

43 REACT POSITIVE TO T B TEST

Of the 405 people in Lamb County who took the tuberculin skin test in Littlefield Monday, March 27, 366 of them returned the following Wednesday to have their tests read. Of that number, 43 showed a positive reaction to the test. Nineteen of these were referred to their private physicians, and 24 will be seen at a chest x-ray clinic in Littlefield April 7 sponsored by the West Texas Area Texas Tuberculosis and Respiratory Disease Association. Dr. Robert H. McCarty, medical director of Region I and II, TB Control Division of the State Health Department, released the statistics to Joyce Burkholder, the program assistant.

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Earth Manufacturing Co. Building New Trailers

The Earth Manufacturing Company, located in the old Ford building across the street from the State Bank, is now manufacturing a new trailer called a "Tumbleweed Trailer."

Talking about the trailer, Bert Gossett, an officer of the State Bank at Earth Manufacturing Co. said, "You can't yank out a panel."

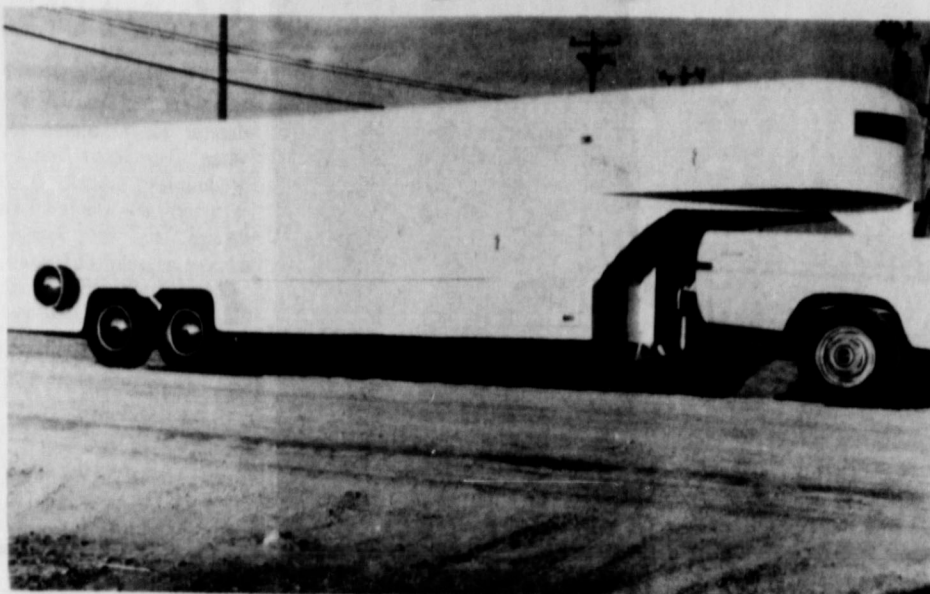
The trailer is extra strong, a welded-unibody. When the gates are shut, they are an integral part of the trailer. The gate reinforces the trailer, making it a solid unit length. There are no loose

parts to rattle or wear. There are no square corners, so there is not a place anywhere on the trailer to cut a rope. The non skid floor is covered with asphalt over metal lath. Side fenders are welded in place and are extra stout.

Full and half top designs are available. Extra strength in the tops protect animals and withstand severe damage in a turn over.

Brakes, lights, and all safety devices meet state requirements. All new pipe and structural steel are used. Arc welding is done with automatic wire feed welders to make the trailers as rugged as possible.

C. C. Light designed the trailer



and his design, which utilizes more than 20 years experience is under contract.

Nineteen Earth residents formed the Earth Manufacturing Co. in November. Larry Tunnell is president of the company that will manufacture any type of trailer including gooseneck or drag type trailers.

Four shop employees are building six or seven trailers a month now, but equipment is being added to speed the manufactur-

ing process. They hope to start turning out eight trailers a month and hold the number at that point.

The custom built trailers are not cheap, but there is no lack of customers. Trailers have been built for Oklahoma and New Mexico ranchers as well as cattlemen at Earth and surrounding areas. Shop employees are now working on backlog orders.

