The State Department of Education this year has raised the amount of money that Springlake School District must contribute to the State Minimum Foundation Program in order to meet the increase in this year's budget which is \$284,260.00, compared to last's \$252,216.00 incurring a total increase of \$32,044.00.

Of this \$32,044 budget increase, Springlake is assigned approximately \$4000 to raise locally over last year's figures.

The budget is met from three sources: The state furnishes \$173,990.00 which is 61 per cent of the total budget, non-resident property owners pay 36,000.00 or 13 percent, leaving local property owners only \$74,270.00 or 26 per cent of the cost, which seems like a pretty good bargain in any language. (Wish we could get 74 percent paid on our grocery bill). Guess we'd eat "high on the hog". We probably wouldn't be as conservative as the school board, but according to school officials the board has cut down on most all items in last year's budget.

The major part of the budget increase is due chiefly to the raise granted to all school teachers. Faculty members at Springlake Schools received raises ranging from \$399 to \$750. An overall average increase for local teachers was estimated at \$500. Another cause for the hike in the budget is the addition of a teacher to the staff. This addition to the faculty is deemed a necessity, as the enrollment is climbing annually. Last year the enrollment was greater than ever before, and 20 seniors were graduated. This year there is expected to be 90 enrolled in the first grade, which will give a 60 pupil increase over last year's enrollment.

The state based our local assignment on the counties income, and on the raise increase of our teachers. To meet costs it was necessary to make a change in our local tax structure. This change will make a very small increase in our school taxes, but it is necessary to continue to improve our educational system.

(Let's all take a deep breath, and let it out real slowly) this gives us time to think before we speak, and think is what we need to do. We can't expect to educate our children at the same cost today as in bygone years. We will readily agree it takes a might more today to train a Jet pilot, then it did to instruct a stage coach driver of yesterday.

We will also agree that in our modern day life, education is the best insurance policy we can give our children.

Money left our children can be spent in a fortnight, leaving them empty handed and afraid of life. This then cannot be considered providing for our children well, but a good education and a healthy mind is something that cannot be taken away from them. (This then seems worth a dollar or two more more per tax payer if we can give our children a little more of his so-called "learnin").

Freedom of our nation is dependent on the education of the masses of our people. People without children may not see why they should be asked to pay more taxes to help educate our youth, but their future freedom, like that of everyone depends on our youth. Today's many luxuries that we are surrounded with, were invented by educated minds. Therefore no estimate can ever be placed on education.

Just a little further thought and analysis on this matter shows us that the school board is raising taxes, also raised their own. (They I'm sure didn't want it that way), but the facts and the figures made it necessary to find a way to raise the \$4000 increase assigned this district, or go backward in our educational endeavors.

Domingo Castillo Confesses McNeill Station Break - in

Domingo Castillo, age 19, of Earth was arrested by the sheriff in Clovis, New Mexico, Monday, according to L. H. "Shorty" Randolph, local Justice of Peace.

Randolph stated Castillo was apprehended in an attempt break-in in Clovis. Later Castillo confessed to the break-in and robbery of the McNeill Service Station, which occurred here Saturday night, August 3. He is being held in the Clovis jail.

Castillo confessed to the break-in at McNeill's Service Station, but does not remember entering the Wayne Rutherford Station, which was burglarized the same night. However an old cut on his hand led officers to suspect him of this offense also. Police are attempting to obtain a confession, but if none is forthcoming, a blood sample taken at the scene of the break-in, will be sent to the laboratory, to determine if it types with that of Castillo's. He will also be asked to undergo a lie detector test.

Until Castillo's confession, the only evidence local authorities had was one footprint. Fingerprints were to be smeared with blood to be obtained for use as evidence. He had been a resident of Earth for approximately one year.

Three local men voluntarily plead guilty to fighting before Justice of the Peace L. H. "Shorty" Randolph early this week and paid fines totaling \$66.00.

Involved in the first fistic were Mayor Roy Neal and Water Superintendent W. F. "Dunk" Williamson about 6:00 p.m. Monday near the old Farm Chemical building which is located on Main Street. Neither of the men were injured during the brief encounter.

