Multiple Sclerosis Film Shown at Earth Lions Meeting

Mrs. Nadyne Guidry, Executive Director of the South Plains Texas Chapter of the National Multiple Sclerosis Society was in Earth Tuesday as guest speaker at the noonday meeting of the Earth Lions Club.

A film "My Friend, Joe" was shown. It was made and donated to the Multiple Sclerosis Society by Rex Fleming, and narrated by James Stewart.

Mrs. Guidry mentioned that 40% of the donations goes to the National Multiple Sclerosis Society for research, and 60% stays at home to be used in local cases.

The South Plains Chapter, consisting of 23 counties, has only one paid salary, that of Mrs. Guidry.

A Lubbock doctor said that there were literally hundreds of cases in the area.

The Chapter organized in May, and the charter was granted May 27. Mrs. Roy Byers, Springlake, is on the Board of Trustees.

The purpose, according to Mrs. Guidry, is to acquaint this area with Multiple Sclerosis, its symptoms and the results of it. Plans are to take donations to get a clinic in Lubbock as the nearest ones now are in Dallas and Houston.

Mrs. Guidry left with the Earth Lions donation envelopes, which will be available through them.

The film will be shown to the Springlake Lions at noon on December 7, and to the Springlake-Earth Schools in the afternoon on December 7. The Olton Lions will present the film on December 5. The Springlake-Earth school children as well as the Springlake and Olton Lions will receive donation envelopes.

Multiple Sclerosis is a disease of the central nervous system of the brain and spinal cord that may affect speech, vision, balance and movement. The illness is visually progressive, but often it reaches plateaus during which people can function independently, sometimes for many years.

Girlstown USA Representative Speaks To PTA

Approximately 25 attended the P. T. A. program Monday night at Springlake-Earth school auditorium.

Mrs. Faynell Spears, of Girlstown, presented a very interesting program on Girlstown, U. S. A. Girlstown was founded March 13, 1949. The late Tom Duggan, of Lubbock, gave 1,425.6 acres of ranch land, and nine girls were soon settled in the old ranch house. Currently 70 girls are being cared for, and during its 18 years, more than 500 have been cared for.

These girls come from every walk of life, and just need a home. They are encouraged in their education, and win many outstanding awards and honors in school. If they wish to attend college, beauty school, or nurse's training, or special training, they are helped in this.

The Home exists on contributions. Many clubs take this work as their project.

The girls arise at 5:15 a. m. and they take turns at kitchen duty, keep their rooms clean, and take the bus at 8:15 a. m. to attend school. The girls attend the church of their choice twice on Sunday.

Girlstown reached a very difficult point in their work this year, and were told they might have to close their doors unless they raised \$38,000. They asked the Board of Directors to give them until January to reach their goal, and Marshall Cooper and Mrs. Spears began to raise the money. Mrs. Spears asked, "If you can find a place in your heart for these needy young ladies who are growing up in a Home atmosphere, where they are loved and cared for, will you send your contribution?"

On the average, the Home has 100 young girls a week. These girls can be placed in foster home, if anyone is interested.

The Home can use any kind of home canned foods, clothing for girls, especially 10-12. The P. T. A. has planned to take a car load of supplies to Girlstown before Christmas. If you want to send anything, please call Mrs. C. L. Houchin at 257-4672.

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Gene Higgins Returns To Saigon After Furlough

Gene Higgins, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bruce Higgins, left Clovis, N. M., Monday for Saigon, following a furlough spent in Earth and in Portales, N. M., with his wife and five children. Higgins, a 1958 political science graduate of Eastern New Mexico University, is now wrestling with problems involving management of a 200,000 person "village" in Vietnam.

He was formerly in city management in Las Cruces and Alamogordo, following a graduate course in public administration at Southern Methodist University. It was while serving as city manager at Fort Stockton, Texas, that he answered an inquiry from the Agency for International Development on going to Vietnam as a specialist in urban affairs.

