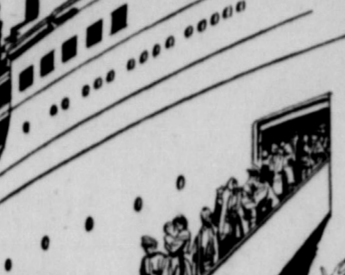

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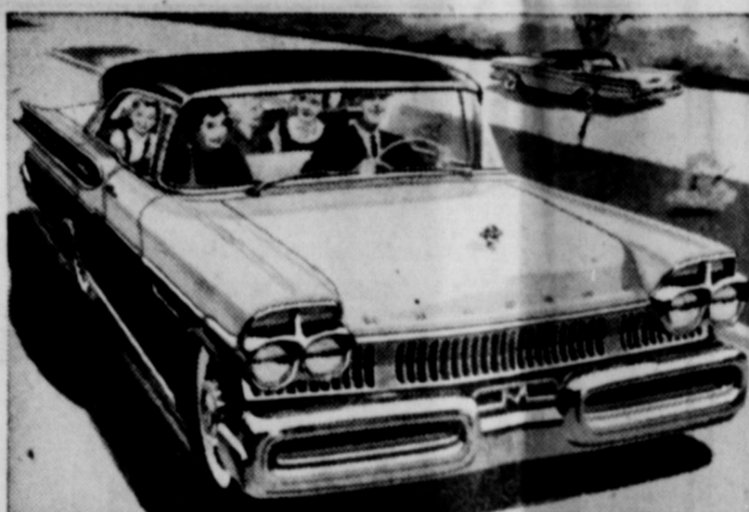

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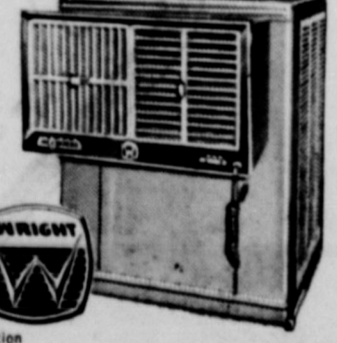

