City Receives \$3303.84 Sales Tax Revenue

The City of Earth received its first city sales and use tax check recently from Austin in the amount of \$3,303.84. This is on June 30 of this year.

The gross amount collected was \$3,539.76. The state keeps 2% of the gross as a service fee for collecting, this amounted to a total of \$70.80. The state also is required to retain 4.0% of the gross until the next quarter. The amount retained was \$165.12. This amount will be returned to the city when the next quarterly

check is received.

At a regular city council meeting Monday night, several residents bordering Elm Street met with members of the council to discuss the need to repair the block on Elm Street.

The council agreed to patch and repair the street enough to make it through the winter months, then see if something could be done on a more permanent basis in the spring. Mayor Kelley agreed to contact Jake Diehl Pavers concerning the work.

First Bale Of Cotton In Area Ginned Saturday

The first bale of cotton in the Earth Area was brought in Saturday, October 4, by Marcello Sanchez, of the Dodd Community to Campbell Cotton Gin Company at Dodd, proof that the local cotton harvest is underway.

The 2100 pound load of seed cotton produced a 592 pound bale and 1030 pounds of seed with a 28% turnout.

B. Campbell owner of Campbell Cotton Gin Co., has ginned the first bale in the community ten out of eleven consecutive years and provided ginning services free.

The cotton was produced from seed developed by E. R. Little called "Little Special." Little resides southeast of Flagg. The cotton was grown on the Orbie Armstrong place in the Dodd Community. Sanchez said it was gathered from a one-acre plot in his field.

The cotton was planted May 19, and was fertilized with Oil-in 13-39-0 Fertilizer purchased from Fred Kuntz, owner-manager of Flagg Fertilizer.

With the first bale in the area already ginned, it is certain that harvest will be in full swing in the very near future, depending of course on favorable weather.

Community Receives First Frost

Hazy skies and chilly temperatures were signs that the Springlake-Earth Community had received its first light frost of the season Tuesday morning.

Fred Clayton, who farms four miles north and two miles west of Earth, reported that he noted effects of frost in low-lying sections only and that it will not aid his cotton crops for harvest.

There were no reports of damage to fruit, vegetables, and shrubbery in the area.

Other area farmers are hoping that heavy frosts and the first freeze will hold off until the sun and drying winds can aid late maturing crops and speed up grain harvest activities.

Financial Assistance Available For Students To Attend College

Milton "Buff" Morris, Executive Vice-President of the Opportunity Plan, Inc. and Director of Student Financial Aids at West Texas State University, spent Thursday in Springlake-Earth High School advising juniors and senior students of the educational opportunities beyond high school.

The day's program began with a "wake-up" assembly at 8:30, introduced by high school principal, J. W. Sollis. Mr. Morris urged students to make use of the advice available from adults in the community and to plan now for post-secondary education. He stressed that numerous forms of financial assistance are available to students if they start application procedures early.

Mr. Morris stated, if you are of good character, if you cooperate, it doesn't make any difference what school you wish to attend, I'll see to it that you have a way to go. Emphasizing the importance of early plans he said, "If we're going to win this horse-race, I'll need some time."

All students were invited to come in and bring their parents, if they wished, to discuss their special educational problems. Every student has different financial needs and educational needs. Mr. Morris stressed that not all students are better suited and happier to be in vocational or trade schools than in colleges. But every student, regardless of race, color, creed, academic standing, or financial situation, deserves to prepare himself for an occupation.

In the afternoon, the student council met with Mr. Morris. They were encouraged to be the group to originate a Springlake-Earth community division of the Opportunity Plan, Inc. The Plan is a non-profit organization supported by contributions, which are tax-deductible, for the purpose of giving financial assistance to deserving students.

Accompanying Mr. Morris were Mrs. Dan Sanders, one of the directors of the Opportunity Plan Supervised Study Program, and Mrs. Jon Ann Dwyer, as assistant with the Plan.

High school counselor, Alvin Mitchell, and Bill Anderson of the high school assisted in the program and in furnishing information on the students.

As early as 2000 B. C. Babylonians placed their treasures with trusted men. They paid one-sixtieth of the treasure for this safe-keeping service.

Egyptians had "treasure houses" equipped with containers for storing valuables.

The first real safe deposit vaults were in ancient Greece. They were kept in the Temples. The priests of the Temples stored money, precious stones and other valuables.

At first there were no standard charges for safeguarding the treasure. Records show, however, that the priests were amply rewarded.

Later the temples safeguarded valuables as a matter of business. Regular and substantial charges were made. Records indicate that priests lent their own funds at interest. This proved highly profitable.

As time went on, the handling of treasure by Temples expanded greatly.

