## Spacing Rules Of Water District Remain Valid

The State Supreme Court dismissed an appeal by F. J. Bryson of Hockley County, appealing a decision of the 72 District Court which enjoined the producing of a well in excess of 100,000 gallons of water per day (69.4 gallons per minute) drilled in violation of the spacing rules of the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1.

The District refused to approve a permit at 74 yards from an existing well; however, Bryson drilled the well without a permit.

After the trial court issued a permanent injunction against Bryson, he made a direct appeal to the Supreme Court of Texas. The high court said that it lacked jurisdiction to take the case on direct appeal; thereby ruling against the appeal and dismissing the case.

## Dr. Billy Graham To Speak At Breakfast Preceding Inauguration

AUSTIN—Gov.-Elect Price Daniel has announced that Dr. Billy Graham, world-renowned evangelist, will be the main speaker at a dedicatory prayer breakfast preceding the inauguration in Austin on January 15.

Dr. Graham, a life-long friend of the new Texas Governor, also will attend the Inaugural ceremony at high noon.

Daniel himself asked the spiritual emphasis be added to his Inaugural Day schedule. He said: "It is fitting that we open a new chapter in our State Government by rededicating ourselves to those spiritual principals upon which Texas and our nation were founded and I am happy that Billy Graham can be with us on this occasion."

"The parade, ceremonies and other festivities sponsored by the citizens of Austin are very much appreciated and enjoyed by each new Governor and his friends, but I am happy that this year we shall add emphasis on the importance of the moral and religious principals which are so necessary for proper guidance in the affairs of men and government."

The breakfast at the Driskill Hotel, starting at 8 A. M., will be sponsored by Christian Leadership U. S. A., a non-denominational or-

ganization which sponsors the President's Prayer Breakfast in Washington as well as weekly prayer groups for leaders of government, business, industry and labor. Daniel is national president of the group.

Members of the Legislature and other State officials will be invited to attend the breakfast.

Zollie Stakley, Austin attorney who has been designated by Daniel for appointment as Secretary of State, is chairman of the local arrangements committee.

The sponsoring organization, Christian Leadership, U. S. A., originated the weekly prayer breakfast groups attended for many years by members of the United States Senate each Wednesday morning and by members of the House of Representatives each Thursday morning while Congress is in session.

There are several hundred of such groups meeting throughout the United States and in most of the nations of the world. Their international association is headed by Senator Frank Carlson of Kansas as president and H.R.H. Princess Wilhelmina of the Netherlands as honorary president.

Dr. Abraham Vereide of Washington, D. C., founder and director of the organization, will attend the Austin meeting.

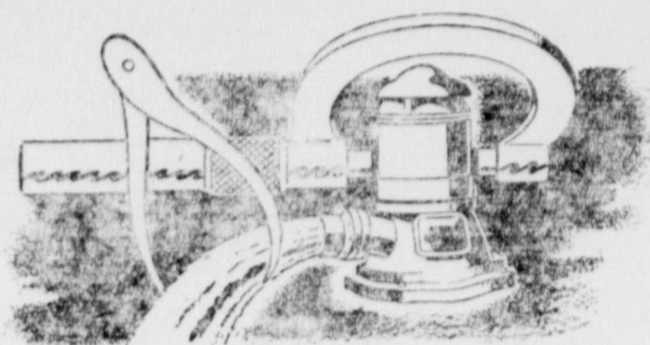

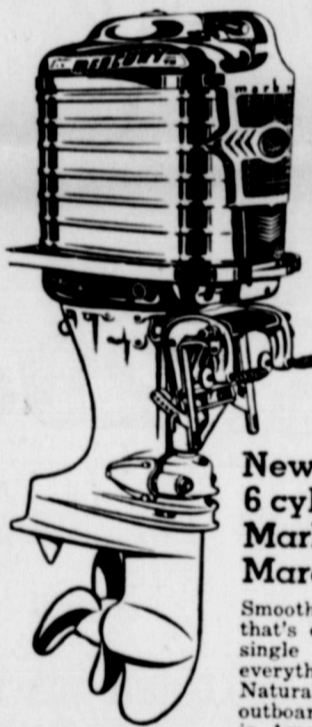

## Underground Water Maps Issued By 'The Cross Section'

An estimated 80 to 85 million acre feet of water still lies in storage, available for pumping, in the water bearing sands of the 13 counties in the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District.

