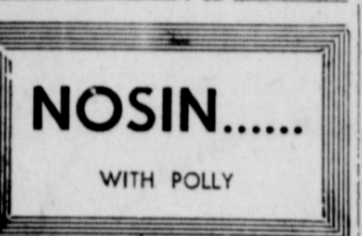




### Office Opened in Earth By Pioneer Natural Gas Co.

Snaggle tooth, freckle faced, pigtailed, braids and crew cuts. They are the same to their parents. (Wonderful)

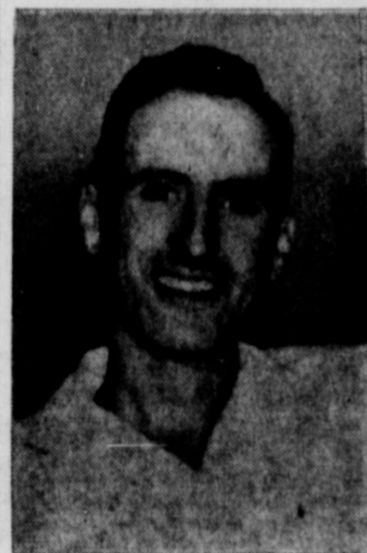
Dear Mr. Bus Driver:

### City Council Meet in Regular Business Session

The City Council met for a regular business meeting in the office of the Neal Insurance Agency Monday night.

Business transacted included the Audit report and its acceptance by the Council.

Request has been made for the city to extend the sewer service to the Burton house on the west outskirts of town. Motion was made to hold the request until advice could be obtained from the City Engineer regarding this step.

It was decided the City Maintainer would be available for out of town work only in extreme emergencies since this work can be obtained in the area through other sources.

The matter of furnishing water to Latin American families living in the south part of Earth was discussed. The idea was advanced that if the city would lower the meter connection charges from \$50 to \$25, more people might use the City Water. It was decided however to continue the present rate.

The cost to the city of putting in a meter connection is approximately \$50, and therefore it would be impractical for the City to put in a meter for \$25.

The Springlake City Council approved the ordinance offered by General Telephone Company for a dial exchange system, and granted a 35 year franchise to that company in a Wednesday morning meeting at the community building.

Division Manager J. L. "Dusty" Kemper of Brownfield presented the ordinance for action to the council. Bill Street of Littlefield attorney for the city was present to go over the ordinance with City Officials and found them to be of standard form such as is familiar in all towns.

City officials present were Mayor Herschel Sanders, Councilmen Ralph Rudd, James Busby, Grant Lott and Jesse Watson.

Also present was rural committeeman Billy Wayne Clayton.

Telephone rates accepted by Springlake for a dial exchange system toll free to Earth to be installed and in operation by the first quarter of 1960 were as follows:

Kemper presented the zoning map to illustrate the exact boundaries for zones 1 and 2, and explained the necessity for rural zoning.

This new Dial System which will be installed in 30 months will serve the town adequately as well as the complete Springlake area subscribing to telephone service. Kemper said the new system would be modern in every way, custom manufactured to the Springlake area and would be the latest modern type system.

"This will mean better service for the people of Earth," said Melvin Rape, local manager for Southwestern Public Service Company, commenting on the work now being performed by a construction crew for the electric light and power supplier.

## Springlake Opens Season With Dimmitt

The Springlake Wolverines travel to Dimmitt tomorrow, Friday, night 8 p.m. to open the 1957 football season against the powerful AA favorites. A very thin, inexperienced squad will represent Springlake this year, with coach Billy Hahn having only eight lettermen from last year's team which had a seven won and three lost record. Graduation took out the entire starting backfield, and only Keith Leonhart is back from the starting line. Keith has been moved to center from his tackle position. Bud Cooper, who played line backer last year, has been moved to tackle. Tom Messer, sophomore, who played in the backfield last year, has been moved to guard. Tom and David Starkey at guard

were the only freshmen last year to letter. David is ineligible because of scholastic difficulties.

