Election Day November 3 For Hotly Contested National Race

The largest number of votes ever to be cast in any previous National election is expected to be cast Tuesday, November 3, when concerned Americans in every state in the USA are expected to find their way to the polls to cast their vote in this National Election.

Polls have been taken throughout various areas of the nation in an effort to procure a cross-section report to tabulate the pulse of America and how its citizens expect to vote November 3. These polls have revealed varying reports as the tempo increased throughout the long weeks of campaigning. Though the polls varied in their findings, they seemed to pronounce a definite feeling of grave concern to Republicans, and Democrats alike in Metropolitan, small town and rural areas across the nation, indicating a large turnout at the polls.

Voters in this county will receive a ballot bearing 48 candidates seeking the twenty-seven National, State and County offices available. Of this number, 27 are Democrats with a full and complete ticket. Only thirteen of these twenty-seven offices are contested, these of course are contested by this states fast growing Republican party. The Constitution party has only 8 candidates on the ballot. At the bottom of the ballot are three amendments, voters are expected to scratch through all amendments and all candidates on the ballot they do not choose to vote for, leaving only the names of candidates the voter chooses to favor.

The remaining 14 offices have no opponents for the Democrats. To indicate the tremendously heavy voting expected in this election, there has been a total of 185 absentee votes cast in the county, many more than has been customary in past elections.

Absentee voting will end Friday, October 30, at 5:00 p. m. after that time, there will be no voting over the counter or by mail; however, there may be some previously mailed ballots received after that date.

In the general election of 1960, there were 6,293 votes cast. Of this number, 5,634 were bearers of poll tax. 659 voters were exempt through old age. This year, there are 6,133 qualified voters.

Lions Get Current Report Direct From NORAD In Colorado Springs

Curtis Scott, 3rd vice president of the Brownfield Lions, and Division Service Manager for General Telephone Company presented an interesting program Tuesday when local Lions gathered for a noon day luncheon at the community room.

Scot spoke on NORAD, which means, North American Air Defense Command. During the meeting, he called NORAD Headquarters in Colorado Springs, Colorado, and talked with Major H. A. Davis Jr. through a direct channel made available through General Telephone Company. Major Davis gave the following reports:

Here at NORAD Headquarters we have the Space Detection and Tracking System Center. SPADATS has the job of detecting, cataloging, tracking, and predicting the orbits of every man-made object in orbit around the earth. Today we're tracking and accounting for 471 satellites in orbit. 126 of these are actual payloads, they are: 106 USA Satellites, 17 Russian, 2 English, and 1 Canadian, the other 345 objects are what we call space debris, material that goes into orbit with every payload launch. Some of the pieces of junk that we are tracking are no larger than a lead pencil.

Following his report, members of the Lions were permitted to ask the Major questions, he in turn answered their inquiry, giving the lions a clear insight on the operations at NORAD. Now Is The Time For All Good Men ...

Next Tuesday is Election Day. This is a time of perennial, electric excitement which seems unique only to elections. Also, it is a time of sobering sadness. Here's why: This year in Texas there are an estimated 5, 900, 000 people over 21, but only 3, 110, 000 are eligible to vote. And that "eligibility estimate" takes in everybody. Poll-taxpayers, folks who were issued exemptions and those who live in towns who do not require over-age exemptions, and those who registered under the federal provision. So, right off the bat we lost more than two million potential voters. Now, some forecasters predict a voting turnout of 2, 500, 000! Texans. That would be a record, but not a record of which to be proud. That means only about seven out of ten Texans who are eligible to vote will take time out to do so. You-and only you-can do something about it. Only you can go to the polls; only you can cast your vote. It's up to you. You are voting for more than yourself. You are voting for half of Texas which can't vote for themselves.

