SHALL TEXAS ELECT A REPUBLICAN SENATOR TO REPLACE PRICE DANIEL?

At the recent State Democratic Convention in Ft. Worth it was decided that the Democratic Party should try to center on one candidate through special Primaries, rather than to take the chance of a large number of Democrats running against one Republican in a special election and thereby dividing up their votes to the extent that the Republican would win the "high-man" race. A copy of the Resolution passed by the State Democratic Convention follows.

WHEREAS, under the Texas Election Laws, it may be possible to hold a primary election and run-off primary in order for the Democratic Party to select a candidate to run in a special election for the United States Senate vacancy to be created by the resignation of Senator Price Daniel;

AND WHEREAS, such procedure would be the best safeguard for the election of a Democrat in stead of a Republican,

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the State Democratic Executive Committee explore the possibilities of such primaries and if found feasible to proceed with such primaries and solicit the volunteer service of all Democratic Party officials and raise sufficient funds to pay the additional expenses necessary therefor.

In conclusion the letter from the State Democratic Executive Committee to all county and precinct chairmen explains that:

"The only question remaining is whether the special Primaries can be conducted through local volunteer election judges and through local contributions to pay for the printing of the ballots and election supplies. That is why the Democratic Convention urged all County and Precinct chairmen to volunteer their services and to assist in every way possible in this important matter.

"The purpose of this letter is to ask whether you, as a Democratic Party officer, will volunteer your services and obtain the assistance of others in making the Primary possible. The success of this proposal depends entirely upon the willingness of Texas' 254 Democratic County chairmen and 4,600 Precinct chairmen. This letter is going to each of you, together with the attached questionnaire, which I hope you will fill out promptly and return to me in the enclosed self-addressed envelope by return mail.


"It is urgent that we hear from you promptly because the State Democratic Executive Committee will meet in Austin at 10:00 a. m. on October 4 to make its decision about holding the Primary, and we will need to hear from each of you prior to that date in order to compile your replies and to know if the Primaries are physically and financially possible."

In view of the fact that the State Democratic Committee meets today (Thursday) at Austin it is necessary that this letter be answered immediately. There are Democratic chairmen of Precinct 2. I have advised the State Committee that I would gladly volunteer my services to help hold the primary election and would try to obtain the assistance of others. As explained in the letter, this also involves local contributions to pay for printing of the ballots and election supplies.

In other words you are just asked in plain English if you want Texas to have a Republican Senator instead of a Democrat and if so -- to what extent are you willing to go to get what you want? Will you donate a little of your time and money to get it?

With many thousands of dollars being spent in Texas on TV billboard and newspaper advertising to elect a Republican administration in Washington, could we possibly be so dumb as to let the State Republican machine out-wit out-manuever and out-vote us and elect a senator to "represent" us who is traditionally opposed to almost every thing we believe in and stand for?

General Tel. Plans In Local Exchange

Greatly improved telephone service is in store for Earth subscribers early next year when the dial switching equipment here is replaced with dial equipment of almost twice the capacity of the present equipment.

Fred Mathis, district manager for General Telephone Co. of the Southwest today announced the changeout of equipment which will cost about \$27,000 and will begin in December.

As a result of the expansion, the Earth dial building has been enlarged about one-third to provide space for the large equipment and space for additional equipment expansion in years to come.

Mathis said some of the present equipment has already been moved in the building to make way for the installation of the new dial unit which has, in some cases, caused slight service disruptions. He asked Earth subscribers to be patient during the months when service might be temporarily interrupted due to the moving of equipment and change out of equipment since the expansion work is necessary to improve the overall efficiency of the Earth dial system.

The new dial equipment is expected to be of a capacity large enough to care for Earth's telephone needs until the third quarter of 1937.

The Springslake Wolverines kept their record clean by noosing the Muleshoe Mules 19 to 14 in a thrilling football contest played at Muleshoe Friday night. Muleshoe was previously undefeated in three games including an one point victory over always tough Sudan. It looked for a while the Mules might remain in the unbeaten ranks, but their last quarter rally fell short one touchdown. It was the Wolverines fourth straight victory and no doubt their toughest test of the year. Even though in the statistics Springslake outgained the Mules 318 yards to 227, and had 11 first downs to 7, Muleshoe was in the contest all the way.

Going into the last quarter Springslake held a 19 to 7 lead, but with John Young and Darrell Oliver doing some brilliant running Muleshoe pulled up to 14 points with John Young going around right end on a pitch out from quarter back Dickie Johnson for 25 yards and the TD with 3 minutes and 20 seconds to go.

