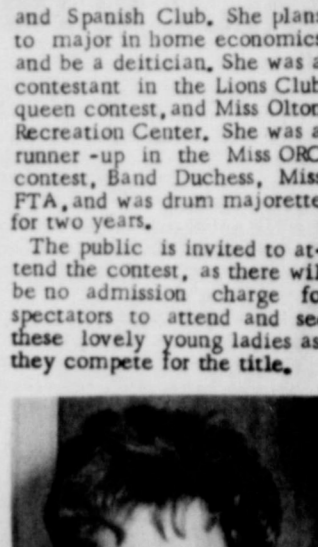

### Three Injured Thursday In One Car Accident

Three youths miraculously escaped instant death in a one car mishap last

night around 11:45 p.m. when the driver of a 1963 Ford Fairlane, headed west, went off the highway on the wrong side of the road, and traveled 123 yards in the bar ditch, before hitting a concrete culvert, completely demolishing the vehicle.

Injured in the accident were Jerry Dale Ammons, 20, of 1021 Duncan Ave., Littlefield, driver of the automobile, Sammy Gene Smith, 17 years old, Littlefield, and Jimmy Kesler, 17, of Lubbock.

Both Ammons and Smith are in the Littlefield Hospital, listed in fair condition, and the Kesler youth was admitted to the Goodnight Hospital in

Lubbock, was released Friday. Investigators have not been able to determine the cause of the accident, which happened three miles east of Earth on Highway 70, at the school road intersection.

