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# SPRINGLAKE-EARTH WOLVERETTES TAKE REGIONAL

## Wolverettes Establish All-Time Record

A first rate band director is one thing, but when you come up with a first rate basketball coach in the same person, that is something else. The Springlake-Earth School Board and parents that make up the school district have a right to be mighty proud of Dean Foshee and his outstanding record while teaching at our local school the past three years.

Dean has been with the school system five years and has coached the varsity girls the last 3 years, compiling a record of 72 won, 21 lost. Most of lost record was recorded during his first year at the head post, but with determination developed the Springlake-Earth squad into the present State contender. Last year the team advanced to the Bi-District playoff, getting beat by Roosevelt by a close 7 point margin.

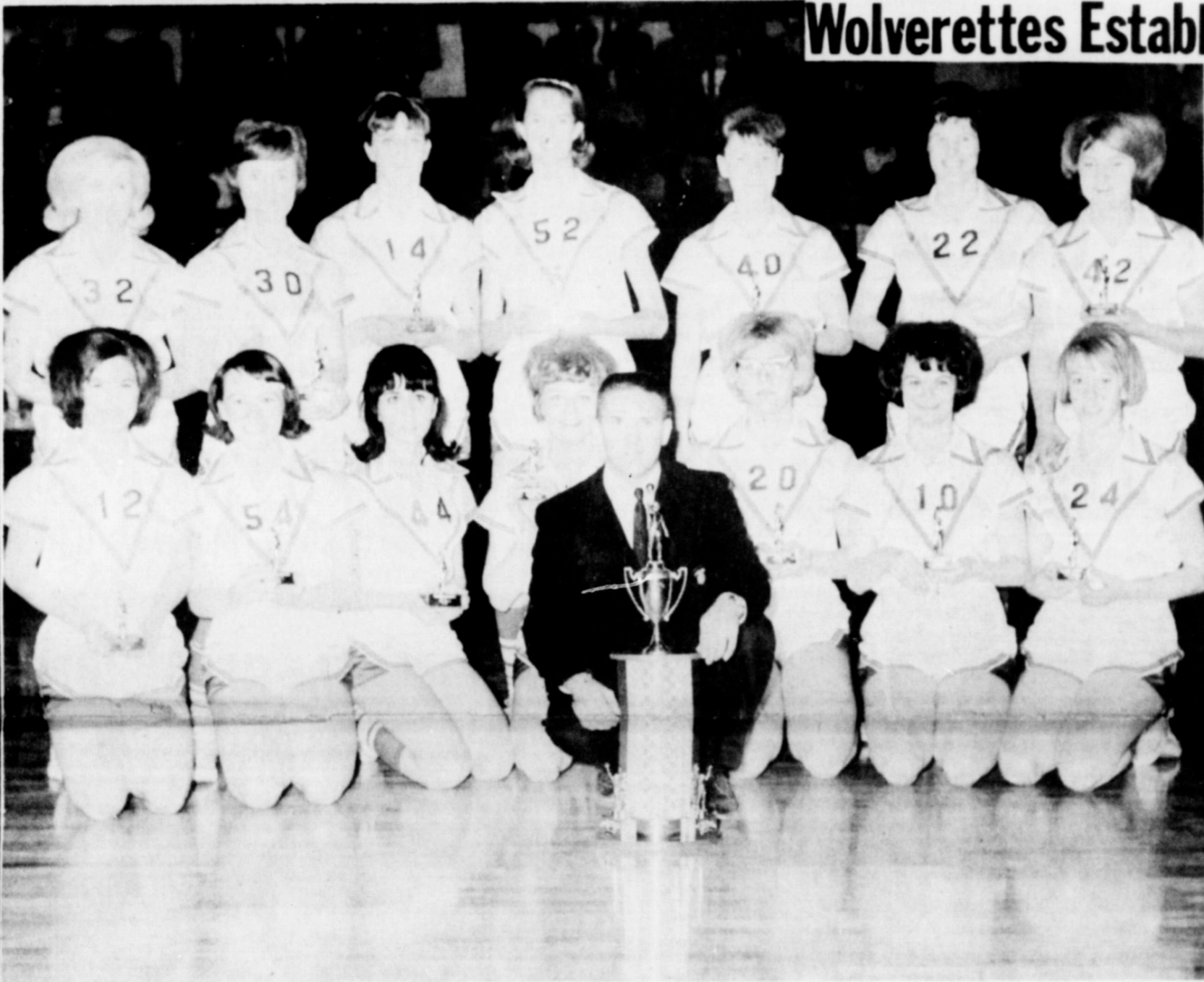
The first game of the state playoff will be with Midway of Waco at 11:35 a.m. Friday morning, and it is reported they have three terrific forwards that can really run up a high score if the guards are not on their toes. Foshee stated that it is a toss-up as to who will win the State championship, but he would pick Jourdan to be in the final game with the Wolverettes or Midway. We will have to play at our best to be victorious and the new State Champs.

