COUNCIL NOTES: Candidates To Draw For Position On City Ballot

The City Council met in a regular session Monday night at the City Hall.

It was decided that all candidates entered for city offices would draw for position on the ballot. They are to come by the City Hall for this purpose not later than Saturday, March 15. Five hundred ballots will be printed for the City election.

The extension of the sewer line west to the Eagle and Burton property was discussed. It was voted to permit these residents to connect to the sewer line after paying regular sewer tap and inspection fee, provided they cross their own property to Boston Street.

M. E. Kelley and E. C. Clayton led a discussion about furnishing water to the Cemetery and extending a four-inch line to the East City Limits. No decision was reached on this subject.

M. E. Ellis discussed the need of a place to store GOC equipment so that it will be available to members when needed. He suggested a locker to store the raincoats, hats, overcoats and radio equipment. No decision as to a location for this purpose was made.

A group representing residents east of the City Limits discussed the extension of a water line to houses on the southside of the highway. The decision was made that the City will furnish water at regular rates if those residents will meet the water line at the City's 6-inch terminal.

The Council voted to pay all bills as listed.

A lightweight Berkshire, shown by Larry Tunnell, placed first in its class and was named Reserve Champion Berkshire of the show. He also placed eleventh on a heavyweight Poland China.

Darwin McLeod had a first place heavyweight Hampshire and a second place heavyweight Duroc.

Doug Jones had a third place lightweight Duroc. Jearl James showed a sixth place heavyweight Poland China, a tenth place was awarded Carl Sanderson on his heavyweight Berkshire. Donald Gover received ninth place on his heavyweight Poland China. 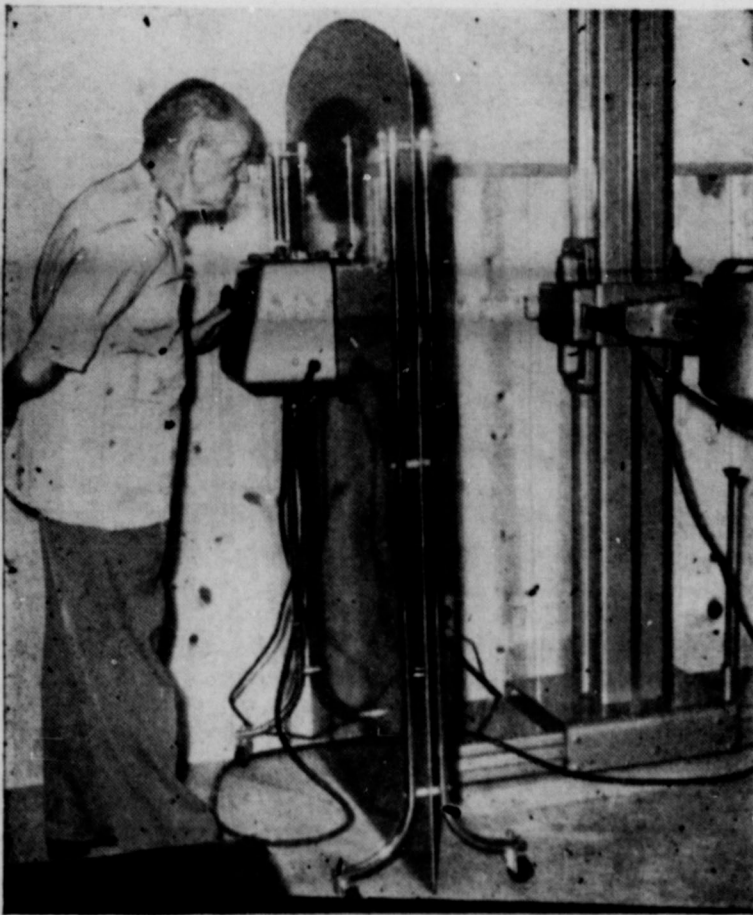