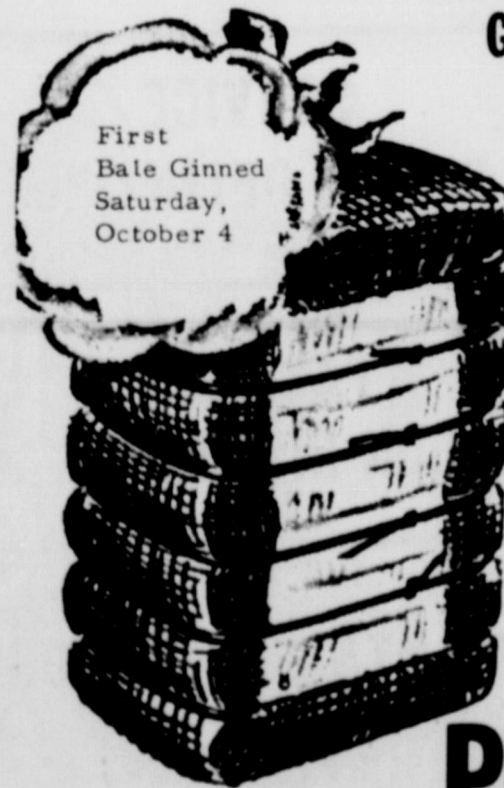

Changes Made In Voter Registration For 1970 Elections

The period for registering to vote in the 1970 elections begins on October 1, 1969, and ends on January 31, 1970.

The 1970 voting year begins on March 1, 1970 and ends on February 28, 1971. This is the period for which the registration is effective.

The general rule is that no one can vote without having registered. A former exemption from registration for persons over 60 years old who did not live in a city of 10,000 or more inhabitants is no longer in effect. The only major exception to the general requirement for registration is for persons who are absent from their county of residence in active military service.

The required qualifications for voting are as follows:

1. Citizen of the United States,
2. Over 21 years old on the day of the election,
3. Resident of the State for at least one year immediately preceding election day,
4. Resident of the county for at least six months immediately preceding election day required for voting in local election but not required for voting on state-wide offices and issues. (Residence in the city for six months is required for voting in city elections.)

Persons convicted of a felony who have not had their right of suffrage restored and persons who are under an adjudgment of mental incompetency cannot vote. Any person who already fulfills the requirements stated above, or who will fulfill them before the end of the 1970 voting year on February 28, 1971, may register during the regular period. Persons registering before they meet the age or residence requirements cannot vote until the requirements are met. Their registration certificates will show the date on which they will become eligible to vote.

WHO MUST REGISTER DURING THE REGULAR PERIOD.

All persons already meeting the requirements for voting listed above must register by January 31, 1970. They cannot register after that date.

Persons who will become 21 years old by January 31 must register by that date and cannot register later. (Persons becoming 21 after January 31 may re-

gister during the regular period, and may also register at any time afterward but must have been registered for 30 days before they can vote on the registration.)

Persons who were residents of Texas on October 1, 1969, must register by January 31, 1970, regardless of whether they will have met the one-year residence requirement by that date and regardless of whether they will have lived in the county of present residence for six months. (Persons moving into Texas after October 1, 1969, may register during the regular period, and may also register at any time afterward but must have been registered for 30 days before they can vote on the registration.)

WHERE TO REGISTER.

A person must register as a voter of the county and precinct where he has his permanent residence (domicile). He makes his application for registration to the county tax assessor-collector of that county. The application may be made either by mail, on a voter registration application form which can be obtained from the assessor-collector's office, or by personal appearance in the assessor-collector's office or before a deputy who has been authorized to serve at some other location.

There is no charge for registration.

APPLICATION THROUGH AN AGENT.

The husband, wife, father, mother, son, or daughter of a voter may act as the voter's agent in applying for registration if the relative is a qualified voter in the same county. Except for these listed relatives, which do not include persons related by marriage (in-laws,) no one may act as agent for the voter in applying for a registration.

Terry Bridge led the scoring with 24 points. Hoyt Glasscock was next with 11 points. He had one touchdown and kicked 5 points after touchdown.

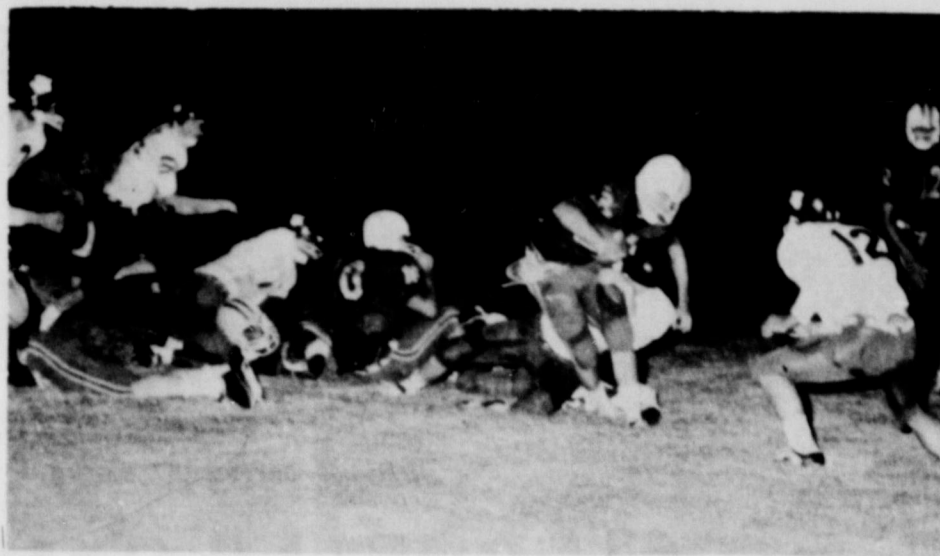
Willie Wilborn and Mike Cleavinger were each responsible for one touchdown each.