It took some time Saturday morning in the Lubbock Coliseum for the Wolverettes to shake the jitters, but once they did, the Wolverettes settled down and played a terrific hard fought game against a determined Stratford team.

After trailing early in the first quarter of four to six points, Springlake-Earth rallied to hold a 15 to 13 lead at the end of the quarter and went on the conquer the Stratford Elkettes 56 to 49.

The Springlake-Earth girls led at the end of each period, holding at 28 to 24 lead a half time. During third quarter play, the Wolverettes stretched their lead to as much as 8 points. However, the Elkettes overcame this lead and went ahead themselves by one point, then, Britton and O'Hair sank critical baskets to build a three point lead, which held at the end of the third quarter 41 to 28.

Irene Stephenson, who came in the game for Stratford in the closing minutes of the second half started hitting a driving layup shot and kept the Elkettes close until the final minute of the game. However, Britton and O'Hair once again came to the rescue with a quick basket apiece when the final buzzer sounded, the score stood at Springlake-Earth 56 and Stratford 49.

Britton led all scorers with 27 points and O'Hair was close behind with 21. Linda Gregory added 1 point, Marsha Dawson, a 5 ft, 10 in. freshman, scored 2 points and Alicia Washington bucketed 5 points. Stratford's scoring was well balanced as Pam Bennet and Irene Stephenson scored 17 points a piece with 15 of Stephenson's coming in the last half. Myrna Hester totalled 15 points for the morning's work.

Saturday night in the final

game against Wylie of Abilene, the Wolverettes found themselves playing an entirely different style of basketball than they were familiar with. The Wylie girls played a much slower type game, with the Wolverettes playing a much faster, and driving type basketball. Sharpshooter Susan Britton led the Wolverettes to their 37 victory against two defeats with 21 points.

Another usual high scorer, Anita O'Hair, was plagued by excessive fouls and a cold firing

streak and managed only nine points.

Promising 5-10 freshman Marsha Dawson, turned in 13 points to serve as an able substitute for the foul laden O'Hair. Anita Carter and Marcia Glenn led Wylie's attack with 14 and 12 points respectively.

Springlake jumped to an early lead and padded it to a 40-24 count with 2:46 left in the third quarter.

O'Hair drew three fouls early in the first period and sat out much of the first half with Dawson

coming in to handle post work excellently. Susan Britton also off the shooting mark for much of the game, finally found the range during second quarter activities and pace the victory dash.

Dawson's superior height, coupled with timely shooting and a fiery defensive effort from Helen Phillips and Judy Gover, kept Wylie down while Britton found the range.

With their victory over Wylie,

the local girls settled down this week and worked on plays to sharpen their timing and preparing for their first big game in Austin.

Streaks of Green and Gold took to the local hardwoods on November 2, 1965, and gave the local fans ample indications of things to come. Defeating a tough Tulla Sextet, the Springlake-Earth Wolverettes have continued their winning ways, winning 37 ball games while dropping only two. The two losses came at the hands of two of the toughest Class AA teams in the state and no heads should be bowed.

There is no question the local femmes have battled and fought their way into the hearts of the local fans. Crowds, indeed, multitudes, turned out for the by-district clash at Plainview when the Wolverettes turned back Roosevelt, last year's nemesis for the locals, and defending Class A State Champions. From there to Lubbock where the Wolverettes defeated Stratford, and, in the finals, took a breather as they downed Wylie to earn the coveted trip to Austin and a crack at the State Championship in Class A Girl's Basketball.

To recap the season at this point would be to jump the gun. Recaps are made when the season ends, and we know the season is by far from finished. It is now on to State for The State Crown. If the past is truly indicative of the future, we know our girls will bring home to us, for the first time in the history of the school, a really genuine State Championship.

One simply cannot give plaudits enough. Where does one start when they mention the Springlake-Earth Wolverettes? Is the starting point with Susan Britton, fiery Sophomore forward who has scored a total of 912 points for an average of 23.5 points per game? Is it Anita O'Hair, the Junior with the finesse, who has scored 791 points this season? Is it Washington, Gregory, Dawson? All of whom have given their capable share to bringing home the victories?