In the backfield coach Hahn will have to work out an entire new starting lineup. Gene Stephens junior letterman, is working out at quarterback. The rest of the backfield will be formed from a group of eight boys, senior lettermen, Doug Loudder, Richard Moore and junior letterman, Dean Jones, and squaddmen, Kenny Hamilton, who has looked like a real strong runner in practice, Joe Neal Ellis, Dewitt Kelley, Jimmy Rose, who are all sophomores, and freshman Jerrell Hadaway.

Coach Hahn and assistant coach Paul Prater have been working hard with the team the past couple of weeks, and they feel the boys can give a good account of them-

selves in spite of their inexperience if they will continue to work hard hustle every minute, and stay in good physical shape all year. Coach Hahn stated to this reporter that every position on the team was wide open. Any boy has a chance to make any starting position. The boy who shows the greater amount of enthusiasm, spirit and hustle will be the boy who plays the most, according to Hahn.

The boys have been put through some rugged exercises and have done a lot of running. But football is a rugged game and requires courage and physical endurance. If you don't acquire these things on the practice field you won't have it on the field in games. It is this reporter's personal opinion, after watching the boys in practice, there is a certain amount of indifferent

complacency on the team. Some seem to think they can loaf, pay no attention to drills, and still play ball. Even if boys of that attitude should play in games, they would be no good to the team, so good to the school, no good to themselves. A boy will behave in a game much like he reacts to practice. If a player lets his team down in practice by loafing, being indifferent, not caring if the play succeeds or not, that habit and attitude will show itself also in a game when the going gets tough. Believe me with our schedule this year, the going is going to be tough. For the Wolverines to give a commendable showing, they are going to have to be in the best of physical condition, give all they have in practice by hustling all the way,

and then this hustle will become a habit right on through games. The Wolverines must make up for lack of experience and size with hustle, determination, willingness to sacrifice for the team. These things will make a man of a boy. A boy will only get as much out of the game as he puts into it. If he continues to sulk, loaf and be indifferent, he'll come out of football still a boy. Whether the boys will have the determination, hustle and courage to make this an interesting season, is yet to be seen. It is my opinion their attitude will have to change drastically from what it has been. It may be they are beaten before they take the field. Perhaps the schedule is so tough they think they don't have a chance and have given up. Remember, fellows, a team

that won't be beat can't be beat.

Coach Hahn's team will run out of a modified split "T". The line will be split but the quarterback will not run the option that goes with the regular split "T". This is not a fast team, but it could be a powerful and rugged with its middle plays. Hahn said it would not be a team that could break away and go all the way on any play, as the team last year, but we will get our yardage the hard way, three or four yards at a time, usually up the middle. Coach Hahn expects the Wolverines to start out slowly this year, but barring injuries, he expects the boys to get rolling by time the district race begins. Springlake cannot be considered a contender for the title this year, but it can spoil it for other teams.

After the Dimmitt game, Malou comes here September 13, and they will bring an experienced club which held the Wolverines scoreless the first half last year. Malou has lost only four men from that team. September 20 will be an open date, then September 27 Muleshoe will come here and will bring a team reputed as one of the strongest double A teams on the south plains.

So, we can see the boys have their work cut out for them. Or, again we are behind them, rooting for them, and trust they will put out a bit extra and surprise a lot of people who think Springlake will finish at the bottom of the heap. Boy's you can do it. Let's everybody go to Dimmitt tomorrow night and prove to the boys we are with them. On to victory, Wolverines!

