Such a spirit as hers and her schoolmates leads us to believe that great - Americans are still rising up everyday. That our great nation will always in charitable hands.

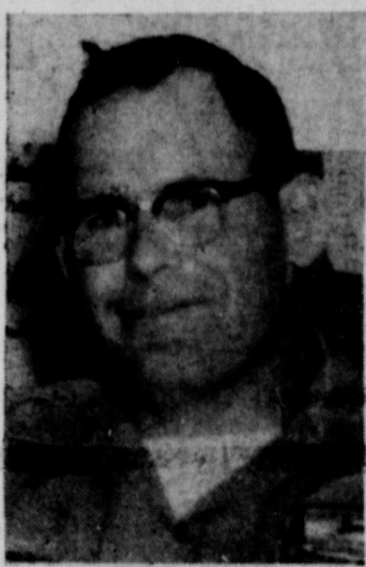

Two Springlake Stores Burglarized Early Sunday, Suspect Jailed

The Bob Chitwood Grocery and the Skinner Grocery in Springlake were burglarized sometime after 3:30 a.m. Sunday morning.

A Negro suspect has been picked up and is being held in the Littlefield jail.

Entrance to the Skinner Grocery was made by using a ladder which the burglar apparently had with him, to reach a window about 12 ft. off the ground, which he broke out. Departure was evidently by way of the door. A passing truck driver noticed the door to the store was open and stopped at the Paymaster Gin and reported it to Claude Davis, who was working at the gin. Davis called B. L. Skinner, owner of the store. Between \$10 and \$15 in cash was missing from the cash register.

Skinner said he had been in business in the same location for ten years and this was the first time he had had a break-in.

At the Chitwood Grocery, a National Cash Register, containing between \$20 and \$25 in cash, was taken. The register was found Monday southeast of Springlake on the Wisian farm. The safe had been beaten to open and the currency was removed.

The burglar gained entrance to the store by breaking the glass in the front door and reaching inside to unlock it. The owner, Bob

Chitwood, had closed the store about 8:30 p.m. Saturday night. Postmaster White contacted Chitwood about 8:30 Sunday morning, when he noticed the broken door.

Lamb County Sheriff, Dick Dyer and deputies Joe Ebeling and V. L. Smith conducted the investigation.

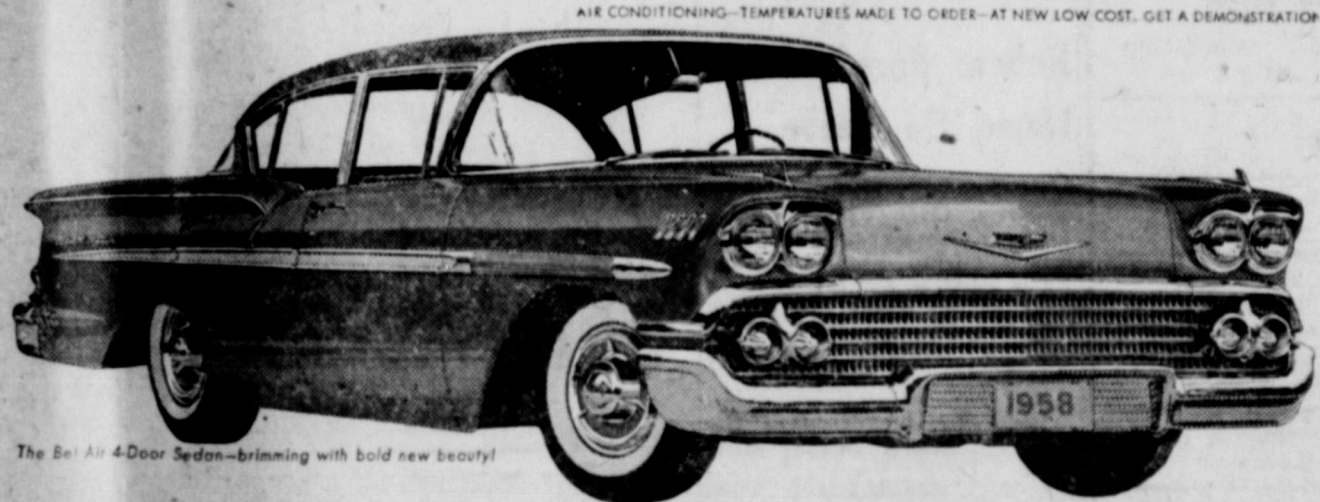

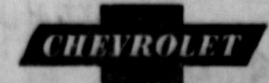

Applications For Disability Payments Should Be Made Before January 1

John G. Hutton, District manager of the Social Security Office declared today that if a long-disabled worker is now over 50, it is important that he file his application for disability payments as soon as possible, and before January 1, 1958, so that he will not lose any monthly benefit payments. When an application is filed before January 1, 1958, payments can begin with the month of July, 1957. Disabled workers who apply in January, 1958, or later, will not be paid benefits for months before the date of their applications. In no case is the worker entitled to disability payments until he has

been disabled for at least six months, and in all cases he must fulfill the work requirements of five years out of the immediate ten years before he became disabled and a year and a half out of the last three years before he became disabled.

By recent Congressional action, the long-disabled worker now has another six months until June 30, 1958, to file an application and still have his social security earnings record protected as of the date he actually became disabled.

This "freeze" protects a worker's social security earnings record, when he is unable to work because of a severe and long-lasting disability but does not pay benefits until age 50.

Hutton pointed out that the law now permits a veteran to receive compensation from the Veterans

Administration for service connected disability without any reduction in the amount of his disability insurance benefits under social security. This change, significant to persons who have been disabled for some years and to those with service connected disability, became effective when President Eisenhower signed Public Law 109.

Research In Storage Of Ground Water Underway At High Plains Station

Research in the storage of ground water got underway at the High Plains Station of the Texas Research Foundation on Dec. 4. The study of the controlled movement of measured water bearing sands is being conducted by pumping water thru underground pipe from an irrigation well into the recharge well, one-fourth mile away, adjacent to the east lake at the Station. The experiment, which will be continuous for six weeks, is designed to discover the behavior of recharged water in the underground sands. Among the items studied are: the permeability of the sands; the rate of movement of waters; the practicality of recharging water sands and the most economical way of conserving surface lake water.

The flow of water into the re-charge well is measured at both the source and the recharge well to give accurate tests. This is the first time equipment for accurate measuring and recording the data has been set up in this area. Three four-inch wells are located 8, 50, and 100 ft. from the recharge well so that observations can be made to get data. Wells one-half and one and one-half miles away are being checked to determine any effect the tests has on them.

During the first five days of testing, 5,889,999 gal. of water had been pumped into the recharge well. A rise in the water level of 24.61 ft. was recorded at the recharge well, 21.31 ft. at the test well 8 ft. away, and 20.93 at the

well 100 ft. from the recharge well. The irrigation well supplying the water showed a draw-down of 21.45 ft. during the five-day period while a well 350 ft. away showed a drop of only 5.97 ft. A flow of 800 gallons per minute was selected to run the test. This rate could be varied up or down.

The recharge research program is a cooperative effort of the U.S. Geological Survey, the Texas State Board of Water Engineers and the High Plains Station. Jerry G. Cronin and the staff of the USGS are in charge of the research program. Al Winslow, assistant district geologist from the Austin District Office, is assisting in the research program.

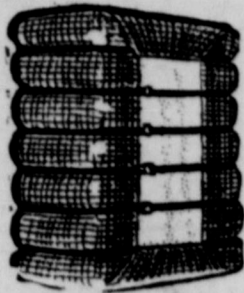