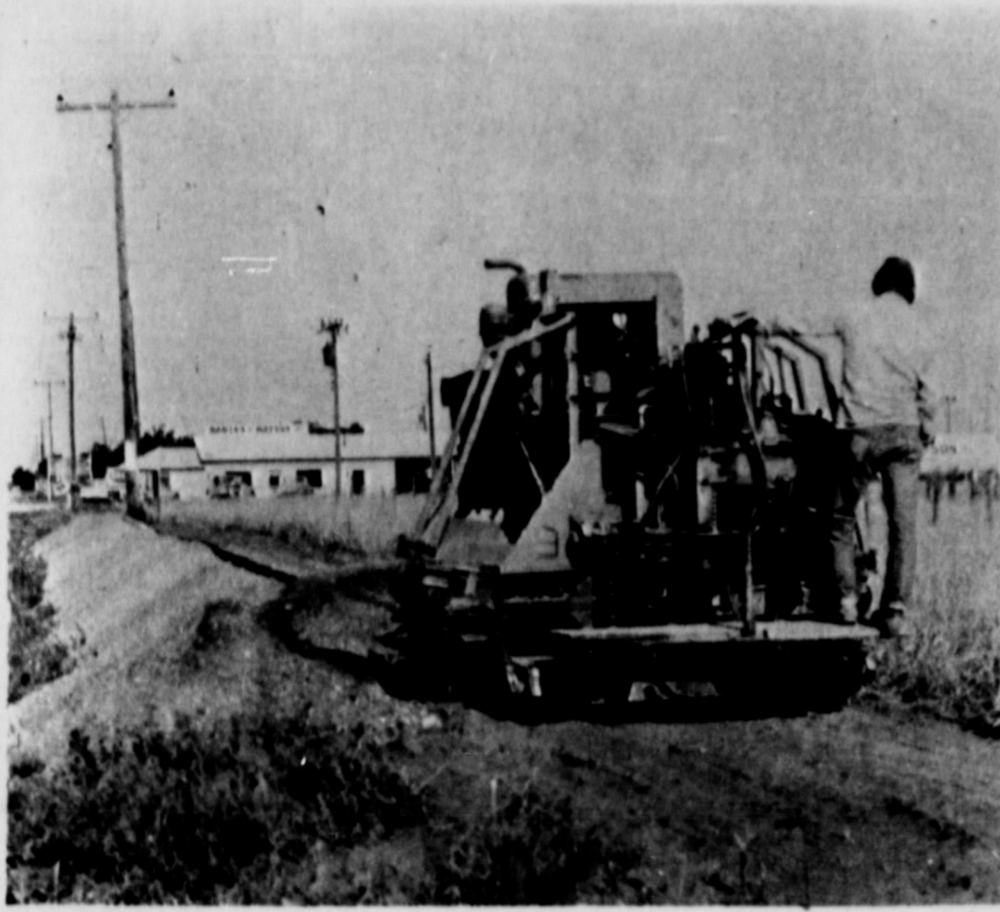

### PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1963. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 28 proposing an amendment to Article XVI, Section 62 of the Constitution of Texas, by adding thereto a new subsection authorizing all political subdivisions of Jefferson County, Texas, to provide retirement, disability and death benefits for all appointive officers and employees of all political subdivisions within Jefferson County, providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding thereto a new subsection (e), reading as follows:

"(e) Each political subdivision within Jefferson County, Texas, shall have the right to provide for and administer a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for all appointive officers and employees of all political subdivisions within Jefferson County, Texas; or said political subdivision may elect to join the County Retirement System of Jefferson County, provided that same is authorized by a majority vote of the qualified voters of such political subdivision and after such election has been advertised by being published in at least one (1) newspaper of general circulation in said county once each week for four (4) consecutive weeks; provided that the amount contributed by the said political subdivision to such Fund shall at least equal the amount paid for the same purposes from the income of each such person and shall not exceed at any time seven and one-half per centum (7 1/2%) of the compensation paid to such such person by the political subdivision.

"All funds provided for the compensation of each such person, or by the political subdivision of Jefferson County, Texas, for such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund, as are received by the political

subdivision within said county, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or counties or cities of this state, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States Government, the payment of the principal of and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States, provided that a sufficient amount of said funds shall be kept on hand to be determined by the agency which may be provided by law to administer said Fund; and providing that the recipients of benefits for said Fund shall not be eligible for any other pension retirement fund or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless the Fund, the creation of which is provided for herein, contributed by the political subdivision is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at the General Election in November, 1964, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the following words:

"FOR the addition of subsection (e) to Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution, to authorize all political subdivisions within Jefferson County, Texas, to establish, after approval of its voters, a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund covering all appointive officers and employees of said political subdivisions."

"AGAINST the addition of subsection (e) to Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution, to authorize all political subdivisions within Jefferson County, Texas, to establish, after approval of its voters, a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund covering all appointive officers and employees of said political subdivisions."

Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election to be held on the first Saturday after the first Monday in the month of November, 1963, and have notice of said proposed amendment and of said election published as required by the Constitution of Texas and laws of this state.

## Water Safety Alert Issued By State

The Texas Safety Association this week issued a "water safety alert" warning the public of potential water hazards and citing an apparent increase in drownings.

"Drowning is the fourth leading cause of accidental death in Texas, with approximately 300 fatalities a year," J. O. Musick, TSA General Manager said.

