

They will be among thousands

of CROP workers in the state this month as they call from door to door in their communities seeking" treats" for needy people

CROP is the community Resources Program of Church World Service and collects food, fiber, and cash in communities through out the United States for the world relief programs of the churches,

The youth will join other CROP workers in the state who are seeking contributions of grain, cotton, rice, livestock and cash

for the overseas programs.

Together they will help to provide a meal a day of rice for a Child Feeding Program in Hong Kong where 18,000 children, who have come to the British Crown Colony from Communist China, otherwise do not receive as much as one full meal a day. A gift of \$4 will provide enough rice for a meal a day for one

child for one year. They will help to provide emergency assistance for people left home less by natural disasters of which there were 14 in 1963 In September of this year, for example, 44,000 people were left homeless in Korea due to torrential rains; and through Korea Church World Service, blankets and other items were provided by the contributions of the people of America.

They will help to provide agricultural assistance to other lands, food for wages to build roads and to develop water sup-plies, better seeds, and more effective tools. # **Vote Right Or It Won't Be Counted**

'ticket splitting" in the General Election November 3rd.

Members of both major parties will be affected; that is, "regular" Democrats may find that they want to cross the party lines to vote for one or more, but not all, Republican nominees;

In the 1960 General Election, at least half a million Texans voted "split tickets." This estimate comes from comparing the total vote received by the Kennedy-Johnson ticket with the Democratic and Republican votes for Governor and other state offices.

The Courts have held, in effect, that there is no legal bar to ballot-splitting. Each voter has

the right to make his individual choices, regardless of party, and this right cannot be limited

The mechanics of ballot-splitting are less complicated than the average voter realizes. To vote for a particular candidate for a particular office, whether on a paper ballot or on a voting machine, the essential thing is to leave his name and mark out the name or names of his opponents in the other columns. In counties that use voting machines, the voter is entitled to receive technical information as to how he can make his vote count as he wants it to count.

Voters using paper ballets need to be reminded that there are other columns than the Democratic and Republican, and that these columns must not be overlooked. The final result must be, simply that only one name is left (in whatever column) for each office. Otherwise, the