FB Ask For Changes In "Tax Reform" Proposals

WACO--Senators Ralph Yarborough and John Tower have been asked by Texas Farm Bureau President Sidney Dean to help change certain "Tax reform" proposals that would hurt agriculture.

In a letter to the two Texas Senators, Dean said the House-passed Tax Reform Bill, H. R. 13270, contains several provisions which, if enacted, would "work to the detriment of thousands of full-time farmers."

Dean said provisions of the proposed law which "we are vitally concerned about" include:

- (1) Deletion of the current 7 percent investment credit for farm machinery and equipment.
- (2) Extension of the holding period required for livestock to be eligible for capital gains treatment.
- (3) Repeal of the livestock exemption from the depreciation recapture provisions of current law.
- (4) Amendment of the present "hobby farming" or "tax-loss farming" provisions to prohibit the cash-accounting method of

income tax reporting in favor of the accrual method.

Dean elaborated on the provisions as follows: "Simple economics dictates the necessity for continuing the 7 percent investment credit as an inducement for farmers and ranchers to buy and use the most efficient machinery and equipment available to assure continued adequate supplies of food and fiber for the consumers of this nation. Considering the ever-tightening cost-price squeeze on farmers and ranchers, the 7 percent investment credit is just what it is—a good investment in the future."

"While the proposed extension of the holding period for capital gains will work some hardship on producers of cattle and

horses, it would work an extreme hardship on farmers and ranchers engaged in the breeding and production of livestock with a shorter life span such as hogs, sheep, goats, and fur-bearing animals. The bill as drafted by the House does not specifically state whether the one-year holding period would begin at the beginning or end of normal gestation, and this omission could lead to major confusion.

"The proposed extension of the depreciation recapture provision of the current law to livestock fails to recognize that livestock is different from other personal property in that maintenance of livestock is a fairly high-risk business for which adequate insurance is not available. Adoption of this provision would unnecessarily increase production costs without contributing very much to the economy or to the goal of tax reform."

"We believe that nothing is to be gained by forcing farmers and ranchers to switch from cash accounting to the accrual method of income tax reporting, while the accrual system would be burdensome and costly."



Double Barreled Hunting Safety Urged By TSA

AUSTIN, Oct. 3--With duck, deer and many game bird seasons near at hand, Texas sportsmen are urged to take a "double-barreled" approach to hunting safety by the Texas Safety Association.

"Duck hunters in particular should be aware of the necessity for safe boating habits as well as proper gun handling," said George W. Perry, Dallas, president of the state-wide safety association.

Heavy hunting and hip boots can prove to be an anchor, making boating mishaps doubly dangerous. Some insulated hunting jackets quickly become saturated with water, hampering even the strongest swimmer. Hunters using small, unstable duck boats are urged to wear a life preserver.

Hunters were also advised to know the capacity and performance characteristics of their boat. "If waves are too high, stay ashore. Remember that

besides passengers, you are carrying a heavier load in guns, ammunition and clothing," Perry said. "It would be better to leave a friend behind on the shore than leave him behind in the lake."

Boating safety rules should be combined with proper gun handling--the second "barrel" of hunting safety--to increase the sportsman's chances of not only bagging his limit this season, but bringing himself back alive.

Hunters, expect duck hunters in blinds, should wear bright red or reflective orange caps and jackets to make identification easier for both hunters. Each year hunters are killed when mistaken for a deer, quail or even a rabbit, Perry said.

All hunters are reminded to be sure of their line of fire. This is particularly true when hunting in underbrush, as bullets fired from high-powered rifles can travel great distances.

Shooting at sounds in deep underbrush is the sure sign of a "green-horn." A hunter should fire only when positively sure his target is legal game.

When the hunt is over, hunters should make sure their guns are unloaded. Loaded guns should never be carried in a moving vehicle, as rough riding, a playful dog or an accident can cause a gun to discharge.

All hunters--on land or the water--are advised to avoid drinking alcoholic beverages before and during the hunt, as well as afterwards on the road home.

Alcohol and gunpowder--just as alcohol and gasoline--do not mix, safely, the safety official concluded.
