### Cotton Harvest In Full Swing, Gins Swamped

Favorable weather this week has allowed farmers to get their cotton harvest in full swing. Trucks and trailer loads have come into the gins from every direction, one gin in Earth had 235 bales of unginned cotton on its yard at one time late Tuesday afternoon, while another had 270 bales.

The majority of the cotton seems to be strict low middling light spot grade. Some grades range higher and some lower.

The average price range runs from 22 cents to 25 cents with lower grades bringing from 12 to 15 cents. Some cotton is being put in the Government Loan.

It was estimated that approximately 85 to 90 percent of the cotton is now being harvested by machine.

### Light Damage Sustained From Fire In Senior High School Building

Excitement ran high around 12:30 p.m. Wednesday when the Earth Fire Department was called to the school where smoke was reported coming from the boys' rest room in the Springlake High School. The only damage sustained to the building was inside the one room, where the paint was damaged and janitor supplies were destroyed. Also a window was broken in order to throw fire extinguisher bombs on the source of the flame.

Gene Stephens, senior student, first discovered the smoke and turned in the report to the principal's office. The fire alarm was sounded and a very quiet and orderly evacuation of the building followed, so quietly, in fact, that two janitors working on a report in one room, did not hear and were not aware of the fire until they eventually opened the door to the hall and saw smoke.

Faculty members and students are to be commended for the way in which they conducted the situation. Teachers remained so calm that most students were not aware

of actual fire danger until they were outside of the classrooms, thinking it was only a routine fire drill. After students were outside they were kept away from the portion of the building where the fire was reported, so that they were safe from the possibility of an explosion.

It was thought that the fire originated in the broom closet which opens into the restroom. The Earth Fire Department assisted by teachers and custodians at the school, extinguished the fire in a short time, taking every precautionary measure possible. The restroom facilities were not damaged. Water, sprayed in the room by firemen, was soon removed and the floors were not believed to be damaged.

The fact remains that where there is a little smoke there must be fire, and while we are all thankful that no one was injured and very little damage occurred, we may also have a higher regard for fire drill practice, which proved its worth and effectiveness during an incident which could have been tragic.

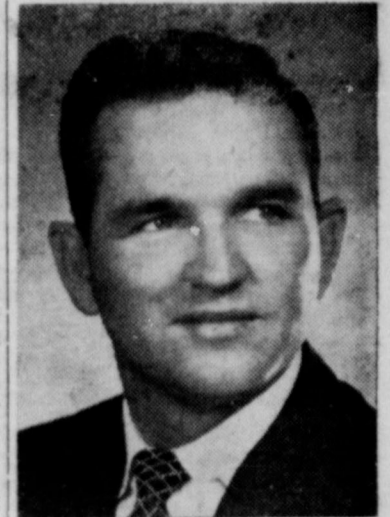
### Carroll McDonald Named As The New Manager For S. W. Public Service Co.

### Springlake First In County To Reach United Fund Goal, Earth Lags Behind

Springlake was the first town in Lamb County to reach its goal in the United Fund Drive, which began Tuesday. Sully Sanderson, Community Fund Chairman, and his group had their kick-off breakfast at 7 a.m. Tuesday and in two hours had practically reached their quota of \$1500.

E. C. Hudson, Earth Community Fund Chairman, reports approximately \$300 collected so far towards a goal of \$2575. Thirty-three active workers will continue to solicit contributions throughout the week. Everyone is urged to cooperate in Earth's Community effort to reach its quota.

The Pleasant Valley Community is organized and all set for their all-out drive Thursday (today). Mrs. Bonnie Haberer is community Chairman. Assisting in the canvassing of the community will be members of the Pleasant Valley Home Demonstration Club, the Pleasant Valley Social Club and other workers. Their quota is set for \$320.

Lamb County United Fund Drive was past the 40 per cent mark Wednesday with a total of \$12,270 reported. The county-wide goal is \$28,665.

### Grain Harvest Almost Complete, Yields Are High

The county's grain harvest was estimated at 98 percent complete. The County ASC manager, Lamar Aten, believes the 1957 crop is a "good million dollars" better in money than the 1956 crop. This is attributed to greater yields through the use of Hybrids and fertilizer. Yields up around 7,000 pounds to the acre on Hybrid irrigated grain have not been infrequent, Aten said.

The average yield in 1956 was about 4,000 pounds per acre.

High yields have offset prices, which have been between \$1.30 and \$1.50 per hundredweight. The CCC has been accepting grain with 12 percent moisture content at \$1.76 per hundredweight. Because of this rate, about 90 percent of the crop probably will be handled at the County ASC office.

Grain harvest in the Earth area is almost one hundred percent complete.