Do we go to the back court and look at the defense, and after careful scrutiny start with Diana Gregory, the intelligent, ball-hawking Senior, or turn to the aggressive, hard-playing Helen Phillips, who will soon be playing her last game for dear Alma Mater? Or is it to Judy Gover, who has given so unselfishly of her time, that we look to find this starting point?

The reserves? Any coach in the United States will tell you without reserves, there is no team. Reserves like Fanny Been, Dwala Boone, Carolyn Hucks and Linda Jordan, and returning to the front court, reserves like Beverly Prather and Dalpha Banks. So, the question is still, at this time, seemingly insurmountable.

Do we look to Coach Dean Foshee, who has proven his merits time and again? Two district championships, a bi-district championship and a regional championship, all firsts in the history of the school. Do we go to his hand, remember the sweepstakes, also firsts, to see what makes this man so capable of producing?

What about the fans; the real supporters of the Wolverettes? Have they been so loyal as to inspire these victories; has their shouting and yelling and pats on the backs brought these victories? Just what is it?

One cannot simply put his finger on the ONE thing, but one thing we can say it is not one girl, it is not one person, it is not one fan and it simply is not one thing. It is a very important and vital and wonderful thing in our society called TEAMWORK and all one has to do is look at the Springlake-Earth Wolverettes and their Coach to see what we mean.

And, because of this and the fact that lady luck has smiled on this fine school and community, local fans can now look forward to the trip to Austin.

Leaving for Austin Wednesday morning at 8:00 a.m., the Wolverettes will spend the night in Brownwood, and work out in the Howard Payne Gymnasium the following morning. Continuing their trip, they will arrive in Austin Thursday evening, rest for the night, and play their first game Friday morning at 11:30 against a tough Midway of Waco Team.

Let's continue the support and follow the Wolverettes to Austin and help them win the first State Championship in the history of the School.

