

# Wolverettes in Regional Tournament at Lubbock Saturday

The hard playing Springlake Earth Wolverettes will leave at 6:15 a. m. Saturday for Lubbock where they will play Stratford in the first round of the Region 1 tournament held at the Lubbock Municipal Coliseum. Game time will be 8:30 a. m. However the early morning hour

is not expected to cut down on the attendance by local fans, and a large crowd is expected to follow the local girls to this important regional semifinal game. The Wolverettes 54-49 victory Tuesday night over the defend-

ing class A State Champion Roosevelt team, advanced the Wolverettes into the regional tournament. The Stratford Elkettes rating (26-8) for the year won the right to meet the Wolverettes by downing a stubborn Clarendon team 55-48 at Tascosa gym

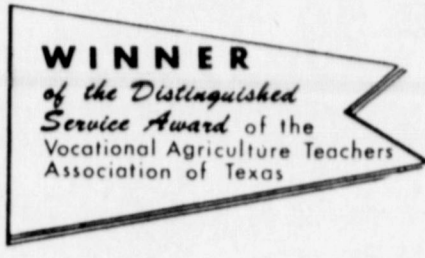
Tuesday night. The Elkettes bowed out in the regional semifinals last year to Roosevelt, who eventually claimed the state title. This is the first time in the history of the Springlake-Earth School that a girls team has

## Voter Registration Begins Today, No Fee

MARCH 3 THROUGH MARCH 17  
 With the remission of the payment of poll tax as a pre-requisite to voting in local, state and Federal Elections in Texas, Lamb County tax assessor-collector, Herbert Dunn announced Friday an emergency voter registration period had been set up to allow persons who did not pay their poll tax to qualify themselves to vote in 1966 elections. The 15-day emergency registration period will be March 3-17, inclusive. Persons without poll tax receipts may register to vote. They will be issued certification receipts showing that they have registered and have qualified to vote. Persons who held 1965 poll tax receipts, for 1966 elections, are qualified to ballot in 1966 public elections and do not have to register during the March 3-17 period, Dunn emphasized. Their names already have been included on the list of qualified voters within the county. Persons registering to vote during the 15-day emergency period will not be charged a registration fee. However, those who paid \$1.75 for their poll tax receipts will not receive a refund of this payment. Federal Court action recently outlawed the purchase of poll tax, as a pre-requisite to voting. 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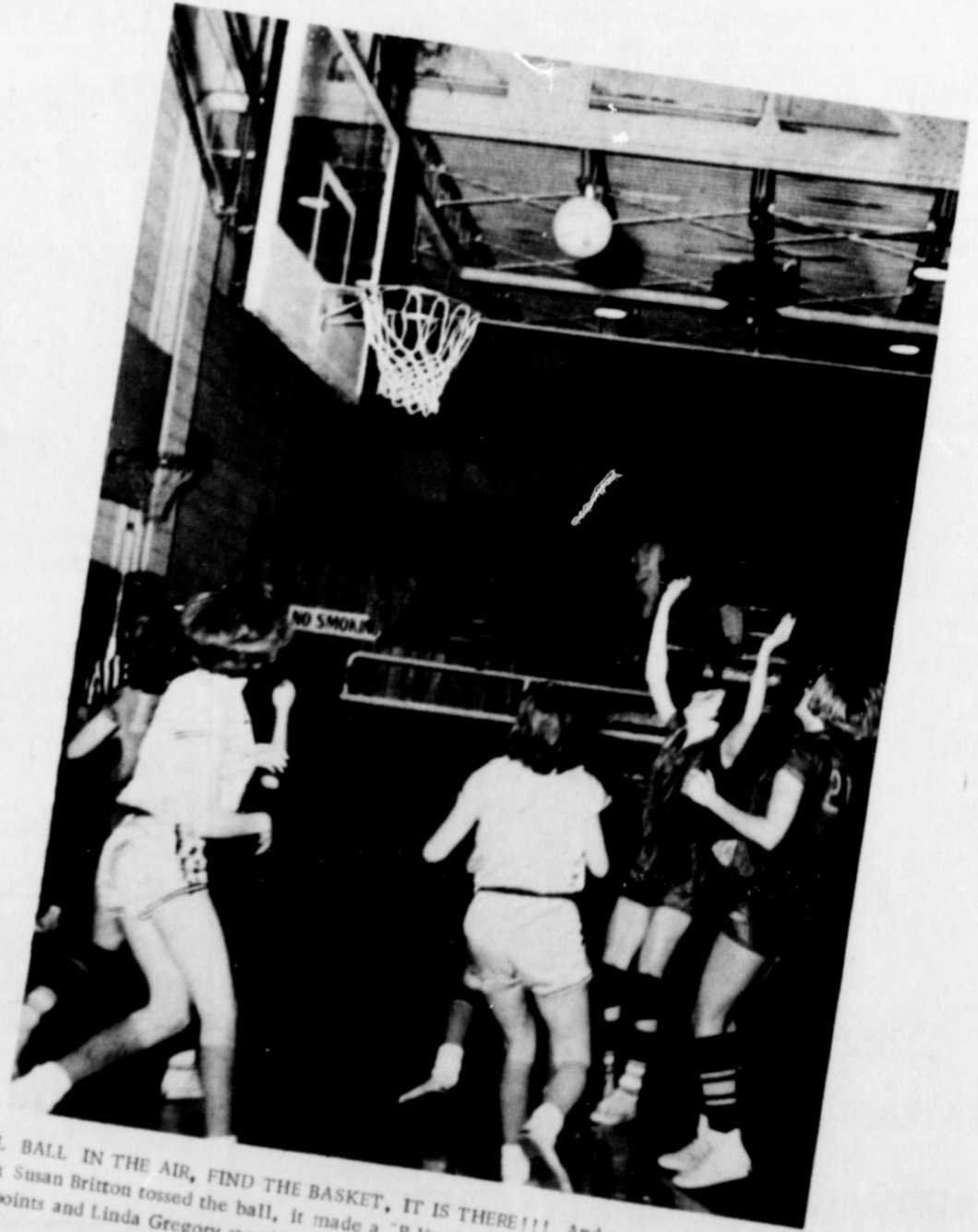

