However, this was the picture that M. and Mrs. Johnny Alston of Edmonson saw Friday night following the tornado there.

Mrs. Alston will be remembered locally as the former Patsy Raught, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Phil Raught of Earth.

The young Alstons who live in the rural area northeast of Edmonson, sought shelter in the cellar with his parents Mr. and Mrs. Roy Alston who live a mile east of the younger couple. As the clouds gathered other neighbors in the area likewise sought shelter in the Alston cellar.

When the group emerged from their underground shelter they found the Alston home had been hit by the storm, knocking out the picture window and sweeping through the kitchen area to do considerable damage. Destroying or damaging miscellaneous items in and around the house, and wiping away the garage and the home of a farm hand located in the rear of the Alston residence.

Tornado-like winds, hail and rain lashed the whole of Lamb County and surrounding areas Friday night doing heavy damage to crops, trees and some buildings.

The extremely high thunderheads roamed over the plains dropping hail ranging in size from peas to baseballs and dumping heavy rain on some sectors of the area. Winds reached near 80 miles per hour in gusts.

Worst hit of the various farm crops appeared to be cotton which suffered from light damage in some areas to heavy in others. Damage was divided between burning from blowing sand and beating from the hail.

A check with farmers and gins in the surrounding areas revealed some drastic results of near-hurricane weather.

A total of 10 tornados were reported sighted over the Plains area during the storm. None of these were reported in Lamb County but some occurred in nearby areas.

Nearly everything east, south-east and northeast of Springlake was completely destroyed by hail and wind damage.

The P. A. Washingtons, Bill Claytons, and J. J. Cokers crops were destroyed, 50-60% of the crops were destroyed in the Springlake area, 75% have already been replanted, 90% of the crops around Springlake will be replanted with lower grade seed, because of the scarcity of high grade seed available for replanting.

The J. D. Phipps farm received 4 inches of rain Friday night.

Earth, Pleasant Valley and Springlake went solidly for Preston Smith for the Democratic nomination for governor in the second primary election Saturday.

Smith had a margin of better than 4-1 in the county, carrying every box by a wide margin. The final count was Smith 2,723 and Yarborough 646.

In returns from the Texas Election Bureau Monday morning Smith was leading Yarborough by 756, 909 to 620, 726.

James Joy led Jack Hazelwood handily in Lamb County in the race for a seat on the court of Civil Appeals.

Joy's margin in the county was 2,103 to 1,180 as he carried 15 of the 17 boxes and the absentee count.

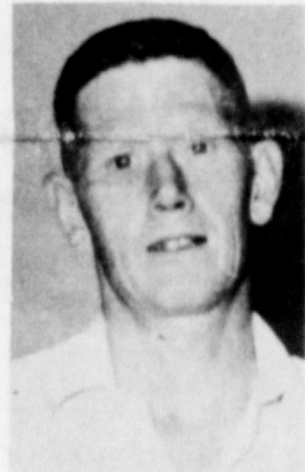
Rev. Williams, who is beginning his 14th year in the ministry comes to Earth from the Cooper Methodist Church in Lubbock, where he served as pastor six years.

## Special Legislative Session In Progress, Clayton Attends

Representative Bill Clayton of Springlake is in Austin to take care of State Business during the special legislative session which opened Tuesday, June 4. His doctors have allowed his return with strict stipulation that he not overexert himself or become too excited over the issues discussed. Clayton suffered a heart attack in early March of this year.

Main business, in this session, is passing a \$2,500,000,000 appropriations bill to finance fiscal year beginning September 1 and approval of about \$125,000,000 in new taxes.

Governor Connally has recommended general revenue spending of \$465,200,000. That would require \$125,800,000 in additional state taxation. Legislative Budget Board purposes a budget of \$471,000,000 from the fund over which the legislature has direct control, which would boost the tax bill to \$129,600,000.

Connally's tax bill calls for an increase of the state sales tax rate from two to three percent, with cities to get most of the additional revenue in the form of a direct rebate. Many services not now taxed also would be included in the three percent levy. Statewide tax would do away with one percent local sales tax now charged in more than 300 cities that contain the vast majority of Texas' population.

