When you stop to think that every little letter in this twelve page paper comes from the one Linotype, you get an idea of how many times ones fingers have to strike the right key. Services Held For Harry Vogt In Plainview Wed.

Funeral services for Harry Frank Vogt, 33, of Abernathy, were held at 4 p.m. Wednesday in the St. Alice Catholic Church in Plainview.

The Rev. George Salway, pastor of St. Elizabeths Catholic Church in Lubbock and The Rev. James Fitzgerald, pastor at St. Alice officiated.

Burial was in the Plainview Memorial Park, with Lemons Funeral Home directing arrangements. Vogt died Saturday night at the High Plains Hospital in Hale Center of a heart attack.

He had been manager of the Southwestern Public Service Co. office in Abernathy since March. Prior to that the family had been residents of Earth from Sept. 1954 during which time he was manager of the Southwestern Public Service Co. here.

Vogt was a World War II veteran, having served in the Navy. Survivors are his wife, Nowleen; three children, Patricia, Daniel and Kevin; his father, H. W. Vogt, Onata, Okla.; one brother, Herman, Ada, Okla.; two sisters, Mrs. Fred Mabry, Henrietta; and Mrs. Elsie Reynolds, Long Beach, Calif.

Several Arrests Made This Week

Two men, white transients, were picked up a mile and a half west of town, Saturday night and charged with being drunk, according to L. H. Randolph, justice of peace. Also three Latin-Americans were charged with drunkenness. All were fined in City and Justice court. Another man was picked up in Earth on a drunkenness charge and was taken to Littlefield, where he is being held, pending word from authorities in Arizona, where he had been paroled on a former prison sentence. He is a suspect in the burglary of Paul's Super Market.

Earth Voters Approve Two, Reject One Amendment In Light Vote Turnout

A total of 46 votes were cast by Earth voters in the Tuesday election. The first of the three amendments was rejected locally by a narrow margin, but the other two were approved.

Votes cast for the Retirement Fund Amendment were 29 for and 23 against; Pension Fund Amendment, 38 for and 7 against; and Water Bond Amendment, 37 for and 9 against.

Unofficial returns from the Texas Election Bureau indicated all three of the amendments were approved by voters over the state. Local election officials were O.

Paul's Super Mkt. Has Break - In, Suspect Jailed

An intruder gained entrance to Paul's Super Market, Sunday night by breaking the glass in the front door. Approximately \$35.00 in change was taken from the cash drawer.

Aramando Flores, employee at the Super Market, discovered the door of the store had been shattered at 11:05 p.m., after he came from the show. He called City Marshal A. M. Camp and Night Watchman Kelley, who, after investigating, reported nothing to be missing except the change in the cash drawer. The robbery was believed to have occurred between 9 p.m. and 11 p.m., since Flores passed that way as he went to the show at 9 p.m. and the door was intact at that time.

A suspect has been jailed. He was picked up about an hour and a half after the break-in was reported, as he was going about over Earth exchanging small currency for bills. He had also attempted to get transportation to Littlefield.

According to City Marshal Camp, the suspect is an ex-convict. He was sentenced to serve three to seven years in Arizona for theft. He served eighteen months of the sentence and has been paroled since last August. He is of Spanish descent.

He is being held in the sheriff's department in Littlefield, pending notification of authorities in Arizona.

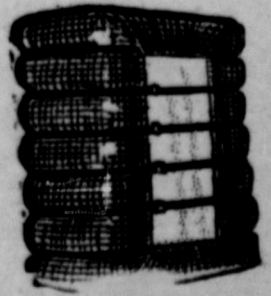

Springlake Schools Have Progressed Greatly Since Beginning

Springlake School was first established in 1908 with Miss Corry as teacher.

The second year of school was taught by Edgar Rice.

The third year two teachers were employed, Miss Melissa Thompson and Miss Margaret Shellbarger (now Mrs. D. G. Axtell).

A few years later it was necessary to employ three teachers, Mr. West, his sister, Viola West and Gene Cleavinger. In 1924 application was made for Springlake to become an independent district, in due time this was arranged, also a \$30,000 bond was voted for a new school building to be built at the present site (now serving as Junior High) and in Sept. 1925, school opened in the new building with E. C. Martin as superintendent.

The seven trustees being W. C. White, George Linville, Earl Hewitt, Otis Brown, Arley Edwards, H. M. Packard and M. E. Cleavinger.

The first football team was organized in 1928 with only twelve men on the squad, that year, they won three games, tied one and lost five.