How long will this amount of water last?

No one knows.

Too many factors depend on other things to get an accurate answer. But hydrologists know that the water table is continually dropping. In some counties, like Lubbock the water supply is down about 40 per cent whereas in Bailey County it has only dropped 10 per cent from what it was in 1938.

In order to give south plains residents and farmers a better picture of the actual water situation under this area, directors of the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District have had the hydrologic staff prepare three composite maps of the water district in color.

These maps, about as large as a single newspaper page, are in four colors. The first map was printed in the November issue of "The Cross Section" the monthly newsletter of the water district.

This first map shows the thickness of the Ogallala formation—the entire section of the sediments

from the ground to the bottom of the water-bearing sands — the Southern High Plains principal source of underground water.

The second map will be printed in the December issue of the Cross Section, and the third map in the January issue. The second map will show the thickness of the saturated part of the water table since 1938.

More than a year of work has gone into the preparation of these maps. Considerable time and expense has been put into their production and in order that all farmers and interested persons see or receive these maps, the directors of the water district are making the maps available free.

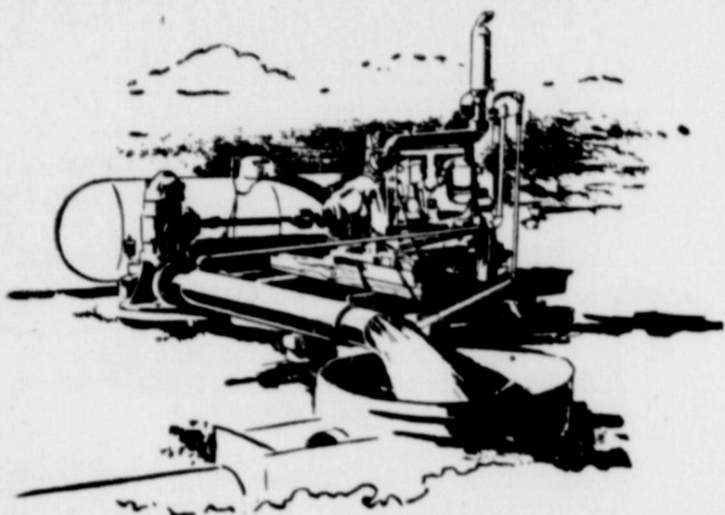

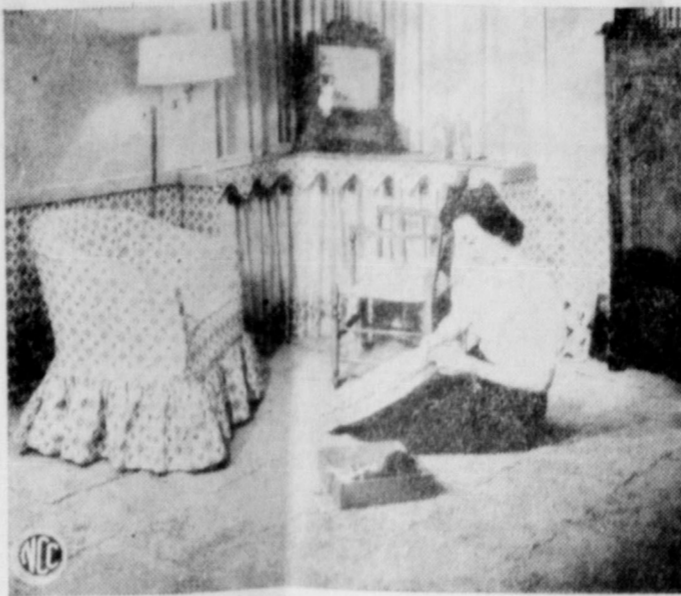



 Named to the planning committee are Superintendents T. A. Roach, Andrews; Weldon Marcom, Levelland; and Fred Cunningham, Hereford; and Dr. Morris Wallace, Tech education department head.  
 That committee was authorized to name a fifth member chosen from the Tech faculty.  
 The committee will report its findings to a meeting of West Texas School administrators January 29 at Tech.