The payroll and materials

bought locally add \$3,000 a month to Earth's economy. Six or seven trailer sales per month at an average of \$1,500 each adds \$9,000 to \$10,000 more per month. It is said that a dollar changes hands in a community seven times and if this saying is true the Earth Manufacturing Company is responsible for a \$94,000 turnover each month. If the figure is multiplied twelve times (12 months) it produces \$1,134,000 boost for Earth's economy.

Guard Your Pets Against Rabies

Rabies in man doesn't happen too often, but the disease still is one to be reckoned with because of its presence in wildlife and the increase in the number of pets owned by Texans.

Those who believe that an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure should guard their pets against rabies by having

them vaccinated, says the Texas State Department of Health. It is a good way of protecting your pets—and yourself—against the threat of rabies.

Rabies last year was on the increase after a record low number of cases in 1970. Following a low of only 226 cases, laboratory confirmed animal rabies rose to 322 cases in 1971.

Surprisingly, cat rabies cases outnumbered the number of dog cases last year. This can be interpreted two ways. First it could be interpreted to mean that the vaccination of dogs is showing results. Or, it could mean that cat exposure to bites is increasing and that cat vaccinations aren't on par with those of dogs.

Whichever reason you choose, you'd be correct.

Of the 39 pets which came down with rabies, the cats outnumbered the dogs 21 to 18. Dog rabies cases showed a decline by one case, but the number of rabid cats increased from 16 to 21 in one year.

The Veterinary Public Health Division of the State Health Department instituted a bite surveillance program during 1971, and the nine-month results showed the need for more pet rabies protection. Of 5,119 dogs involved in biting episodes, only 34.1 per cent—or about one-third, were known to have been vaccinated. The percentage was much worse for cats. Of 835 cats involved in biting incidents, less than 10 per cent were known to have rabies protection.

As usual, wildlife rabies cases took the spotlight in 1971 with 252 cases. Rabid skunks headed the list with 186 of the 252 confirmed cases. Thirty-one cases of rabies were confirmed in livestock last year.

To protect the public, the State Health Department furnished 689 anti-rabies treatment series (14 injections) to bite victims last year. This treatment is doing the job, and the last human fatality to natur-

ally acquired rabies in Texas was in 1962.

The record is good, but Health Department officials believe that the odds against rabies can be better if all pets—dogs and cats—are protected against rabies.

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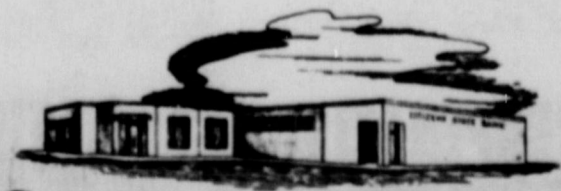

State Fair To Sponsor Super Marching Band Contest

The State Fair of Texas will sponsor an annual Super Marching Contest, the PARADE OF CHAMPIONS, which will originate in the Cotton Bowl in Dallas on October 9, 1972. Participation is open to all Texas high school marching bands and any other school-sponsored music or marching organization which contributes to an entertaining marching exhibition. Competition will be held for the following classes:

Class I: Marching band combined with one or more other school units from schools in UIL Conferences AAAA and AAA.

Class II: Marching band combined with one or more other school units in UIL Conferences AA, A and B.

Class III: Marching band only, from schools in UIL Conferences AAAA and AAA.

Class IV: Marching band only, from schools in UIL Conferences AA, A and B.

The preliminary contest will commence at 8:00 a.m. on the morning of the contest. Each participating unit will pre-

sent a marching performance of not less than eight minutes nor more than ten minutes. A panel of five well known, qualified judges from out-of-state will evaluate the performances on: Audience Appeal, Musical Competency, Suitability, Marching Competency and Discipline.

The three best marching units in each class will be selected on a point system and will compete in the evening of October 9 in the PARADE OF CHAMPIONS. The Cotton Bowl scoreboard will post the combined scores of the five judges immediately following each performance. The twelve top-rated units will compete for First Place Trophy and a \$1,000 prize, Second Place Trophy and a \$500 prize, and a Third Place Trophy and a \$100 prize to be awarded in each class. All other units will receive division rating and will be presented appropriate awards.

