Cotton Marketing Quotas Approved in Referendum Vote

Cotton farmers of the South Plains, voted to approve marketing quotas on the 1965 crop by a heavy margin of 98.13 percent Tuesday in a light turnout of voters across the 23 county area.

As stated by the ASC office in Littlefield, in Earth and Pleasant Valley, 27 votes were cast for, 46 against. The state greatly supported the quotas with a 90% vote for the program. Complete but unofficial returns Tuesday night showed an area vote on the South Plains of 6,957 for quotas and 848 against them as South Plains farmers joined in a national referendum.

Approval by at least two-thirds of the farmers voting in the national referendum was required for marketing quotas to continue in effect. Late national returns showed an overwhelming trend for quotas.

Texas cotton farmers last year approved marketing quotas by a margin of 85.2 percent in a total vote of 33,995, the margin nationally last year was 94.2 percent.

attributed the low vote total to the fact that area farmers are still busy harvesting cotton.

Approval of national quotas will mean that price supports will be available next year at 65 to 90 percent of parity to growers who comply with their acreage allotments. An additional price support payment not to exceed 15 percent of the base support rate, also will be available to growers who comply with their domestic allotments, which for 1965 will be 65 percent of the base or original farm allotment. Price support levels on the 1965 crop are not expected to be announced until early next year.

The results of Tuesday's referendum also will mean that marketing quota penalties equal to 50 percent of the cotton parity price as of next June 15, will apply to growers who exceed their acreage allotments. The penalty or "excess" cotton this year was 20.4 cents per pound. Growers who exceed their acreage allotments when marketing quotas are in effect also are not eligible for price support loans.

