Soil Stewardship Week Is Observed

Local Teen-Age Road-e-o Contest Planned By Jaycees For June 7

Plans to conduct the first annual Teen-Age Road-e-o were made Monday night by the Earth Junior Chamber of Commerce.

The Road-e-o will consist of a written examination and a skill test involving driving through prescribed exercises such as parking, smooth stopping and others.

The local winner in this national Jaycee contest will be eligible to compete in the regional contest at Muleshoe, June 9th. Winners from the regional contest will go to the state Road-e-o June 22 in Sherman, Texas. State winners compete for \$3000 in scholarships in a national contest August 12-13-14 and 15 in Washington, D. C.

Carl Jones, local Jaycee president, said six sub-committees have been organized under the general chairmanship of Weldon Barton to carry out the various aspects of the program. "By emphasizing the rules of the road and the skills needed for safe driving, we intend to give local youths a chance to prove that some of America's best drivers are teen-agers," Carl Jones said.

Last year 250,000 teen-agers took part in Teen-Age Road-e-o in more than 1000 towns and cities. Sponsors of the National Teen-Age Road-e-o are the U. S. Jaycees, Liberty Mutual Insurance Companies and American Trucking Association, Inc.

The written test will be held at 9 a. m., Friday, June 7 at the community building in Earth.

The driving test will be held at 9 a. m., Saturday, June 8 in Earth. Boys and girls wishing to enter the contest please fill out the entry blank and mail it to the Earth News-Sun or bring it with you to the community building, Friday, June 7.

OFFICIAL RULES — Eligibility —

1. The contest is open to all persons who have not reached their twentieth birthday on or before the date of the final day of the National Teen-Age Road-e-o, August 15th.
2. All persons having competed in previous National Road-e-o finals at Washington, D. C., shall be ineligible to compete in any local or state contest.
3. Entrants will be declared ineligible if (a.) they have been found guilty of a moving traffic violation within a six-month period prior to the local Road-e-o in which they are entered, (b.) they are sons and daughters of the national sponsors of the National Teen-Age Road-e-o.
4. Winners of local or state Road-e-os who are found guilty of a moving traffic violation previous to competing in the state or

County Grain Loan For '57 Is Announced

Announcement was received this week by Lamar D. Aten, Jr., Lamb County ASC Manager, that the official County Grain Loan rate for 1957 would be \$1.73 per hundred pounds. The grain sorghum price support for last year was \$1.58.

Above price will apply to No. 2 grain and better, with not in excess of 13 percent moisture, and test weight of 56 pounds to the bushel.

No. 3 grain containing not less than 13 percent moisture will carry a five cent per hundred pound deduction.

No. 4 with not in excess of 19 percent moisture will carry a ten cent per hundred deduction.

Grain sorghum grading smutty will carry a 5 cent per hundred pounds deduction; and that grading discolored a seven cents per hundred pounds deduction.

Springlake Schools Now Have Two New Busses For Routes

According to School Superintendent, Bill Mann, the average daily attendance for this year was 752 compared with 710 last year, intitling us to two more teachers for the next school year.

Attendance in the colored school has more than doubled with an increase from 20 students last year to 46 this year, making us eligible for another teacher there.

Two more large science desks, costing \$625 each, have been added to the science room. There is now six of these desks in the Lab, giving us one of the better equipped science departments in the area.

Two more school busses of 54 passenger capacity have arrived and one more is expected soon. In the near future three of the old busses will be for sale. The bidding date will be announced later. Superintendent Mann says there is lots of work being done at the school including repairing and painting. One of the buildings on the campus, formerly used for classes and music, is being remodeled and several rooms added. When completed it will contain three bedrooms, one and one-half baths, combination kitchen, utility and dining room, and living room. The Bill Manns' will occupy this house.

Vegetable Meet To Be May 31

The Court Room of the Lamb County Courthouse will serve as headquarters for a vegetable marketing meeting at 2 p. m., Friday, May 31.

Vegetable growing will be discussed with farmers of Lamb County by Jimmy Rosebrough of Tyler, Texas.