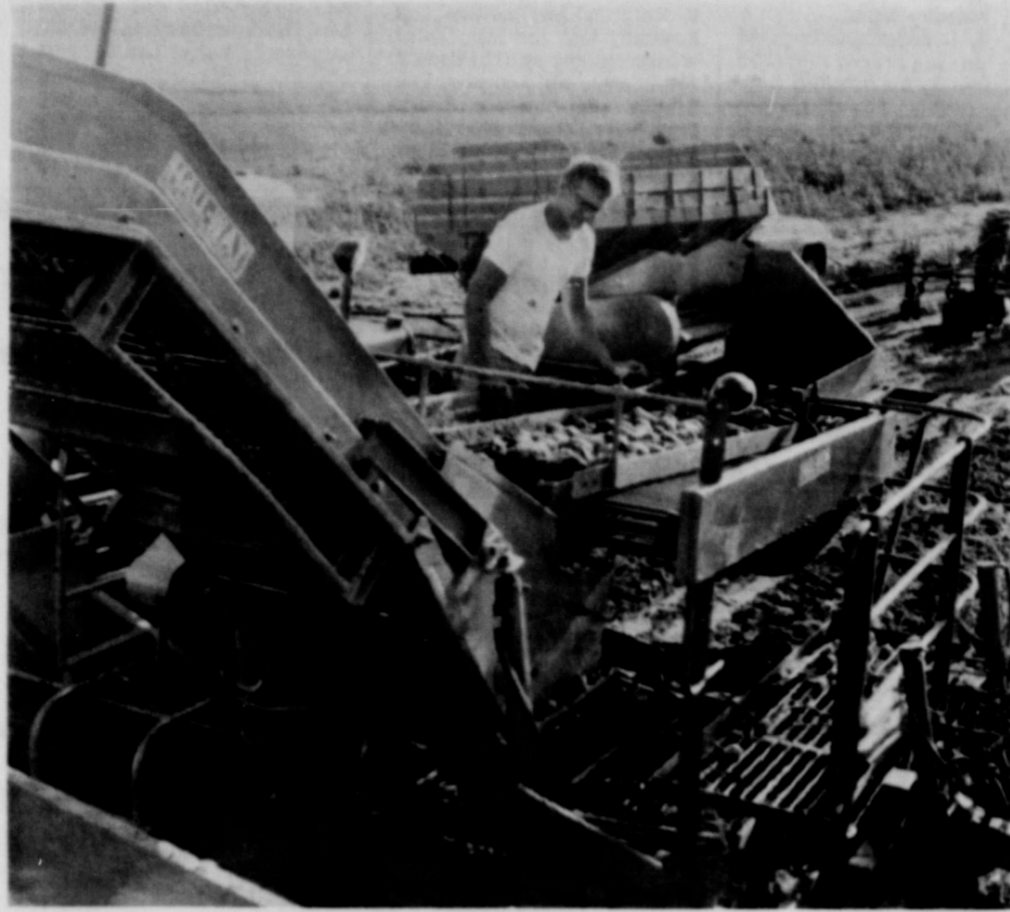
"Reports for the past six weeks indicate an increase in the number of drownings over the same period last year, and unless water enthusiasts start putting safety first, fatalities will continue to increase."

Noting that many drownings are occurring in lakes, the safety director said anyone planning to swim, boat or ski on a lake, should familiarize himself with the hazards of that particular body of water.

"Nearly two out of three drownings in the nation are non-swimming deaths—people fall into the water from docks, bridges and shores. Small children step into deep water when wading and some fall out or may be thrown from boats," Musick explained.

"Of course, the first and most important thing to do to prevent drowning is for every body to learn to swim, and if you are going to enjoy water recreation with any degree of safety, this is a 'must'."

He said anyone going "near the water" should remember

## 70 MPH Speed Limit Goes Into Effect August 23

More than two-thirds of the Texas highway system will come under the new 70-miles per hour daytime maximum speed for passenger cars which becomes effective August 23, the Texas Highway Commission revealed last week.

Under the speed control law passed by the Legislature this spring, all highways not zoned down by the Commission will automatically go to the new 70-mph speed August 23. This means that some 41,500 miles of the state-maintained highway system will be allowed to come under the higher maximum speed.

The Commission passed a Minute Order which zoned some 18,640 miles of the highway system at a maximum of 60 miles per hour day

time and 55 miles per hour at night for passenger cars, effective August 23. These highways will be restricted to the lower speed limit because engineering studies indicate they are inadequate to accommodate a 70-miles-per-hour maximum.

The Commission's action followed a series of engineering traffic studies conducted throughout the state by the Highway Department's 25 highway districts.

A large percentage of Texas' vast Farm to Market Road system will come under the 70-mile maximum, although some of these roads (and some of the older primary routes) will be restricted to the lower 60-mph maximum where conditions warrant.

10. Have one extra person in a boat when water-skiing at all times. This person can watch the skier and the driver can watch the traffic.

