Saturday Night Is Rodeo Time

Rodeo fans will thrill to a top performing group of Junior Cowboys and Cowgirls, Saturday night, September 7. Competition is scheduled to begin at 8:00 p. m. in the local rodeo arena.

The event is again being sponsored by the Earth Roping Club. A large attendance is expected for the performance. Competition will be in 3 age groups. These groups include: 12 years and under, thirteen through fifteen, and sixteen through eighteen years. Entrance fee is \$2.00 for each event and contestants must have signed consent from their parents before they will be allowed to participate.

Events will include calf riding, break-away roping, pole bending, barrel racing and flag racing for ages 12 and under. Ages 13 through 15 will participate in the down roping, ribbon roping, cow riding, barrel racing, pole bending, flag racing, and rescue racing. Events for the 16 through 18 age group will be the same as the above with the addition of bareback bronc riding.

Buckles will be presented to first place winners in each event with ribbons given for second and third places.

Buckles will also be given for the three top all-around cowboys in the show, one in each age group.

The boys and their coaches will canvass both Springlake and Earth in an all-day, all-out drive to sell season tickets to this year's games. Hart Men Purchase Citizen State Bank

Sale of the controlling interest in the Citizens State Bank in Earth took place in Tuesday, September 3, and was announced Wednesday noon following a meeting of the board of directors of the bank.

Purchase of the 16 year old institution, founded by W. R. Stockard, Sr., and his late son, W. R. Stockard, Jr., from president Joe Temple, came after a few days speculation.

New owners of the stock in the bank are Norlan Dudley, Willis A. Hawkins, Sr., and his son, Willis A. Hawkins, Jr. The three men are bankers from Hart.

Dudley and Willis A. Hawkins, Sr., founded the Farmers State Bank at Hart, and opened its doors for business on December 14, 1957. Willis A. Hawkins, Jr. later became a partner in the bank there and presently serves as a director and vice-president. Dudley is currently serving as president and director and Mr. Hawkins, Sr. serves

as vice-president and director. The three men will retain their interest in the Bank at Hart.

Dudley 40, was named president of the local bank. He assumed his executive post with the bank on Wednesday, September 4. Willis A. Hawkins, Sr., and Willis Hawkins, Jr. were each named vice-presidents and directors of the local bank.

Dudley, a native of Silvertown, has had 22 years of banking experience. He graduated from high school at Silvertown in 1944 and entered West Texas State University that fall.

In the spring of '45 he joined the Navy and served for one year in the South Pacific. Following the end of World War II he was released in August '46.

Fresh from the service of his country he was employed by the First State Bank in Silvertown. Starting at the bottom, he worked his way up to cashier of the bank. He served there for seven years prior to moving to Petersburg where he served as

cashier and director of the bank there for five years.

From Petersburg, Dudley moved to Hart, where he and Hawkins founded the bank there. Dudley has served as president and director at the Hart bank since its establishment.

Dudley and his wife, Doris have purchased the Joe Temple residence in Earth and plan to move within the next few days.

The couple have three daughters, Joan, 15 is a sophomore student, Laura, 13, an eighth grader and Donna, 9, is a 4th grader.

Active in civic affairs, Mr. Dudley served as past president of the Hart Lions Club. He has also served as Zone Chairman. He is a member of the American Legion, Masonic Lodge and Shriners. He also helped with the organization of a Fire Department in Hart and served as a fireman.

Joe Temple, who has been president of the local bank since January 1, 1966, has no defini-

Registration Began Tuesday For Punt, Pass & Kick Contest

Boys age 8 through 13 in the Earth and Springlake areas began registering for the eighth annual Punt, Pass & Kick Contest on Tuesday, September 3rd. There will be trophies and trips awarded football-minded youths for skills in punting, passing and kicking.

Headquarters for registration in Earth is Brown-Jordan Ford where entries will be accepted through October 4th. Entrants must be accompanied by a parent or guardian. There is no charge as the entire competition is absolutely free to all entrants and all equipment such as footballs and kicking tees are provided. No body contact is involved in PPK&K competitions.

When they register, boys receive a free booklet of competition tips written by Green Bay's star punter, Bart Starr, the Atlanta Falcon's punting specialist, Billy Lott, and St. Louis Cardinal's kicking leader Jim Bakken. The book includes exercises for better physical fitness oriented to boys of PPK&K's competition ages.

In addition to the booklet each registrant receives an attractive PPK&K lapel pin.

The basic principle of PPK&K underlines fairness in competition to give every boy equal

chance to win, pitting contestants only against those their own age. Points are awarded for each foot of distance the ball travels on the fly, with points subtracted for each foot the ball lands to right or left of a center line.

