Appearing in contest for state music Region I will be 28 school bands, among them our own Springlake Wolverine Band.

This is the annual marching contest for Region I, and will be quite a spectacular affair.

Beginning the festival will be massed snare drum rolls, "To The Colors" by cornets from the bands

present followed by a fanfare by all the band en masse.

Immediately following these opening exercises, the number one band will present its contest routine followed in succession by each of the other 27 bands.

The Wolverine Band is to be band No. 5.

The closing ceremony will consist of mass twirling (all twirlers from each band) while all the bands together play "Say It With Music".

After the playing of this number the award ceremony will take place, with all bands who rate either a first or second division receiving a trophy.

Tickets may be purchased from any member of the Wolverine Band at 50 cents for adults and 25 cents for students. All spectator cars are asked to be parked on the West side of Jones Stadium, leaving room for the band buses on the East side of the stadium.

Some want certain laws liberalized.

ed. Others want them tightened. Many departments of State Government seek new or increased appropriations.

Examples in the news:

STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION wants \$50,000 a year for the next two fiscal years for education and rehabilitation of mentally retarded.

BOARD FOR STATE HOSPITALS AND SPECIAL SCHOOLS wants the state cigarette tax providing \$5,000,000 a year for its building program continued two more years. Contingent on this, it asks \$11,000,000 for building improvements in the next biennium.

TEXAS PRISON BOARD wants some \$5,500,000 for new building and staff needs resulting from an 80 per cent jump in prison population.

TEXAS LAW ENFORCEMENT CONFERENCE wants 29 law changes aimed at updating criminal detection and trial procedures. Typical items: set up a statewide file of fingerprints of convicted felons; allow drunk driving convictions up-

on scientific blood tests, provide public defenders for defendants without funds, etc.

TEXAS JUNIOR CHAMBER OF COMMERCE wants to institute annual legislative sessions with annual and more substantial salaries.

TEXAS CONGRESS OF PARENTS AND TEACHERS wants a 10-point program involving improvement of the school system and teacher salaries, strengthening of laws concerning juveniles, banning of common law marriages, sale of narcotics to children and sale of fireworks.

COSTLY CHANGE—At an approximate cost of \$1.00 per vote, Texans have approved a plan to aid the permanently disabled.

It was the third time in history the Legislature fumbled its calendar in setting a constitutional amendment election. Eight amendments were taken care of with the general election. But the ninth, by error, was dated for a week later.

Confused or short of funds, nine counties held no election. Another held it a week early. In all, some 200,000 straggled to the polls. Estimated cost: \$200,000.

Under the amendment, qualified persons will receive \$58 a month, \$20 from the state, balance from federal funds.

NAACP SEEKS MOVE—Next encounter between the state and the NAACP will be in Tyler district court Dec. 3. NAACP will then seek to have the site of future hearings changed from Tyler to Dallas or Austin.

Last month in Tyler Dist. Judge Otis T. Dunagan granted a temporary injunction against operation of the NAACP in Texas. Defendants gave oral notice of appeal.

Since, the organization abandoned appeal efforts and asked for a full trial on merits. If it loses this, the injunction becomes permanent.

Atty. Gen. John Ben Sheppard said his staff already is at work preparing and that he "earnestly hopes" the trial can be completed in December. Sheppard will be succeeded by Will Wilson on Jan. 1.

OIL BOOST OKAYED—Texas' December oil allowable will be 3,142,592 barrels daily—an increase of 75,593 barrels a day.

A 16-day production pattern was set by the Railway Commission, compared to 15 days in November.

Several major companies had urged 17 to 19 producing days because of disruption of supply lines from the Middle East. But representatives of Texas Independent Producers and Royalty Owners contended crisis needs could be met with surplus oil in above-ground storage.

In announcing the 16-day pattern Comm. Chairman William Murray said the commission could issue a

half-month emergency order later if necessary.

STATE WINS TIDELAND—State Supreme Court added to Texas' public domain in a case settling the boundary between tidal and landholder's property.

"Highest tide of the year," not "average high tide," determines the dividing line between tidelands and coast land, ruled the court.

In the test case Texas gained 4,986 acres of mud flats along Laguna Madre north of Port Isabel.

Eventual result, said Atty. Gen. John Ben Sheppard, will be the gaining of hundreds of thousands of acres and millions of dollars for the permanent school fund.

Tidelands, according to law, belong to the state. Income is earmarked for education.

TAX ISSUE CLARIFIED—Corporation franchise taxes do not have to be figured on the rate in effect at the end of the year of the rate was lower during the year.

Third Court of Civil Appeals so ruled in a suit brought by Southland Cotton Oil Company to recover taxes paid under protest.

