Car-Train Crash Kills Seven Area Teenagers

Last Thursday evening, about sunset, the sun went down for Olton, Springlake, Earth and Sunnyside, never to shine again with its usual splendor. For on this fateful day just as the night was beginning to draw its curtains to close out the day's sunlight, these communities lost an abundance of sunlight, gaiety and laughter never to be felt again in all its fullness. For on this day, August 9, 1962, these communities lost 7 gay, laughing carefree teenagers who were just beginning to live. All gay young leaders of the communities, schools and church activities — future leaders of tomorrow's world.

When each left home that evening, laughing and gay, to attend a church picnic, none could predict the future and know that within the hour they would be still in death, the gaiety of their voices never to be heard again on this earth.

Then all too soon came the shocking news just at twilight time that placed all the area in sadness. The news that only one had escaped death in that car that had delivered the laughing gay group to the spot where death awaited them.

God's mighty love then came fourth and was demonstrated by a Mother who said, "I'm so glad the Lawson lad was spared as he was the only one who was not a Christian." (God works in mysterious ways and the Lawson lad is now a Christian.)

One Mother clinging to her faith in God for comfort said, "My Darling Bill is alive and happy up there, because God is a God of the Living, not of the dead." Another Mother was quoted as saying, "I thank God I had my son the best years of his life, while he was carefree and happy before responsibilities weighed him down."

Parents, families, friends and classmates all felt the sting of this tragedy, and none would attempt to describe the area's great loss. . . but somehow those teenagers did not die in vain. God's mighty hand of love has been felt throughout the area.

Revival Now In Progress At Earth Baptist Church

A summer revival is now in progress at the Earth First Baptist Church with services being held twice daily, at 10 a.m. and 8 p.m. Services will continue through Sunday, August 19.

Rev. Don Murray, pastor of the First Baptist Church in Muleshoe, is conducting the revival.

The singing is being led by Rev. Byron Hardgrove, also of Muleshoe.

The public is cordially invited to attend these meetings and hear this team as they sing and preach the gospel.

As the sun slowly sank Thursday evening, seven North Lamb County teenagers enroute to a Sunday School picnic at the Lubbock Park were killed near Shallowater in a deadly train-automobile crash, which left the bodies strewn along a mile area of railroad track.

Killed were:
Bill Shirey, 18-year-old driver of the car, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. E.

Shirey, Sunnyside;
James Loveless, 17, Olton, son of Mr. and Mrs. Everett Loveless;
Everett Baldwin, 20-year-old son of Rev. and Mrs. M. B. Baldwin. The father is pastor of the First Baptist Church, Springlake.
Barbara Fancher, 16, Olton, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Cloma Fancher.
Diane Smith, 16-year-old daughter of Mrs. Cleo Smith, Olton;

Sharon Miller, 16 daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ancil Miller, Olton; and
Carolyn Carson, 16, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Carson, Olton.

A single survivor of the tragic collision escaped injury when he jumped from the car as the train "bore down on the automobile shortly before 7 p.m."

He was 18-year-old Jimmy Lawson, Olton, who tried in vain to

save other passengers in the car, engineer of the train said.

Lawson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Drexall Lawson, was taken to Methodist Hospital in Lubbock for treatment of shock and later was taken to his home in Olton.

The young people were en route to Mackenzie State Park for a picnic of the intermediate department of the Olton First Baptist Church.

"I saw the car stop on the tracks about 100 yards from it," said Thomas Norman Bickers, 70-year-old engineer of the Santa Fe passenger train headed from Clovis, N.M., to Houston.

"A boy (Lawson) jumped out of the car on the right side, turned and then ran back to help a girl out of the car," Bickers said.

The engineer said the boy turned away and got off the tracks

just as the train "bore down on him".

The engineer said the train was traveling about 79 miles an hour when he saw the car. The vehicle had "throttled back one and a half miles from the crossing, however and was slowing for a brief stop at Shallowater."

Melton said Bickers told him he immediately went into a "full emergency stop" when he spotted the car.



Grieving Area Buries Its Dead

Tears of sorrow. . . tears that can never be completely dried, drenched down the faces of young and old alike last weekend as the area buried its dead.

The sight of caskets with pictures of gay, young, carefree teenagers atop, but holding the remains of the bodies of seven

popular and much loved kids will never be completely erased from the minds of the North Lamb County area.

The memory of those last gay words of parting before the carefree group raced out to the car that was scheduled to carry them to a church picnic at the Lubbock park, but in truth was destined to carry them to their death within the hour, will never be forgotten.

BALDWIN RITES SATURDAY

It was a stunned grief stricken group that filed through the doors of the First Baptist Church in Springlake Saturday at 3 p.m., overflowing the 350 capacity auditorium to attend funeral services for Everett Baldwin.

