

## A Week On the Casper Mountain With Christ

"In every thing give thanks," for God is the only one who knows the overall picture of what is best for us. What seemeth best in the eyes of man may not be the best thing

Anyway, the trip last week to Casper, Wyoming, where 34 people from Earth stayed in a two room camp on the tip top of Casper Mountain, 8,-500 feet above sea level, is somewhat higher than we in West Texas are accustomed to and was a big undertaking.

As we left Casper to start up the mountains, Rev. Johnny Tims ( former pastor of Lazbuddie Baptist Church) was there to guide us up to the camp. The bus at times could only make five miles an hour and those were the longest miles that any of us West Texans had ever traveled straight up.

Rev. Tims told the group to never stop the bus until they got to an observation point. If it stopped, to have big rocks ready to put under the wheels to keep it from rolling back down the steep curving mount ain road.


With Tom Lively at the wheel and Hershel Hulcy standing in the doorway with rocks and Pete O'Hair behind us ready to drive his car up against the bus and throw on his brakes in an attempt to hold it, we started straight up and around curves, with Rev. and Mrs. Hartman in front driving the pickup with our provisions and following Rev.

At the first stopping place high up in the mountains with high rocks, mountains and trees on one side and cliffs that drop straight down on the other, we saw a drunk woman try to jump off. Her companion, almost equally as drunk, got her back into the car before she could commit suicide.

After reviving slightly and cooling the motor off, we boarded again for the Heavenly way upward around each curve. We finally came to a dirt road that wasn't wide enough to get the bus through. Bark was off the majority of the trees on either side of the road where vehicles had hit them. The mirrows on the bus stuck out so far they would hardly pass between the trees. The bus needed big hinges in the center, as the hair pin curves were so sharp and impossible to turn short enough to get the bus through, but somehow we


