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Maize Crop Worth \$16 Million

Lamb County's 1962 feed grain crop, "Queen Maize", will top the \$16 million mark, according to top agriculture officials. "This is one of the best grain years we have had in the county's history" according to L. D. Aten, ASCS office manager.

Based on the average production on both irrigated and dry land, and the price, both support and open market, plus the amount paid for layout lands, the total figure should be about \$16,500,000 or about \$300,000 more than last year.

The crop is about 98% harvested with only a very small amount of late dryland maize left in the fields. Dry, sunny weather is all that is needed to complete the harvesting.

"There is approximately 185,000 acres planted in feed grain this year," Aten remarked Friday, "and about 55,000 acres is in layout lands."


"The average yield on irrigated land is 6,000 pounds and on dry land it is 2400", he stated. Of the total acreage about 30% is dryland and the remainder is irrigated. The average yields this season are larger on irrigated and smaller on dryland.

Based on these figures and the fact that 78% of the farms are in the feed grain program, the \$16,500,000 was derived. Of this total, \$3,500,000 was paid in layout land payments with the remainder being the actual amount received for grain.

Figuring that the irrigated land produced the average the total yield would be 777,000,000 pounds and using the average for dryland the total yield would be 133,200,000 pounds for a grand total of 910,200,000 pounds of grain for the county.

Taking into consideration that 24% of the total will be sold in the open market at an average price of \$1.60, the figure is \$3,494,848 and taking the remainder, minus the over-production, at the support price of \$1.86, the figure is \$10,016,865 and taking the over-production at the open market price the total is \$2,213,664.

Aten said that his office has already placed over \$8 million in the loan program and he expected the total to run close to \$10 million before the deadline is reached.

Three Escape Injury Tuesday

A car-transport collision about 7 miles north of Littlefield on U. S. 385 Tuesday at 6:50 p. m. resulted in heavy damage to the 1961 Impala Chevrolet, driven by Phil Middleton 15, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ross Middleton, publishers of the Earth News-Sun.

The youth was accompanied by David Glasscock and Ray Tom Packard and were on their way to attend an FFA District banquet at Littlefield.

The International oil transport, owned by Permian Oil Company (driver's name not available) was traveling north and the Middleton car was going south. Phil attempted to retrieve and article that had fallen to the floor of the car, diverting his attention momentarily from the road as he neared the top of a hill. The driver of the approaching transport saw the auto swerve into the left traffic lane and pulled his vehicle to the right. The rear bumper of the transport caught the left front of the Chevrolet, ripping away the entire left front fender plus other damages.

No one was injured due to the quick reaction of the transport driver when he avoided what might have been a head-on collision. Joaquin Jackson of the Texas Highway Patrol, Littlefield, investigated. The Middleton youth was issued a ticket for wrong side of road, not passing.

Local Students In Three Year Testing Program

Springlake students in grades 7, 9, 10 and 11 are being tested in the second series of three-year testing programs.

The initial 3-year contract beginning in 1949 has been completed and the Texas Education Agency has begun a new series. It is reported that Springlake students rank well with national norms.

Junior and senior high school students in more than 800 Texas schools are participating in the three-year testing program sponsored by the Texas Education Agency to evaluate current standards of education in the state and to determine the possible need for revision of the state curriculum outlines.

An estimated 200,000 students in grades 7, 9, 10 and 11 are being given a series of standardized tests published by Science Research Associates, Inc., Chicago based educational publishing firm, in an effort to measure their educational ability in the natural and social sciences, mathematics and English, and their aptitudes in the job skills, interests, reasoning ability and language usage areas. Tests of other publishers are also being used in the state-wide program.

The TEACH Battery, a specially constructed combination of tests designed to meet Texas Education Agency curriculum specifications, is being used in 9th grade. Other SRA tests used in the study are the company's Tests of Educational Ability (TEA) and Achievements Series (FACT) in 9th and 10th grades and the Iowa Tests of Educational Development (ITED) in 11th.

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Two will go to Washington D. C. in December. They will meet the President and tour the

capital, accompanied by parents and Ford dealer.

Results of all local contests were tabulated in Dearborn, Michigan.





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
