Taxpayers should ask to see the credentials of all persons identifying themselves as Internal Revenue Service employees, the IRS said.

From time to time, individuals have posed as employees of the Internal Revenue Service to collect money for what these imposters refer to as unpaid taxes.

Taxpayers should bear in mind that every public contact IRS employee carries distinctive identification and is required to produce identification when conducting official business.

If, after seeing an employee's identification, a taxpayer still doubts his or her authenticity, the taxpayer should immediately contact his or her nearest IRS office.

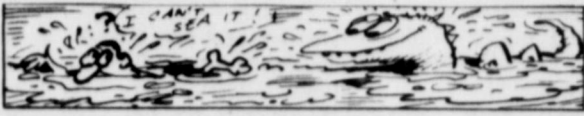

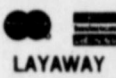

Formation of a group to practice the Thin Head Concept of weight control is planned in Dimmitt, starting May 17. Psychotherapist Phil Sorley, who is associated with the Central Plains Mental Health Center of Plainview will conduct the group.

Sorley is one of the co-developers of the concept which offers a psychological approach to taking off weight and keeping it off. The plan was started in California four years ago.

Groups are limited in number and pre-registration is required. Cost will be \$10.00 per two hour session, Sorley said.

Registration and information are available by calling 647-2409.

The date has been extended for growers to place 1977 wheat in the wheat loan program, and now this

may be done until May 31, according to Charlie Hill, executive director of the Castro County ASCS office.

"This extension was made possible where interested producers could take advantage of the grain reserve, a three year loan program," Hill said "We have been advised there will be no interest charges on grain loans placed in the grain reserve after one year."

Hill said producers are urged to check with their local ASCS offices before the May 31 deadline.

Sign up into the 1978 farm program has been extended to May 15, he added.

The ASCS director urges producers to measure each field before coming to the office to certify as acreage reports must be accurate.

"Please don't wait until the last few days before the deadline, because it is taking from 30 minutes to two hours for a grower to sign up for the program", Hill said.

Officers of Texas Farmers Union from counties all across the state have officially gathered to renew the flight for parity goals in farm legislation and pledged continued support of "all farmers and groups of farmers who are fighting for this cause." The TFU board of directors stated in a unanimous resolution "to build stronger coalitions and efforts of ALL farmers for new work toward the goal of parity in government programs for the survival of family agriculture."

Pointing toward the shared goals of Farmers Union with the American Agriculture Movement, the farm leaders indicated a need to more closely associate all factions who are willing to work actively for reform.

Said one representative spokesman, "Farmers have learned many things in the past few months. Among them have been an awareness of which individuals and groups are fighting for them and which are fighting against them."

"Farmers are learning how to take care of their own business and item number one is to support your friends and quit feeding your enemies. Family Agriculture will be

saved only when those who are willing to get out and work start working together."

"I think the farmers on our side of the fence are in the majority, but we are going to have to put it all together and push and pull until there is no one left on the side lines. We must stop beating ourselves and start building a block of supporters of 100% parity."

An official of Texas Farmers Union called the spirit of farmers across Texas "good despite their frustrations". New work to build the organization to greater numbers and efforts seeking legislation were discussed at the meeting with positive momentum.

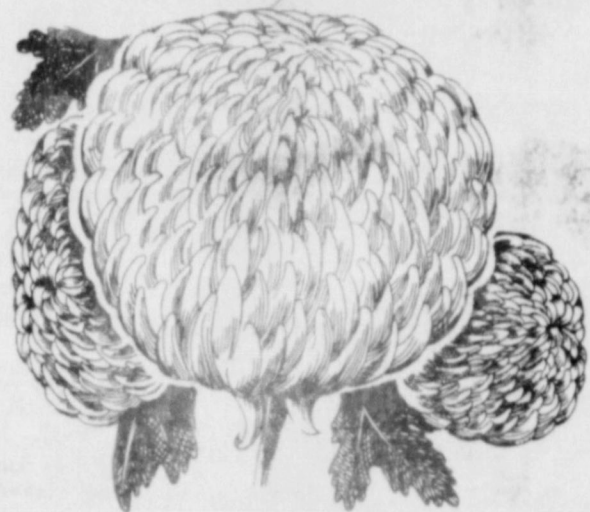

Many people are not aware of the variety of programs available under the social security program and are they aware that they can now file for these programs or obtain information about them without inconvenience. The answer to any question about social security is as near as the telephone.

Most social security offices around the country now have a new teleservice program to the public. Using the telephone, a person can contact the nearest social security office by telephone and receive any answer to any question he has about social security. And, a claim for any type of social security benefit can be filed over the telephone too. For example, if a person is disabled and cannot come to the office, or if a person wants to file for retirement or health insurance benefits and cannot find time to come to the office, he can call and give the necessary information over the telephone. When the application has been completed, it will be mailed for signature. An envelope will be sent, also, so that the completed application and all the necessary proofs which may be requested can be returned to the social security office by mail.



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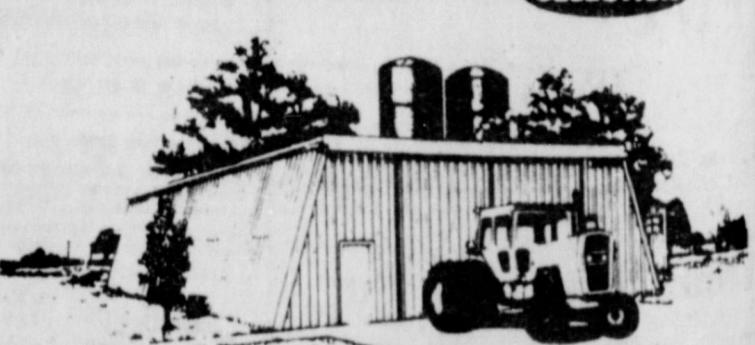
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
