## Three Springlake Students To Take Scholarship Test

Three junior students at Springlake High School, Karen Barton, Peggy Upchurch, and Pam Beasley plan to take the 1964 National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test, principal John Lawrence, principal, announced today.

The test will be administered at the school at 9 a. m. Tuesday, March 10. All students who wish to be considered for Merit Scholarships to be awarded in 1965 should take the test at that time.

The qualifying test is a three hour examination of educational development. The test is the first step in the tenth annual competition for four-year Merit Scholarships provided by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation and by sponsoring corporations, foundations, colleges, associations, unions, trusts and individuals.

The number of scholarships awarded in any year depends upon the extent of sponsor participation. In 1963, 1528 Merit Scholarships were awarded; 361 were provided by 179 sponsors and \$77 by the Merit Corporation. There are 418 Merit Scholars attending 425 colleges in the current academic year.

The test scores of students who are examined in March will be reported to their schools before May 15. The scores are used by counselors in many

high schools to help students make decisions about college attendance and field of study. Many students who do not expect to win a scholarship take the test in order to learn more about their individual strengths and weaknesses in the areas measured by the test.

Some 14,000 Semifinalists, the highest scorers in each state will be named early next fall. Names of Semifinalists are published in a booklet which is distributed to all colleges and to other sources of financial aid for undergraduates. Further, their names and test scores are sent to the colleges they express an interest in attending as their first and second choices. The order of preference is not shown.

An additional 35,000 students selected on a national basis, receive Letters of Commendation for their high performance on the qualifying test. These students are considered for special awards made through the Merit Corporation, and their names and test scores are also sent to their first and second choice colleges.

Each Semifinalist will be asked to take a second examination. Those who repeat their high performance will become Finalists in the Merit Program. Winners of Merit Scholarship will be selected from the Finalist group on the basis of school records and resom-

Each Finalist is awarded a Certificate of Merit attesting to his outstanding performance. The scholarship stipends are based on financial need. The minimum award is \$100 and the maximum is \$500. The average stipend awarded to freshman Merit Scholars in 1963 was \$796 annually, or \$3184 for the four years of college. Each scholarship constitutes a form of educational insurance, since the stipend may be increased at any time if the student's financial situation changes during the four year term of the scholarship. Supplementary grants are usually made to the colleges that the scholars attend.

## Heart Ailments Claimed 90 Lamb Countians Last Year

Ninety people in Lamb County last year died because of some type of heart ailment according to the Texas Heart Association which ended a heart fund drive this month to help carry forward an all-year round, program of research and education for this disease.

There are an estimated 1,400 people in Lamb county alone that suffer from a cardiovascular disease and in Texas over 49,1 percent of all deaths last year were contributed to this cause.

Last year nearly a million dollars was contributed to THA through the Heart Fund. Of this money, 37.60% was to

support research. Of the \$217,310 directed to the American Heart Association, more than half was sent to THA to support research grants and fellowships. Important as research is, its value becomes worthless unless the knowledge gained is put to work in the community. Over 11,5% of the fund went to support professional education, and another 16,10% was aimed at bringing the message to the people of the state.

Fund raising organization and development and administration received the remaining part of the Heart Fund Dollar.

## Weeds Cost Money - Can You Afford Them?

### Which Crops Can Be Flamed?

With proper burner adjustments, tractor ground speed and gas pressures, most crops can be flame cultivated without damage to yield or quality.

The following chart shows results of tests conducted by the High Plains Research Foundation:

### What Investment In Equipment Is Necessary?

Flaming is done with midget, two, four or six-row machines. Two-row midget attachments for flaming equipment will cost about \$185; four row, \$375; and six-row, \$525. The larger burner will run about \$800 for the four row and \$1,500 for the six-row. Middle-flaming attachments for four-row cost \$225 and six-row \$330. The basic combination of power unit and high clearance frame is about \$3,000.

### What Are Fuel Costs of Flaming?

Fuel costs vary according to the crop and equipment. One farmer who flamed off grain sorghum and weeds used about 30 gallons of LP-gas per acre.

Here are comparative figures of actual per acre costs of various crops:

### How Much Time Is Required To Flame?

An operator with a power unit can cover his field at the following rates of speed:

