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DON'T FORGET TO VOTE---

## Primary Election Saturday

Polls will open at 7:00 a. m. throughout the state Saturday, May 7, for the Democratic Primary, and a heavy turnout is expected. Unusual for an off-year election, local Lamb County residents promise to put added zeal into the campaigns in the race for County Judge. Incumbent J. B. Davis is being seriously challenged by O. J. (Jim) Mangum and the vote is expected to be heavy in this area.

In other local issues, Ray Lynn Britt is challenging incumbent Ernest L. Owens for district clerk and in the race for County School Superintendent Edwin L. Hall is challenging C. Roy Stevens. The race for Lamb County Democratic Chairman will have incumbent Glenn Batson in first place on the ballot, followed by C. A. Duval.

In the two races for Precinct Chairman, Billy Hall will appear on the first line in Precinct 12 with D. W. Bawcom following. In Precinct 16, Bruce Forcher and J. C. Hall, Jr. are on the ballot.

In the Justice of the Peace Precinct 4, it will be V. L. Smith challenging incumbent David Macey. Polling place in Earth will be the Community Room of the City Hall with O. B. Whitford as Election Judge.

In Springlake, having precinct 16 and 17, polling area for 16 will be the Community Building with R. L. Byers, Jr. election judge. For Precinct 17, the Fire Station will be Election headquarters, with Ed Dawson as election judge. In Pleasant Valley, Russell Haberer will be election judge with the Community Building housing official election headquarters. The only other county race has only one candidate Henry Lewis, who is seeking a return to the County Commissioner's Seat in Precinct 2.

Statewide, the spotlight seems to be on the Attorney General's position, with three aspirants in the thick of the

race. Franklin Spears is seeking election on the basis of improved law enforcement throughout the state. Crawford Martin, long time political figure in the state, is emphasizing his experience both as State Senator and Secretary of State. Galloway Calhoun, resident of Tyler is identifying himself as the only real conservative in the campaign.

In the Governor's race, incumbent John Connally is seeking a third term, and is challenged by Stanley Wood of Houston. A third candidate, Johnnie Mae Hackworth of Brenham, has not actively campaigned.

Being challenged for the Lt. Governor's Chair is incumbent Preston Smith. Bill Hollowell, of Grand Saline, is running as ticket mate to Stanley Woods, Bryon Tunnell, of Tyler, the incumbent Railroad Commissioner is being challenged for his position by Paul B. Haring of Goliad.

Seeking the U. S. Senate nomination is Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr and political newcomer John R. (Jack) Willoughby of Houston.

Fred Williams of Del Rio is challenging Jerry Sadler for State Land Commissioner.

The only contested statewide judicial race is between incumbent Court of Criminal Appeals W. T. McDonald of Bryan and John F. Onion of San Antonio.

In a race for State Senate, and one that promises local voters added excitement to the political scene, three candidates have tossed their hats into the ring. Two incumbents, brought about by the re-districting act of the past year, will be seeking this position and one will have to fall by the wayside as a result of the returns.