Durwood Speight will conduct the meeting which has been called to encourage and promote vegetable growing in the county. All interested persons are invited to attend this meeting.

Bill Kimbrough, County Agent, states "there are many acres of carrots, tomatoes, cabbage, potatoes and onions already up in the county."

Only two persons were hospitalized and nine injured by the destructive tornado which struck Olton Friday, wiping out the colored section of the city and leveling at least five farm homes and damaging a grain elevator as it approached the southwest corner of the city.

After leaving the Negro section with only three buildings standing, the storm moved on northeast of the city, where it destroyed at least a half dozen more farm homes, leaving at least 300 homeless as an estimated 60 homes were completely destroyed and over \$600,000 in damages.

The funnel was first sighted about 11 a. m. near Sudan where it dipped to the ground, uprooting a few trees. As it moved through the area Earth residents went scampering to cellars after a loud long blast from the fire whistle, as men and boys stayed in the observation tower in order to give warning to their fellow townspeople.

This is the second time in less than five weeks that tornadoes have ripped through Lamb County destroying property in various communities. And bringing terror to residents as swelling black funnels dipped regularly to the ground bringing destruction.

The brick school house which was built in 1952 and housed all of the Negro students from both school buildings during the storm, the Negro Church, where several people huddled for safety and Principal B. T. Graves home just east of the school were the only buildings left standing in the Negro section as the funnel moved on.

Principal Graves said he moved students from the old building into the brick school at 11:50, placing them under desks, which had been moved together in the southwest corner and under long tables. Students were panicky he said, some were crying, some were praying, but teachers quieted them as best they could.

Graves said he watched the tornado, which was one-fourth mile wide approach and completely wipe out the section and saw it level the other vacated school building located just a few yards from them and felt the building shake and rattle. The clock in the school stopped at 12:31, clocking the time the tornado struck.

East of Olton the vicious funnel leveled the J. A. Ragle home, and left only an outside wall of the L. R. Bryant home. Two small houses could not be found.

A pickup truck parked near the home located in the yard of the Bryant residence was blown through the air one-fourth mile. All residents had sought shelter in cellars as the storm approached.

The two hospitalized were Joe Jackson and Roosevelt Tinnis, both colored. Their injuries were not thought to be serious.