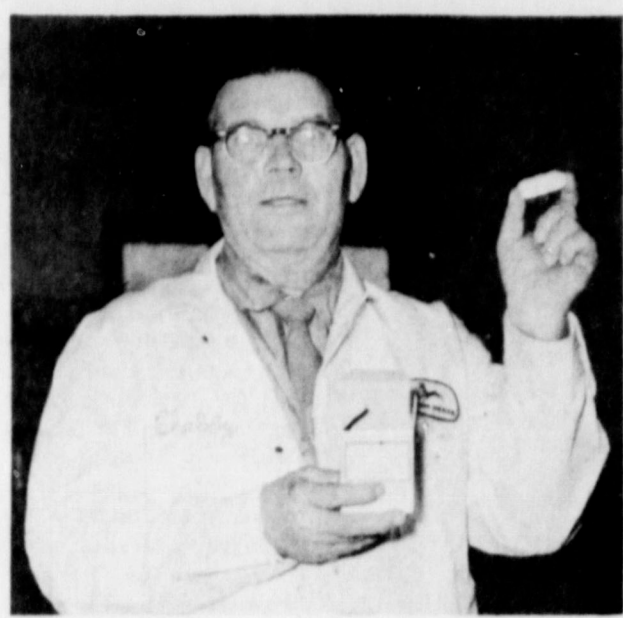

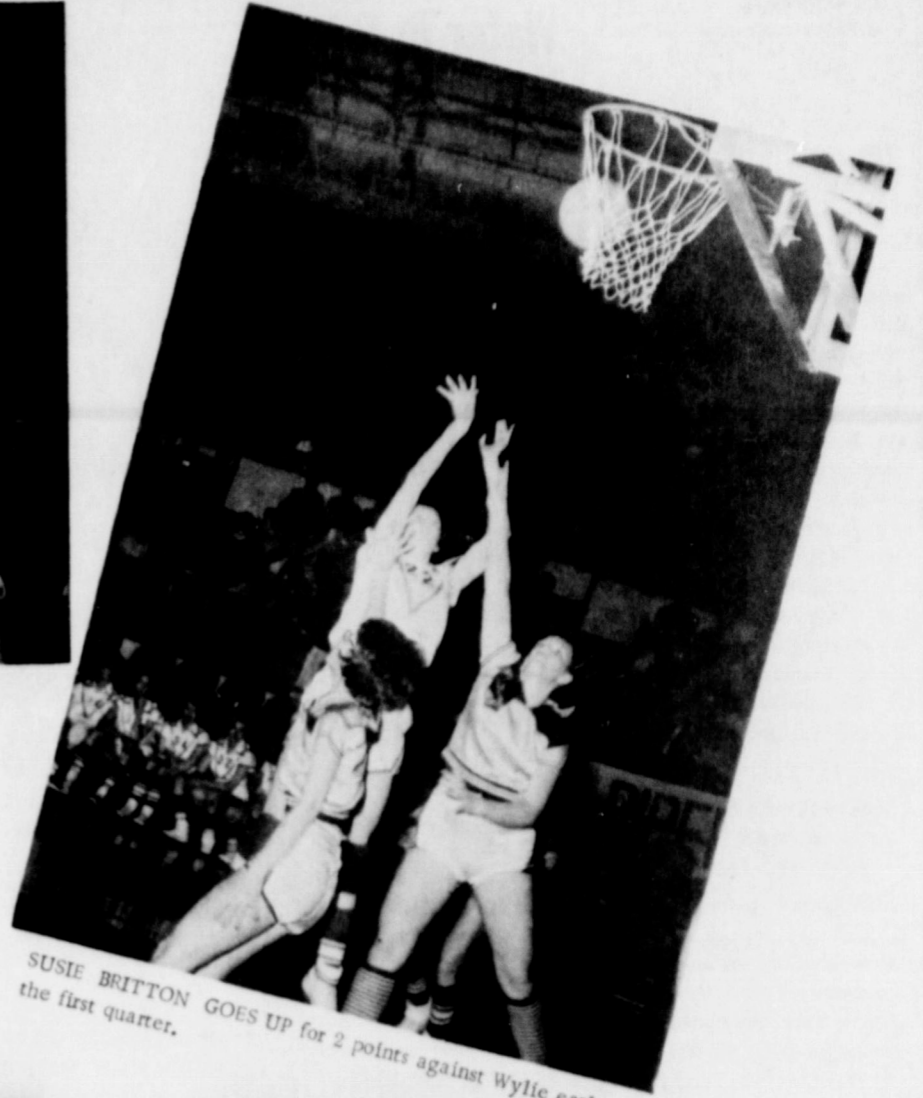

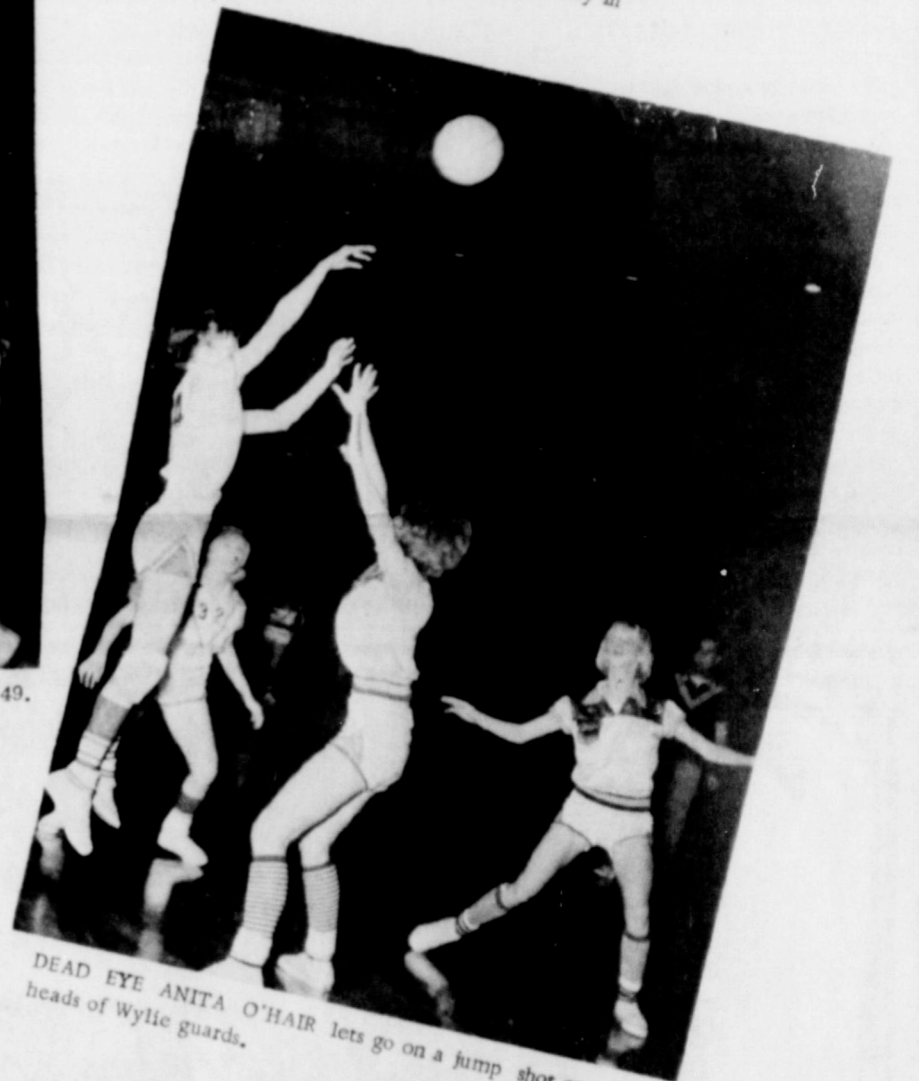

AN ORDINANCE REQUIRING HEALTH CERTIFICATES FOR ALL PERSONS WORKING IN ESTABLISHMENTS WHERE FOOD IS SERVED TO THE PUBLIC AND PROVIDING A PENALTY AND SUSPENDING THE RULE REQUIRING THE READING OF AN ORDINANCE ON THREE SEPARATE DAYS

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF EARTH:

SECTION 1: That for the purpose of promoting the health, safety and general welfare of the community, that all persons working in establishments in the City Limits of said City where food is served to the public display in such establishment a health certificate, not more than six months old, from a licensed doctor, certifying that such person is in good health and has no communicable disease.

SECTION 2: Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of this Ordinance, or shall fail to comply therewith or with any of the requirements thereof, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be liable to a fine, and upon conviction of any such violation shall be fined in any sum of not more than \$200.00; and each day any such violation shall be permitted to exist shall constitute a separate and distinct offense.

SECTION 3: The Ordinance rule requiring the reading of an ordinance on three separate days be and the same is hereby suspended and this Ordinance shall become effective as provided by the Charter of the City of Earth.

PASSED on this 7 day of March, 1966, A. D., by an affirmative vote of 4 voting "For" and 0 voting "Against."

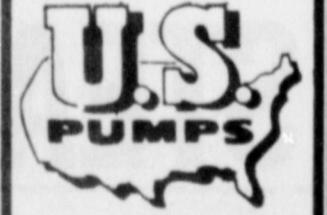

## This Is The Year Of Decision For Bookmobile

"This is the year of decision for the High Plains Bookmobile Service," reports Mrs. Rosalynne T. Shamblin, Texas State Library Field Consultant for West Texas on a recent visit to the bookmobile headquarters provided by the Muleshoe Area Public Library.

The Service to Bailey, Cochran, Lamb and Parmer counties began in April 1964 by agreement between the County Commissioners of the four counties and the Texas State Library.

The free, trial period provided by the State will continue until December 31, 1966. After that date, it can be continued through County appropriations from the general fund. Texas County Library Law provides that a county may appropriate up to a maximum of twelve cents per one hundred dollars evaluation for county library service.

