

# Exchange Students Impressed By Spacious Fields, Friendly People

## Springlake Lions Find Guests Intelligent, Friendly With Great Sense of Humor

A meeting such as this could not have taken place 15 years ago, said Madame Ali Geto as she spoke to her hosts, the Springlake Lions and their guests at the Springlake community building, where a luncheon was held Saturday, honoring Madame Geto, her assistants, Mr. and Mrs. Rudolph

Feverschutz of Amarillo and 14 foreign students now studying at the Amarillo Air Force Base. Madame went on to say, "It was since World War II, that the fast planes, and other developments of mankind had brought people nearer to one another, but that isn't the major reason for

people being closer together," she said, "It's the will to come to a closer understanding in our great and blessed world."

"This, she said, can't be achieved by the leaders of the countries of us, for it is the personal only, it has to be done by each contact between one human being and another that builds the bridge of understanding."

She went on to explain, "It was the exchange of thoughts, ideas and ideals that brought peoples of all countries closer, and to be able to feel their ways in the beliefs,

traditions, cultures and ways of living of others."

Madame commented that as she saw the picture today there could be no isolation of any kind anymore, because that we were all in the same boat, all struggling for the same survival from the tremendous threats of our times.

"Each of us gathered here today," declared the Madame, "Love his family, his country, and his people as much as the other, and we all have the common danger and we all must help one another to build up strength and under-

standing, to face it shoulder to shoulder."

"Many of us have doubtless been ignorant, even arrogant at times, toward other countries and their peoples, because we lived to far away from each other to cultivate an understanding," said Madame Geto as she added, "Let's stretch out our hands to build this friendship, IT'S NOW the time to say, 'I come to you because I want to learn to know you and to please; come to me and learn to know me.'"

The Madame pointed out the fact that though many of us had never had the chance to travel to foreign lands and to meet their peoples, though today, there, we each had this wonderful opportunity, sitting shoulder to shoulder with a charming ambassador of his country, giving each of us present the opportunity to exchange thoughts, ideas and ideals and to build the bridge for greater understanding through this personal contact. "Such a bridge," she said, "is necessary for the peace of the world, to help us all survive and to build a safe future."

Madame Geto came to America 11 years ago, leaving behind her a country almost destroyed, with its people divided. She came here to begin a new life, and to find her way into the hearts of American people. She said, "It was then, that I realized America was made by forefathers who came from all parts of the world, East, West, North and South."

"Despite different cultures, and traditions, they all had the wish and the will to adjust themselves to the new life that confronted

## Mrs. Ivy Resumes Management Of Rainbow of Beauty

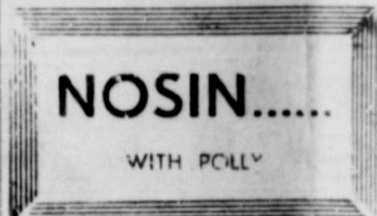
Mrs. LaNell Ivy has returned from an extended visit with her husband, who is stationed in El Paso.

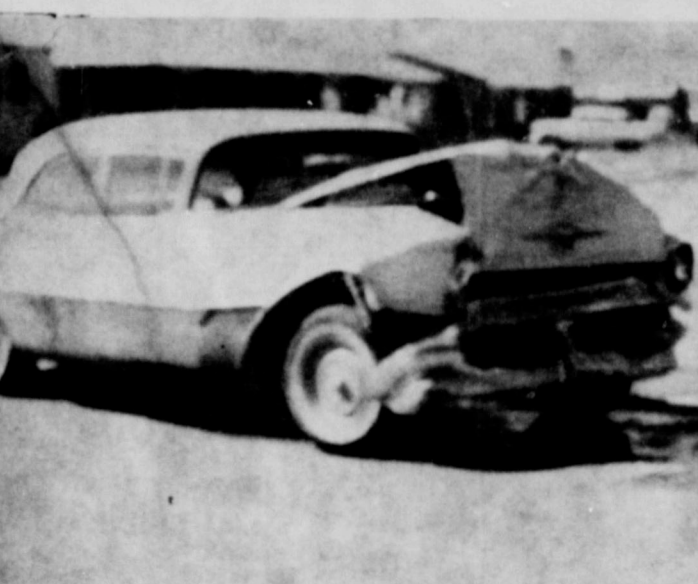

them, so they put aside their ignorance and arrogance that would have isolated them one from another, and began to build TOGETHER, side by side with strength that made this country what it is today, a great Democracy in which each one of us lives with the constitutional rights that make us a free people.