Trouble between the two arose from a disagreement over a petition which Williamson accused Neal of passing, calling for the replacement of the water official.

Although Neal denied any knowledge of the petition, several businessmen told a News-Sun reporter Tuesday that the Mayor had asked them to sign the controversial paper.

The second fight occurred Tuesday morning about 9:30 a.m. on First Street near Paul's Super Market as Williamson, who was driving down First, slowed down to turn onto Main Street, when Leonard Stephens, Neal's stepson drove up beside him, got out of his car, removed his glasses and watch and as Williamson got out of the car, the fight started. Although several blows were struck neither party was injured.

The controversy climaxed Tuesday afternoon, when a meeting of local businessmen and City officials met in a called meeting to discuss various problems.

No action was taken during the hour long meeting. After the session was opened by Mayor Neal, who explained the meeting was called by businessmen to give them an opportunity to voice an opposition.

John Adrian, local grocer said, "He didn't think it was becoming to allow a younger man to strike an elderly man." He further stated "city official had been hired to serve and please the people, but apparently they were choosing to please themselves." He went on to say he "didn't know why Williamson hit Neal, but his big problem was a \$50.00 water bill, which he had received he thought partly due to the fact that he had previously had words with the Water Superintendent. He said he didn't think \$50.00 worth of water would run down his drain in a month's time.

Alderman Pete Parish said "I will be glad to go measure the drain and will figure out with you how much water the drain is capable of carrying off."

Ted Borum, spoke as he rose up "I respect John Adrian and his wishes, but I am here to get facts, and to defend the City Council, who was elected by the majority of the people to serve our city."

A. D. Taylor and Herb Wendborn said "We are also here for that purpose." Lynn Glasscock told the group, "My purpose here is to back the City Council, that I like the others present am instrumental in electing, and until such time when new officials are elected, I think we should trust their judgement." John Adrian, arose saying, "If I am standing alone in this, I guess I'll leave," and left the meeting.

Mr. McNeill asked for back figures on the revenue derived from water. Figures were given for the 1956 year, ending March 31, 1956 and the 1957 year, ending March 31, 1957. The latter year showed a \$4000 increase over the year ending in 1956. Aileen Griffin, City Secretary, explained that there were more meters in use at this time than during the 1956 year, ending the 1956 year.

Clarence Kelley said, "During the time of the first figure, I was using water on a flat rate without a meter to register the amount, and my bill was considerable cheaper, because of the estimated gallons used, so were many others." Mayor Roy Neal explained to the group that an auditor had drawn up a budget for the 1957 year, which he didn't see how it could be met at the time and neither did the Aldermen, but they had paid their bills and bought a gradar and various other things and still had money in the city treasury.

Borum, explained the fact that people had been influenced to use lots of water, as the larger quantity.

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## Castor Beans May Prove To Be Good Cash Crop In Area

HALFWAY, Texas — The castor bean appears to have a place as a cash crop on the irrigation soil of the High Plains. In an attempt to determine the best adapted variety and find the cash per acre value, twelve varieties of castor beans have been included in the research program of the High Plains Station at Halfway.

The Station Scientists, incorporated with representatives of the Baker Castor Bean Corporation, are searching for not only the most productive but also the varieties that can be harvested with minimum difficulty. They want a variety of combine height that can be harvested cleanly so as to leave few or no seeds to volunteer.

Recent predictions indicate a future increase in the castor bean market due to the need for castor oil in the operation of jets and rockets. There is also a potential tremendous market for use in the production of synthetic fibers.

Nitrogen fertilizer tests on castor beans are under way at the High Plains Station to determine the most economical rate and the time of fertilization. Two varieties are being used in four row plots one hundred feet long. Each plot is being replicated four times. Each variety received four different fertilizer treatments. These included no fertilizer, 50 and 100 pounds of nitrogen per acre at planting time and 50 pounds of nitrogen at planting time with an additional 50 pounds sidedressed when the castor beans were 6 inches high.

