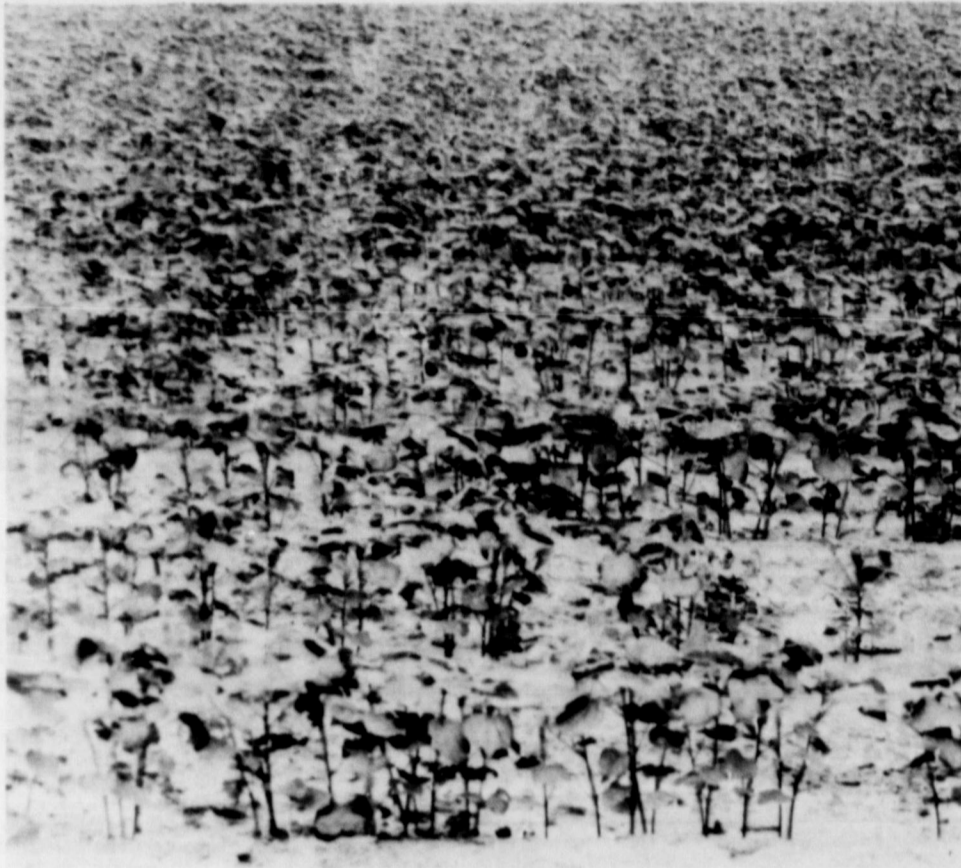

## Hail Damages Area Crops

Area Farmers began to move back into their fields Saturday morning to evaluate the damage caused by a Friday evening hail and rain storm. Early estimates place the loss of crops at approximately 600 acres of early cotton and feed. The heaviest losses in the area appeared to have occurred approximately 10-15 miles west of Earth.

The hail stones fell in the size of marbles, and many growers reported that they will have to replant if it is not too late. On the Thurlo Branscum farm, six miles west and five miles north of Earth, 2 1/2 inches of rain were received last week, with no hail reported. Jimmy Craft reported that he received 3/4 of an inch of rain Thursday, and .4 Friday, with no hail. Approximately 2 inches of rain was received five miles North and 1/2 mile west of Springlake on the Ed Dawson farm.

Very little hail was reported. Among those who received heavy damage from the hail were E. K. Angeley, 13 miles west and 2 miles north of Earth; Ennis Galyon, 10 miles west and 2 north of Earth; Bobby Free, 15 miles northwest of Earth; and Jimmy Skipworth, 10 miles west of Earth.

For necessary daily nutrients, continue to select foods from the four basic food groups: meat and meat substitutes; milk and milk products; fruits and vegetables; and, breads and cereals.
3. Watch your waistline--Staying slim is good for more than vanity. Statistics show a 15 per cent increase in death rate for individuals 10 per cent overweight, a 25 per cent increase for those 20 per cent overweight. Excess weight also increases chances of heart disease.
4. Rest up for days ahead--Don't be a sleep cheat. Adequate rest benefits adults as much as young children.
5. Check up on health--Illnesses don't just happen. Many of them can be prevented or controlled by early medical care and good health maintenance. Periodic visits to your physician and dentist as they recommend will keep tabs on your health as you mature. Persons over 50 may need a checkup more often.
6. Don't just stand there--Don't wait until retirement to join the church club, develop a hobby, or participate in civic affairs. Now is the time to begin activities that will add more life to your years.