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## 63 Animals Bring \$10,296.33 In Livestock Sale

Sixty-seven animals were exhibited by local PFA boys and members of the 4-H Club at the Junior Livestock Show Friday at the local FFA barn.

Sixty-three of the show animals were sold the following day in the livestock sale, bringing a total of \$10,296.33. Of these sixty-three animals sold, there were thirteen steers, twenty lambs, and thirty barrows. Donations from firms that failed to purchase animals, accounted for an additional \$275.06, bringing the over-all total of the sale to \$10,571.98.

Ed Dawson, secretary-treasurer for the Springlake-Earth Junior Livestock association said, "Of the \$275.06 received in donations to date, \$119.00 was used to purchase trophies for the winners, \$86.65 was used for the purchase of animals in the show \$5.00 to purchase gifts for the assistant county agricultural agent and for E. G. Gaston, vocational agriculture instructor, and \$40.00 for flood lights for the show barn. The remaining balance will be used for additional needed facilities for the show barn."

All the stock, even those animals that placed in the lower brackets were sold at extremely high prices. The prices paid for steers ranged from \$1.75 a pound to 34 cents per pound. Giving an average of 47 1/2 cents; lambs sold from \$1.40 to 35 cents around, the average being 69 1/2 cents per pound; and barrows brought from \$1.05 to 37 1/2 cents a pound.

In discussing the prices paid for the animals, Dawson said, "The exhibitors received much more than they expected as a satisfactory sale price. Comparing this year's sale with last year's sale, which netted \$7,837.22 from 44 head of animals the percentage remains almost the same."

The following firms purchased animals at the show: Citizen.

State Bank and Earth Oil and Gas bought the grand champion heavy weight steer from Brian Hamilton, with a guaranteed bid of 80 cents; Citizen State Bank and Brown and Jordan bought the second place heavy weight steer from Wella Barton, guaranteeing a bid of 42 cents; Joe B. that the poll tax receipt forms will be used as the registration forms with the words "Conditional Voter Registration Certificate" stamped on the poll tax receipt.

The voter registration law also allows persons to apply for the voter registration certificate either in person or by mail but Dunn warned persons that a change has been made in the mail applications.

"Under the voter registration law the application for the voter registration certificate must be received by the tax office before midnight March 17. There is no grace period as in the purchasing of poll tax receipts by mail," Dunn said.

Dunn also stated that persons will be able to apply for the voter registration certificates at each city hall throughout the county but that the law states that he will not be able to travel throughout the county as with the poll tax receipts.