Eighteen handsome trophies will be awarded locally by Brown-Jordan Ford. Gold trophies go to first place finishers, silver to second and bronze to third, with first place winners going on for further competition in Zone contests.

Winners of Zone competitions will receive trophies and runners-up are awarded certificates. Zone winners move to District competitions where 216 District champions will be awarded trophies and go on to compete for Area championships. Area champs travel to division events in NFL stadiums in St. Louis or Atlanta where twelve finalists are chosen—six from the NFL Eastern division and six from the NFL Western division. Winners are accompanied by their fathers to all Area and Division Competitions.

The twelve Division winners go, with both parents, to the Orange Bowl in Miami, Florida, for the National Finals during the annual NFL Play-Off Game. Then all 12 National finalists

and their parents will go on a "Tour of Champions" to Washington, D.C.

The Punt, Pass and Kick Competition is sponsored nationally by Ford Dealers and the National Football League.

Local Youth Places 2nd In Archery Competition

Donnie Henderson of Earth placed second in the youth division, class C, bare bow championship, at the Texas Field Archery Association Championship in Abilene, Donnie, attending the tournament with Norman Clayton, also of Earth, was in Abilene, the permanent site of the TFAA Championship, from August 31 through September 1. A total of 252 archers, from over the state, competed in the adult and youth divisions.

The shooting got underway on Saturday with the animal round. Donnie shot a 216 on 28 animal targets, putting him in fifth place. Sunday he shot 216 on 28 hunter's targets and 264 on 28 field targets to take over second place by 9 points. He was competing against 10 other contestants in his class.

The youth division includes ages one to eighteen years, with contestants being placed automatically in the Adult Division at their 18th birthday. The youth are divided into two separate divisions, bare bow

and free style. Bare bow uses no sighting device, whereas free style has the aid of a sight placed on the bow. Contestants are then classified according to their scores; they are required to shoot in two tournaments in order to be classified. Participants with scores under 200 are placed in class C; 200 to 350 in class B; and over 350 in class A. Because of Donnie's scores he will now be required to compete in class B.

Donnie, 12, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. L. D. Henderson of Lubbuckie. He is a member of the Lubbuckie Field Archery Club and has competed in three other tournaments this year. Donnie competed in Lubbock in June, and the Abilene Invitational in July, coming home with a first in both events. He placed second in League Shooting in Amarillo last June.

Archery has been first among Donnie's interests for three years, and he has been competing in tournaments for a year and a half.

Police Casualty Lists Too Long

THERE SEEMS little doubt that national and many local records for killing and injuring of policemen will be broken before this year is over.

In some neighborhoods in some cities, there is a sort of "open season" on law enforcement officers sent or called in to investigate what used to be routine cases of disturbances of the peace.

Over the weekend, news wires were crackling with details on outbreaks of violence "triggered," as the sociologists like to put it, by police efforts to protect innocent citizens. Incidents such as that at Newport News, Va., are on their way to becoming "typical." A patrolman called upon by the management of a theater to arrest a drunken and disorderly woman was beaten by a gang of "cop-haters." A man who seized the patrolman's pistol and fired it at another policeman was shot to death.

Violence at St. Paul, Minn., was touched off under somewhat similar circumstances. Four policemen were wounded by gunshots and 18 others were injured. There is an upward trend in police casualty figures. They are high in increasingly vicious outbreaks such as those at St. Paul. They are high, of course, in cases such as Cleveland's recent one. There, "black militants" deliberately set up an ambush. Snipers killed three policemen and wounded several others.

There was a most interesting aspect to last week's battles provoked by "demonstrators" in connection with the Democratic National Convention. Only 253 among thousands of "laymen" in the streets were injured. The police list was 89, one being the

most seriously injured among all the victims.

The point is that the Chicago police practiced restraint during the early pre-convention and convention days. They did not use firearms, taking many bruises and cuts which might have been avoided if they had.

A dismal time lies ahead. Policemen will be targets in "informal" outbreaks as well as in the more "formal" clashes set off by assorted militants and pro-Communists and Communists. It seems inevitable that police forces will be called onto a record number of college campuses.

FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover and other, with specific information have so warned. The role of Students for a Democratic Society in attempting to take over or close down "target universities" has been planned thoroughly. In some cases, as in one of last Spring's Columbia University battles in which New York City's aid was necessary, policemen will be expected to fight without, or with inadequate, weapons.

On all the "fronts," measures are needed to help police forces do an unpleasant but absolutely essential job. Some of them have been strengthened, to accompanying "police brutality" cries from their prospective opponents.