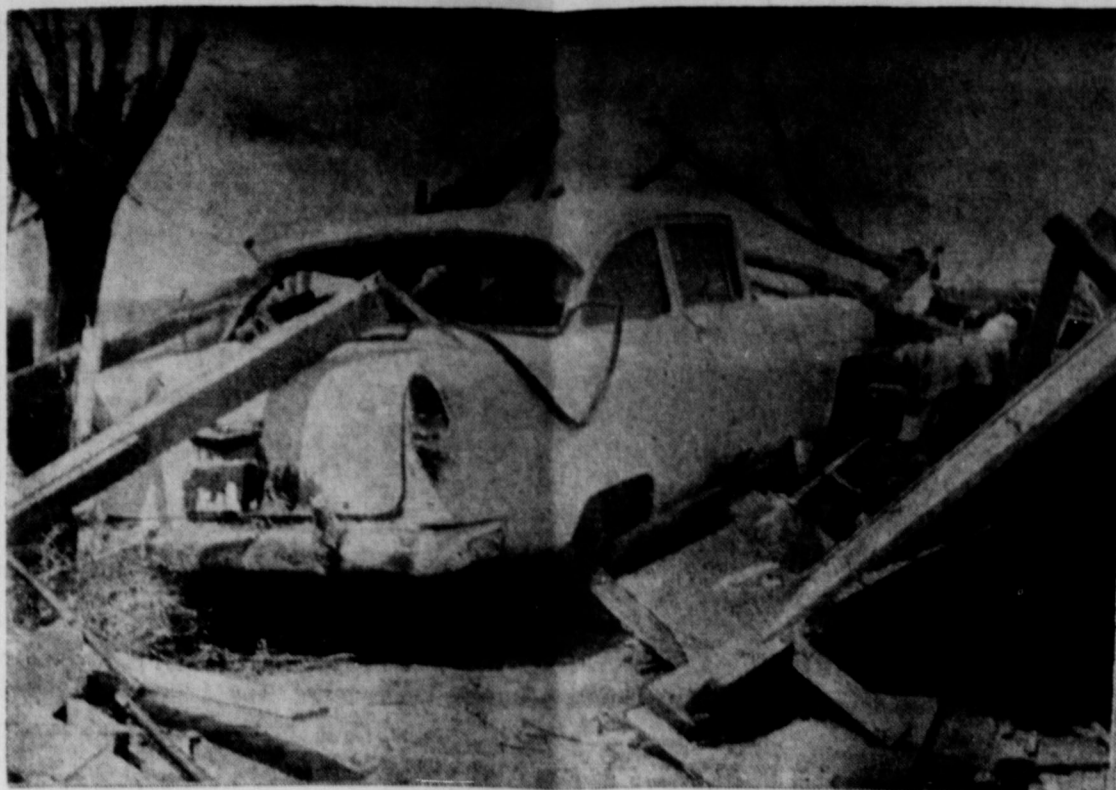

national Road-e-o will be declared ineligible without exception.

5. In such cases as described in rule 4 the runner-up shall be declared ineligible to compete in the state and/or national Road-e-o.

6. Entrants in the State Road-e-o shall have been certified by the local Road-e-o committee as having successfully competed in a local Road-e-o.

7. Only one finalist from each Jaycee state shall be eligible to enter the National competition. All finalists from countries outside the continental and territorial United States shall compete as honorary contestants only, in eligible for scholarship awards.

Equipment and Course Layout
 1. All cars used in the local, state and National Teen-Age Road-e-o will be equipped with a standard gear shift or automatic and be of the fleet variety.
 2. Stanchions used in the skill test shall conform as close as possible to the specifications cited in the local chairman's work manual.
 3. Each skill test shall be laid out in accordance with specifications of the official driving course as presented in the local chairman's work manual. Deletion of any part of the official Teen-Age Road-e-o driving skill test will not be allowed.

High Plains Research Station Increases Staff

On May 1, the High Plains Station at Halfway increased its research staff with the addition of Mr. Delbert Langford as research assistant in soils.

The addition of Mr. Langford was made possible with the establishment of a fellowship grant by International Minerals and Chemical Corporation of Chicago, manufacturers of International and Rainbow Fertilizers. Mr. W. O. (Bill) Burns, International area manager from Texarkana visited the High Plains Station on May 18 to discuss the fertilizer research that will be conducted under this \$3,000 annual fellowship.

"We are very glad to see the High Plains Station get established and are equally glad to assist in its fertilizer research," Mr. Burns said. "All the High Plains farmers and the entire fertilizer industry will benefit from the research information on fertilizers obtained at the High Plains Station," Mr. Burns continued.

Mr. Langford will also enroll as a graduate student at Texas Technological College and will use a part of his fertilizer research in Altus, Oklahoma.

