The 1960 cotton harvest will surpass last year's crop by far and the grades are reported to average much better than last year. A local gin manager said he figured the cotton crop to bring 27 cents

straight across for '60 cotton. He also stated the cotton harvest would probably be completed by mid-December, if the speed of harvest continued. 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Earth Cemetery Road Paving Project Now Complete

Construction on the Earth Cemetery road which began several weeks ago is now completed, as well as roads to Sudan and Amherst cemeteries.

Construction and paving work was done by Pioneer Pavers Inc., of Lubbock.

A distance of approximately 3200 feet on the Earth cemetery road was paved, beginning at Highway 70 and continued north past the cemetery.

Lamb County furnished funds for the construction of these roads and the commissioners have made the final payment on the cemetery paving projects and a mile of connecting roadway leading east from Bainer to north-south highway.

The final payment was \$50,000. Previously the commissioners had paid approximately \$17,000 on the project.

Roads leading to cemeteries at Earth, Sudan and Amherst have been paved under the new program, Judge Boone said.

The commissioners also opened bids for a new road grader for Precinct 2, a trade-in bid was made by Plains Machinery Co., Lubbock, for \$16,500 plus trade-in.

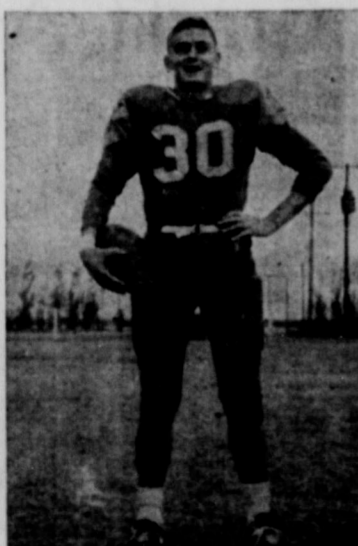

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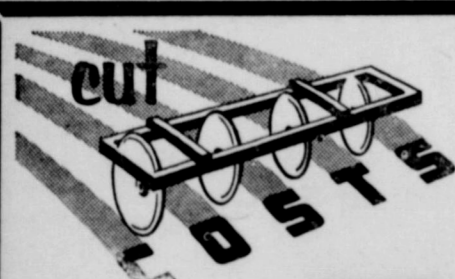
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Wolverine Band Places Second In Marching Contest At Brownfield

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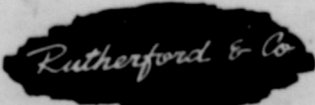

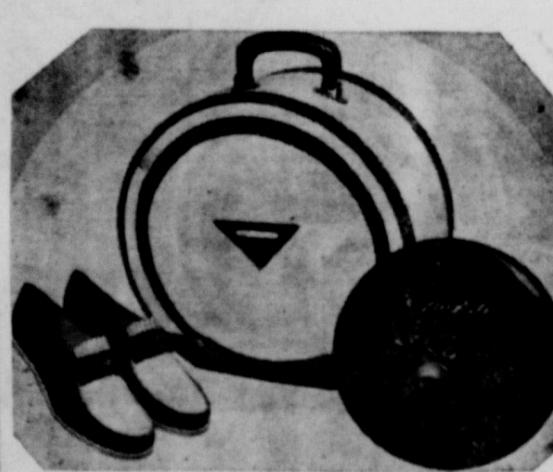