Ray Everett Baldwin, 20, son of Rev. and Mrs. M. B. Baldwin, was born January 18, 1942, was graduated from Midlothian High School in 1960, and attended college in Corpus Christi for one semester, where he was manager of the football team. In the spring of 1961, he transferred to Wayland Baptist College, served as manager of the Pioneers Boys Basketball team, and planned to return to Wayland this fall. Until a month ago he was employed as bookkeeper at Watson Bros. Butane in Springlake.

Dr. Ivoylo Bishop, Professor of Bible at Wayland Baptist College, who was a life long friend of Everett's, conducted the services in the crowded Springlake church. He was assisted by Rev. Cecil Meadows of Earth, Rev. Emmett Hunt, pastor of the Southside Baptist Church of Ervin assisted Dr. Bishop at the graveside services.

Palbearers were Phil Boarden, Steve Holt, Kenny Hamilton, Jerry Jones, Delvin Walden and Penn Jones of Midlothian.
Deacons of the church served as Honorary Palbearers.
Survivors include his parents, Rev. and Mrs. M. B. Baldwin, of Springlake, his grandmother, Mrs. Anna Baldwin, Albuquerque, N.M., two brothers, Charles of Corpus Christi and James of Springlake; and many friends in the community.

Funeral arrangements were under the direction of Parsons Funeral Home in Olton.

Tearful friends and loved ones from every direction filled the Sunnyside Baptist Church to overflowing as funeral services for Bill Shirey were conducted Sunday at 3 p.m.

Bill, almost 18, the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Shirey, was born October 14, 1944 at Levelland, Texas. He started to Springlake Schools as a first grader. Bill was an outstanding athlete on the football team and was elected Basketball King last year. He had many friends, not only of his own age, but all ages, in the community. He was active in PFA work and all athletics in the school. He was converted and joined the church in the spring of 1954. His funeral was the first to be conducted in the Sunnyside Church, which was rebuilt after the tragic tornado in 1960. It was filled to overflowing Sunday afternoon.

building in the city. The auditorium which seats 1,000 was overflowed with persons, and 700 sat in chairs just outside the school auditorium in a lawned courtyard for the service. There were loudspeakers.

Two dozen or more dark suited palbearers, many of them classmates of the wreck victims, formed a double line at the auditorium.

The stage of the auditorium was decked with wreaths of flowers. The five, unopened metal brown caskets with pictures of the youths on top of each, were lined in a row in front of the auditorium stage.

At 3:30 five hearses brought the caskets to the high school from Parsons Funeral Home.

A crowd began to gather at the school hours before the service. They sat in hushed silence in the semi darkened auditorium.

A hidden organ started playing softly at 4:30 p.m. as persons came to the school from all directions.

At 5 p.m. the relatives came. They filled 20 rows of seats, 15 seats to the row.

It required 20 minutes for the survivors and relatives to be seated.

Jimmy Lawson, 18, Olton, the lone survivor in the tragedy, attended the solemn service for his companions. He sat with the parents of the Fancher girl, his sweetheart, who died in the crash, and who he tried desperately to pull from the doomed car an instant before the train ploughed into it.

G. B. Stanley, Grand Junction, Colo., former Olton Church of Christ minister, read scripture. The Twenty Third Psalm and other verses.

In prayer, Alfred White, minister of the Olton Church of Christ, said, "Almighty God, strengthen us. . . Help us in this community to lift our eyes to thee, that these have not died in vain."

Then the Rev. John E. Lewis, pastor of the First Baptist Church, Olton, began the funeral oration. It was from his church that a laughing carefree group of teenagers started on a church picnic last Thursday afternoon that was destined to end in tragedy for seven of the happy, laughing carefree group.

Have You Seen The Soil Inventory Of Your Farm? Soil Scientists Of The Soil Conservation Service Have Surveyed Your Land.

U. S. DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE
SOIL CONSERVATION OBJECTIVE

THE BASIC PHYSICAL OBJECTIVE OF SOIL CONSERVATION ACTIVITIES BY DEPARTMENTAL AGENCIES SHALL BE.

"The use of each acre of agricultural land within its capabilities, and the treatment of each acre of agricultural land in accordance with its needs for the protection and improvement."



Soil scientist have walked over the fields and pastures. They dug holes and examined surface soils and subsoils; measured slopes with a land level; noticed differences in growth of crops, weeds and brush; and in fact, recorded all the things about the soils that they believed might effect their suitability for farming, trees, wildlife and related uses.

Aerial photos are used to record the different types or kinds of soils observed from their examinations.



IT PAYS TO KNOW YOUR SOILS

Collecting soil samples for analysis is very important. Samples should be taken from the different types or kinds of soils on your farm when analyzed for fertilizer application. Each kind of soil may have different fertility levels.



FARM YOUR PLAN



Farmers (Lamb County Soil Conservation District cooperators) and technicians of the Soil Conservation Service use the soil inventory as basic information when they help you work out your farm conservation plan.