He has spent the past five months in Vietnam, and expects to be back in Saigon on November 29, and will be working the next 18 months directly with the "village" of Bien Hoa, 30 kilometers from the capital of South Vietnam. He says one of the big problems is disposal of garbage in villages in which the population is far beyond normal.

His experience in South Vietnam has already convinced him that this war-torn country is making progress. He notes that despite the constant harassment of the Vietnamese, which includes the murder or kidnaping of their village leaders, the people are striving to set up a stable political system which can provide security for economic development.

The problems facing the Vietnamese villages, compared to the problems of Las Cruces or Alamogordo, seem almost endless, Higgins explains. "Most villages have no sewer or water system and no system for drainage. Instead, each home has its own septic system for disposal or sewage, and water is pumped from wells 5 to 12 meters deep.

There are schools and hospitals in many communities, but there are few teachers and doctors or technical personnel to staff them, Higgins says, despite these handicaps, schools are operating in double shifts throughout South Vietnam, and the literacy rate is high.

He explained that intensive training has produced cadres of Vietnamese who go out into the villages to provide the services required to get the nation on its feet.

The training includes such specialists as the raising of ducks, and pigeons, in irrigation. This system, he says, com-

bine security along with practical assistance. "In some villages the system has worked very well. Other villages there have been overrun by the Viet Cong," he notes. In some areas platoons of American soldiers provide the extra margin of protection necessary to give these people a chance to establish a political and economic base for their lives.

Assassination and kidnaping of village and hamlet officials is a constant hazard, Higgins says, and "this is why it has taken a while" for the people of South Vietnam to become convinced that the Americans can offer them a better way of life. He noted that the big break-through to the people is the point at which they are willing to reveal the presence of Viet Cong among them. Until they are confident that they won't be victims of reprisals, they can't afford to expose the enemy.

Higgins said the political system the Vietnamese are learning through tutelage of Americans is based on a hamlet-village organization. The hamlets are responsible for tax collec-

tions, and the villages provide the services.

Security, or police protection, is all under the national government, he noted, and the village government is therefore nationally oriented. There are but a half-dozen cities in South Vietnam which are autonomous.

Eight per cent of the villages now have organized themselves with a chief and councils. Each village is made up of a number of hamlets, each with its own internal organization.

The village and hamlet leaders attend workshops where they learn their duties and responsibilities. "We have had some very good workshops," Higgins said. Most of the actual teaching is done by training officers who are native Vietnamese, with American advisors on hand to supply technical background. Most of these Vietnamese officers can speak English, he said.

Higgins says that during the five months he has spent in Vietnam he has traveled throughout the country, and is impressed by the zeal with which the people take up their responsibility as voters.

During the recent national election over 80 per cent of the eligible voters went to the polls. He noted sadly that in last week's constitutional election in New Mexico, only 12 per cent of the registered vote was cast.

Higgins was in Saigon on October 31 when Viet Cong lobbed three mortar shells onto the grounds of the national palace during inaugural festivities for President Nguyen Van Thieu.

The incident captured the headlines of daily papers throughout the United States, and displaced the news of President Thieu's inaugural address.

But in Saigon, Higgins said, the incident was accepted as a matter of course. "It happens all the time," he said. He added that life goes on despite the occasional shots, or hand grenades.