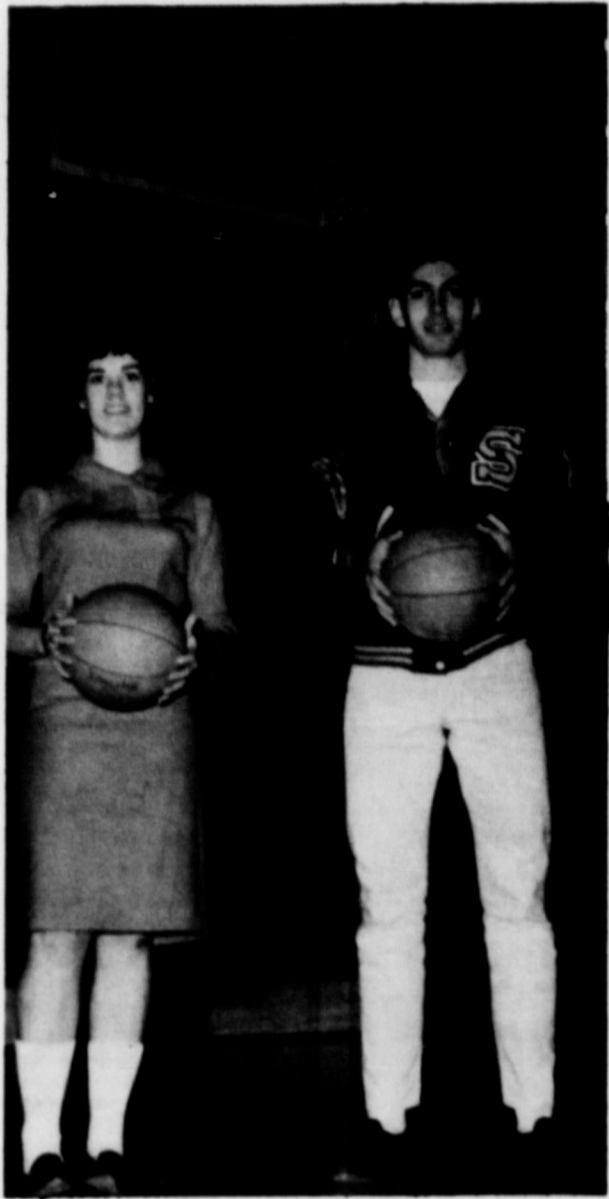

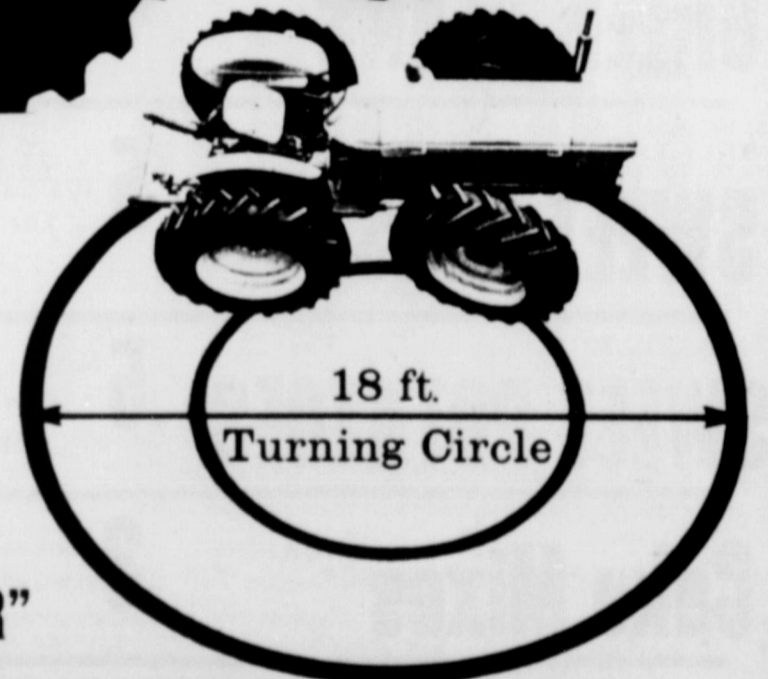
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Springlake Varsity Teams Win First Place Trophies In Tourney

Postmaster Miller announced that all postal operations will be on a holiday schedule Christmas Day. Only special delivery mail will be delivered on December 25.

Miller thanked all the citizens of Earth who cooperated in the "Shop and Mail Early" campaign. "It now appears that we passed the peak for outgoing mail on the 16th. However, there still is a small mountain of holiday mail which must be delivered," he said.

As participants in the Texas Electric Cooperative Youth Tour, local contest winners will travel by chartered bus to Wash-

An ordinance setting forth what constitutes disturbing the peace and providing penalty therefor.

LEGAL NOTICE

ORDINANCE NO. 56

The State Of Texas) County Of Lamb) City Of Earth)

WHEREAS it is deemed expedient and in the interest of public welfare to define what

constitutes disturbing the peace and to provide appropriate punishment therefor;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the City Council of the City of Earth, Lamb County, Texas;

SECTION 1

It shall hereafter be unlawful for any person to go into or near any public place or into or near any private house and use loud and vociferous or obscene language or swear or curse or yell or shriek or make similar loud noises by mechanical means or by sounding automobile horns or by operating automobiles without mufflers, or expose his or her person to another person of the age of 16 years or over, or rudely display any pistol or deadly weapon in a manner calculated to disturb the person or persons present at such place or house.

SECTION 2

Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof, be fined in any sum not to exceed \$200.00.

SECTION 3

All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby expressly repealed.

SECTION 4

This ordinance shall become effective and be in full force and effect from and after the date of its passage and publication as required by law.