## Abnormal Cotton Poses Problem

Widespread appearance of oddly formed cotton plants is furrowing the brow of many Texas cotton producers, especially in the Coastal Bend area. Research scientists at Texas A&M College are puzzled, too, as the abnormal development of cotton plants seems to be on the increase. The condition also has been reported on the High Plains, in the Brazos Valley, the Blacklands and in Arkansas, Louisiana and Mississippi.

Generally, the trouble begins about 35 to 45 days after planting when terminal growth ceases for reasons still not completely understood, says Dr. C. S. Miller, professor and plant physiologist at A&M. When terminal growth stops, forced axillary branching produces bushy, sometimes dwarfed plants and delays normal fruiting.

Losses to the farmer may be severe or almost negligible, depending upon weather conditions that follow. With good late rains, normal yields may be harvested, even on fields where most of the plants are affected. But the delayed harvest will increase the chances of losing mature cotton in the field.

Dr. Miller says that recent studies strongly indicate that no single factor such as air pollution, insects, drought,

high winds or disease is responsible for the abnormally developed plants. For example intensive field and laboratory tests conducted by Dr. Luther S. Bird, plant pathologist, so far have failed to point the finger of blame at any pathogenic organism of virus. And the condition is far too wide spread for air pollution to be considered the basic cause he added.

Because of the urgent need for a solution, a team of research scientists at A&M has stepped up its efforts to find an answer. One project, headed by Dr. Morris E. Bloodworth will attempt to duplicate the abnormal growth condition in an environmental control chamber. "When we find exactly what is causing the problem, we will be in a much better position to do something about it," Dr. Miller said.

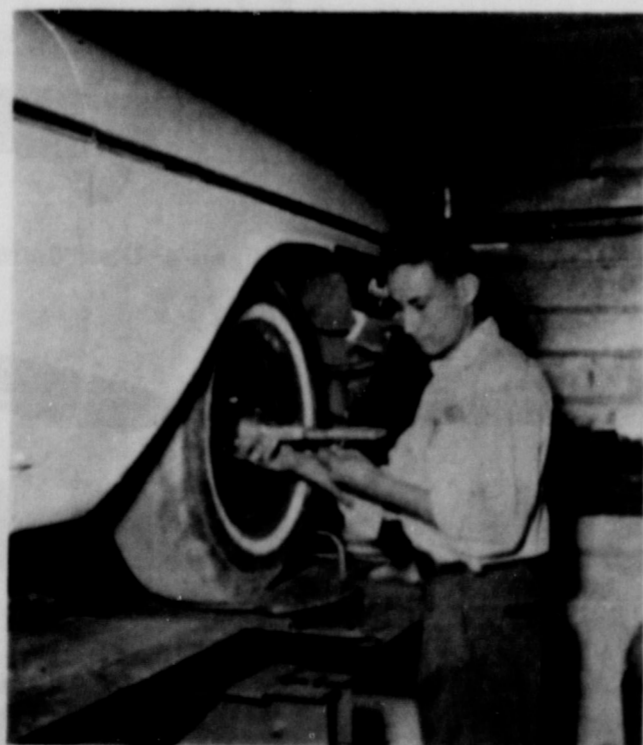
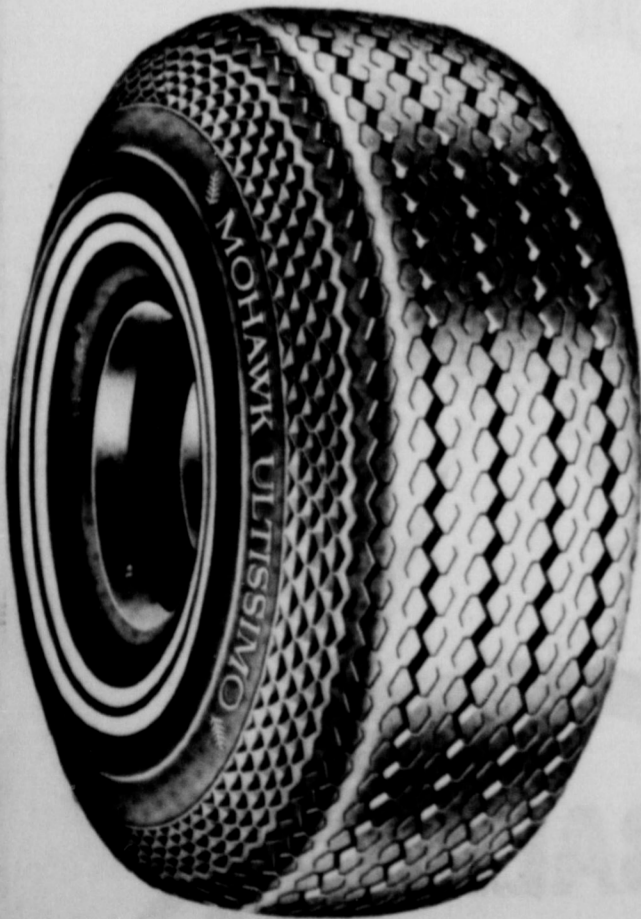