State laws should be strengthened to provide tougher punishment for persons convicted of attacks on firemen as well as policemen. In short, every possible advantage should be given to the men responsible for public safety.

Those casualty lists must be held down.

Navy's Famed Blue Angels To Present Aerial Display During PSP Fair, Sept. 23 - 28

Lubbock-The nation's first official jet flight demonstration team, the Navy's famed Blue Angels, will present their breathtaking aerial display here in connection with the 51st annual Panhandle South Plains Fair. It will be their first visit to the South Plains.

The pilots will be honored guests during two days of activities in the weeklong fair run, September 23-28. The appearance is sponsored by Reese AFB officials as a salute to the fair for its "armed forces day" event each year.

The precision flying team will appear at the 7:30 p.m. performance of the Pat Boone Show in Fair Park Coliseum on September 25, and will present a 40-minute free aerial show at Reese AFB at 2 p.m. on September 26. The public is invited to attend the dramatic show.

Shortly afterward, the jets will make a double fly-over the Fair Park as a final salute to the exposition.

Reese AFB and the fair have jointly cooperated in many ventures over the years. One day of each fair week is set aside as "armed forces day," and military personnel are admitted free upon presentation of identification cards. Four other special days also are scheduled.

All branches of the service are represented at the fair and the coming of the Navy group under the sponsorship of the Air Force is a gesture of good will.

Separated by only three feet, the four planes of the diamond Blue Angels formation trail brightly colored smoke streamers as they flash across the sky at near-sonic speeds in intricate loop and roll maneuvers.

Maximum performance maneuvers by the two solo pilots, demonstrate the high performance capabilities of naval aircraft at closing speeds of more than 1,000 miles an hour.

Precision teamwork and exacting coordination are next displayed as the two solo aircraft join the wing tip to canopy

diamond formation for a dazzling series of six plane tactics. All of the maneuvers performed by the team are standard tactical maneuvers taught to all Navy fighter pilots. They are, however, accomplished in a close formation rather than individually, and at ground eye level instead of the normal 30,000 to 50,000 feet.

Now beginning their 22nd year, the Blue Angels have performed before more than 90 million spectators in countries throughout the world. Their mission is to interest young Americans in careers in naval aviation, to demonstrate the high level of training and skill required of all naval aviators, and the high performance capabilities of naval aircraft.

The Blue Angels are made up of eight pilots, a naval flight officer and 45 enlisted men. The demonstration pilots are carefully chosen regular Navy and Marine Corps jet pilots, all of whom are veterans of the war in Vietnam. The enlisted maintenance crew, which keeps the team's supersonic F-11A Tigers in top flying condition despite the heavy show schedule, is the finest to be found.

Appearing with Boone on stage here will be the Baja Marimba Band, humorist Don Rice, twirler-juggler Diane Shelton and the big band sound of the Richard Hayman orchestra.

Tickets are priced at \$2, \$2.50, \$3 and \$3.50. Performances are set at 3 p.m. on Monday, Friday and Saturday and daily at 7:30 p.m. All tickets purchased prior to September 23 will be accompanied by free gate admission passes. Children 12 years and under will be admitted to all matinees for one-half price.

The coliseum box office is open from 10 a.m. until 6 p.m. Monday through Friday. Mail order requests for tickets also are being accepted by the fair association at PO Box 208, Lubbock, Texas, 79408.

A ticket booth also will open in the Pioneer Hotel on September 3.

Vehicle Inspection Began This Week

The 1969 vehicle inspection period began Sunday, September 1, in Texas according to Colonel Wilson E. (Pat) Speit, acting director of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

"More than six-million vehicles are expected to receive the compulsory inspection prior to the April 15, 1969, deadline," Speit said.

Inspections may be performed at any of the almost 5,500 vehicle inspection stations in Texas, each of which displays the official vehicle inspection station sign.

Texas law requires inspection of the brakes, lighting equipment, horns and warning devices, mirrors, windshield wipers, front seat belts in ve-

hicles where seat belt anchorages were part of the manufacturer's original equipment on the vehicle, steering and wheels and rims.

Special inspection provisions apply to trailers, semi-trailers, pole trailers or mobile homes having a loaded gross weight in excess of 4,000 pounds.

The minimum fee is \$1.75. This does not include the cost of repairs or adjustments necessary to enable the vehicle to pass inspection.

Special inspection stickers will be a two and one-half inch square replica of a DPS patrolman's badge with red background.

Motorists are urged to have the 1969 inspection performed as soon as possible to insure that their vehicles are mechanically safe for fall and winter driving.