"Mini Bikes" Cause Maxi Headaches

Mini-skirts, mini-shorts... everything's a "mini" these days. But "mini-bikes," the latest craze in midget motorcycles, have the potential to cause maxi-headaches for many parents in Texas, the Insurance Institute cautions.

These packages of pint-sized propulsion look like toys, the Institute notes, and they are notorious for their ability to win their way into the hearts of youngsters - particularly those between 10 and 14. However, unless the driver is of legal licensing age (15 years old in Texas) or he operates the mini-bike only on his parents' own private property, the vehicle is being operated outside the law and insurance coverage is non-existent.

Texas law prohibits operation


of a motor vehicle by anyone under the age of 15 on any public street or thoroughfare in the state and mini-bikes come under the provisions of this law, the Institute says. This covers riding on sidewalks; in parking lots; in apartment complex entrances, exits and access roads, as well as alleyways and highways.

If the mini-bike is being operated by an underage driver on his parents' property, any damage or injury caused by that driver is covered - within the limits of the policy - by the usual homeowners insurance coverage.

However, the Institute cautions that if the vehicle is being operated outside these narrow limits, the parents of the driver assume responsibility for

any damage or injury... and neither the family automobile nor homeowners insurance will offer relief.

The Institute urges parents to consider the problems involved in allowing underage drivers to operate these mini-bikes, from the standpoint of possible harm to the child driving the vehicle and also from the standpoint of possible legal liability and resultant damage suits that could arise from injury or property damage that the youngsters might cause.

Ray Joe Riley Appointed To Texas Beltwide Campaign

Ray Joe Riley and Dr. John E. Hutchison, director of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, have been appointed co-chairmen for Texas in the Beltwide campaign to obtain "Better Yields of Quality Cotton for Profit and Market Growth."

They will be part of an intensive effort in the 14 major cotton-producing states aimed at increasing cotton yields and preserving the inherent quality of the fiber. Profitable production will be emphasized.

Need for the program is pointed up by a shortage in the supply of cotton. Contributing to the shortage have been unfavorable weather in all but one season since 1965 and a steady decline in yields. As a result, the carryover for the 1971-72 season, ending July 31, is projected at 3.25 million bales. This is less than a four-month supply.

Participating in the campaign

will be the U.S. Department of Agriculture, state Extension services and experiment stations, and the cotton industry. The National Cotton Council is coordinating cotton industry activity.

The play to be presented by the local school is "Eternal Life," written by Fred Eastman.

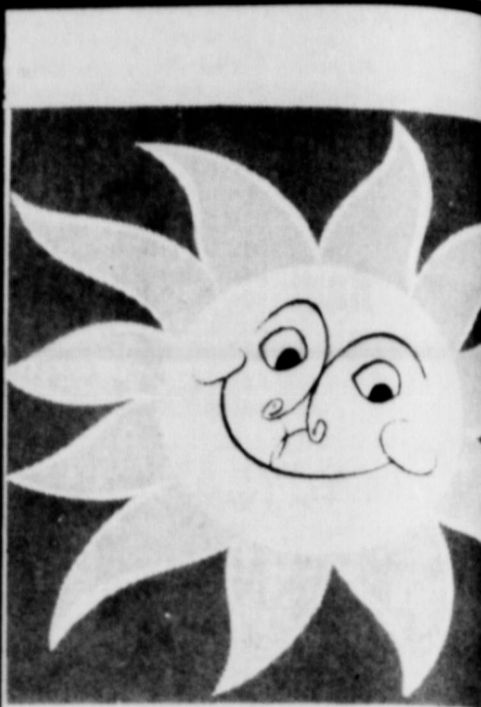
The story is centered around six members of a family trapped in a bomb shelter during World War II and concerns the reactions of the groups as they know they will each die.

VEE Campaign Underway

Throughout Texas, horse-owners are urged to "get the jump" on VEE, Venezuelan equine encephalomyelitis, that deadly sleeping sickness of horses. Bobby Brunson, Associate County Agent, advises that all horses that were not vaccinated last year to be vaccinated as soon as possible.