J. M. Willson Urges All To Buy Bonds

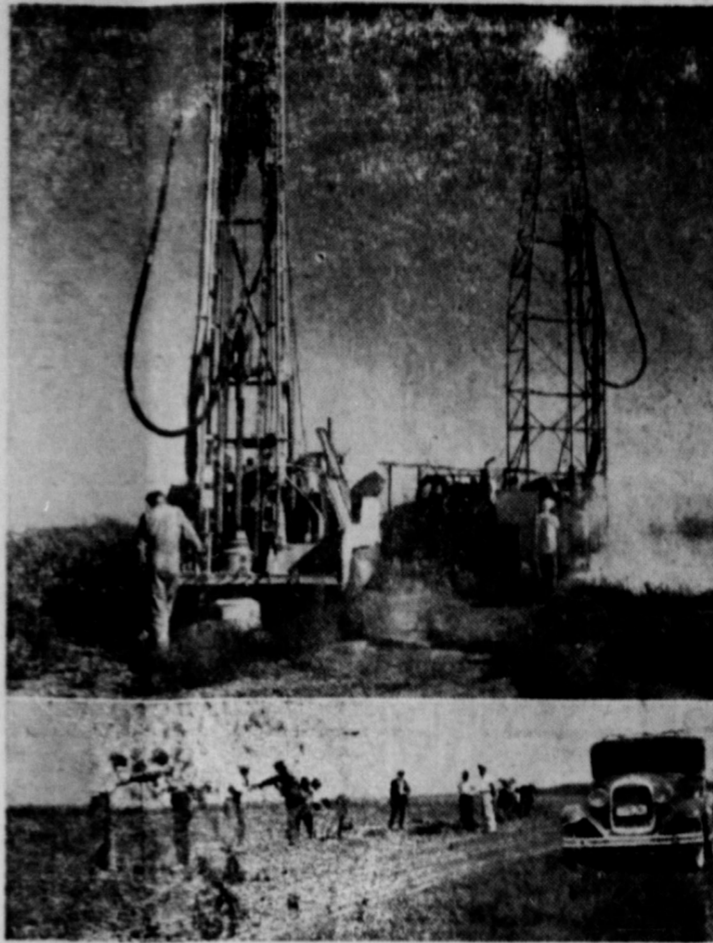

WASHINGTON NEWS LETTER

from LYNDON B. JOHNSON U. S. Senator

"You shall know the truth and the truth shall make you free." Dear Friend:

Throughout my life, I have held firmly to a fixed belief. It was summed up by Thomas Jefferson when he said:

"I know of no safe depository of the ultimate power of society but the people themselves; and if we think them not enlightened enough to exercise their control with a wholesome discretion, the remedy is not to take them, but to inform their discretion by education."

Because of this belief, I did not deplore the fact that the Russian community leader, Nikita Khrushchev was able to come into our homes by television and state his case. I believe Americans have too much sense to be deceived by open communist propaganda.

I did regret, however, that we did not answer his broadcast with a demand that the Russian leaders grant spokesmen of our own choosing the right to appear—uncensored—on Soviet television and radio. I am willing to back the American case against the communist case any time, because I am confident the American case will win.

Since the end of World War II,

this nation has taken the lead consistently in trying to rescue mankind from atomic conflict. We have offered to reduce armaments; to share our atomic secrets; to allow "open skies" inspection to enforce disarmament agreements. We have asked in return only reasonable safeguards to insure that the Soviets will not violate the agreements and use them to further the communist cause.

These agreements have come to nothing because the communist leaders have been able to conceal the facts from the Russian people. Future agreements will meet the same fate unless we find a way of penetrating the "iron curtain" so the Russian people will hear our side of the story.

I believe we should demand the right to make weekly telecasts and radiocasts to the Russian people. They should have the chance to hear our businessmen; our labor leaders; our professionals; our leaders of agriculture.

In return, we should be willing to grant them the same privileges in our country.

This offer should be pressed upon Nikita Khrushchev every time he is within earshot of an American representative. And if he refuses, he will have to explain to

the whole world why we are willing to let him state the communist to our people but why he is not willing to let us state the case of freedom to the Russian people.

Let the people know. Once they have the facts, they can make the honorable, just and fair decisions that will rid us of the fears of world wide atomic war and the arms race.



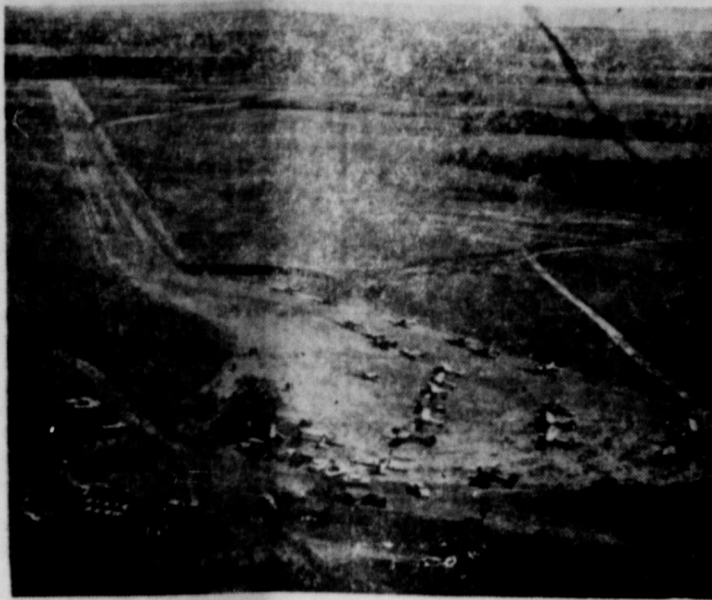

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Sixty-One Cotton Varieties Planted For Observation at Research Foundation

OLTON, Texas — Research on cotton varieties at the High Plains Station of the Texas Research Foundation at Halfway, Texas will consist of observation plots, test plots and variety comparison in acreage plots.