## Texas Department Of Public Safety Seeks Applicants

Higher pay, better training, more opportunities and a chance to be located near present home were featured items in the Texas Department of Public Safety's bid this month for more than a hundred new highway patrolmen.

The vacancies for Texas Highway Patrolmen were announced by Major Harry Hutchison, Regional Commander of the DPS, as the first openings available for additional highway patrolmen only since 1957. Until this time applicants made application for the position of patrolman within any of the department's four uniformed field services. Due to the shortage of highway patrolmen, a training school will be held in November for the Highway Patrol Service alone according to the Major.

Hutchison said, "Many favorable features are available to new members of the DPS that were not enjoyed previously."

Every effort will be made to assign prospective applicants within one hundred miles of their present home. Trainees will draw higher pay while in training which will automatically increase to a basic salary of \$453.00 per month upon graduation. New employees will receive thorough training in every function conducted by the Texas Highway Patrol, qualifying them for immediate transfers and promotions to other positions outside their regular function. . . Not only

## Lamb County Oil-Gas Data Released

With oil production worth about \$2.9 million a year, Lamb County citizens have a financial stake in the world wide demand for energy and the complex economic and political problems involving the petroleum industry, according to statistics released this week by Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association.

"We have pulled together some figures from the most authoritative sources so residents of Lamb County can see how local pocketbooks are affected by some of the issues which involve our industry," said J. Clyde Tomlinson, Association president. "Issues of current concern include the proposals to cut percentage depletion rates, extension of federal controls over prices at which Texas producers sell their gas, and development of laws and production methods that will help Texas compete with other states and nations for markets."

The latest year for which U.S. Bureau of Mines figures are available (1961) shows Lamb County producing more than 929,000 barrels of crude oil, valued at about \$2.8 million. In 1961 there were 95 producing oil wells in the county, according to the Texas Railroad Commission.

Although its first field was discovered 18 years ago, Lamb County is the scene for the industry's continued search for oil and gas. Three wells were drilled in the county last year, with all being wildcat exploratory wells, according to the Oil and Gas Journal. The Association estimated that more than \$170,000 was spent on drilling these wells. All were dry holes. Close to \$80,000 was spent last year on geophysical crews using seismic devices to probe the underground formations of Lamb County for possible drilling locations.

Leasing adds many thousands of dollars to the county's economy. Tabulations by the International Oil Scouts Association show major companies in 1961 were paying rent on about 90,000 undeveloped acres, which comprise about one-eighth of the county's area. Royalty payments to Lamb County farmers, ranchers and other landowners are running at more than \$345,000 annually, the Association calculates.

Lamb County producers and royalty owners also make a sizable contribution to the support of state government, with production tax payments of more than \$127,000 a year.

Industry taxes likewise are important to the county government and school districts in the county. For instance, 19% of the local property taxes collected for the Littlefield Independent School District comes from oil and gas operators.

Some impact on the Lamb County economy has been registered by petroleum industry payrolls. According to figures from the Texas Employment Commission, the industry payroll is more than \$355,000 a year, with the average employee receiving more than \$4,900 annually.