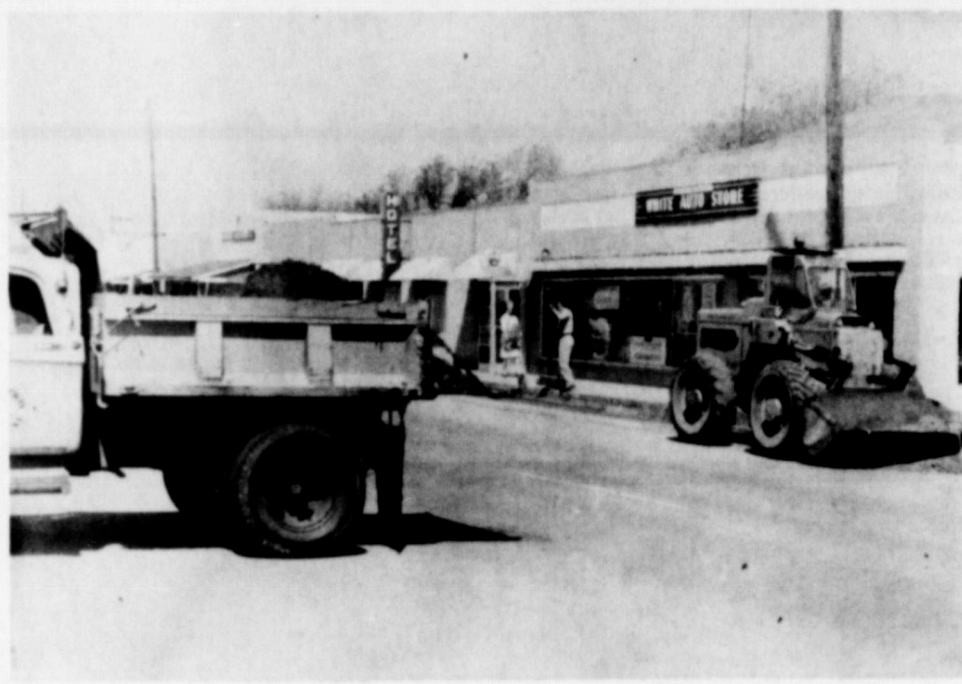

## Springlake-Earth Band Wins Another Sweepstakes

The University Interscholastic League sightreading and Concert contests for A, AA, and B schools were held Friday in Dimmitt.

Springlake-Earth's 83 member band, competing with 13 other class A schools, composing Region I, won Sweepstakes.

The two divisions, sight reading and concert, completed a three-part contest, as Springlake-Earth had previously completed the marching division. A band must be first in all three divisions in order to earn Sweepstakes.

Three bands out of 13 in Class A won first in all three divisions. They were Springlake-Earth, Petersburg, and Hale Center. There were four out of 13 last year, Springlake-Earth, Seagraves, Hale Center, and Petersburg.

Each band was rated in five classes: superior, excellence, average, good, and poor.

The local band played three selections, "March Onward," "Second Suite in F Major," and "Gilliard and Courante."

On April 8, 1964, Springlake-Earth band brought home a Sweepstakes trophy from the Region I UDI Contest in Lev-

eland. This was the first time in Springlake-Earth's Band history that such a high honor had been won.

The local band again received the Sweepstakes rating on April 2, 1965 in the University Interscholastic League Band Contest held in Seagraves.

Dean Foshee directs the local Sweepstakes winning band. He has been director since the 1961-62 school term, replacing Norman Hemphill.

Each year for the past nine years, the band has steadily improved. Early in the 1961-62 school term, a total of 76 members were enrolled in the band; only 16 of which were high school students, the remainder was composed of 7th and 8th grade students. During that year, 141 band students were enrolled in the entire band program. In 1963-64, students in grades 8-12 made up the Wolverine Band. Foshee, band director, graduated from Shamrock High School, and received his college degree from West Texas State University. He directed the Cowden Junior High School band in Midland. The band won outstanding honors under his leadership.

## City Officials Create Park-Recreation Fund

At a regular meeting of the City Dads Monday night Ralph Douglas, city engineer, presented the survey maps of city streets that are in need of paving, also those that require re-paving. He also showed the existing sewer and water lines and projected future needs were discussed. No final decision was reached concerning the paving or sewer system.

City pool manager, Gene Brock, met with the Dads for the purpose of supplying them with a list of improvements that should be made before the city pool opens. Tentative opening date for the pool is May 29.

Included on the list of suggested improvements was the need to paint the bottom of the pool. These improvements were tabled until a later date.

The Earth-Springlake Recreation association was present at the meeting to discuss with the city officials the need to secure a new baseball field. No decision was reached, and the discussion will be resumed at a later date.

The city officials voted to charge a \$1.00 per load fee to anyone who uses the city dump. The dump ground will be open for use each Thursday. However, permission must be received from the city hall and the \$1.00 fee must be paid prior to dumping trash in the city dump.

The Dads created a park and recreation fund that will be used to beautify the City park. The funds for this beautification program will be derived from the charges made on the city dump and from a portion of the water bill.

The bills were approved and paid, prior to the close of the meeting.

## Mobile Chest X-Ray Unit To Be At School May 12

The Christmas Seal Mobile Chest X-Ray Unit of the Lubbock-Hale County Tuberculosis Association will be at Springlake-Earth Schools Thursday, May 12, under the sponsorship of the Springlake Earth PTA.

William Mann, superintendent, has arranged for the unit to be at the school from 8:30 a. m. until 6:00 P. M. on the north side of the cafeteria.

Everyone is urged to take advantage of this opportunity to have his chest x-rayed. This is just another service to the community sponsored by the Springlake-Earth P. T. A.

All school personnel, including teachers, substitute teachers, clerical employees, supervisory personnel, bus drivers, personnel handling food and personnel performing janitorial services, shall be required to furnish the governing board of any public school in this state on or before September 1 of the each year a certificate, revealing that such



school personnel have been examined for the disease of tuberculosis during a period of time not exceeding one hundred twenty (120) days prior to September 1 of each year, and revealing the results of such examination have been furnished the State Board of Health by the person performing the examination. No person shall be permitted to perform his or her duties in the absence of such certificate being furnished the governing

board of the school.

