urday's primary election Ray Lynn Britt candidate for District Court Clerk edged by incumbent Earnest Owens b the slight margin of 27 votes, Total votes cast for Mrs. Britt vere 1521 while Owens reeived 1494.

In the race for County Suprintendent, Voters gave C. Ray Stevens, County School Suprintendent, the margin of 199 votes over his opponent Edwin L. Hall. Following the official count Tuesday night the votes stood at 1686 for Stephens and 1187 for Hall. In the one remaining County wide contest, Glenn Batson, County chairman retained the post, by defeating C. A. (Charlie) Duvall by 480 votes.
