



Mahon To Seek Funds for Study On Diverting Surplus River Water

Representative George Ma-hon stated this week that he would seek funds for a preliminary investigation by the U. S. Department of Interior of ways and means of divertng surplus water from the Missouri River Basin and Mississippi Riverto West Texas. The annual Public Works Appropriation Bill is now beng whipped into shape by the Appropriations Committee for presentation to the House in late August, Mahon will seek to have the funds for the preliminary study included in the bill, He believes the proposals are good for success. Mahon pointed out that the study would be preliminary in nature and that he would seek a detailed study if the preliminary findings were

favorable for the project. The proposed study would not be a substitute for the one roposed in the Lower Colorado River Basin bill which is pending before the House Committee on Interior and which calls for a study of the possibility of channeling water into West Texas from the Columbia River Basin and the Missouri and Mississippi Rivers, This measure contains many far-reaching provisions



and the part relating to West Texas is only a minor portion of the bill.

Mahon pointed out that there was no certainty that the Lower Colorado River measure would become the law this year but that a Public Works Appropriation Bill was assured at this session, and that he felt inclusion of a preliminary study in the Public Works bill would be desirable. He said he would advocate an appropriation of \$200,000 for the

preliminary investigation, Fifteen years ago Mahon had introduced a bill providing eight million dollars for an extensive survey of ways and means of bringing surplus water to West Texas from the Missouri River Basin, The proposal was rejected at that time. He pointed out, however, that the present attitude is much more favorable toward big and dramatic efforts to meet water needs in West Texas and elsewhere.

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
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

SENATE JOINT RESOLU-TION NO. 26 proposing an Amendment to Sections 4 and 5 of Article V of the Consti-tution of the State of Texas provide for a Court of ment takes effect shall be-iminal Appeals of five come Judges of the Court of Criminal Appeals of five members; prescribing their qualifications; elections, ap-pointments, tenure of office and compensation; and pre-scribing the term of court of said court. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Criminal Appeals and shall hold their offices, one for a term of two years and the other for a term of four years, beginning the first day of January following the adoption of this Amendment elected and qualified. Said

LEGISLATURE OF STATE OF TEXAS:

That Section 4 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be

amended so as to hereafter read as follows: "Section 4. The Court of Criminal Appeals shall con-sist of five Judges, one of whom shall be Presiding Judge, a majority of whom shall constitute a quorum, and the concurrence of three Judges shall be necessary to a decision of said court. Said

decision of said court. Said Judges shall have the same Judges shall have the same qualifications and receive the same salaries as the Associate Justices of the Supreme Court. They shall be elected by the qualified voters of the state at a general election and shall hold their offices for a Judge of the Court of Crimi-nal Appeals, the Governor shall, with the advice and con-shall, with the senate, fill said

Judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals, the Governor shall, with the advice and con-sent of the Senate, fill said vacancy by appointment until the next succeeding general election. "The Judges of the Court of Criminal Appeals who may be in office at the time when this Amendment takes effect shall become Judges of the Court of Criminal Appeals and continue in office until the expiration of the term of office for which each has

the State Capitol. The Court of Criminal Appeals shall ap-point a clerk of the court who shall give bond in such man-ner as is now or may here-after be required by law, and who shall hold his office for "The Clerk of the Court of Criminal Appeals who may be in office at the time when this Amendment takes effect shall continue in office for the term of his appointment."

Sec. 3. Said proposed Con-stitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state elected and qualified. Said Judges shall by agreement or at an election to be held throughout the state on the otherwise designate the in-cumbent for each of the terms mentioned. first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A.D. 1966, at which election each voter opposing said proposed Amendment shall scratch off