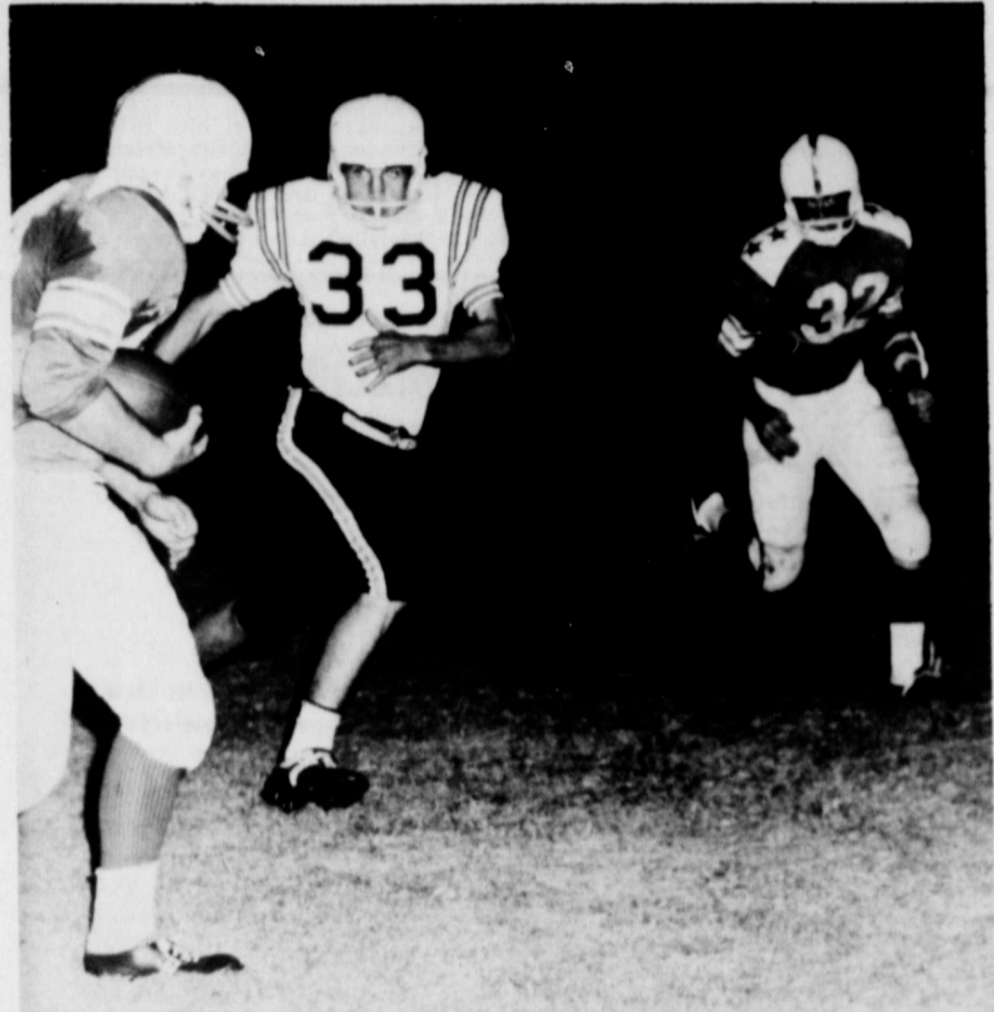

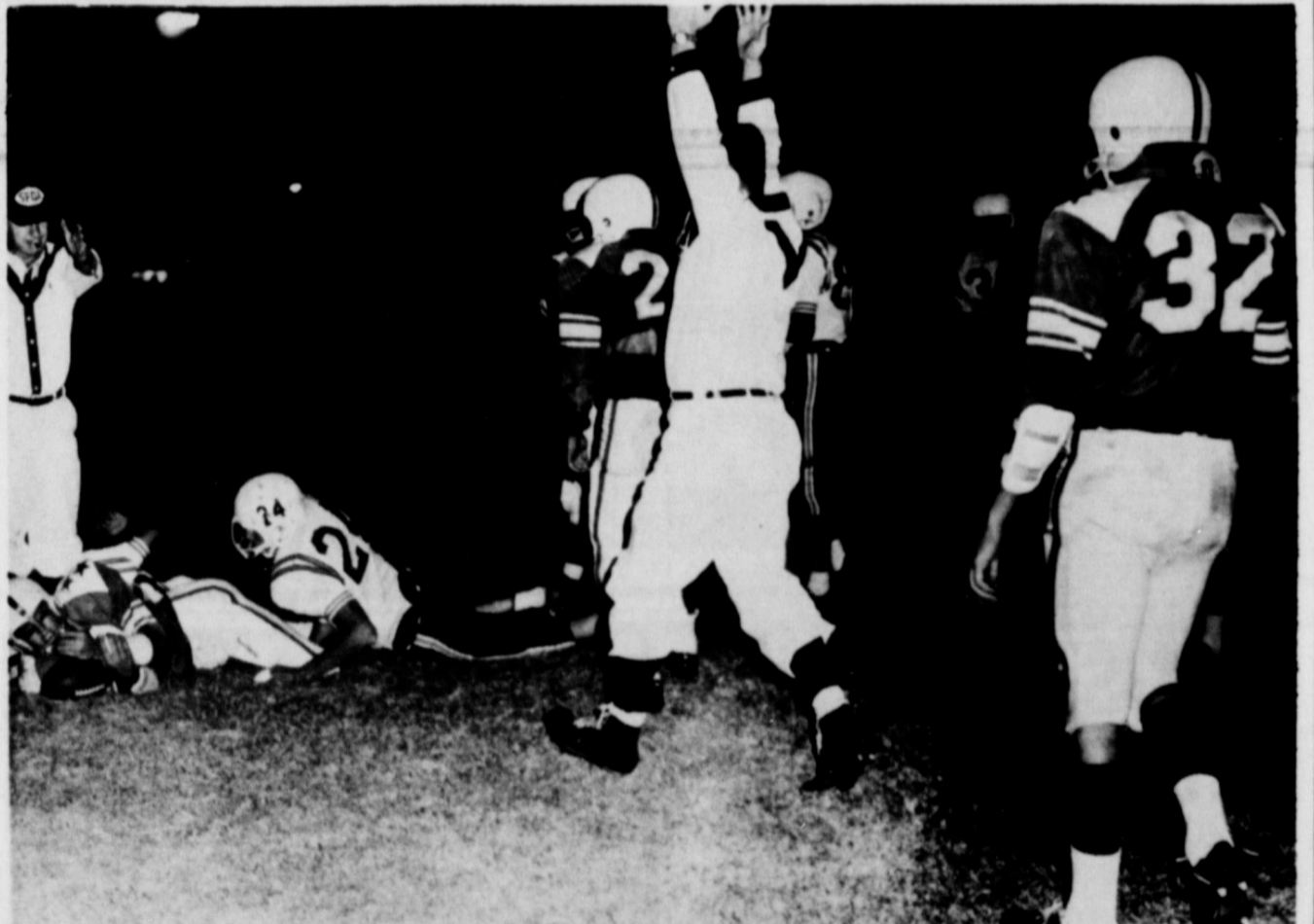

Vote Right Or It Won't Be Counted

Close observers of Texas elections down through the years expect an unusual amount of "ticket splitting" in the General Election November 3rd.

Members of both major parties will be affected; that is, "regular" Democrats may find that they want to cross the party lines to vote for one or more, but not all, Republican nominees; and vice versa.

In the 1960 General Election, at least half a million Texans voted "split tickets." This estimate comes from comparing the total vote received by the Kennedy-Johnson ticket with the Democratic and Republican votes for Governor and other state offices.

The Courts have held, in effect, that there is no legal bar to ballot-splitting. Each voter has the right to make his individual choices, regardless of party, and this right cannot be limited by party action.