AUSTIN, Tex.—Conflict, complications and suspense made 1956 one of Texas' newswiest years. Many of the biggest stories didn't run out with the calendar. They're marked "to be continued in 1957."

These were some of the headline-makers:

**POLITICS** were everyone to a frazzle. Gov. Allan Shivers took his first political tumble when Sen. Lyndon Johnson won control of the May Democratic convention. Price Daniel won over Ralph Yarborough for the Democratic gubernatorial nomination in a narrow margin of a little more than 3,000 votes. Daniel gained shaky party control by getting a mostly-friendly executive committee at the September Democratic convention. But he held on to the Senate seat too long. Gov. Shivers wouldn't buy the election, now, resign later plan. And Shivers came to the end of his historic seven-year tenure as leader of the again-triumphant Democrats for Eisenhower.

**DROUGHT**, in its seventh year, grew steadily worse. Crops burned up. Streams stopped flowing. Reservoirs dwindled. State Water Board had its hands full trying to referee squabbles over water rights. Agricultural groups banded together in the Texas Drought Emergency Committee finally gained expanded federal relief. All but five of Texas' 254 counties were designated disaster areas. Texas Water Resources Committee, a legislative study group, put in a lot of overtime reading a statewide water program for the next legislature. Suggestions: a \$100,000,000 bond program to help finance local projects, fishing and boat taxes to buy water storage space in federal reservoirs, "rain-making" research at Texas colleges.

**FEDERAL LEGISLATION** had Texas repercussions. Eisenhower supporters groaned when he vetoed the natural gas bill. But the federal highway building bill passed. It means \$57,000,000 a year more for Texas road building. Texas Highway Department started using it at once, predicted an era of unparalleled progress. To move things faster, it reversed its long-time policy, is now buying right-of-way for interstate roads. This brought a new headache—a hue and cry from officials for help in buying land for state highways.

**BUSINESS LEVEL HOLDS**—Capital expansion, the building of new and growth of old industries, has kept Texas' 1956 business index at its 1955 high.

University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reported the 1956 11-month total as the same as 1955. Rapid industrial expansion has kept the average up, says the bureau.

It offset declines in residential building, consumer spending and farm employment.

Texas' 1956 crops is estimated at \$1,100,000,000 — nine per cent below last year and the 10-year average.

U.S. Dept. of Agriculture said reduced production is due to drought, acreage restrictions and the soil bank plan.

Increased irrigation accounted for some bright spots. Per-acre yield of cotton was the highest on record — 278 pounds. But dry-land farming reached new lows. Corn crops of 27.4 million bushels was the shortest since 1873. Sorghum, with half the total acreage irrigated, produced 124 million bushels, fourth largest crop in history.

Other reports: rice, smallest crop since 1949; wheat, double last year's crop, but half the 10-year average; peanuts, smallest crop since 1934; oats, 19 per cent under last year; barley, about average; hay and forage, about two-thirds of average; commercial vegetables, up 16 per cent from last year.

**OIL RECORD PREDICTED** — An all-time production peak in 1956 and continued heavy demands for the first quarter of '57 are foreseen for the Texas oil industry.

Texas Railroad report said closing of the Suez Canal seems likely to be reflected in two ways: (1) decreased importing of oil into the U.S. and (2) increased demand by other countries for U.S. oil. Both would mean heavier demands on the Texas industry.

But, it noted, above-ground storage of gasoline stocks is still "quite expressive."

**WHODUNIT?** — Austin city officials promise every effort to find out who, if anyone, set fire to O. Henry's Honeymoon House.

People over the state and nation took sides in the local fight over the house where the famed short story writer took his bride. His-

tory-lovers moved it to a residential park, planned to make a shrine.

But nearby homeowners howled. They called the 80-year-old frame cottage a "pile of junk." Suit was filed to have it removed from the neighborhood.

Then a swift, nighttime blaze completely destroyed the house. It appeared the "junk" was set by some mischief-maker taking advantage of the already-heated controversy.

**SHORT SNORTS** — Leonard Mohrmann has named public information officer for the Texas League of Municipalities. For the past four years Mohrmann has been administrative assistant to Lt. Gov. Ben Ramsey. Texas Employment Commission's latest report shows many of the state's industrial workers taking home bigger pay checks.