During most of Southland's first year the franchise tax was \$1.25 per \$1,000 taxable base. By the end of the year the rate was up to \$2.00.

State officials contended the company should compute the entire year's taxes at the \$2.00 rate. Southland paid the full amount but sued for recovery.

GRAIN CROPS SKID—Texas' 56 grain crops will be substantially less than last year, but better than expected earlier.

A 28 million bushel corn crop is forecast by the U. S. Dept. of

Food Service Team Improves Navy Chow

WASHINGTON, D. C. (PHOTO) As U. S. Navy men around the world sit down to their Thanksgiving dinners they will have cause to thank "County Fairs" for the excellent flavor of the turkeys.

Navy Food Service Teams have been touring the world since 1953, bent on improving the meals served aboard ships and at shore stations.

When the teams first started their two-week visits to Navy galleys, resistance to their kitchen and dining hall tips developed from some of the old timers. They didn't like "outsiders" in their galleys, and the idea lingered that the food service team experts were holding an inspection.

The "County Fairs" is the plan that the teams have adopted to counter this unfounded idea. At the "Fairs," cooks from galleys in the area where the "Fair" is being held are invited to attend. They sit in to watch and judge the results of the visiting cooks and bakers.

As the pies, cakes, salads, meats and other dishes are turned out by the team of experts, local cooks judge and score them. While nobody gets a blue ribbon for the "best in show," this scoring leads

to lively informal discussions of the right and wrong methods of food preparation. To get the feminine viewpoint, wives of the cooks are also invited.

