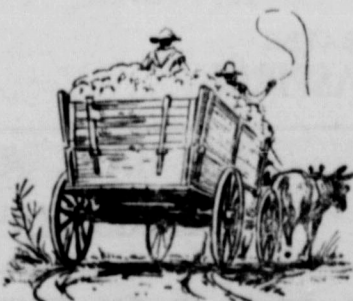
Springlake Baptist Choirs To Present Christmas Cantata

Olton Man Injured In Auto Accident

Porter Jackson, Olton Negro was injured in an automobile accident about 5 a.m. Monday, just inside the City Limits of Springlake.

Jackson was admitted to the Olton Hospital for treatment. The two other occupants of the car were uninjured.

The accident occurred as Jackson, driving east on Highway 70 in a 57 Chevrolet failed to pull his automobile to the right as he approached the divided highway at the entrance of the City of Springlake.

Marks indicated he hit the island and straddled it for a distance before losing control of the car as it overturned coming to rest back on its wheels approximately 20 feet west of the Telephone building on the north side of the highway.

According to Deputy Sheriff V. L. Smith, Jr. who investigated the accident with Highway Patrolman Jackson and Cox of Littlefield, the automobile was listed as a total loss.

Springlake's teams traveled to Olton last week to take part in the basketball tournament there.

The girls' team won their first two games then lost in the finals to bring home a trophy for second place. The boys won their first game but were defeated in their second game, thus were unable to take part in the finals.

The first game of the tournament took place on Thursday night. Both teams beat Olton by very short margins. The boys took their game by a score of 49 to Olton's 41. The score was Springlake 21, Olton 19 at the end of the half. Then the score was tied at the end of the third quarter, each team having 28 points. Springlake then scored 21 points in the fourth, while Olton scored 13. Joe Ellis was high point man of the game with 16 points, 13 of these were made in the fourth quarter. Sandy Sanders made 12 points, Hal Hudson made 9, Tom Messer made 8, and A. M. McGowan 3.

The girls' game was even closer than the boys'. Springlake scored 40 points while Olton scored 38. Olton scored 11 points the first quarter while Springlake made 10 points. Springlake then continued their good work by scoring 10 more points the second quarter while holding Olton to only 2 points, making the score Springlake 20, Olton 13 at the end of half. Olton then outscored Springlake in the third quarter by making 10 points while Springlake made 7, making the score Springlake 27, Olton 23. Olton continued to outscore Springlake in the fourth quarter by making 15 points while Springlake made 13. This was not enough for Olton to win the game, though. Springlake girls came out victorious by winning the game 49 to 38.

Pat LaFrance of Olton was the high point girl of the game with 22 points. Linda Lewis was second with 17 points. Carolyn Gregory made 15 points. Minnie Wheat and Linda Oden each scored 4 points.

For a Beautiful Cake!

HEAVENLY frosting, delicately honey-flavored, and covered with frosty-white flaked coconut, makes a "beauty" out of the simplest of cakes! You can use bakers' cake layers; or you can make layers or a large loaf from a mix, or from your own favorite recipe.

Coconut Honey Frosting

2 egg whites; 1 1/2 cups sugar; 3/4 teaspoon salt; 1/2 cup water; 2 tablespoons light corn syrup; 2 tablespoons honey; 1/2 teaspoon vanilla; 1/4 cup Angel Flake Coconut.

Combine egg whites, sugar, salt, water, corn syrup, and honey in top of double boiler. Beat 1 minute until thoroughly mixed. Cook over rapidly boiling water, beating constantly with sturdy egg beater (or at high speed of electric beater) 7 minutes. Remove from boiling water. Add vanilla and beat 1 minute or until thick enough to spread. Frost cake and sprinkle with flaked coconut. Makes 5 1/4 cups frosting or enough to cover generously tops and sides of two 9-inch layers.

Early Corn Highest In Production According To Hi-Plains Research

Corn planted early in May, 1959, produced higher yields than later plantings in the date of planting tests at the High Plains Research Foundation at Halfway, Texas.

Three varieties of yellow corn were planted April 17, May 1, May 15 and May 21 in this test. Delbert Langford, Assistant Agronomist at the Foundation, reported this week. Yellow varieties used in the date of planting tests included Northup King KT6, Asgrow 104, and Texas 30. All three varieties had their best yields on the May 1st planting: Texas 30, 95.7 bu.; Asgrow 104, 86.4 bu.; and Northup King KT6, 84.9 bu.

Thirty - eight varieties of corn were compared in variety trials at the High Plains Research Foundation in 1959. This test included

thirty - one yellow and seven white varieties planted on May 1. The highest yielding hybrids were Pfister Associated Growers (PAG) 454, 83.5 bu.; Pioneer 309A, 79.6 bu.; Texas 26, 79.1 bu.; Funks G 711 AA, 79.0 bu.; and Texas 30, 77.4 bu. The leading white varieties were Asgrow 105W, 86.2 bu.; Texas 17W, 77.0 bu.; and Pfister Associated Growers (PAG) 633W, 74.6 bu.

Now Is The Time To Mail Christmas Packages and Cards

"The time has passed to talk about 'Mailing Early for Christmas,'" Postmaster Kelley said this week, "but our patrons can still help the Postal Service avoid a tremendous last-minute pile-up of Christmas mail by sending all packages and cards right now."

To the inevitable last-minute mailers he suggests that Air Mail postage be used on all gifts and cards going to distant cities.

The Postmaster said that Regional Postal officials were expecting the Christmas mail volume this year to break all previous records. And this mail load is expected to hit its peak next week.

He cautioned local post office patrons to make sure that all packages are addressed carefully and that zone numbers are included on mail going to large cities with zoned delivery.

There is still time to mail cards for local delivery," Mr. Kelley said, "but they should all be in the mail by the end of next week."

He recommended that cards going out of town be sent by first class mail (4 cents postage) in order that they may be returned or forwarded in case the addressee has moved. And he pointed out that it is quite proper to affix your return address on Christmas cards.

The dryer with a capacity of 50 lbs. will operate thirty minutes for twenty five cents.

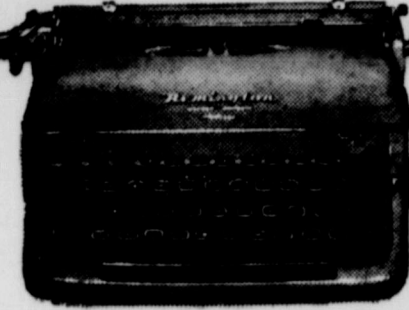

Here's a pleasant "fr instance." Let's say you're going to have dinner tonight with friends. And let's say you have a drink or two before dinner, then enjoy a leisurely meal and drive home about 11. So far so good.



But let's change the program. Follow dinner with three or four drinks during the evening. Then drive home. Now the "fr instance" is tricky. Chances are you'll make it. But there's also a real chance of trouble. This is not good. Responsible drivers should know about the numbers that prove why.

Recent traffic studies indicate that drinking drivers figure in as much as 50 per cent of fatal accidents. The percentage is even higher around Christmas.

What to do about it? One smart thing is to know the relationship between alcohol and driving ability.

The obvious drunk in a weaving car can be spotted and avoided. A greater menace is the social drinker, who seems all right until an emergency arises. He feels great and thinks he is alert, but his reflexes are off. Result: possible trouble.

Coffee does not help. Only time gets alcohol out of the bloodstream. It takes three hours to work off the effect of two cocktails.

And note this: alcohol is not a stimulant. It is classified medically as a narcotic depressant.

For a pleasant evening—if you have a drink, have it early. Your pleasure and your driving will be better for it.