Success in this research program will help reach the objective of the Regional Council in finding new cash crops for the High Plains area.

### Lawn Insects Can Be Controlled With Chemicals

College Station — Many kinds of insects and insect-like pests damage lawns, but this damage can be greatly reduced by proper use of available chemicals, says C. F. Garner, extension entomologist.

Grubs of several kinds of beetles feed on the roots of grass, leaving bare spots where plants have been killed by their feeding. Others, such as sod webworms, armyworms and cutworms feed on the leaves or stems. Still others, such as chinch bugs, false chinch bugs, Rhodgrass scale and leafhoppers suck juices from the grass. Ants and earthworms dig holes in lawns and throw up mounds of earth and ants may invade the house from their nests in the grass.

All of these pests can be controlled, according to the entomologist with insecticides such as chlordane, DDT, aldrin, dieldrin and heptachlor. For quicker results chemicals should be washed into the soil by watering after application. Insecticides may be applied whenever desired. Follow the application rates on the container and observe all precautions on the label, because insecticides are poisons.

The problem of moles in the lawn is related to insect problems since moles invade lawns and build tunnels in search of worms and grubs. So controlling insects may help control the moles as well, suggests Garner. Finally, the entomologist suggests that you visit the office of your local county extension agent and ask for publications on lawns and insects.

## More City Officials Social Security Representative To Be In Muleshoe

 City used the lower the rate per gallon and that the majority of the people were using much more than they realized, therefore their bills were up. He continued saying, "That sometimes through the summer maybe other utility meters weren't read monthly, only estimated, but if this be true the next month it would be read and balanced off correctly," and he said "I feel certain if the city is reading them over other month they will balance them off correctly." He made it clear he didn't know just how it was managed, but he felt it was in capable hands.

Borum went on to tell his personal experiences with the Water Superintendent, which he said he had called several times, as his home was fed by one of the town's smaller water lines, and due to this fact the meter had sanded down numerous times. He said, each time within 15 minutes after his call, the Water Superintendent was there and had it cleared up. He went on to say, "we might find a better Water Superintendent, he didn't know, but we also stood a chance of hiring a much worse one."

He continued "I think if the City Council sees fit to replace him, and go to him like a man, then I feel certain Williamson will accept it in a manly fashion."

C. O. Taylor told of an instant when Williamson had gotten out of line when his meter froze up last winter and left him without water for days. Alderman Kelley came to the defence of the Water Superintendent by stating if he did get out of line, he wasn't the only one out of line, and pointed out that Taylor also got way out of line.

Taylor, Borum and Wendborn all three former members of the City Commission, tried to point out that our water system was installed during the time when both material and labor was high, and it would have to be paid back with high water bills. They pointed out that most all cities operated from revenue derived from their water bills, and Earth's system was in accordance with other cities.

Alderman Pete Parish said at the close of the meeting, "Meters are the only thing we have to go by in establishing the quantity of water used, but if anyone is dissatisfied, I will be glad to go with anyone, anytime and reread their meters, and if anything is wrong we will make it right with them."

**FIRST AID CLASS CONTINUES**

Farmers and ranchers and other employers of agricultural workers such as cotton gin operators, are reminded by John G. Hutton, Manager of the Lubbock office of the Social Security Administration, of some changes in the method of reporting the wages of their employees.

In 1957, agricultural work is covered by social security if either: (1) cash wages of \$150 or more are paid to a worker by his employer during the year; or (2) regardless of the amount of wages, if an employee works on 20 or more days during the year where the wages are figured on a time basis.

The total covered wages of farm workers are reported only once a year, in January for the preceding year to the Director of Internal Revenue. Mr. Hutton added that if employers keep an accurate record of the name, the social security number, and the amount of wages paid to each worker that will be all the information needed to complete this annual social security report.

A representative of the Lubbock Social Security Office will be in Muleshoe on August 22 at 9:30 a. m. at the Court Room, Court House and will be glad to assist in all matters pertaining to Social Security.