The above and foregoing ordinance read, adopted on first

reading and passed to second reading by the following vote this 5th day of October, A. D. 1964, at a regular session of the City Council;

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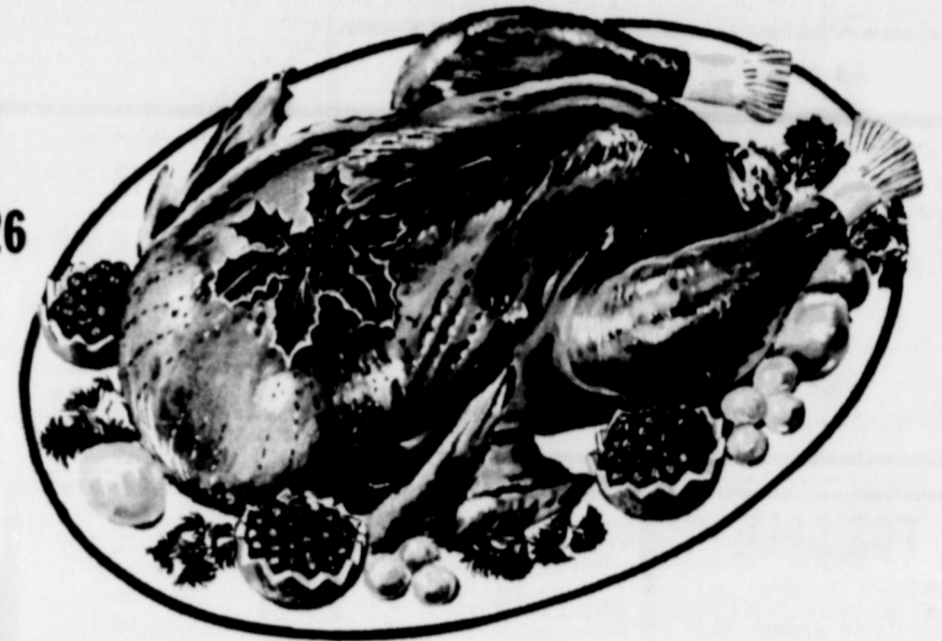

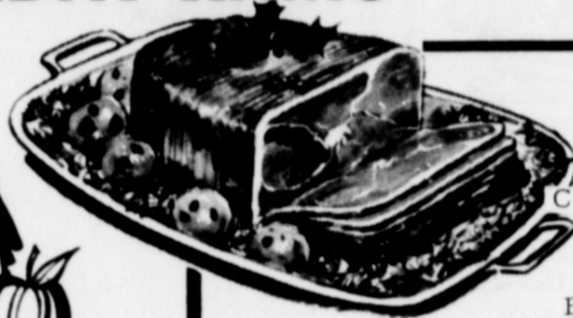
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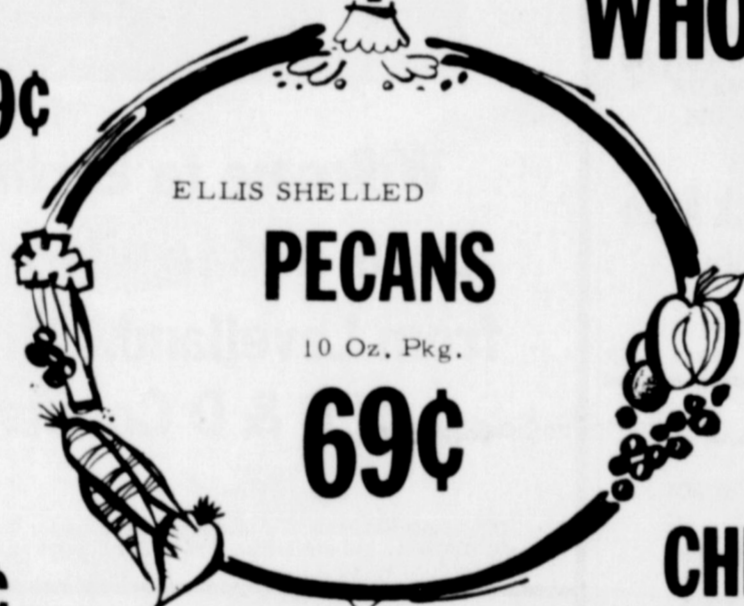