The chest x-ray detects many of the abnormalities of the chest besides tuberculosis, such as cardiovascular, and other respiratory diseases. It is hoped that a large number of our citizens will avail themselves of this opportunity which is given to you in the interest of the general health of this area.

A fee of fifty cents will be charged each person having a chest x-ray.

### EDITORIAL---

## Cities Under a Handicap

PRESIDENT Robert P. Gerholz of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States has given some highly important advice to those communities which have their hands out for more federal aid, to pay all or part of projects which, not long ago, were universally considered to be a local responsibility. Cities which rely on federal subsidies, he said, are putting themselves under a handicap in the competition among communities for growth and prosperity. The reason for that, he went on, is that "By not making that extra effort required to get private financing, they're failing to get their affairs in tip-top shape. Sometimes they are throwing their overall programs out of balance by shifting attention to the area where the subsidies are, rather than to the areas of most immediate need."

In other words, these dependent cities will grab all the subsidies they can get, regardless of whether they are for really worthwhile purposes or whether they will promote community welfare or not. And all the taxpayers, including the many millions who live in nonsubsidized communities must, of course, chip in heavily to pay the bills. Worst of all, a subsidy, no matter where it comes from, destroys initiative, ambition, and a sense of responsibility.

Hand-out money carries with it a heavy price.

## Counties to Vote on Sale Or Lease of Cotton Allotments

Growers in about two-thirds of the upland cotton producing counties will vote during the period May 16 through May 25 on whether to permit transfer of cotton acreage allotments to other counties by sale or lease. If in any county at least two-thirds of growers voting favor transfer, growers will be permitted to transfer allotments by sale or lease to farmers in other counties with in same state. Allotments may not be shifted to other states.

Food and Agriculture Act of 1965.

First Vote on transfer of allotments held on November 23, 1965. At that time growers in 349 upland cotton producing counties voted to permit transfers. There are a total of 1,059 cotton growing counties in U. S. Only those counties which did not approve transfers last November will vote.

The May 16- 25 referendum will be by mail, first time a referendum of this type has been conducted by mail. Ballots will be delivered to all cotton growers in the county in the near future. Officials said a mail vote should be much more convenient for growers rather than having to appear in person at their polling place, particularly during busy season. USDA officials hope for good turnout in voting and will regard it as sign growers approve mail method of holding referendum. To be counted, all votes should be in office of the county ASC Committee before office closing time May 25.

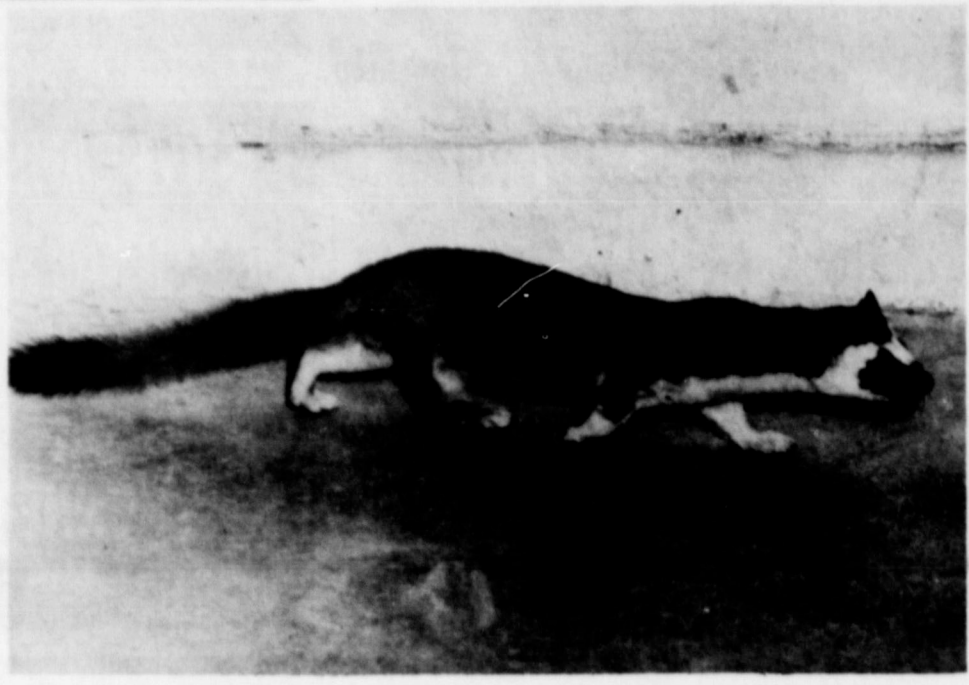

## Bookmobile Operation Endorsed By Four-County Meeting

An enthusiastic group of literary supporters from four counties heard reports on the recent Governor's Conference on Libraries, discussed the urgent need for good library service, and endorsed the continued operation of the High Plains Bookmobile at a meeting in Muleshoe recently.