Brunson stated, "It was less than a year ago that the disease swept into the state from Mexico, killing hundreds of horses in its path."

The 1972 campaign against VEE calls for vaccination of all equidae (horses, mules and donkeys) not vaccinated last year. In addition to Texas the vaccination campaign will include the Gulf Coast states and states adjoining Mexico. All these states have been designated "high risk" states by the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

The four categories of horses that should be vaccinated now are: (1) unvaccinated horses that have recently moved into the state; (2) foals born since last year's vaccination drive; (3) foals vaccinated under six months of age; (4) horses that were overlooked and never vaccinated, notes Brunson. "Horses, mules, and donkeys that were vaccinated last year need not be vaccinated again. However, if there is any doubt as to whether the animals were vaccinated, it is best to vaccinate again," Brunson pointed out.

Officials of the USDA's Animal and Plant Health Service believe that VEE will break out again even though the disease was confined to 25 Texas counties in 1971. So, it's important to vaccinate now before mosquitoes which transmit the disease emerge in the warm months ahead.

This year the vaccination program will be conducted at the horse owner's expense. Commercial vaccine is available and must be administered by a veterinarian.

Vaccination will provide immunity for more than a year and possibly longer. However, if there is any doubt as to whether horses were vaccinated last year, it is best to vaccinate again.

Texas is still under federal quarantine for VEE. Thus horses must have been vaccinated for VEE at least 14 days before being allowed to leave the state for other areas. Horses for interstate shipment must be accompanied by a vaccination certificate with individual animals identified by tag, tattoo or other means.

About 92 per cent of Texas' estimated horse population of 625,000 head were vaccinated in 1971. Almost 800 Texas veterinarians participated in the vaccination campaign. More than 2.8 million horses were vaccinated in 19 states and the District of Columbia last year.

By appearance, VEE is not

distinguishable from Eastern and Western forms of encephalomyelitis. Symptoms range from fever, loss of appetite and depression to stupor, weakness, staggering, blindness and death. More than 60 per cent of infected horses die.

All horse owners should be encouraged to report any sickness in horses suspected of being encephalomyelitis to their local veterinarians.

A surveillance program is underway to check for possible infection in a variety of wild and domestic animals in the critical Gulf Coast and Mexican border states.

Game-Fish Law Hearings Set

Austin--Texas sportsmen and landowners will have an opportunity to hear and be heard about proposed game and fish law changes for 1972-73 when public hearings are held throughout the state during May.

The statewide hearings are the first step toward setting of coming hunting and fishing regulations, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department Executive Director James U. Cross pointed out, and is the citizen's forum for comments, questions and opinions. Cross added, "I sincerely urge all interested Texans to attend these local hearings, toward our goal of setting the most reasonable game and fish laws in the best interest of sportsmen and our bountiful wildlife resources."

Times and locations for the hearings are listed below. The Panhandle district which includes Lamb, Bailey and Castro Counties will stage their meetings at Littlefield, Muleshoe and Dimmitt at the county courthouse in each of these towns at 8 p. m. on May 2.

ICC To Aid Consumers

The Interstate Commerce Commission (ICC) is asking Congress for statutory authority to judge loss and damage claims against transportation companies engaged in moving household goods and other commodities in interstate commerce. "This would remove the need for dissatisfied consumers to resort to costly and time-consuming court action for claims and would improve prospects for fair settlement of claims involving small sums of money," said Pat Bradshaw, housing and home furnishing specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

ICC reports that it has been receiving 5,000 to 6,000 consumer complaint letters annually concerning claims service from movers who lose or damage household goods in transit.

"In another move for consumers, ICC has declared that rules adopted by groups or association of movers to limit their liability on claims for concealed loss or damage are unlawful," Miss Bradshaw said. ICC has issued new regulations, effective April 21, that will require carriers to acknowledge each loss or damage claim, begin their investigation of the claim promptly and settle the claim within a specified time or tell the consumer the reason for the delay.