### What Are The Advantages of Flaming?

1. Economy over hand labor reduces the farmer's cost and raises his profit.
2. In some crops, such as corn and grain sorghum, yields have been increased because the root systems of the plants were not disturbed by conventional cultivation.
3. Continued use of flame cultivation will reduce weed and grass populations as deeply buried seeds are not plowed to the surface where they will germinate, and the present weed crop is killed before it can produce new seeds.
4. In certain crops such as young cotton, there is evidence of a reduction in the insect population. (Flame cultivation is not a complete insect control measure).
5. In castor beans, there has been noted a reduction in Alternaria leaf spot disease after flaming.
6. When a cash crop and weeds come up together and are the same size, crops such as grain sorghum and corn may, at the proper time, be "flamed off" with all surface vegetation killed. The cash crop will renew growth within four to six days, but most weeds will not. This saves replanting costs, soil moisture, and gains valuable growing time.
7. Flaming equipment can be taken into a field after a rain much quicker than conventional cultivators can operate.
8. It is safe to use because it does not poison crops or contaminate water supplies. There are no harmful residual effects to the soil by using flame cultivation on crops.
9. Service and maintenance of flame cultivators is very simple if clean fuel is used.
10. It is an aid to mechanical harvesting:
  - (A.) Lower leaves of the mature cotton plant are destroyed, thereby yielding a cleaner, higher grade cotton.
  - (B.) Destruction of above-ground foliage on below-ground producing crops, such as potatoes, at harvest time makes harvesting of the crops much easier and cleaner.
  - (C.) Tests on field drying of grain sorghum have shown promise of earlier harvesting of grain, especially on dry land sorghum.
  - (D.) Field drying of grain sorghum dehydrates the leaves and it can be combined at a faster speed.
  - (E.) Dehydration of grain sorghum leaves helps prevent grain from riding through the combine. (Farmer experience indicates an increase in yield up to 500 pounds per acre.)

### What Are Some Other Uses of Flaming?

1. Pre-emergence Use of flame on a seeded area after weeds have come up, but just prior to emergence of the seeded crop, has proved to be highly successful. Burning of an entire planted area to kill not only weeds, but also to kill-burn the tops of certain plant crops.
2. Non-selective (broadcast) Use of a special attachment to destroy trash, weeds, feathers and other combustible materials along fences, irrigation ditches, and roadways.
3. General burning

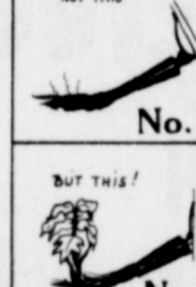
## FLAME CULTIVATION IS PREVENTION - NOT SALVAGE

### Flame Cultivation Is Not New

Flame cultivation has been used in the Mississippi Delta region for about 18 years but, because of lack of knowledge regarding adaptation to other farming situations, it did not spread to other areas until recently. In 1959 the High Plains Research Foundation began studies of its use in controlling weeds in cotton and effects of flaming on the cotton itself. During the following years, research has been expanded to cover other crops and secure more detailed analysis of results. Since 1960 the Foundation staff has also conducted experiments in the Rio Grande Valley of Texas. Though research continues, flame cultivation is well past the experimental stage.

### How Does Flame Cultivation Work?

Flaming does not actually burn the weed to the ground. Rather, the generated heat raises the temperature of moisture in plant cells above the boiling point, causing cell walls to rupture. Nutrients and moisture cannot move through the weed then, so it shrivels and dies.



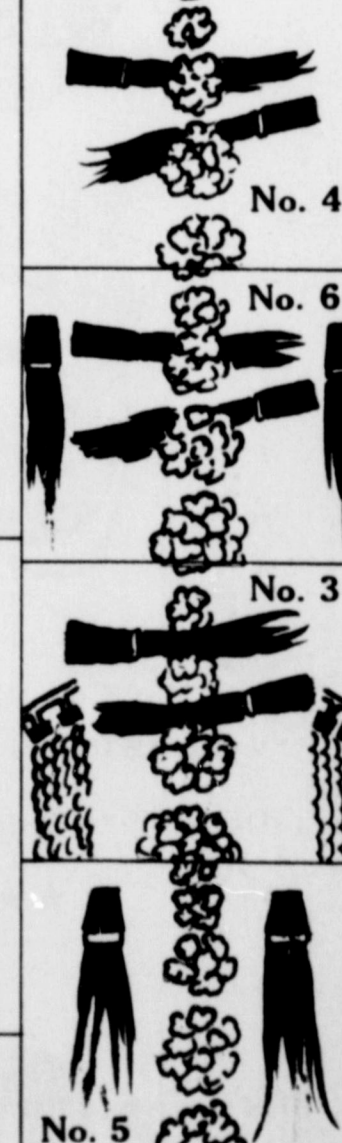
### When Is The Best Time To Flame Cultivate a Crop?

Because of the wide range of heat tolerance in various crops, effects of weather conditions, and the many different types of mechanical equipment available, a set rule on correct timing is difficult to determine. The individual farmer MUST work with his equipment or LP-gas dealer in timing his flame cultivation. Detailed information on proper timing for specific crop varieties is available at High Plains Research Foundation.

(Research in new techniques and experiments in new types of equipment, such as shields, for use in flaming very young vegetables are being carried out.)

### When Is Cultivation Not Cultivation?

When it is Flame cultivation. No stirring of soil takes place (unless combined with a conventional cultivator in the furrow, illustration No. 3). Burner attachments using LP-gas are mounted on a regular or high clearance tractor which is driven through the crop. The burners emit controlled flame either under the row crop at soil level (cross flaming, see illustration No. 4) or along beside the crop in the furrow (parallel flaming, illustration No. 5). The two burner settings can be combined, as in illustration No. 6. A more nearly correct name for this weed-control method is "selective burning."