"The some counts now said the Madame, for all the free peoples of the world, East, West, South and North, we must learn to understand each other, to melt and mold our thoughts and ideas together so that we may live in peaceful co-existence, as did our forefathers as they survived in their great struggles to build a new way of life here. We must realize the world has become smaller, thanks to man's inventions and therefore we, the peoples of the world have come closer."

With these thoughts in mind, the speaker said, I have brought together men from many countries into the Cosmopolitan Club.

With this the Malame concluded, "May I thank you, members of the Lions Club for your hospitality to these sons of mothers from far away lands, for your friendship

toward me and the people of the world, by sitting shoulder to shoulder in this gathering. Thus, as we build small bridges of understanding here today, so throughout the world, God bless you and all the represented here, and bind us together in a close friendship that may inscribe the world.

Following the address, each of the foreign students introduced themselves, stating name, rank and country. Those present were: Capt. Lee, Chang Hyong of Korea; 1st Lt. Kim Dai Yong, Korea; S-Sgt. Oh Yoo Jim, Korea; Capt. Ku Luen Fang, China; 1st Lt. Lin Tsu Ko, China; 1st Lt. Wong Chi China; Major Masafumi Nakaya, Japan; M-Sgt. Bah Rami Cholam-honnein, Iran; Lt. Zalmai of Afghanistan; Capt. Ya Hay Kish-meeri, Saudi Arabia; Capt. Jammaz Sagor, Saudi Arabia; 2nd Lt. Shihay Ahmed, Saudi Arabia; and Lt. Hassan R Karuy, Saudi Arabia, and S-Sgt. Chung Ji Soom of Korea.

As Lt. Kim Dai Yong of Korea introduced himself he said, "There is lots of nice and pretty girls in Texas, all nice and kind to me, and I wanted them to know I am single." This attitude was adopted throughout the afternoon with fri-

endly witty remarks from most all the students.

Lt. Zalmai of Afghanistan remarked he was a farmer, and he was so happy to be in a farming area with so many farmers present.

The group toured Plant X and most of the student were interested in the big machinery and the know-how of making electricity.

The school bus drove the students and other guests past the East Camp Division of the Mashed-O ranch belonging to Halsell Cattle Company and the students saw the cattle and cowboys. One student remarked, "That's the life for me." The students were taken to the feeding station of Halsell Ranch west of Earth and allowed to drive down between the feeding pens. They wanted to know about the feed in the silo storage for the cattle.

Driving along the road they observed a cotton stripper in action. Here they asked if this one pulling would complete the cotton harvest. Lt. Zalmai, (the farmer) described the great difference in his farming in east Afghanistan as compared to this. He said, "cotton in his land grew higher than the heads and they picked cotton almost six months of the year, and that each family has an average of two to five acres of land and hand gined their own cotton.

He remembered a plot of ground 60 square yards that they produced 60 pounds of cotton (weighed after ginning). He said he supposed that would compare with 40 lbs. of cotton here raised on the same size plot of 60 square yards. They grow four crops a year there he said.

Viewing the grain harvest with its combines the students were amazed at the speed in which all phases of harvest were accomplished here in West Texas. They said it was almost unbelievable, all the machinery used on the farms here, doubtless the size of our farms here as compared to the size farms they had been accustomed to made up some of the vast differences that appear in our country, plus the high wage of workers.

On the Kenneth Holloway farm, Jack Wingham, demonstrated for the students the machinery used for cutting sudax grass and feed a large herd of cattle in a short time, according to K. B. Parish, Lion Boss, two men can cut the grass and feed 250 cows within thirty minutes. The students compared the feeding of five cows in their country to take five men three hours to cut enough grass by hand and feed five cows. However they pointed out this big scale operation would not be necessary in their land as few farmers had over a dozen cows, most of them not nearly so many.

They pointed out that everything in Texas was done with speed, everything moved too fast. They asked about the unemployment problem, since here we had so much machinery to do the work of men, and farm such large acreage.

The students found the large warehouse storage for grain at Springlake Elevator almost unbelievable and to see almost 800,000 pounds on the ground brought many cameras out to take pictures. In the caged layer houses the students were amazed, Kim ate a raw egg, he commented that eggs in the nature make him strong. He also commented he would like to have caged layers in Korea and get rich in five years.

Another Korean student remarked that Kruschev should see this and the Russian people see this and maybe they could believe when shown the American power of production. He said he had never seen anything to compare with the production in America.

The group toured the Paymaster Gin and a bale of cotton was ginned as they observed the operation. They then were taken to the K. B. Parish farm to see an irrigation well in operation.
