Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., an nounced this week that the PCG was backing the eight changes re cently recommended for improving of cotton classing for South Plains farmers.

The Directors explained the eight recommendations were made unanimously at a meeting held in Lubbock November 29 attended by representatives of the PCG, the South Plains Farmer-Ginner Committee, South Plains Ginner Association, Farm Bureau, Farmer Union and businesses.

The eight specific recommendations the group listed as favoring the improvement of cotton classing were

1. Establishment of uniform hu-



Both teams played good basketball and showed good sportsmanship



religious practices. However, even though professing this belief, allow customs and traditions to destroy their faith in the Bible. This time of the year we hear a great deal about Christmas as a religious holiday to celebrate the birth of Christ. Many religious institutions are planning special services in celebration of this day. Many will go to church and take part in religious services the next week and then not again until next year.

What does the Bible say about Christmas and related celebrations? The answer is simply, nothing. It is true we think of Christmas as the birthday of Christ; but actually, according to all recognized scholars. Christ could not have been born this season of the year, considering the events surrounding His birth as related in the Bible.

The celebration of Christmas as a religious, holy day originated with the Roman Catholic church. The World Book Encyclopedia states: "Other dates were often celebrated as the day of the Nativity, but in the year 354, by order of Bishop Liberius of Rome. Decefber 25 was adopted. It was noted later this date would fall within the rainy season in Palestine, so that the shepherds would hardly have been in the fields at night as they were when Jesus was born.'

What does the Bible say regarding any day as a special day? In Acts 20:7 the Bible says, "And upon the first day of the week when the disciples came togetter to break bread, Paul preached unto them;" The breaking of bread is mentioned in 1 Corinthians 11:23-26. "For I have received of the Lord that which also I delivered unto you, That the Lord Jesus, the same night in which he was betrayed, took bread; And when he had given thanks, he brake it, and said. Take, eat; this is my body, which is broken for you; this do in remembrance of me. After the same manner also he took the sup, when he had supped, saying, this cup is the New Testament in my blood; this do ye, as oft as ye drink it, in remembrance of me. For as often as ye eat this bread, and drink this cup, ye do show the Lord's death till He come."

Thus upon the first day of the week we come together to break bread, partake of the Lord's supper, in remembrance of His death. This is the only event in the life of Christ we are told to especially commemorate.

Are we to remember and count as sacred the birth of Christ. CERTAINLY SO. But no special day has been set aside, nor has any special ceremony been given in the Bible by which to commemorate this event. We are to think of Christ every day of every year.

We of the Church of Christ have been asked if we were hav-"special" services. No we are not. We shall meet together the first day of the week as always to commemorate the Lord's death.

It is wonderful to enter into the general spirit of good will and peace among men that is around us this time of the year. To exchange greetings and good wishes. We only pray this feel. ing would be prevalent all the year. Even though the holiday season is enjoyable, may we always know Christmas is not taught in the Bible as being a religious holiday.

May we all strive to follow God's book in al Ithings, and may we try to help the general feeling of good will to continue throughout the new year.