During the discussion period following the speeches, the speeches, the group was told a joint meeting of commissioners' courts concerned with the bookmobile was in the making. To the obvious pleasure of the audience, County Judge Glen Williams stated that the Bailey County Court was inviting Lamb, Farmer, and Cochran County judges and commissioners to Muleshoe at an early date to discuss the continuation of the mobile library service.

This response to intense public interest in the matter was lauded from the floor of the meeting, as was the earnest desire expressed by Ike Stinson and Loyd Stephens, the Bailey County Commissioners present, for the opportunity to give careful study to the operating costs the county must assume if the service is to continue after this year.

A feature of National Library Week observance in this area, this "Post Conference Meeting" was one of over 150 scheduled throughout the State of Texas to express the deep concern of Governor John Connally and bring back the message of his conference, which drew 2500 delegates to Austin March 23.

Rev. Frank Peery, pastor of

Muleshoe's First Methodist Church and Muleshoe Area Public Library Board Chairman, summarized the Governor's Address, pointing out that Texas ranks 37th among the 50 states in library expenditures, devoting only 84 cents per capita annually and providing public library resources of less than one whole book per person.

Terry Blake, Bula Church of Christ Minister and school teacher, discussed "Library Support, A Shared Responsibility," asserting that the city, county, state, and federal governments, along with private benefactors, must all share the responsibility for library service.

"Libraries Need Citizen Support" was the subject covered by Mrs. C. S. Silcott, Lamb County Library Board Member from Olton. She said libraries need people support - business people, professional people, housewives, school children, and retired individuals. She went on to point out that at current levels of expenditure, Texas spend \$5100 to expose a child to education through the 12 grades and then spend only \$42 to provide this child, now grown, with materials to utilize the reading and studying skills, to assist him in understanding his world, in keeping abreast economically, politically, socially. This 42 dollars is based on the per capita expenditure for library service over 50 years.

Marion J. McDaniel, Superintendent of Bula Schools, described "Library Financial

Sources," stressing that the two primary sources of funds for public libraries in Texas are the city and county governments and describing various "matching funds" now becoming available from the federal government.

Irvin St Clair, Mayor Pro Tem of Muleshoe was the Master of Ceremonies. Refreshments were served by the E. S. A. Sorority. Sponsoring the event was the Muleshoe Study Club, which also won the attendance prize presented by the Chamber of Commerce to the organization having the greatest percentage of its membership present. Ray Martin at the electric organ provided music during the refreshment period.

Taking part in the panel discussion were: Mrs. Fred Thompson of Olton, president of the Friends of the Library of that city; Mrs. Jack Hicks, Lamb County Public Librarian, of Littlefield; Mrs. Flora Burke, Littlefield High School Librarian; Mrs. Earl Stevenson, Bovina Women's Club; Mrs. Benny Pena, High Plains Bookmobile Librarian; and Joe Harbin, president of the Muleshoe Friends of the Library; Mrs. Bernis Camp, Muleshoe Area Public Librarian; and Roy Davis, Manager of the Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce are "Post-Conference" co-chairmen for this area of the Scout Plains.

**Postmaster Announces New Postal Savings Regulations**

Postmaster Harold Miller today urged depositors with postal savings certificates to withdraw their accounts from Post Offices as soon as possible or as soon as the anniversary dates on their certificates are reached.

The Postal Savings System was abolished March 27, 1966, with the signing of Public Law 89-377 by President Lyndon B. Johnson.

Postmaster Miller pointed out that as of April 28, 1966, no deposits can be accepted and no new accounts can be opened. He said that interest will end on the anniversary date of each certificate.

The Postmaster said that for convenience all certificates held by a depositor may be cashed at the same time and interest will be paid for each full month they have been outstanding beyond three months from the interest date.

The Postal Savings System was established January 1, 1911, to get money out of hiding and to attract savings of a large number of immigrants who were accustomed to saving at Post Offices in their own country; also, it served as a safe depository for people who had lost confidence in private banks. Today, however, with the growth of banking facilities paying much higher interest rates than the 2 percent interest rates per annum paid on Postal Savings, the System has out-lived its usefulness for the American people.

The Postmaster noted that as of June 30, 1965, there were 997,029 depositors holding certificates in 3,130 post offices throughout the nation. The number of depositors has been declining, he said, at a rate of about 6,500 per month. The Postmaster said that unpaid deposits remaining in the Post Office beyond June 30, 1967, would be transferred to the Treasury Department in a trust fund and would be available for payment without time limitation whenever proper claims are received.