LAMB COUNTY SOIL SURVEY IS COMPLETED

Lamb County is one of the first counties in this portion of the state to be surveyed under the new standard soil survey set up by the Department of Agriculture.

The Soil Conservation Service in cooperation with the Texas Agriculture Experiment Station were assigned the job of completing the soil survey of Lamb County. Soil scientists from the Littlefield Work Unit of the Soil Conservation Service made the survey.

The purpose of the survey is to give a detailed inventory of the soil. With this information every acre of land can be classified into their capabilities and ultimately treated according to its needs.

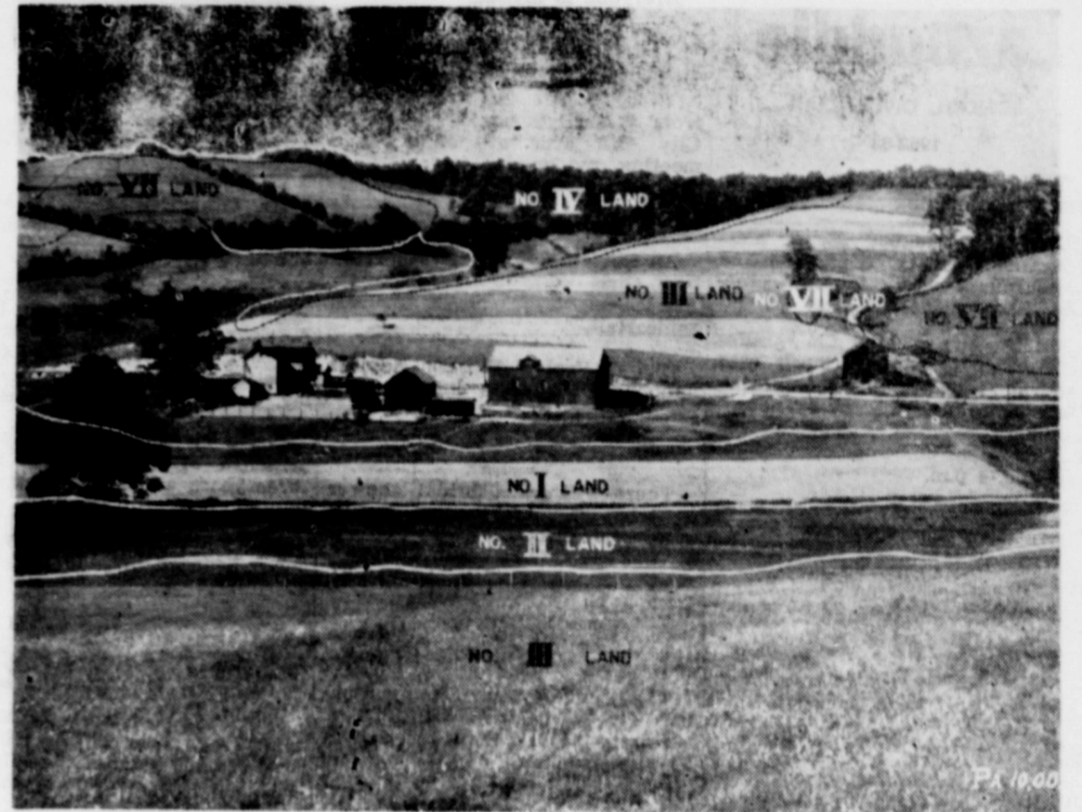
Conservationists of the Soil Conservation Service use this information as a part of their technical assistance to cooperators of the Lamb County Soil Conservation District. They use it to help farmers select cropping systems and practices suitable for each field. Agriculture engineers use it in designing ponds, terraces, drainage systems, irrigation systems and watershed protection structures.

The U. S. Bureau of Public Roads uses the soils information in road construction and maintenance. Soil Survey information is gaining widespread use by land appraisers, real estate dealers, housing developers, tax assessors and others.

The Lamb County standard soil survey is now published and available to individuals and all public users.

SOILS SUITED FOR CULTIVATION

- Class I Best land — can be cultivated safely with few limitations.
- Class II Good land — can be cultivated safely with moderate limitations.
- Class III Good land — has severe limitations. Can be safely cultivated with intensive treatment.
- Class IV Fairly good land with severe limitations, suited for limited cultivation only, with adequate treatment.

LAND NOT SUITED FOR CULTIVATION

- Class V Few natural limitations for growth and use of permanent vegetation.
- Class VI Growth and use of vegetative cover is moderately limited by land characteristics -Generally fair or poor grazing, and woodland use.
- Class VII Growth or use of vegetative cover severely limited by land characteristics. Generally fair or poor grazing land or woodland.
- Class VIII Suited for wildlife, recreation or watershed protection primarily.