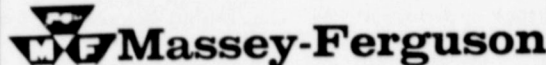

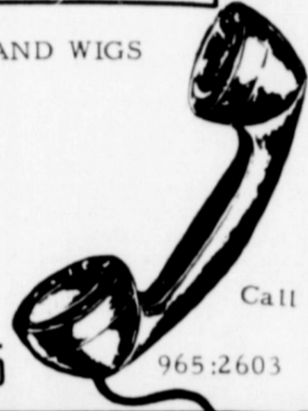

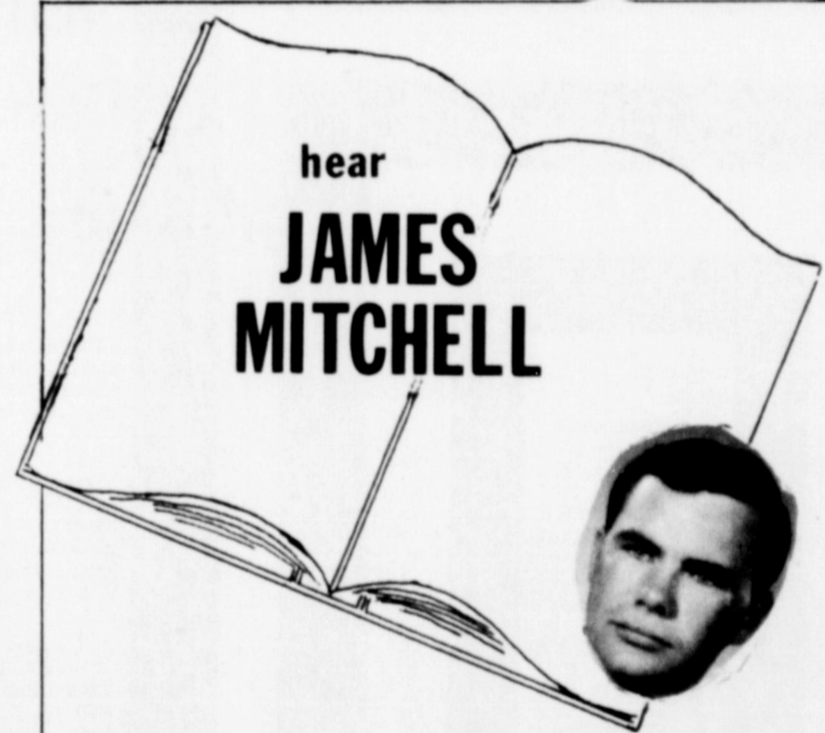

Wolverettes Continue Winning Ways

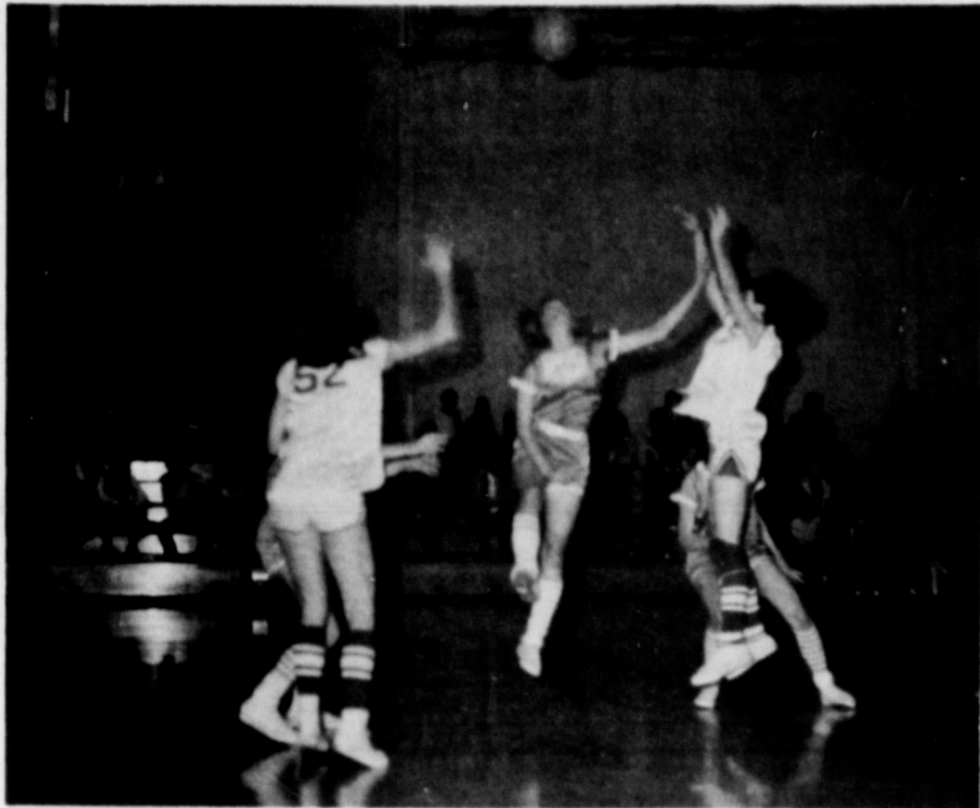

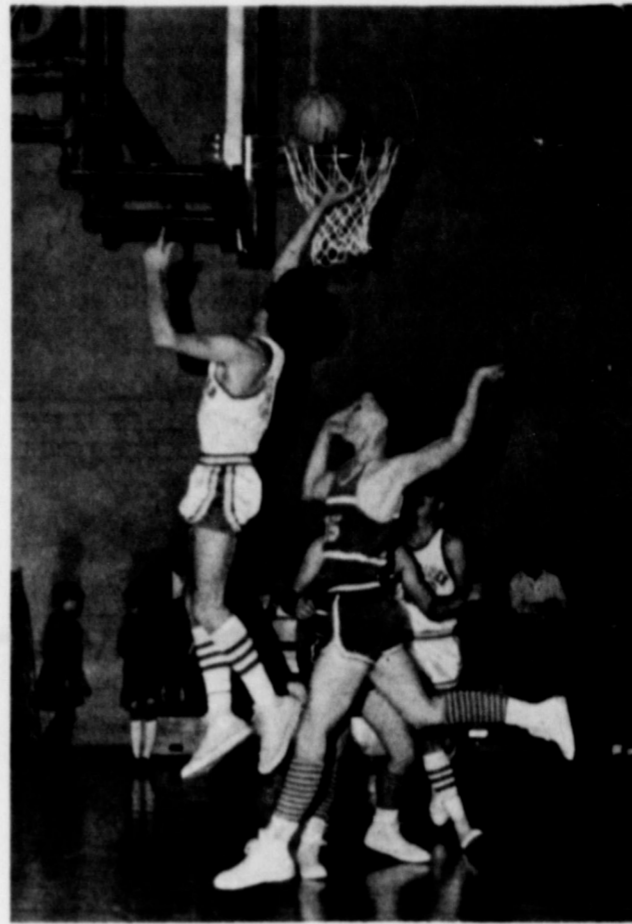

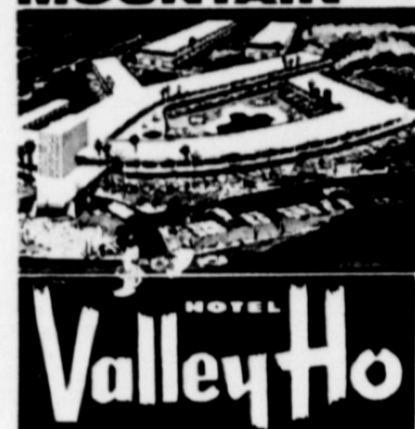

Census Bureau Continues Surveys Population Reaches 200 Million

During the week that the Census Bureau's population clock ticks off the arrival of the 200 millionth American, census workers will be taking an employment survey here, Director Francis H. Wilmer of the Bureau's regional office in Denver announced today.

The data accumulated will be used by the Department of Labor in updating national figures on employment and unemployment. The Census Bureau acts as fact-gathering agent for the Labor Department.

The survey is taken each month from a representative sample of households in 449 areas throughout the U. S. The identity of households surveyed is confidential by law, and the facts obtained are used for statistical purposes only.

Interviewers will visit local residents Nov. 20-25 to ask about kinds of jobs, hours worked, time off, and job-hunting activities, the regional director said.