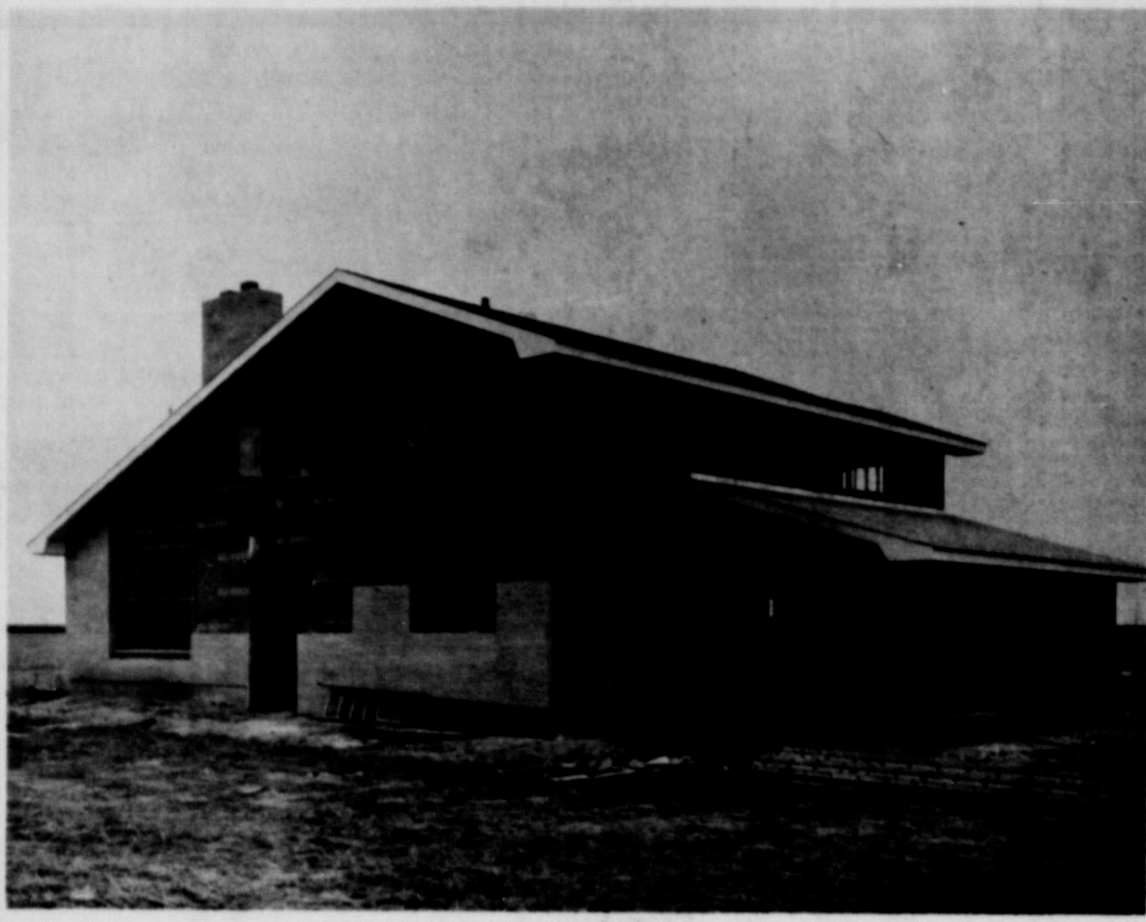

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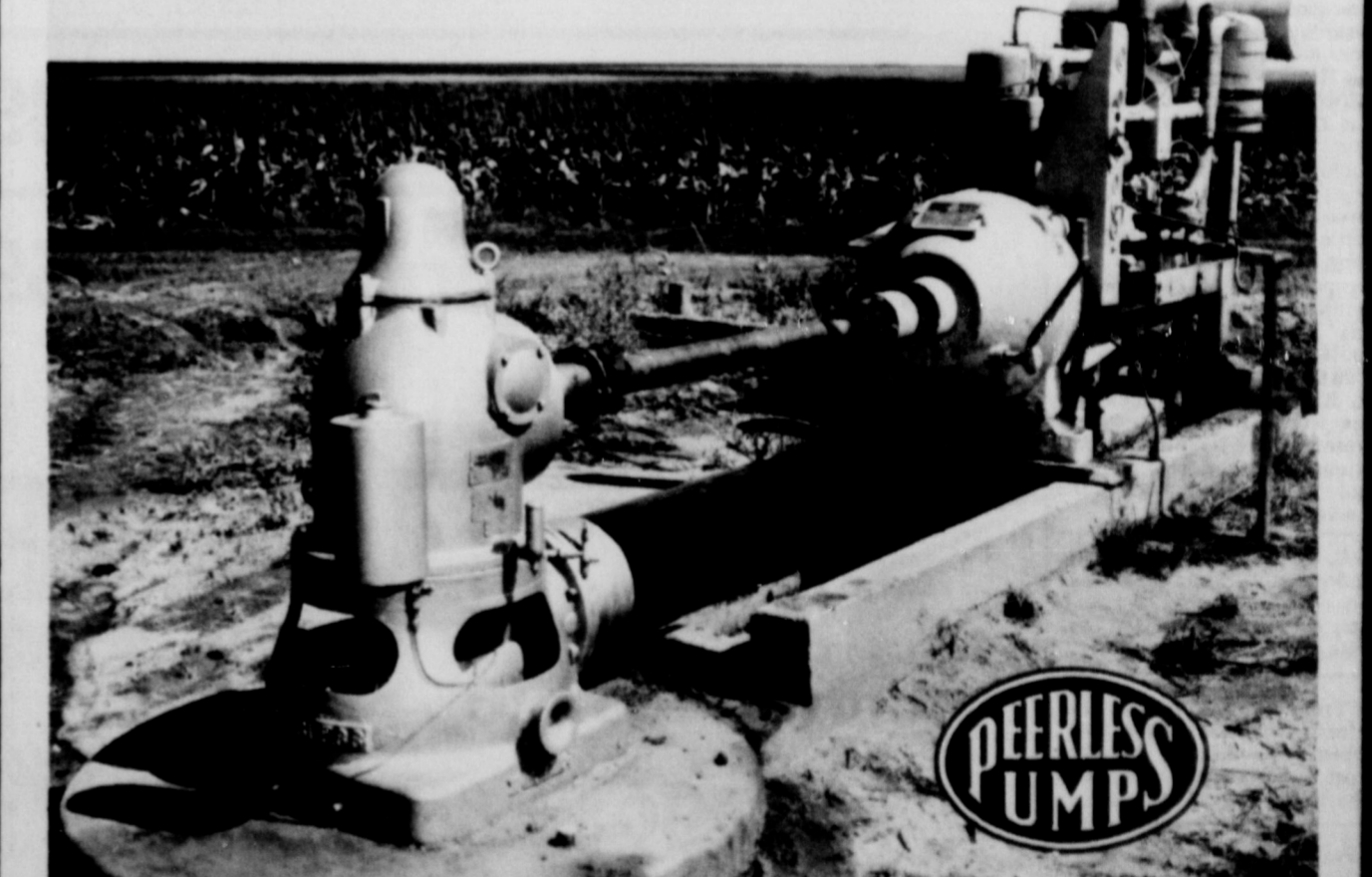

## USDA Develops New Cotton Boll Attachment Device

An improved cotton crop and earlier harvesting may be brought to the High Plains of Texas and Oklahoma by an experimental cotton boll separator attachment, reports the U. S. Dept. of Agriculture. The attachment for cotton strippers harvesters effectively separates immature cotton bolls from mature bolls, thus solving a problem that has long complicated early harvesting. A USDA spokesman told of the new device at a recent meeting of the American Society of Agricultural Engineers. It was developed by the USDA scientists in cooperation with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at Lubbock. In explaining the machine, the spokesman pointed out that cotton harvested before a killing frost has a higher lint quality than cotton harvested

following a frost because the crop is exposed to less weathering. However, when the crop is harvested before frost, it contains many immature bolls that must be separated from mature cotton before it is ginned. In the High Plains, cotton is usually harvested after the first killing frost by the non-selective process of stripping all bolls from the plants at the same time. The new machine works by blowing the light, fluffy mature cotton through a conveyor into a wagon or basket. The heavier immature bolls drop into a box and are later piled in the field to dry. This cotton can be sold after it has dried, though it is of low quality.