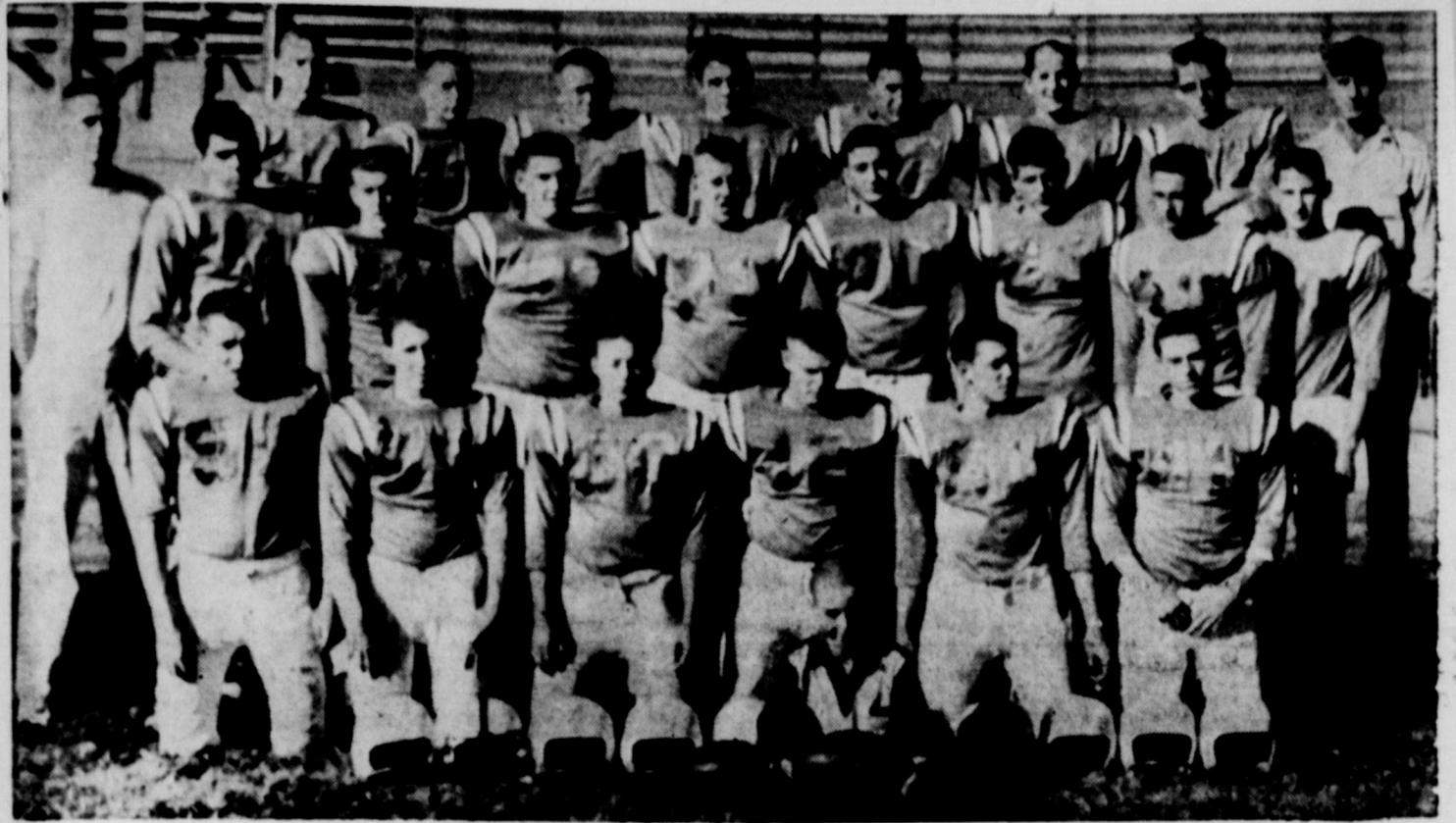

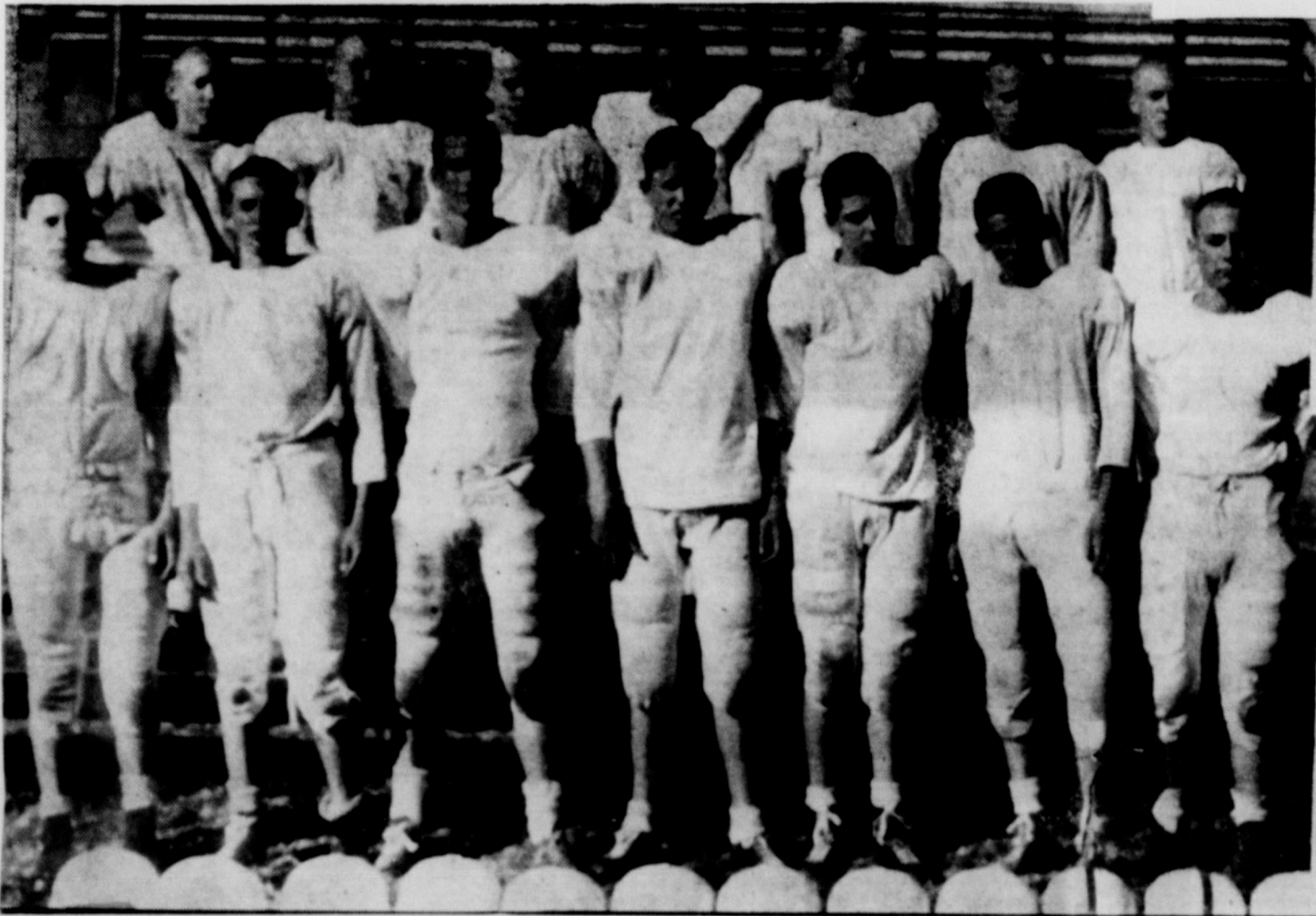
