Mangum, Britt, Stevens And Batson Win In County Primary Saturday

The race for Lamb County Judge turned out to be the closest race in the history of Lamb County, with O. J. (Jim) Mangum winning by the narrow margin of six votes. Mangum received 1591 votes while Judge J. B. Davis tabbed up 1525.

In another close race in Saturday's primary election Ray Lynn Britt candidate for District Court Clerk edged by incumbent Ernest Owens by the slight margin of 27 votes. Total votes cast for Mrs. Britt were 1521 while Owens received 1494.

In the race for County Superintendent, Voters gave C. Ray Stevens, County School Superintendent, the margin of 499 votes over his opponent Edwin L. Hall. Following the official count Tuesday night the votes stood at 1686 for Stevens and 1187 for Hall.

In the one remaining County wide contest, Glenn Batson, County chairman retained the post, by defeating C. A. (Charlie) Duval by 480 votes. Lamb Countians gave Batson a vote of 1509 to his opponents 1029.

Jane Branscum and Brenda Tanner of Muleshoe High School has been selected to participate in the 1966 European Concert Tour of the American Youth Band and Chorus. Members of this select organization were selected through a series of nation-wide auditions based on musicianship, character, scholarship and personality. Founded and organized by James H. Smith, Director of music in the Taylorville, Illinois Public Schools, The American Youth Band and Chorus will be making its third annual European concert tour this summer. Members will arrive in New York City on June 15, and depart for Europe the same day. Extensive rehearsals will be held in Amsterdam, followed by Concerts to be given

in London, Paris, Monte Carlo, Lucerne, Munich, Tiel, and Brussels.

Conductors for this tour, in addition to Mr. Smith, are Mr. Al G. Wright, Director of Bands at Purdue University, and John Leman, Director of choral music at Eisenhower High School, Decatur, Ill.

Representing the John Philip Sousa Memorial Association, the American youth band and chorus is designed to engender Goodwill, mutual respect, and friendship between the peoples of Europe and those of the United States, and is highly endorsed by leading educators, local, state and national officials.

Accompanying the American Youth Band and Chorus will be a group of adults chosen

especially for this tour. The entire band and chorus will assemble in New York for the initial meeting prior to leaving for Europe.

Many awards have been given to the American Youth Band and Chorus in only two years of existence. The band has played a command performance for Princess Grace in Monaco and was awarded the Lion of Italy following a concert in the famed St. Marks Square in Venice. The Mayor of Rapallo, Italy gave each member a miniature replica of the seal of Rapallo after a concert there.

Featured vocalist with the American Youth Band and Chorus for the second year will be William Dupree, soloist with the New York Opera,

Mr. Dupree has appeared in concert throughout the United States and in Europe. He has been heard on the Arthur Godfrey program as featured singer.
