January 30 Deadline For Paying Poll Tax, Don't Be Late

Mrs. Ruby Anderson, city secretary, states that Poll Tax receipts are running at a normal pace.

However with the Presidential election and important County and City elections coming up in 1960, it is estimated that the figures for this year will far exceed that of the previous year.

The City of Earth will elect a mayor and three aldermen in the '60 election, as the term of Mayor Marcus Messer, Aldermen Pat McCord, C. P. Parish and M. H. (Dutch) Been will expire.

Herbert Dunn, Lamb County Tax Assessor - Collector, stated that since January 31 falls on Sunday the deadline for purchasing Poll Tax will be Saturday, January 30.

Dunn will be in Earth on January 12 and in Springlake January 19 from 1 to 5 p.m. for the purpose of collecting State and County Taxes.

Snow Blankets Plains, Gives Farmers Needed Moisture

Several inches of snow covered the Plains area Monday night and continued to fall all day Tuesday.

Snow fall amounts varied over Lamb County. County Agent, Bill Kimbrough measured 3 inches in Littlefield. Moisture content would vary with snowfall amounts, but Kimbrough estimated that the moisture content from both rain and snow averaged approximately .67 inch.

Unofficial reports of snowfall amounts in Earth ranged between 3 and 4 inches.

The snowfall was unaccompanied by the customary strong winds, therefore there was no drifting, and the fluffy snowflakes fell softly, covering the Plains with a thick blanket of white.

The snowfall ceased early Tuesday night, and since the snow fell evenly, as it began thawing, it was soaking into the ground without excessive drainage.

Highway travel was hazardous due to the icy road conditions. Some schools in the area were closed Wednesday, including Springlake schools.

Subsoil conditions are good for this time of year. Dryland farmers in the County, who depend a great deal on the winter precipitation, were especially pleased with the snow, as well as the irrigation farmers. The moisture will also be of great value to wheat and other winter crops.

Council Proposes To Incorporate Area Into City Limits In Near Future

The City Council met Monday night with City Attorney John Alldridge of Farwell, and City Engineer, Ralph Douglas present.

The Council proposal to extend the City Limits one half mile north on Farm to Market Road 1955 and incorporate 780 feet on each side of the FM Road. Also into the proposal was plans to extend the City Limits 780 feet on the north side bordering Taylor Addition of the City. The proposed addition to the city will also take in a strip 360 feet wide on the east side of the city, running parallel to the City Park.

Also in the proposal was to extend the City Limits one half mile east on Highway 70 and to take in 780 feet on either side of the highway.

An election will be called in the near future to give qualified voters living within these areas the right to vote on this proposal submitted by the City Council.

Only those living in these areas who are qualified voters with their 1959 Poll Tax Receipts will be eligible to vote on the proposal.

TEN STOCKS FOR 1960

Each year it is our custom to select ten stocks which we feel will be outstanding performers over the coming twelve months. As usual, we are making this forecast again in 1960 including companies associated with airlines, automotive, capital goods, defense, electronics, non-ferrous metals, railroads and retail industries as well as one company with a substantial stake in the growth of the economy overseas. A brief summary of each of the ten stocks recommended is as follows:

American Airlines earnings should be substantially benefited by heavier passenger loads on its new 707-jet planes and it looks very attractive earnings-wise and also capital appreciation-wise for the year 1960.
American Metals should benefit from a good business year both with its large stake in copper mining and also because it is a major producer of molybdenum heavily used in the steel industry and whose uses are increasing rapidly.
Blue-Knox should be a prime beneficiary both on the increased capital expenditure program forecast for 1960 and from what is expected to be a record steel year. As well as being an important producer of expendable equipment used in steel mills the company also designs, makes machinery and in some cases erects plants for various processing industries.

Borg Warner will be an indirect beneficiary of a prosperous automobile year, while its diversification into other fields also makes it attractive and perhaps less speculative than investing directly in the auto industry through the purchase of one auto stock.
Colgate-Palmolive is a blue chip in the proprietary drug field. Its earnings have continued upward every year since 1951 due primarily to the expansion of its product sales overseas and these should continue to be an important contributing factor. In addition the company has recently announced plans for the acquisition

of a small but promising ethical drug company.

General Dynamics represents one of the best and more diversified media for investment in the defense program participating in the production of atomic submarines, missiles and airplanes. It also will make commercial jet planes and has diversified into the fields of electronics, industrial gases and nuclear research.