The mechanics of ballot-splitting are less complicated than the average voter realizes. To vote for a particular candidate for a particular office, whether on a paper ballot or on a voting machine, the essential thing is to leave his name and mark out the name or names of his opponents in the other columns. In counties that use voting machines, the voter is entitled to receive technical information as to how he can make his vote count as he wants it to count.

Voters using paper ballots need to be reminded that there are other columns than the Democratic and Republican, and that these columns must not be overlooked. The final result must be, simply that only one name is left (in whatever column) for each office. Otherwise, the vote for that office cannot be counted.

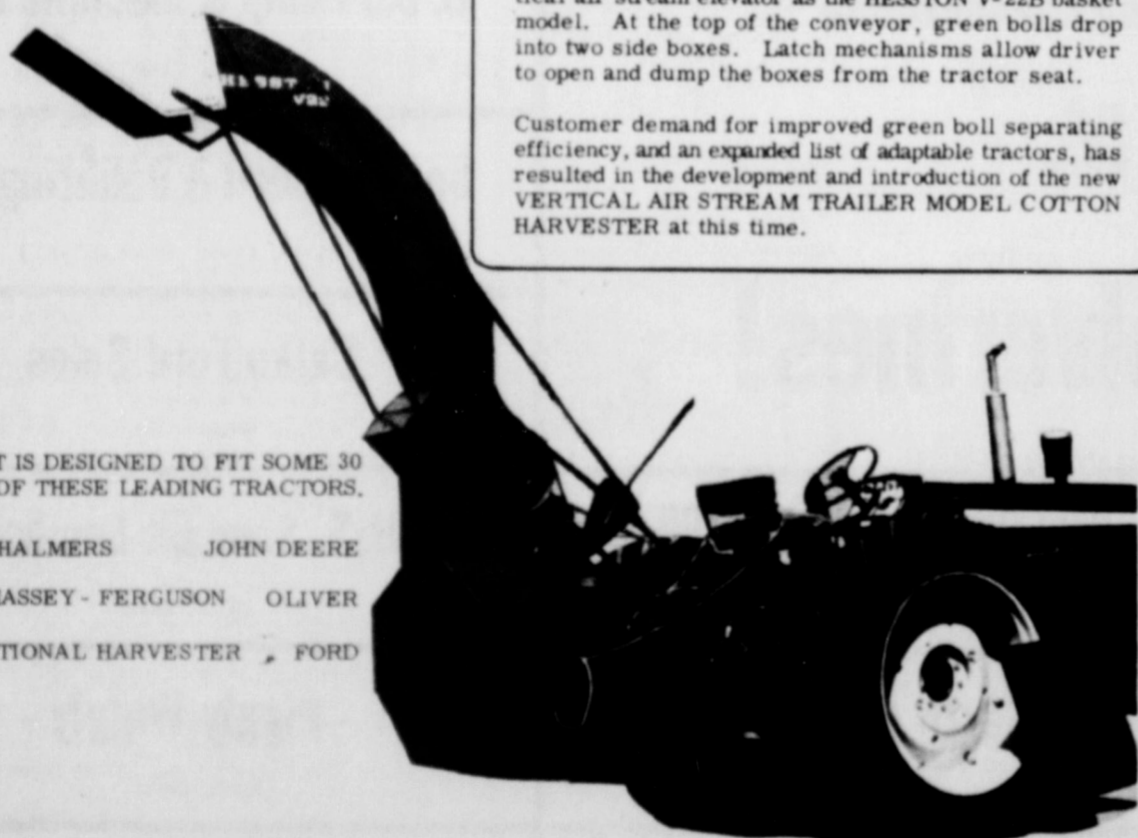
