During National Bible Week, the annual award of the Layman's Bible Committee went to Taylor for his 16 years of work.

A side epic is the growth of Taylor's home born publishing firm, Tyndale House, Wheaten, of whice he is president. Tyndale House now handles 75 other published titles and has a multi-million-dollar sales volume. It has an expanded \$300,000 plant, more than 50 employees and a branch in England named for William Tyndale's colleague in Bible translations, Miles Coverdale.