Lerner Stores is a rather interesting situation in the retail merchandising field, as a store chain selling popular-priced apparel. Recent changes in management, shifts to suburbs, acquisition of new stores and a cost control program suggest improving profits over the years.

Magnavox is the best medium for participation in the fast-growing demand for home stereophonic sets. Sales of these are expected to double in the coming year. The company is also engaged in military electronics and electronic research.

Monsanto Chemical appears to be one of the better blue chip values in the fast-growing chemical industry. After the introduction of its growth program its earnings started turning upward again in 1959. The company's 50% interest in Chemstrand adds to its prospects.

Universal Oil Products offers an interesting businessman's risk in a research and development company specializing in petroleum refining research. It is currently working on two developments: one, a method for producing a superior jet fuel and, another, a catalytic system for reducing harmful and obnoxious effects from auto exhaust. Since either of these products should be dynamic to the company's future growth we have included this stock. FNS

Ready Your Car for Winter

If you are one of millions of women who keep a household going, you probably keep a car going too. Here are some tips to insure good going for your car this winter.
Have it checked now. Last year, a survey of 3,000,000 cars showed that one out every five needed repairs. The survey covered brakes, front lights, rear lights, steering, tires, exhaust, glass, windshield wipers, rear view mirror, horn.



This fall, the Motor Vehicles Bureau in Albany, N. Y., reported that nearly half of the vehicles inspected for mechanical fitness required repair or adjustment!

Be sure to have the radiator and the rest of the cooling system examined. Sluggish circulation can cause the motor to overheat, wasting anti-freeze. Have the radiator drained and flushed before new anti-freeze is put in.

How's the generator? The belt should be tight, the belt fabric fresh, and the generator brushes in good shape. Unless the generator does its job, night driving and the use of heater and defroster can exhaust the battery.

Keep the battery full. In winter, it works extra hard. Have the water checked every two weeks, at least.

If your car has water jets for cleaning the windshield, make sure the water supply contains an alcohol solution. Otherwise it might freeze. Finally, have the heater and defroster checked. Any Shell dealer will be glad to make sure your car is ready for winter.

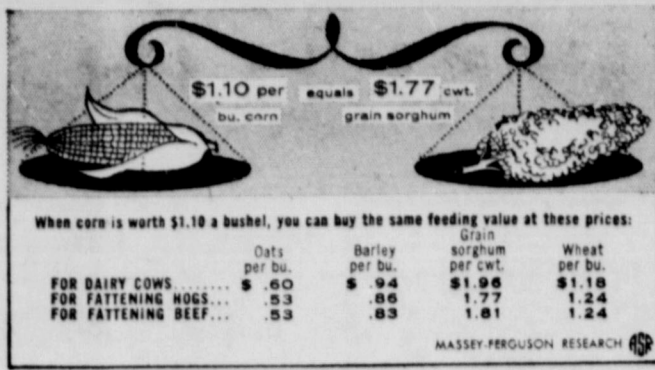

FARM PROFIT



Look For The Best Grain Buys
Just because a farmer has always fed corn doesn't mean it is the best grain for him. Often barley, grain sorghum or other feed grains will produce more meat, milk or eggs for less money. Leonard Schruben, Kansas State College economist, points out that with corn pegged at a \$1.12 support price it seems probable that other feed grains will be better buys. It may pay to sell corn and buy other grain as long as you can get the same feeding value for less money.

Massey-Ferguson research reports show that when corn is \$1.10 per bu., you can pay to \$1.81 per cwt. for grain sorghum and still get equal feeding value for beef cattle. The chart shows the relative values of other feeds. Since different kinds of livestock and poultry vary in their efficiency in using feed grains, you must figure the value for each. Dairy and beef cattle can make better use of some grains than hogs or poultry.

Another way to save on feed this year is to stock up early. Our record sized corn crop has forced all feed prices down. But prices soon will be making their seasonal rise. Last winter corn prices climbed 26¢ a bushel before spring. There's nothing to stop them from doing the same this season.

The corn price support of \$1.12 a bushel will tend to strengthen all feed prices later in the season. Even though we had a huge corn crop, harvest of other grains was down. Total feed supply isn't much larger than it was a year ago.

So check up on what grain you'll need this winter. Decide which grains will give you the most for your money and stock up now.