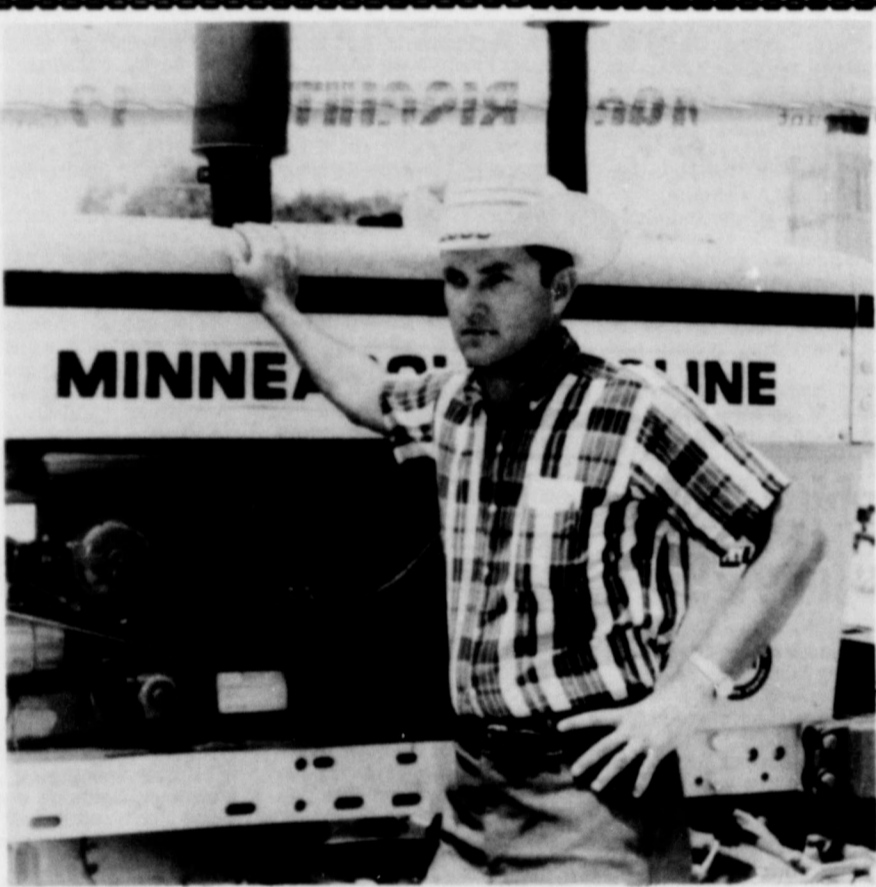

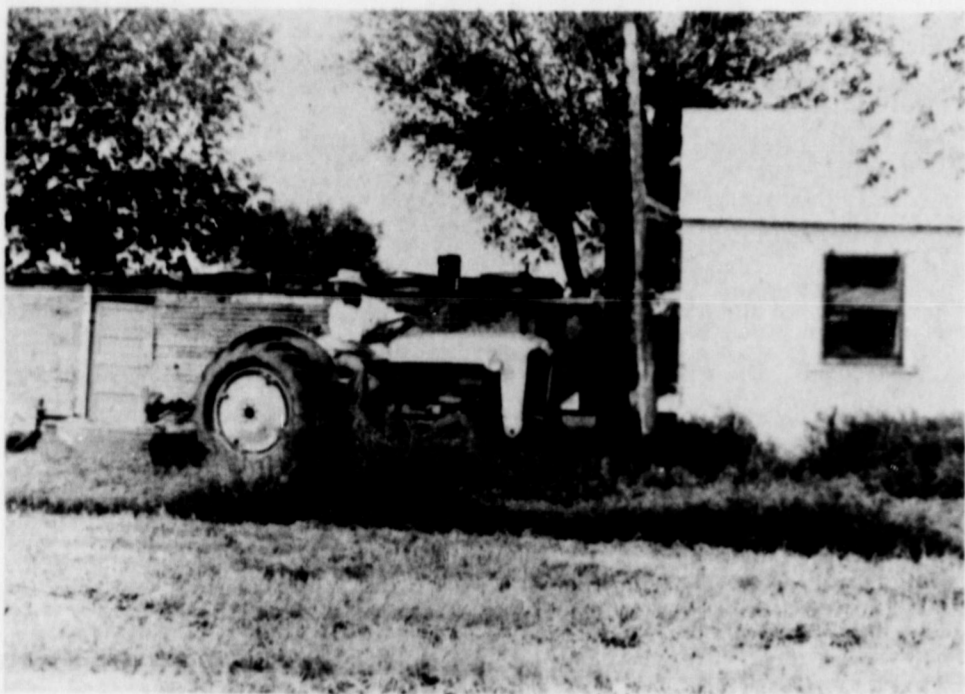

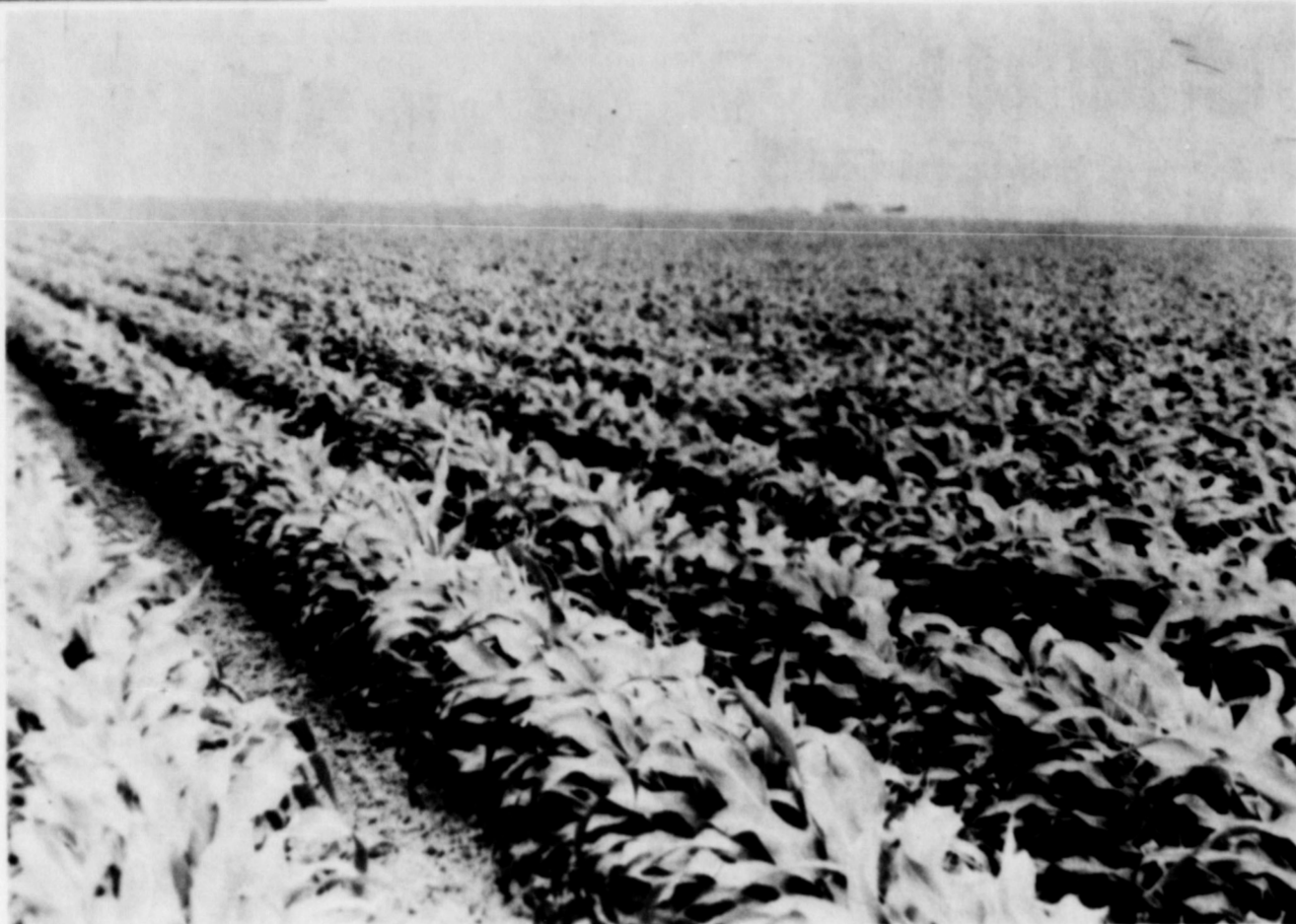
### Cadet Axtell Attending ROTC Camp At Ft. Sill

### 7 Accidents Occur In Lamb During May

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 7 accidents in Lamb County during the month of May according to Sergeant Thurman Keffer Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

The crashes resulted in 3 persons injured and an estimated property damage \$5,425.00.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first five months of 1966 shows a total of 32 accidents resulting in 2 persons killed, 5 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$16,980.00.

The number of traffic deaths in Texas has risen steadily since 1960 with 2254 deaths to 3028 deaths in 1965. "For the first five months of 1966, 1137 persons have died in traffic compared to 1092 deaths for the same period of 1965," the Sergeant stated. "This 10% increase is very alarming, and when you realize our heavy volume traffic months are still ahead, we must anticipate increasing problems in the accident picture."

The Sergeant appealed to the motoring public to assist in the reduction of this trend, otherwise, the death count at the end of the year will far exceed the record number of 3028 deaths in Texas during 1965.