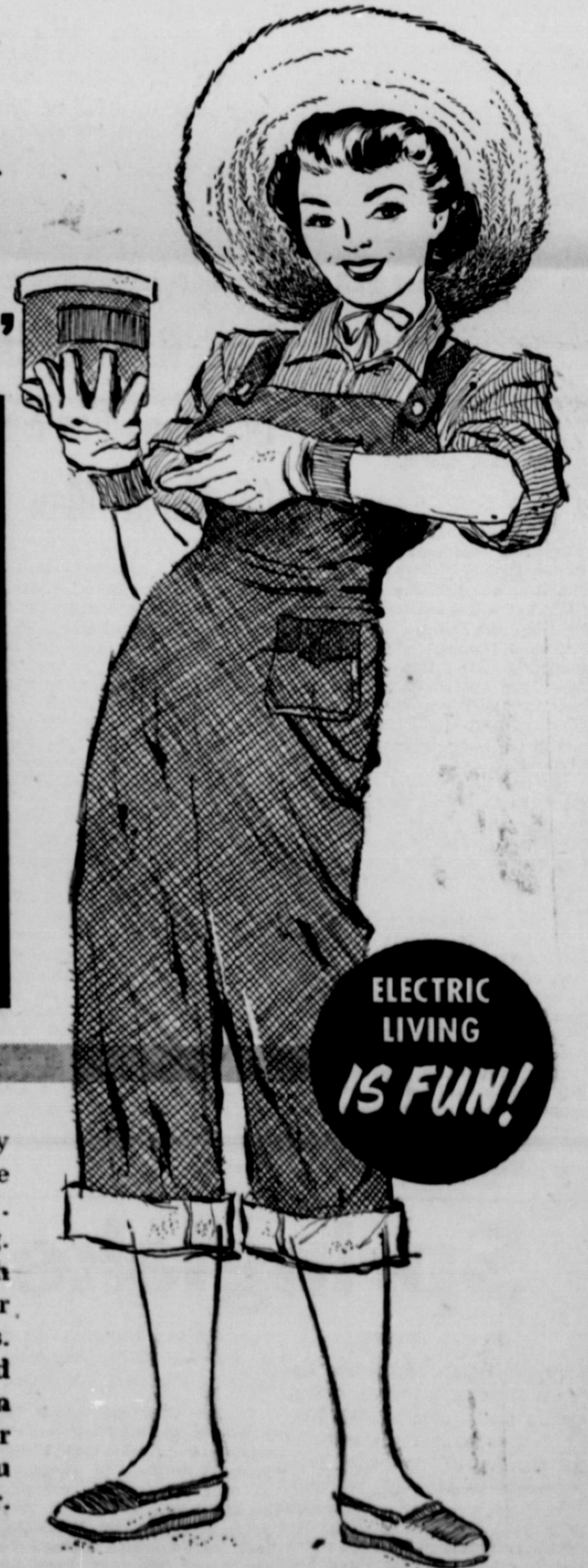

Baptism is one of the most familiar subjects of the Bible, yet possible the most misunderstood. Even though most churches practice baptism in some form and for some purpose, it has been relegated to a secondary position of importance, as far as our obedience to the command of baptism is concerned.

What did Jesus say regarding baptism as a condition of salvation. "He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved; but he that believeth not shall be damned." Mark 16:16. No one will deny belief as a condition of salvation, but will deny that baptism is as important condition as belief. Notice the Lord places as much importance upon baptism as belief by using the connecting conjunction "and" between the two verbs. This statement of the Lord was made in the giving of the great commission to the Apostles. He told them this preaching was to be done throughout the world. It began on the first Pentecost after the ascension of Jesus in Jerusalem. Acts 2nd chapter.

Now let us notice that first sermon upon the Great Commission, and see if baptism had an important part in it. Peter preached that first gospel sermon, and he concluded by saying: "Therefore let all the house of Israel know assuredly, that God hath made that same Jesus whom ye have crucified, both Lord and Christ. Now, when they heard this, they were pricked in their heart, and said unto Peter and to the rest of the Apostles, Men and brethren, what shall we do? Then Peter said unto them, Repent and be baptized everyone of you in the name of Jesus Christ, for the remission of sins, and ye shall receive the gift of the Holy Ghost." Acts 2:36-38.

What is baptism? It is a command of the Lord, it is for remission of sins, in order to be saved. It must be preceded by faith in Christ, Mark 16:16; repentance of sins, Acts 2:38.

Who am I to place more importance on one command of Christ above another? Were you baptized "for remission of sins," or were you baptized because you thought you were already saved? Think on these things, and study your Bibles.