It was the longest three minutes ever experienced by Springslake fans, Young Oliver and Black were threats all night with John handling the ball beautifully. Springslake showed good power and fine defensive work when it counted. Jimmy Herring, Wolverine fullback, was the outstanding back of the game, being chosen as one of the outstanding backs of the south plains by Wed, Lubbock paper. Herring gained 146 yds for an average of 8 yds per carry. He also blocked a punt in the third quarter and played an outstanding game on defense as line backer. Max Goforth also did an outstanding job of faking on handoffs, many times pulling two and three Mule players with him out of position. Jerry Tunnell, halfback showed good break away speed with several long runs. Jo Ed Wheat played his usual hard running game, and was especially effective coming up from his defensive halfback slot to make several crucial tackles on the speedy Muleshoe backs. In

the middle Keith Leonhart was especially effective in the middle on defense, and as a whole the team played good ball showing at times good down field blocking. In the first quarter Muleshoe kicked off to Springslake and the Wolverines went to the Mules 42 where they fumbled on the fourth play from scrimmage and Muleshoe recovered. Jerry Tunnell injured his leg on this play but he was able to enter the game later. Muleshoe was unable to move the ball and punted into Springslake's end zone and the Wolverines took over on their 20. From this point Springslake drove 80 yards in 9 plays for the first score with Jimmy Herring going the final 30 yds around left end. The point after was no good and the score was 6 to 0 Springslake. During this drive Jo Ed Wheat passed 26 yds to A. C. Lewis which was broken up but a Muleshoe boy tackled Lewis before he made contact with the ball and the official ruled pass interference and Springslake had the ball at that point.

Muleshoe retaliated by taking the kickoff and going 35 yds in 7 plays for the tying score, with John Young going the final 18 yards. Young ran over for the extra point and Muleshoe went out ahead 7 to 6 with just a few seconds remaining in the first quarter. Bill Black's 35 yard kick off return to Springslake's 35 set up the score.

Springslake came back by receiving the kickoff and going 50 yards in 12 plays with Herring running the final 8 yds over right tackle. The extra point was no good and Springslake led 12 to 7. The feature of the drive was a 22 yd dash by Herring.

Near the end of the third quarter Springslake went 41 yds in 9 plays for their final score with a pass from Goforth to Jerry Tunnell putting the Wolverines in scoring position, and Jo Ed Wheat ran the final 5 yds for the score. Jerry Tunnell ran across the extra point and the Wolverines led going into the last period 19 to 7. Then with three minutes and 20 seconds remaining in the game John Young of Muleshoe scored on the 25 yd run and Oliver went across for the extra point. Springslake took the kickoff but after a 22 run on the first scrimmage play by Tunnell they couldn't move the ball and the Mules took over for their last frantic try for a win. However, Springslake's defense came to the front and in four plays the Mules made 8 and lost 14 yds. Springslake took over on downs and the gun went off the first play, giving Springslake a very thrilling and well deserved 19 to 14 victory over a fine Muleshoe eleven. The Mules are in AA conference and it is our opinion they will give teams in their district trouble.

Springslake's win caused the Ft. Worth paper to place the Wolverines ninth in the state rating of one A teams. Sunnett was second. This is the first time Springslake has been in the first ten of the state.

Friday night at Springslake Anton will tangle with the local team. Assistant coach Paul Pfister scouted Anton last week and reported they had a very fine, fast team and especially were good at quick opening plays. They allowed 11 out of 19 last week. The Wolverines will have to be at top speed and condition in order to remain undefeated. The Anton club cannot be taken lightly. Coach Billy Hahn has his boys in good physical condition and also spirits seem high. We trust there will not be a let down after the tough game Friday. Keep going Wolverines we're with you 100%.





fecting the title would ever need be incurred. It is risky business for you when you are putting your life savings into the purchase.

These are a few of the reasons why a title examination is an important safeguard to you. When it is completed, the attorney gives you a written opinion stating his conclusions as to who owns the land, the defects in or charges against such ownership, and the requirements to be met if any, to make good record title.

Off-hand this may seem a simple operation. In fact it is not: It requires the interpretation of numerous deeds, mortgages, wills, court decrees and other instruments; the consideration of the order in which transactions and events affecting the title occurred; and the application of statutes and court decisions to the various situations disclosed in the abstract.

**TITLE CHECK ESSENTIAL IN BUYING HOME**

Thinking of buying a new home? How will you know whether you are receiving a good title to the property you purchase? The safest method is to have a title examination made — that is, a careful study of the abstract and other title evidence.

Here are a few of the common sources of trouble in real estate transactions to show why the minor expense of a title examination is justified.

Many persons sign "earnest money contracts" believing that they are mere receipts with no serious implications. In reality they may specify, among other things, the kind of title you may accept.

A "warranty deed" from a responsible seller is comforting to have but it is a poor substitute for a careful title examination. A warranty deed does not guarantee a marketable title.

Moreover, serious title defects may not come to light until long after the seller on a warranty deed is dead, has moved to an unknown address, or is bankrupt. Even if he is available a good title is much better than a lawsuit.

The fact that the seller has possession of an "abstract" does not mean that he owns the property. An abstract is only a history of a title. Possession of an abstract no more indicates ownership of land than possession of the history of Texas means that you own the state.

Some purchasers of land feel safe because the title is being examined at the time of purchase by an attorney for the mortgage lenders. This seems logical but is a dangerous theory. Mortgage lenders are sometimes willing to accept less than good record title as security. This is sound business for them because among other reasons, the chances are that the mortgage will be paid off so that no expense in per-

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

This man said he wouldn't, and come to think of it, I wouldn't either. As a matter of fact, I think Ike has made us one of the best presidents we ever had. If we had to go to war, I'd certainly rather have him at the head of our government than any other living American. But even more importantly—I'm convinced he is the best man to keep us OUT of war.

That's why I still like Ike—better than ever!

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
