Corner on Cotton

Let's talk straight about releasing an unplanted cotton allotment . . . you don't have to do it, but you should . . . every acre allotted for the purpose should be planted to cotton . . . you can release your unplanted allotment to the ASC committee without hurting your "history" and some other farmer will benefit . . . or you can just forget about it, and cotton as an industry will be struck another blow . . . one thing though: If you have released your allotment for the past two years, or if you don't plan to plant your allotment next year, it might be wise to retain a small part, say an acre . . . then there will be no possibility of missing out on your share of acres a couple of years from now . . . the date by which you can release your allotment varies with each section, but you can check with your ASC committee

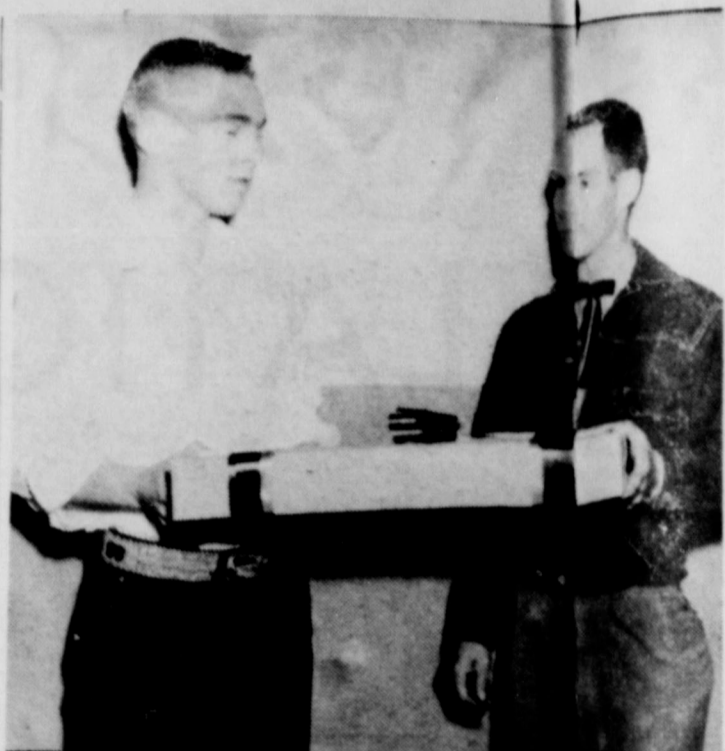
who have all the answers, but do it soon!! . . . if you want some additional acres for cotton write to your ASC county committee as soon as you can . . . tell them how much increase you will use . . . you may get it and at least it will stir up interest in turning in unused acreage.

New High
A new world record in cotton production . . . estimates put 1958-59 cotton at 44 million bales . . . up a half million from the record crop of 1955-56 . . . this puts world average yield at over half a bale per acre.

Less Competition
Looks like the low support price of U.S. cotton and the export subsidy that make U.S. cotton competitive are going to cut production in foreign countries . . . Mexico for certain . . . maybe Egypt also . . . some foreign farmers are in financial trouble from last crop's low-priced cotton.

Supports
Extra long staple will be supported at 65% of parity or \$2.91 cents . . . cottonseed supported at \$38 per ton to producer . . . loan basis.

Better Check
Resale price of "A" cotton is 110% support price of "B" cotton . . . not 71.5% of parity . . . there's a difference . . . quite a difference in some grades and staples because of premiums and discounts.

Governor Price Daniel Proclaims March 16-21 Texas Lions Camp For Crippled Children Week

Governor Price Daniel has declared March 16-21 as Texas Lions Camp for Crippled Children Week. He focuses attention on the unique camp at Kerrville which has provided free summer recreation for 3539 handicapped children during the past six seasons.

The camp was conceived and chartered 10 years ago this month. It is supported by 37,000 Texas Lions and their friends, who have contributed approximately \$1,500,000 to construct and operate the camp.

Its facilities are designed especially to serve the blind, deaf, mute

and crippled. Fifteen permanent buildings — including a chapel, infirmary and giant recreation center — dot 504 hillside acres.

The camp, probably the only one of its kind in the world, is free to any eligible handicapped boy or girl in Texas between 7 and 16.

The camp's capacity is 720 a summer and it has been operating at full strength since 1956.