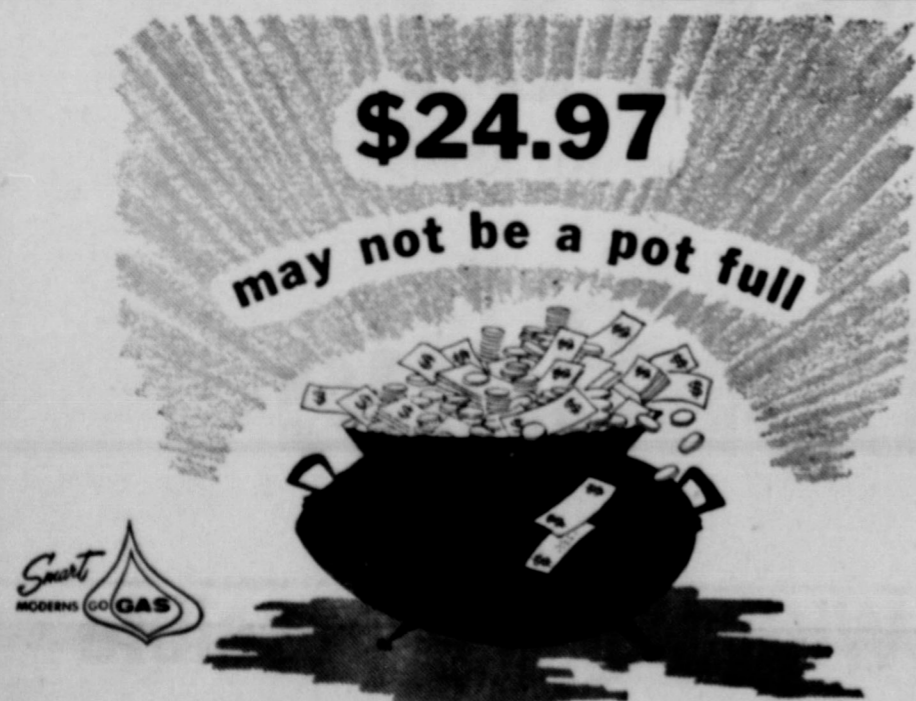

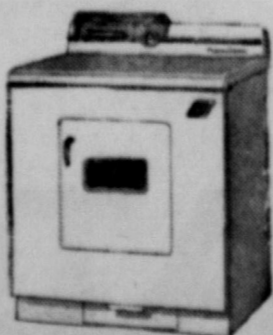

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

## Handicapped Children of Retired Or Deceased Worker to Get Payments

Monthly insurance payments can now be paid to the handicapped son or daughter of a retired or a deceased worker, according to John G. Hutton, District Manager of the Lubbock office of the Social Security Administration.

"This is the first year that payments can be made to a dependent child who is incapable of self-support due to a physical or mental disability.

"Payments can begin for January of this year to a person of any age who was disabled before he reached age 18," Mr. Hutton says.

Such payments are made on the social security account of a parent of the disabled person. The parent must be an insured worker who has retired or died.

"Before this new provision went into effect, no family insurance could be paid for a child after he became 18 years of age. Now there is no age limit for a disabled child," he added.

