

#### WHERE IS EARTH ???

Not long ago I was reading a book which was about the life of Robert Frost, a great poet. While reading this book I came across a certain passage which told of Robert Frost's first attempt at writing. It was a serial which was about a long, lost, forgotten tribe and village, Immediately I thought of Earth. Why would I think of Earth? Well, why not! What future does Earth have? Let the readers of this article try to formulate an opinion or answer after they have seen Earth through

I was born in Earth and I lived most of my nineteen years in Earth. I like the people in Earth and I like Earth as a town, or community, but what does Earth have to offer to me in the way of a vocation? Nothing as far as I can see. And I believe that I am not the only person to recognize this fact. Why have so many people left Earth to go to other cities such as Houston, Austin, Lubbock and many other cities? Why do so many people such as myself, who are born here, grow up here; leave - and then never come back to make their homes in Earth. The answer to these questions can probably be answered in one word. OPPORTUNITY! Earth does not offer any good opportunities.

There are a few people in Earth who want nothing more in the world than to see Earth grow and grow. But these few people cannot carry this kind of load alone. Only the co-operation of the entire community and its surroundings can do this. Earth needs industry, better recreation, something to attract fourists, something to get Earth turning on its axis. If this does not happen then be assured Earth will die, because the young people are not going to return, outsiders are not going to move to Earth and the people already here will either leave for better opportunities or die in Earth.

So people of Earth ask yourselves, in the future do you want people saying "I know where Earth is", or "Where WAS Earth?





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

Progress toward enactment of cotton legislation to succeed the current law is moving along satisfactorily, according to Donald A. Johnson, Executive Vice President of Plains Cotton

Reasons legislation is being pushed this year boil down to two. First, farmers in general and especially wheat farmers who will plant the 1970 crop in 1969 need to know what to expect following this program if they are to plant future operations with maximum effi-

sible date.

Second, the make-up of the 1969 Administration and Congress is an unknown factor which might make passage of farm bill even more difficult

Regardless of how favorable the 1969 Congress might be to legislation the earliest a bill could be passed next year would be September or October and it could very wel be delayed until December of

January of 1970. That would mean wheat farmers would be planting their crops for 1970 harvest without a farm program, Provisions of the 1970 cotton program should be announced in the Fall of 1969 too, and this will be difficult at best and perhaps impossible

unless Congress acts this year. The big obstacle to enacting a bill this year of course is the preoccupation of legislators with Vietnam, racial unrest and other domestic problems, But farm congressmen and other spokesman for agriculture are hopefulthat a concentrated effort may at least get a bil! through the House and possibly through the Senate this year. Virtually all testimony heard by both House and Senate Com mittees has been in favor of extending for at least four years the Agriculture Act of 1965. Some changes are being advocated from various sources but with a few exceptions no on appears willing to push for changes that would hinder pas-sage of legislation this year.

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#### Geraniums For Flower Garden

Geraniums are excellent plants for mass effects in the landscape. They may be planted any time after the night temperature remains above 50 degrees Fahrenheit, says E. E. Janne, Extension landscape horticulturist at Texas A & M.

Geraniums are easily grown and will tolerate a wide range of conditions providing sound, healthy plants are obtained, Janne adds, Plants of the new All-America seed selections should be available in the nursery and garden center outlets at this time. Plants grown from seed will usually provide a source of disease-free plants for the garden. These All-America Seed selections include the following varieties: Care-free Bright Pink, Care-free Deep Salmon, and Care-free Deep Scarlet.

Any good, well-drained soil with several inches of coarse peat moss spaded into the top six inches should produce good geraniums, advises the horti-culturist. Two to three pounds of complete fertilizer per 100 square feet, such as 8-8-8 or 12-12-12, should be incorporated into the soil with the peat moss, Even though the plants are small when set, be sure to allow ample space for their growth and development, A m of 15 inches should be allowed between plants, If the plants are watered and fertilized at regular intervals, they will soon rovide a solid blanket of green clouds gathered, oliage topped with attractive flowers over the entire bed. Although it is often advocated, pinching the top out of geraniplants is not necessary if ample space is provided. It is only crowded plants that pro-

If you are in a school building : city areas: If the school building is of strongly reinforced construction, stay inside, away from windows. Remain near an inside wall on the lower floors when possible. Avoid auditoriums and gymnasiums with large, poorly-supported roofs. In rural schools: If the school building does not have strong reinforced construction, remove children and teachers to a ravine or ditch if storm shel-ter is not available.

If in an industrial plant: Upon receiving a tornado warning, post a lookout to keep safety officials advised to the tomado's approach. Advance preparation should be made for shutting off electrical circuits and fuel lines if the tomado approaches the plant. Workers should be moved to sections of the plant offering the greatest

Anyway that you are: Keep calm. It does not help get excited. People have been killed by running out into the streets and by turning back into the path of a tornado Even though a warning is issued, the chances of a striking one's home or location are slight. As a rule, tomadoes cover such a small area that re-latively only a few places in a warned area are affected. However, you should know what to do "just in case,"

#### Deadline For GI Loans Is July 1970

ome World War II veterans still have more than two years to obtain GI guaranteed or insured loans, Jack Coker, Man-ager of the Veterans Admin-

istration Regional Office in Waco said today, Final deadline for World War II eligibility is July 25, 1970,

Those eligible may obtain a uaranteed loan to purchase home, a farm, or to buy o start a business.

Eligibility has been expiring for World War II veterans according to a formula the idds 10 years to the date heir discharge from active warime service, plus one year for each 90 days of that service plu our days for each additiona day of active duty. The date ividual deadline date ch veteran,

Thus eligibility has alread expired for most World War II veterans, but the program will be eligible until the final ter-mination date of July 25, 1970; this also applies to widows veterans who died to serviceconnected disabilities, Coker invited World War I