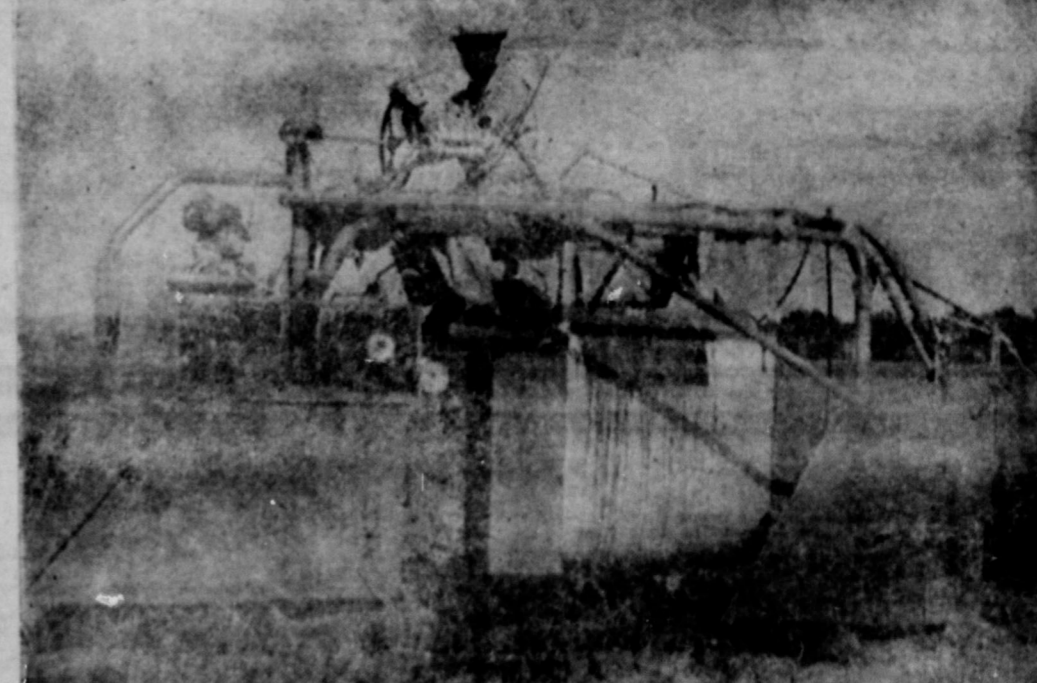

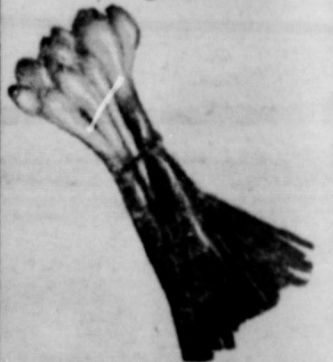

The newspapers are headlining the current economic situation. It is not pleasant. At least four and one half million people want to work, are looking for work, and can't find work.

The problems of four and one half million unemployed are not to be ignored. Without a payroll, they cannot buy pork chops, clothes, or shoes — let alone automobiles, and when buying falls off, the farmers, workers and businessmen who produce those things are threatened.

There are things that can be done. This country need not resign itself to depression and hard times. There are also things that should not be done. And one of these is to lose confidence in ourselves and in our country.

At this moment, partisan arguments over whether this is a depression, a recession or a slump are pointless. Partisan predictions that prosperity is around some nearby corner or that hard times are just over the hill are equally pointless.

They merely detract from the problem before us — and that is: what should a country do when four and one half million of its able bodied citizens cannot find work?

If four and one half million people were suddenly stricken by illness and had to leave their jobs, the full resources of the government would be mobilized. If four and one half million workers were to go on strike, there would be strong calls for action.

We must realize that there is an equal need for action when four and one half million jobs cannot be located.

There are things that can be done. And they do not involve waste and extravagance.

This country needs hospitals. They can be built under the Hill-Burton Act.

This country needs greater protection against floods. Protection can be achieved through sound public works.

This country needs sound reclamation projects. They can be accomplished.

This country needs a more ef-

ficient highway transportation system. It can be made possible through legislation already enacted by Congress.

This country needs a stronger defense. The means of reaching it are available through funds already appropriated.

The activities outlined above represent investments — investment in security; investments in health; investments in future prosperity. They can serve a worthwhile purpose both now and in the days that lie ahead.

The chairman of the Senate Committee are viewing the measures before them. Congress will be ready to act when a prudent course has been outlined.

Yarbrough Files Bill To Increase Cotton Acreage

RALPH YARBROUGH'S REPORT

In an effort to bolster the farm economy of Texas and the nation, I have filed a bill to increase cotton acreage allotments and authorize loans to help cotton farmers plant their land.

Purpose of the bill is "to provide an emergency relief program. The program is needed because thousands of cotton farmers are in bad shape financially and several million bales of high quality cotton are needed to meet the current shortage.

The bill I have filed provides that the acreage allotment for the 1958 crop of cotton for each farm be increased by one acre or ten percent of the total of such allotment for 1958, whichever is greater. It also provides that those farmers who need money to operate their farms may secure loans from the Farmers Home Administration in the amount they would be able to qualify for under Soil Bank payments if they had banked their land.

My bill gives the farmer an option: he may bank his land or get more acreage. He cannot do both. The loan provision applies to both those who have signed up for Soil

Bank, and those who did not. With a short supply of good quality cotton, the cotton farmer of Texas, particularly the small farm owner or tenant farmer, does not need to be paid under the Soil Bank not to farm. What he really needs is a program that will help him get credit to plant his land and live until he makes a crop. He also needs a high enough acreage allotment where he can raise enough to give his family a decent living.

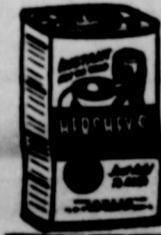

Stir in nuts and DAINTIES and mix thoroughly. Drop by small spoonfuls on greased baking sheet and bake in moderate oven at 375°F. for about 10 min. Makes about 50 cookies.