## General Telephone Co. Has New Equipment For Speedy Billing

Data processing equipment which prints ten lines per second will be printing bills received next month by customers of General Telephone Company. The speed with which the equipment operates will enable the billing department to keep pace with the ever increasing number of customers to be billed each month. When the present type bills were initiated in 1954 it was considered a step forward in customer service and operating efficiency, according to a telephone company official. The new data processing system is a still greater improvement. The data processing equipment, which is housed in the Company's Revenue Accounting Center in San Antonio, Texas is made up primarily of

three units: a read-punch unit, a central processing or memory unit and a printer. Instructions key-punched into codes are fed into the read-punch unit, which in turn transmits the instructions to the memory unit and "tells" the memory unit computations to be made and instructions to be carried out. If the memory machine is instructed to print stored information, then it sends instructions to the printer to print the desired information. The new machines have 8,000 "memory" units which can carry out instructions so fast that the time is expressed in terms of millionths of a second. The printer prints up to 600 lines per minute. Initial plans for converting to the new data processing billing system began early in

1961. Programming of the system has been underway since November 1961. Any questions concerning the new bills should be directed to your telephone company business office.

## Sample Soil Now For Fall Planting

Now is the time to have your soil tested in preparation for fall planting, says William F. Bennett, soil chemist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Early soil sampling is encouraged by the chemist to avoid the fall rush that crowds the state's three testing laboratories. Samples being received now are mostly from pastures, fall-seeded crops and lawn or flower beds, he says. The number of samples received during May and June was about normal for this per-

iod at all three labs. In May 839 samples were tested and 495 were examined in June. The A&M College lab led in the number of samples received, with the High Plains lab second and the Baylor Co. facility handling the lowest number. Harris county topped the list of those submitting samples with 55, while Henderson county had 42 and Hale County submitted 27 samples. Bennett reminds that established legume pastures are among the crops that will need fertilization this fall. An increasing number of acres is being seeded to vetch, Crimson and White clover and since fertility needs of these crops vary, soil samples should be taken, he says. One element of special importance to East Texas and Coast Prairie Farmers is lime, points out Bennett. He says that three-fourths of the East Texas soils and one-half of the eastern Coast Prairie soils need lime, and it should soon be applied to them for fall plantings.

## Value of Farm, Ranch Products Extended by Oil

The value of Texas' farm and ranch production is exceeded by only one other raw material, oil. The value of the state's total yearly agricultural production exceeds the payroll for manufacturing, or the total of construction awards or the payroll for retail trades, points out John McHaney, extension economist. Farm and ranch production each year has a total value of just under 2.5 billion dollars, but, explains McHaney, agriculture adds much more to our total economy than just income from the sale of products. Business firms which assemble, process, distribute, transport wholesale and retail the products of Texas farms and ranches employ about 20% of the labor

force of the state and add about 3.9 billion dollars to the agribusiness economy. Their primary concern is to get the agricultural products to the final consumer in the desired form and at the right place and time. Simple addition, says McHaney, shows that the sale of agricultural products plus the costs of processing and distributing them annually adds to the state's economy about \$6.3 billion. The economic destiny of most Texas counties, the economist adds, hinges primarily on the agribusiness economy. And commenting upon the future of the Texas agricultural industry, McHaney emphasizes the future will belong to those people and states which work to keep their agricultural economy competitive with other areas of the nation and world. Agriculture, he adds, is no longer a way of life but rather a big competitive business. He's strong for keeping the industry in Texas in a strong competitive position.