The children camp out under the stars at Inspiration Point, learn to swim in a specially designed pool, develop talents in the spacious art and crafts building, many of

Prospective campers are being sought now for the six, two week sessions this summer. Applications are handled only on the local level

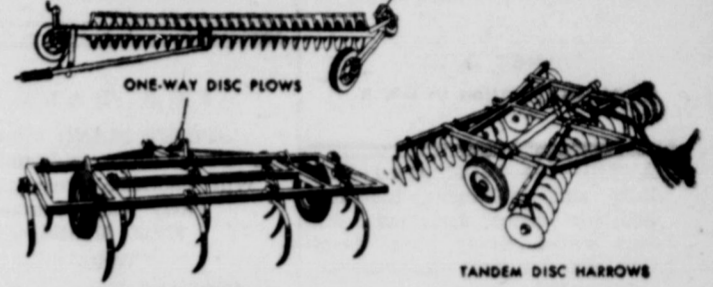

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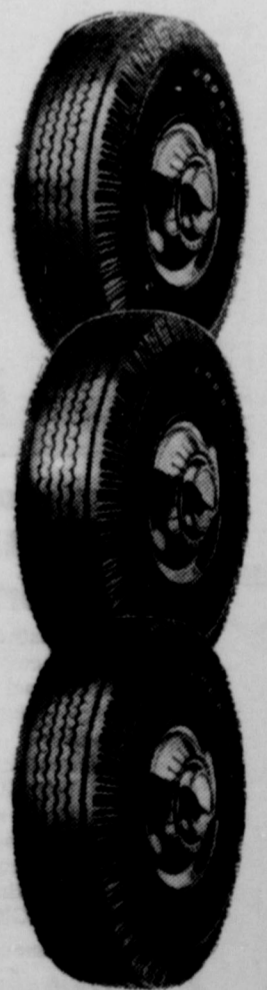

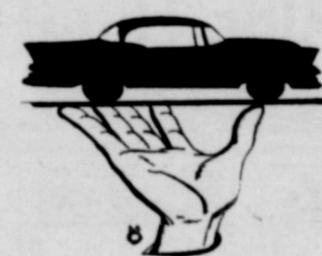

Do You Plan To Drill A Well?

Do you plan to drill an irrigation or commercial water well? If you do, and you expect to produce more than 69 gallons per minute from the well, you should read the following paragraphs.

The rules of the High Plains underground Water Conservation District provide that wells drilled within its bounds of jurisdiction and produce in excess of 69 gallons per minute be spaced certain minimum distances from wells in the immediate vicinity.

4-inch wells must be a minimum distance of 200 yards from the nearest well.

5-inch well must be a minimum distance of 250 yards from the nearest well.

6-inch well must be a minimum distance of 300 yards from the nearest well.

8-inch well must be a minimum distance of 400 yards from the nearest well.

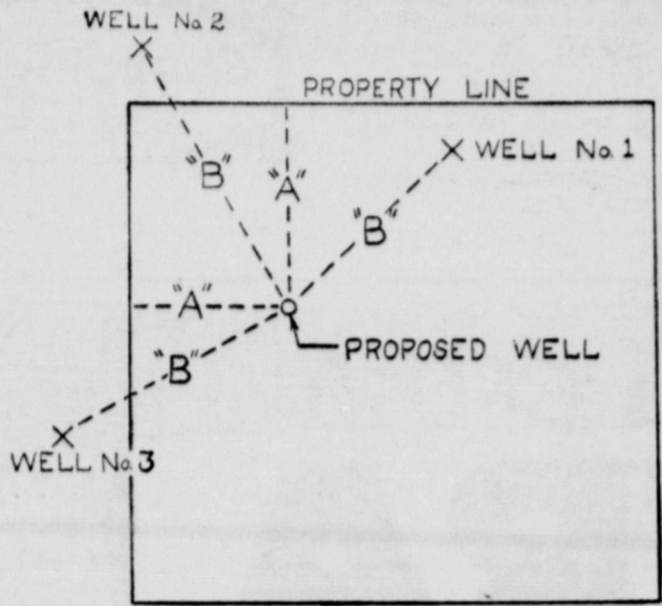
10-inch well must be a minimum distance of 440 yards from the nearest well.

The district's rules further provide that a person who desires to drill must first obtain a well drilling permit.

To assist either the landowner or his agent in filing an application for a well drilling permit, each county has an office and secretary.

Before contacting his local county secretary, the well drilling applicant will need the following information:

1. Name and mailing address of the owner of the land on which the well will be drilled.
2. The legal description of the land.
3. The measured distance from

the proposed drilling site to the two nearest property lines or quarter-section lines. (Shown as line "A" on drawing).