Sixty one varieties have been planted in observation plots 22 feet long. Each of the 61 varieties are repeated four times on plots in different areas of the 310 acre farm. These cotton varieties are new or untried in this area.

Thirty four varieties have been planted in one hundred foot plots with four rows not be used because the results might be influenced by the fertilization or irrigation program conducted on the adjoining plots. Each variety plot will be repeated four times. The research results to be determined by the average of the center rows in the four plots.

Eight leading varieties of cotton have been planted for comparison in acreage blocks. These varieties are those now in common use in the High Plains Area. A prominent farmer visiting the Station and observing the planting in process said, "I now understand better than ever why we must all join in this project. The planting, cultivation, irrigation, fertilization of all these varieties in so many plots is quite beyond what any individual could possibly afford to do alone."

Heavy Rains Checks Infestation of Cotton Insects

Heavy rains, hail, and high winds have reduced or destroyed stands of cotton on a considerable acreage in several localities, particularly in Swisher, Bailey, Hale, Floyd, Lamb, Castro and Lubbock Counties. Disease has reduced stands, particularly in the earlier plantings. Many of these fields have recently been replanted. The heavy rains have checked infestations of thrips and aphids.

Light infestations of thrips were reported in Lamb, Bailey, Cochran, Floyd, Hockley, Lubbock, Lynn, Parmer and Terry Counties, with medium to heavy infestations in Gaines and Hale Counties.

A light infestation of aphids was reported in Cochran, Crosby, Lubbock and Lynn Counties.

Fleahoppers were light in Cochran and Yoakum Counties and medium in Gaines County.

For control measures for various insects, consult the 1957 Cotton Insect Control Guide.

The information contained in the Cotton Insect Situation release has been compiled from reports received from county agents, voc. agt. teachers, personnel of Texas A & M College System, branches of the U. S. Dept. of Agri. commercial cotton inspectors, chemical companies and others. We hope everyone who does any field checking will again send us a report of the situation as you find it.

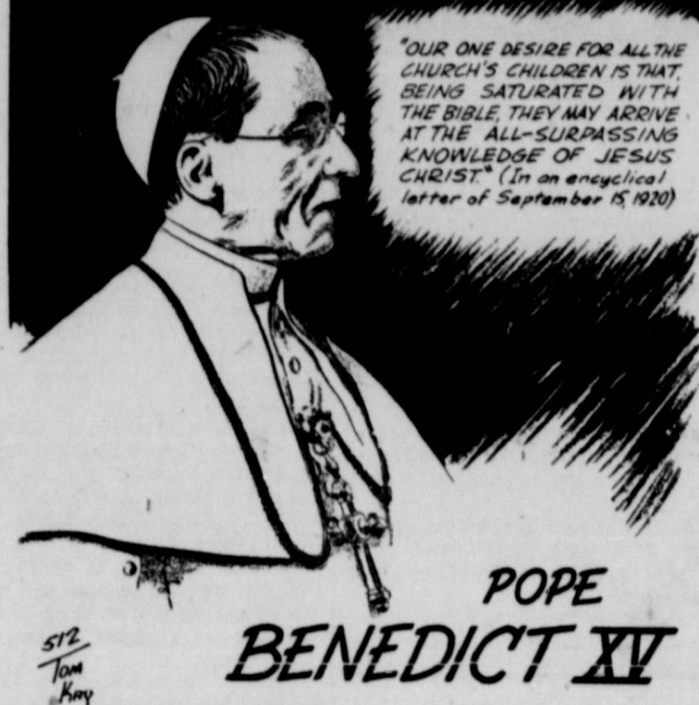