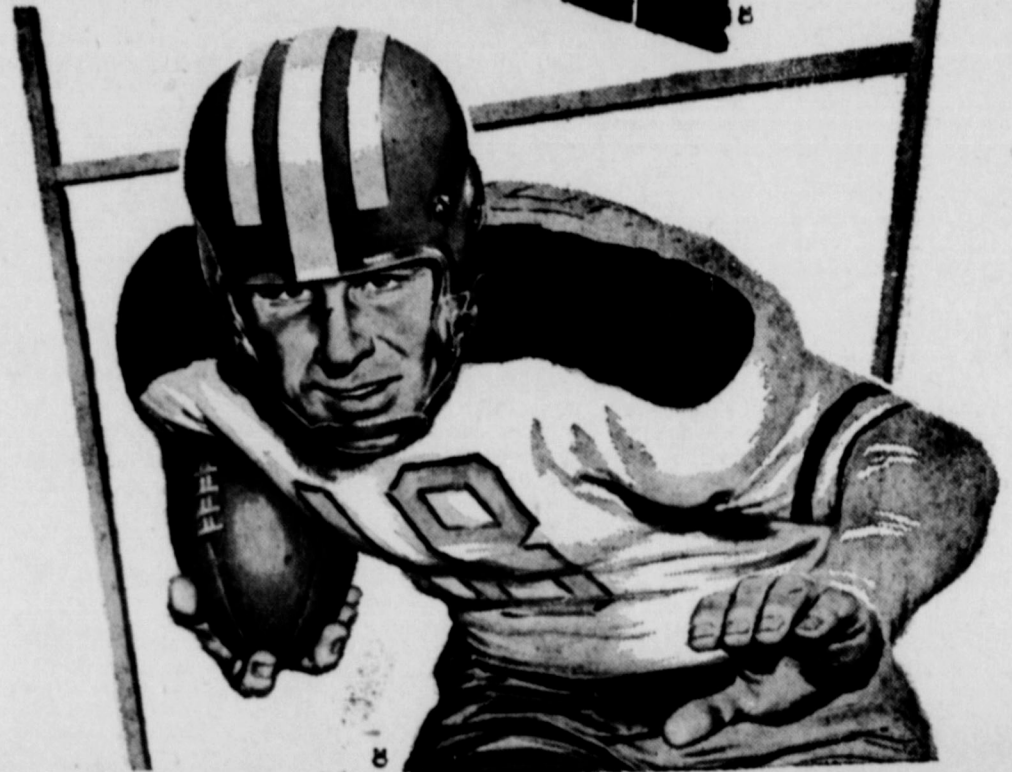

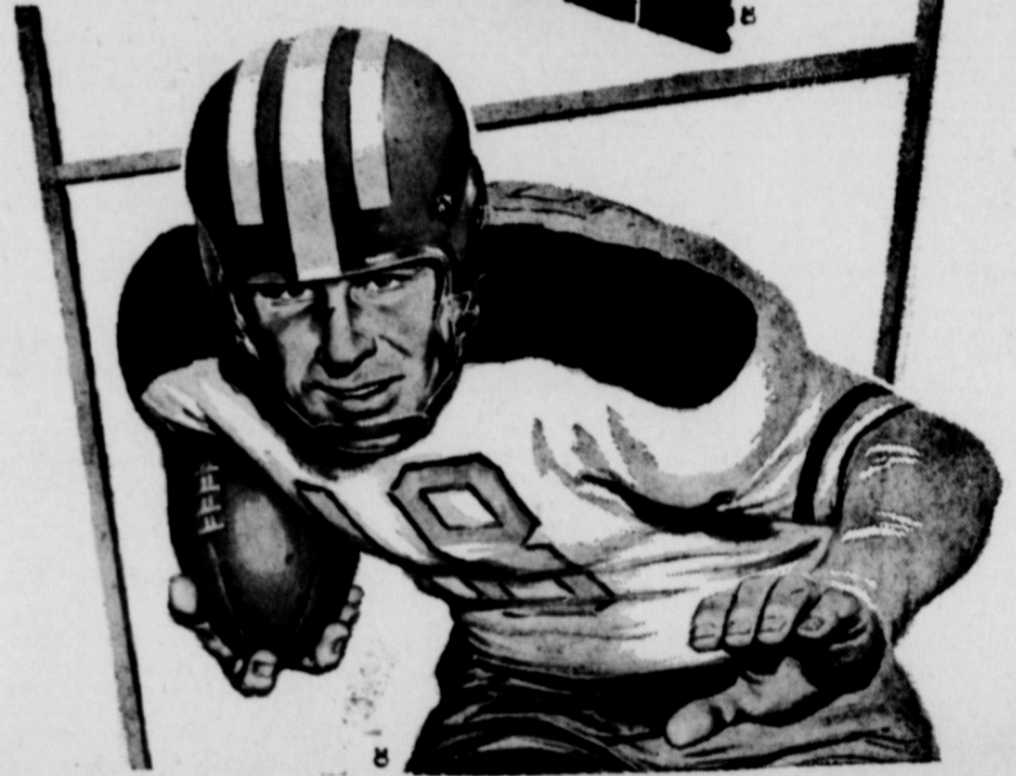