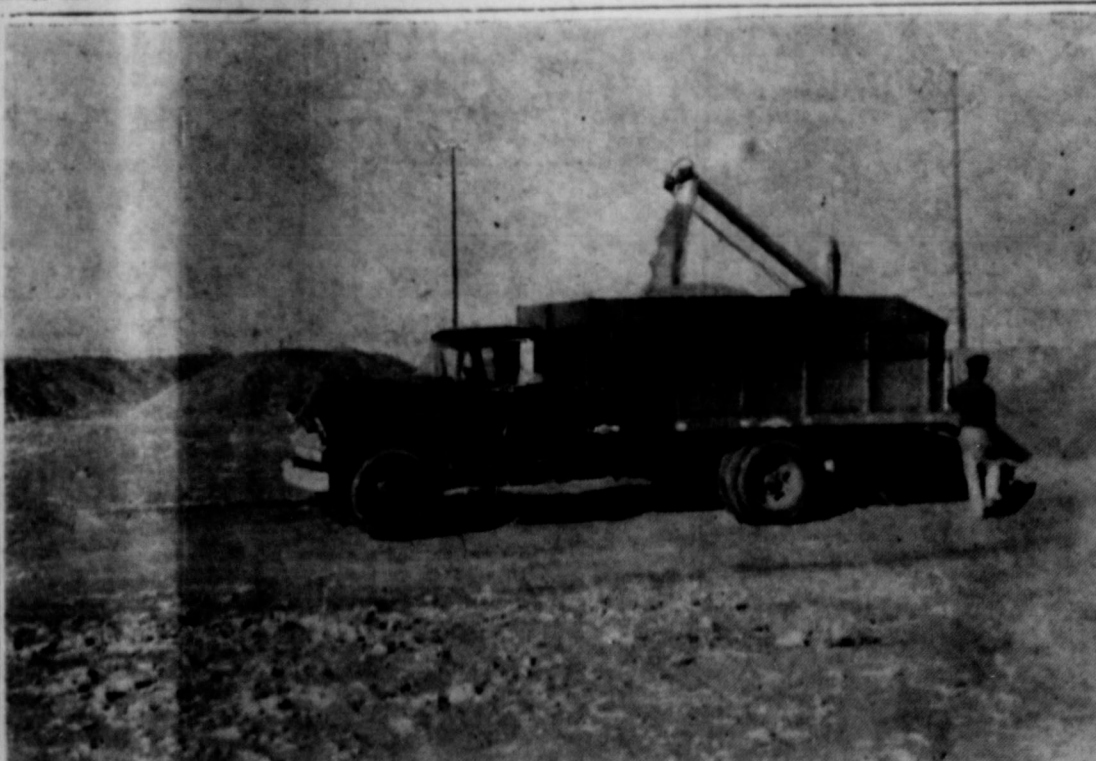
The Earth Elevator has now begun the task of picking up the 48 boxcar loads of grain, which had been piled on the ground east of the elevator, waiting for the moisture content to go down to Government specifications, before placing it in the elevator. Weather conditions permitting, it was hoped to have it all in the building by January 1.

High winds last week blew down a large amount of the grain which had not been combined in the Springlake area. Pickup attachments were being used on combines, in an effort to harvest as much of the fallen grain as possible. Grain harvest is 75 percent complete in the Springlake vicinity.

W. T. Clayton of Springlake has averaged 7715 pounds an acre on his grain yield this year. Average yields in 1956 on irrigated Hybrid grains were about 4000 pounds. Dryland 800 pounds compared to 1500 pounds in 1957.

### COTTON CLASSING DISCUSSED AT FB CONVENTION IN DALLAS

In our convention at Dallas there were many problems discussed that are so vital to each and every farmer in Lamb County that I would like to use this column to tell you some of the things going on in agriculture circles in Lamb County and Texas.

First, our cotton classing is important to each and every one of us farmers. By constant working together we can improve the methods used to class our cotton. In the Texas Farm Bureau convention the following resolution was passed and work has begun on it already:

"We recommend that a government loan price be set up for 'split grade,' light spots and 'plus grade' cotton that would more accurately reflect the true value of the cotton."

A light spot recognition by our government loan would increase the buying power of the farmers in this vicinity. With the cooperation of each farmer, the Texas Farm Bureau, South Plains Cotton Growers, Assn., and other farm organizations, we can accomplish this feat.

## Latin - American Man Killed In Truck-Trailer Mishap Northeast Of Earth

A thirty-seven year old Mexican National farm laborer from Acambaro, Mexico, Leonel Vasquez Chavez, was killed instantly in a truck-trailer mishap northeast of Earth, at 6:04 p.m. Wednesday, Nov. 27.

Chavez was working on the Ed Haley farm. He and eight others were riding in a truck driven by Haley, who was transporting the Latin workers from the cotton fields. Haley said he was blinded by the oncoming lights of a truck pulling a trailer loaded with cotton, driven by Oris Dixon, just before the crash, and his vehicle was

sideways by the truck and cotton trailer.

Investigators were told that Chavez was seated in the truck, wrapped in a cotton sack, and was struck on the head by a board from the trailer. The blow knocked him from the truck.

Neither of the drivers were injured. Two other men riding with Chavez were treated for minor injuries at a Littlefield Hospital and later released.

Hammon Funeral Home of Littlefield, was in charge of funeral arrangements for the victim of the accident.