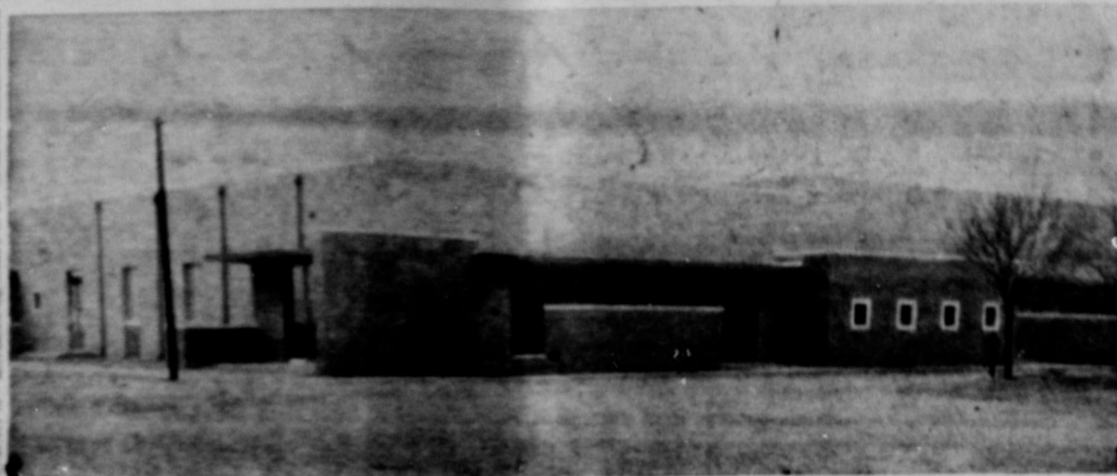
A school paper known as "The Siren" was also printed in 1928, David Leflar was the editor. The band was also organized that year. There were two students in the first graduating class, Ruby Kelley

Parent - Teachers Association was organized in 1930, the first meeting being held on Sept. 4, with 36 charter members present, (today we boast some 300 members), was held in the home economics cottage, then newly built. (Now used as a teacherage). Mrs. M. T. Howard being president of the organization, Mrs. Ray Kelley, vice president and Mrs. J. L. Hinson, program chairman. The first school annual was printed in 1931. The first FFA chapter, also the

room mother idea, were inaugurated in 1931.

The first Equalization Board was in 1924 and composed of J. F. F. Kelley, J. O. Dent and C. B. Landers.

The present gym was built in 1936. Later on several new buildings were added to the campus and in 1939 the present high school buildings being dedicated on Sept. 1, 1939.

In the 1955-56 school year a new 14 room elementary school, large auditorium and gymnasium and four new class rooms in high school were completed.

A large lunch room is located near by with Mrs. Beulah Dan-

forth as supervisor. The lunchroom received a class A rating recently from the State Lunchroom Supervisor.

The present enrollment is 957 students in the white and Negro schools, with 35 teachers in the white school and two teachers in the Negro school. There are 32 students in the senior class.

Springlake School has a very active band program. A fourth and fifth grade band was organized recently.

The P. T. A. has had, as its main project, the beautification of the school campus and during the past two years, many foundation plantings have been made. A com-

munity workday was held in the spring and several feet of concrete walks were laid with materials furnished by P. T. A. funds.

W. L. Mann is School Superintendent. Principals are John Lawrence, high school, Ralph Usery, Junior High and J. J. Davis elementary.

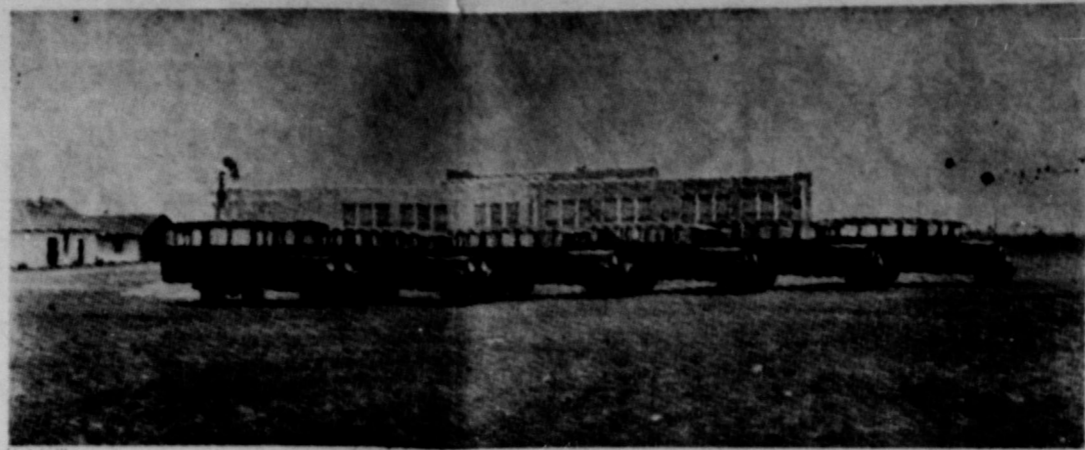