4. The measured distance from the proposed drilling site to the three nearest wells. Distance to wells that are over 440 yards from the proposed drilling site are not required. (Shown as line "B" on drawing).

When the above information has been determined by the applicant, he is then prepared to contact his local county secretary and file his drilling permit application.

A deposit of \$10 is required with the filing of each application.

When the application form is

filled out completely and correctly, the applicant must then make certain that it is signed by three members of the local County Committee. This is most important, and it must be done before drilling operations are commenced.

When signed by the committee, the permit is valid for the drilling of one well only, and it only at the location specified on the permit.

The drilling permit is valid for a period of four months from the date of filing.

When the well is completed and the log of the underground formations is supplied to the county office on forms furnished by the District, the \$10 deposit will be refunded in full. The landowner is responsible for this information.

Crop Residue Cheap Type of Fertilizer

Utilizing the residue which you grow each year can be the cheapest type of fertilizer you can get for your land.

Several farmers in the Lamb County Soil Conservation District are still burning their residue from grain and forage sorghums and grasses to clear off their land for the coming year.

An acre of crop residue left on or near the soil surface may contain as much as 20 lbs of nitrogen, 6 lbs. of phosphorus, 30 lbs. of potassium and 400 lbs. of humus. At the present price of fertilizer, this amount of plant nutrients would cost about \$2.20 an acre for nitrogen and about 54 cents per acre on phosphorus. This amount of money can add up to a profit or loss over several acres in just a short time.

One of the best methods to utilize your residue is to leave the residue on or near the soil surface until near planting time on dryland farms and up until pre-irrigation time for irrigated land.

One of the best methods of crop residue utilization practiced in Lamb County is the practice of plowing out the middles with listers and leaving the stubble standing. This leaves enough residue to be effective in controlling wind and water erosion.

Another good method is to just leave the grain sorghum stalks standing until early spring before you start your pre-irrigation.

The standing stalks will act as wind breakers and cut down on the amount of blowing which occurs nearly all over Lamb County.

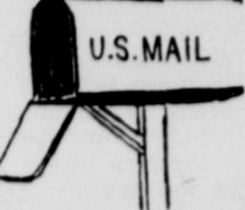

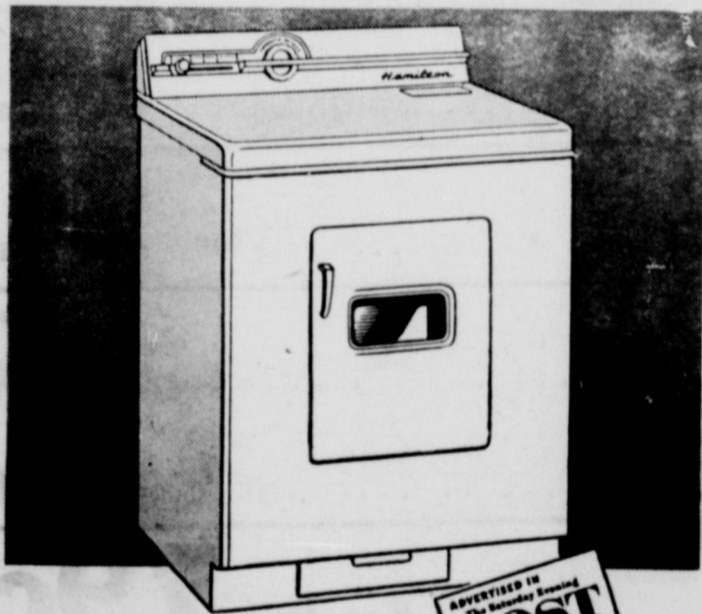

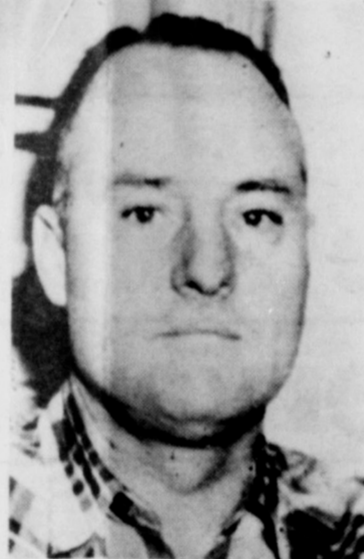