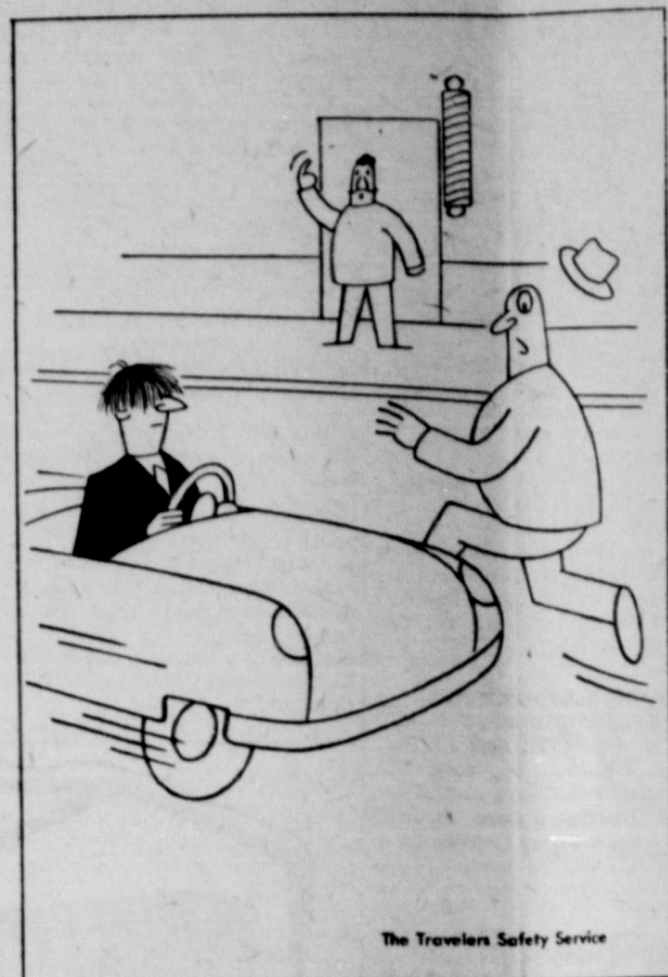

## Postmaster Urges Cooperation In Christmas Mailing

The local post office hopes to keep its good record on handling Christmas mails by getting everything processed and delivered well before Christmas Eve. Postmaster Marshall Kelley said this week.

He added that how well the mail moves will depend a great deal on the cooperation local people give in getting their packages and Christmas cards mailed during the next ten days.

"It's important in the small town as well as in the city to mail early during the Christmas season," the Postmaster said. "Most people appreciate the early arrival of a gift or card, and where there is a heavy concentration of mail early mailing could mean the difference in on-time and late delivery."

"And be sure to use the correct address," (box no. or street address). "Wrap and address packages carefully. Take a little extra time and place the address inside the package just in case it should come unwrapped."

The address on all mail destined for the larger cities should include zone numbers to insure faster delivery.

The postmaster also advocated the use of first class postage on Christmas cards. First class postage - a three cent stamp - allows a written message to be included inside. There are other advantages, too. The Post Office considers first class mail as preferential mail which is entitled to the fastest handling. Also, a Christmas card with first class postage may be forwarded or returned to the sender.

"Incidentally," the Postmaster concluded, "it is socially correct to place your return address on the envelope bearing a Christmas card."

## Important Questions To Be Decided By Cotton Referendum Vote Tuesday

The nation's cotton producers by their votes in the Dec. 10 cotton marketing quota referendum will determine whether quota penalties will apply and also the level of price supports for 1958 crop cotton. Therefore, reminds chairman R. G. Shrawner of the Texas Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, the referendum of vital concern to every cotton grower.

If at least two-thirds of the votes cast in the referendum favor marketing quotas, the program will be operative for next year's crop, explains Shrawner. Too, price support will be available to growers who comply with their farm allotments for the 1958 crop of 75 and 90 percent of parity, and quota penalties will apply on any excess cotton. If more than one-third of the level to eligible growers would drop to 50 per cent of parity.

The chairman points out that, even if quotas are disapproved, acreage allotments will remain in effect as a means of determining eligibility for price support.

All farmers who were engaged in the production of upland cotton in 1957 will be eligible to vote in the referendum and Shrawner urges them to do so. He also says if growers have questions they'd like answered, they should visit the ASC office in their county.

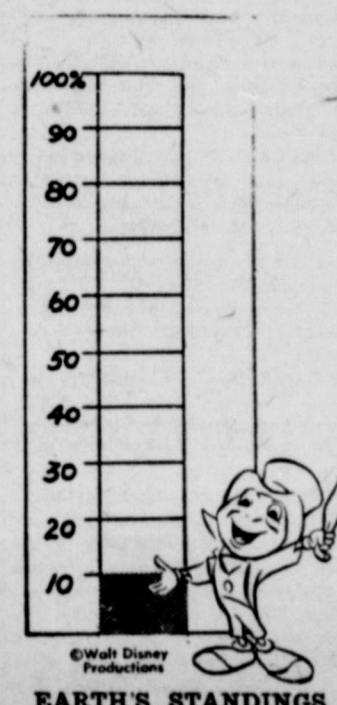
