


Farmers In Need Of Action, Not Sympathy

Prevention Best Control For Plant Disease

The best disease prevention pears and should continue at measure that can be taken in seven to 14-day intervals as ornamental plants is to buy long as weather conditions are healthy or disease resistant plants, Dr. C. Wendell Horne, Extension plant pathologist at Texas A&M University, advises. favorable for the disease, says Horne.

PARTY LINE Once an ornamental plant be-comes badly diseased, it is almost impossible to nurse it back to health. 