"The big red and white bookmobile serves 42 communities in the four counties. Books are on board for all types of interests—farmers, ranchers, mothers, children and senior citizens," according to Mrs. Georgia Pena,

bookmobile librarian.

Two thousand books are carried on this "library on wheels." Books are changed each trip from the 10,000 volume headquarters supply. Established libraries in Friona, Littlefield, Morton and Olton may check out collections for use in their libraries. Teachers have the privilege of taking book deposits for an extended loan period.

Costs of continuing the book service are based on an overall \$14,000 budget for the four counties. Individual county appropriations for the mobile library would be based on proportionate 1965 population figures of each county to the total four county population.

Texas County Library Law provides for contracts by counties to provide library service.

The most recent example of such contracting is the case of Camp, Franklin, Morris and Titus Counties. These have contracted with the Mount Pleasant Public Library in Titus County for bookmobile service. And in West Texas, Taylor and Shackelford counties have received contract bookmobile service. And in West Texas, service from the Abilene Public Library for the past three years," Mrs. Shamblin reports.

Both started as State Library bookmobile projects. The State Library representative notes that County budgets are prepared in mid-year for the following calendar year and Commissioners will need to hear from citizens in regard to continuing the service through County appropriation.

## Smetana Presents Safety Program To Students


Joe Smetana, Safety Director of the Texas Farm Bureau, spoke to Springlake-Earth High School students Tuesday in an assembly program. His main topic was concerning fire and its importance in our everyday lives if used properly, and it's ways of destruction if used improperly.

A variety of demonstration

equipment was placed on tables 16 feet in length to illustrate seven basic points: (1) what fire is; (2) how to control fires; (3) the fact that nothing is fire-proof; (4) kitchen fires and their control; (5) fuel vapors; (6) the power of petroleum products; and (7) household wiring and overloaded electrical circuits. Smetana pointed out that fire


is like a three-legged stool, it can't work with one of the legs missing. The "legs" fire depends on are: (1) fuel, (2) heat, and (3) air. Yet in American homes, those three things come together in deadly and destructive combination every 57 seconds, an average of 1,500 home fires every day, according to Smetana.