The session also is expected to come to grips with the explosive issue of liquor by the drink. A slight majority of the legislators

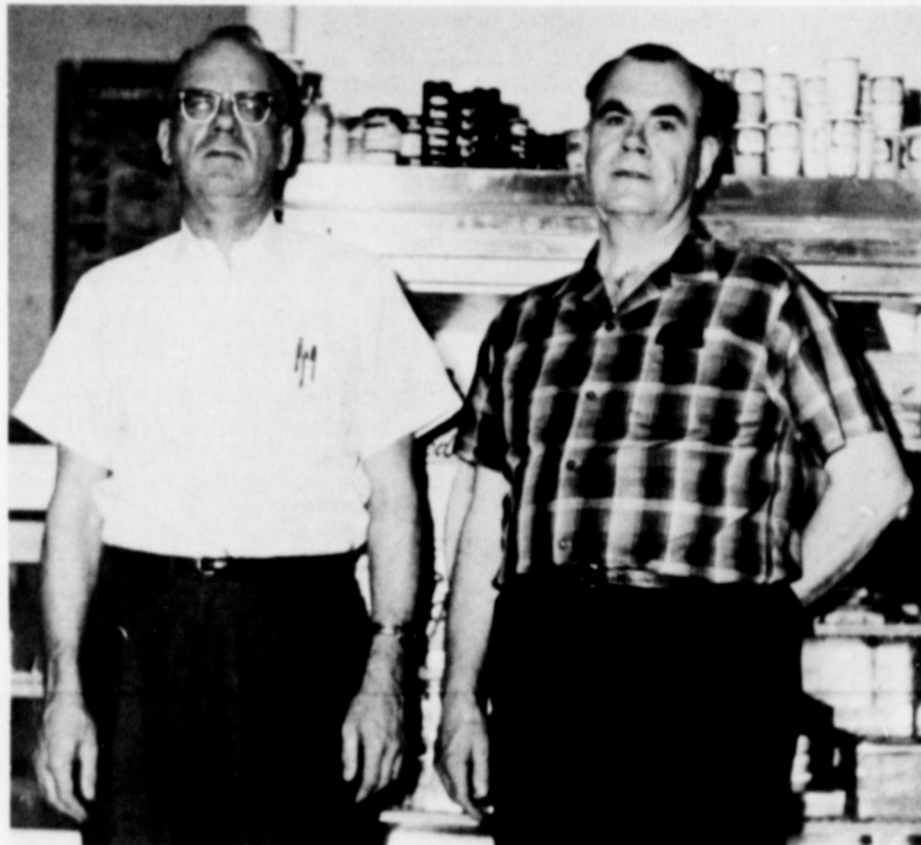

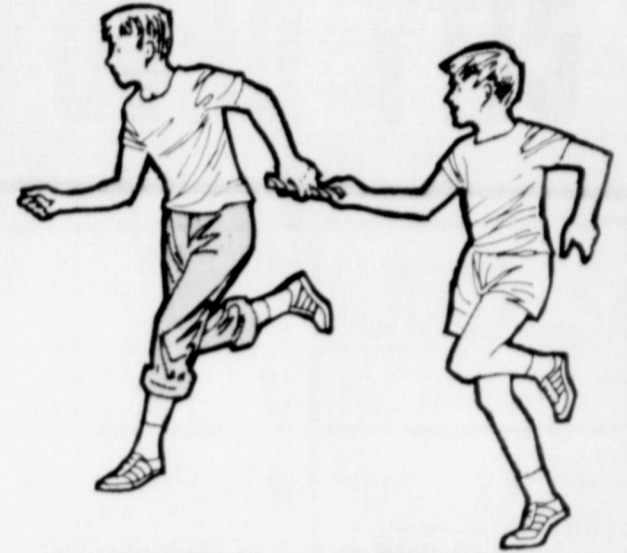

Dairy-made cultured sour cream is perishable and should be kept cold until used. Stored in its original, tightly closed container at 35° to 40° F., Dairy-made cultured sour cream will keep well for two weeks. Do not freeze since it weeps as it thaws. Mrs. Claytt says.

The tour was planned and conducted by 4-H adult leaders and Sam Kuykendall. Observations of the group included mares and foals of some of the top quarter horse breeding in Texas. Mr. "Sheep" Morrow who is in charge of the horse breeding program on the 6666 Ranch, conducted the tour of facilities and quarter horse stock on the ranch.

The boys also toured the Pitchfork Ranch and judged a class of quarter horses. The tour proved to be most inspirational and educational and was termed one of the outstanding learning experiences by our adult leaders in attendance.