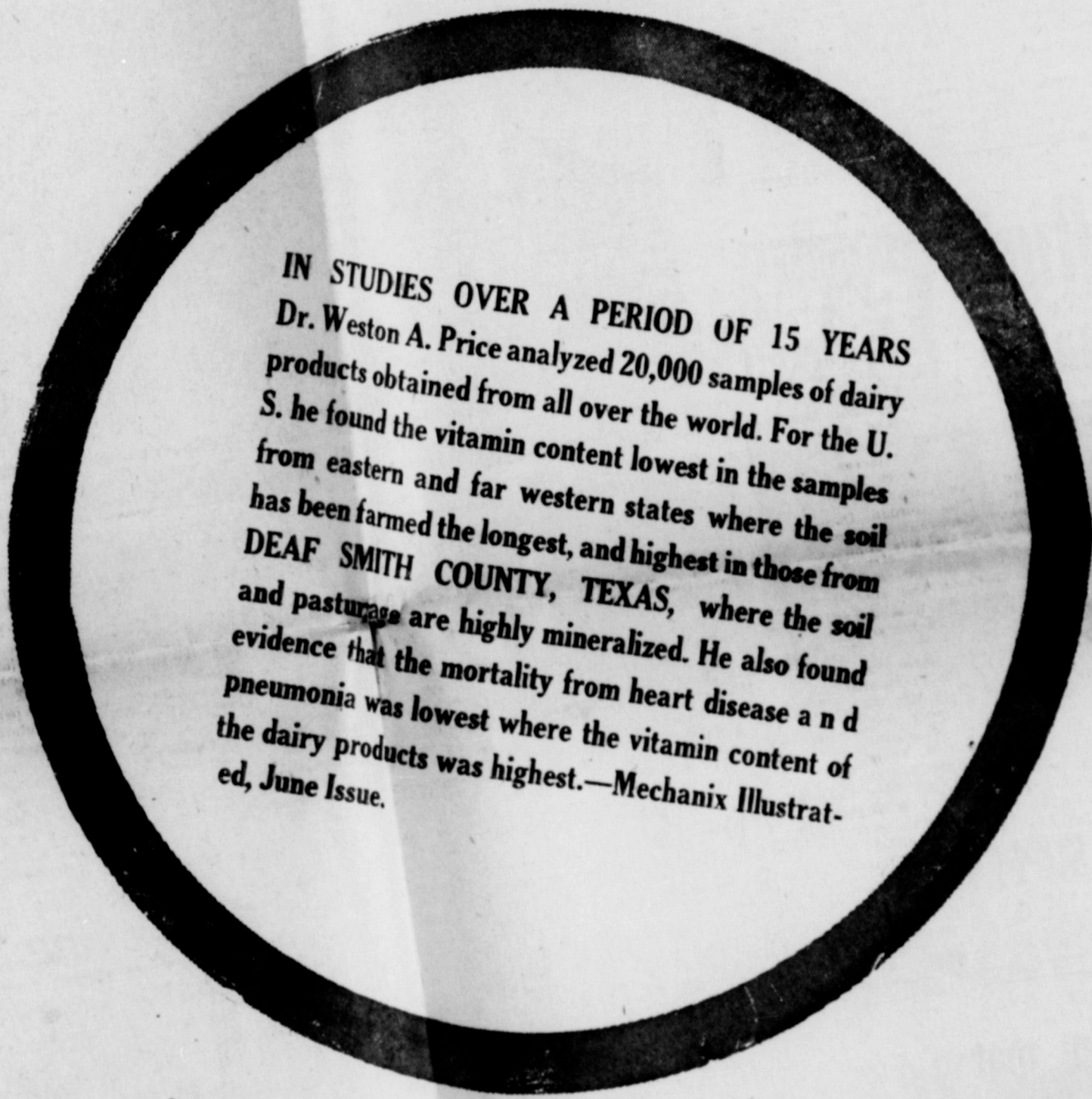

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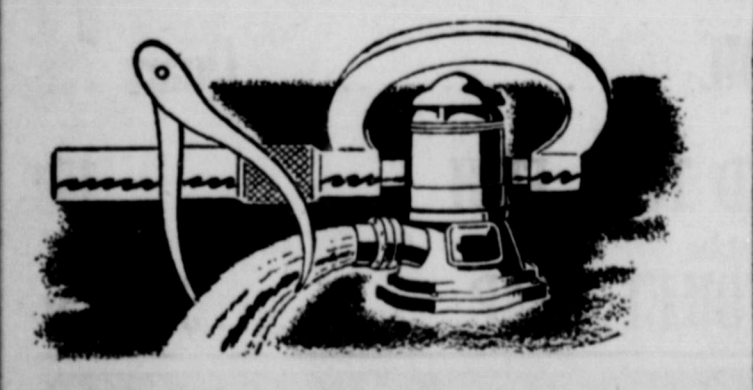
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Final Plans Made To Attend Baptist Camp At Glorieta
