

Get It In Color

On your next week-end motoring jaunt, be sure to take your camera and lots of color film. Foliage, country fairs, and football and here are tips for getting ideal



Never use outdated color film. It loses its color balance rapidly after the expiration date. Always use a light meter. Color film does not have the wide lati-tude of black and white film. The exposure has to be right on the

Think about shots before you take them . . . and take enough. Film is cheaper than a second trip. Avoid early morning and late afternoon pictures-they tend to be too red.

When shooting close-ups, look out for dark shadows under the subject's eyes. Avoid them by us-ing a reflector held low to bounce the light up. To make an excellent reflector, get a piece of heavy cardboard about 3 feet square. Crumple up aluminum foil, smooth it out, paste it on cardboard. Take the light meter reading when reflector is in place. When you take

tree branches or archways to get a feeling of distance. Get action shots. With the new high-speed color film, it's easy. Some color film is much faster than the black and white you've been using.

Check Your Radiator

If you're a woman getting your family ready for winter—don't for-get your family car. First item of iness-the radiator. These tips will help women know what needs

In most areas, anti-freeze is a wintertime "must." However, just having the radiator filled with anti-freeze isn't enough, according to Shell Oil's automotive experts. Allied parts of the car should be in good repair.

So have the service station attendant check the cylinder head and bolts and gaskets to see that they are leak-proof. Ask him to inspect the hot water heater and all connections. 

Mr. Howard ran a test and found that a sound fertilization program along with good management pays well. On 19 acres he did not fertilize at all and got 15 bales of cotton.

On another 19 acres he used 16-20-0 Ammo-Phos and got 26 bales. This gave an increase for the fertilizer of 11 bales on 19 acres. Mr. Howard said, "My fertilized cotton held its fruit much better than the other. Even though I watered it last every time, it did not seem to suffer at all."
