GE Announces Alamo Exterior Lighting Service

The historic Alamo--The Shrine of Texas Liberty--is now displaying its charm and character in a new light.

The new exterior lighting system was donated by the General Electric Co. and installed by the City of San Antonio in cooperation with the Daughters of the Republic of Texas.

During the dedication ceremony, congratulatory telegrams were read from President Lyndon B. Johnson, Secretary of the Interior Stuart C. Udall, Senators Ralph Yarborough and John Tower, Governor John Connally, and Congressman Henry B. Gonzalez.

San Antonio Mayor Walter W. McAllister called the Alamo, "a shrine whose significance is not duplicated anywhere else in the United States." He said

the Alamo at night will now be "much more attractive and architecturally interesting with this expert illumination."

GE's regional vice-president E. H. Howell of Dallas, said his company was pleased to participate in the project and noted the sacrifice made at the Alamo by 187 men "reminds us forcefully that freedom has never been acquired cheaply."

Speaking in behalf of the more than 3,000 Daughters of the Republic of Texas, Mrs. Murray Ezzell of Port Neches, Texas, said the Alamo's illumination "would extend the hours when the Alamo could be viewed by our millions of visitors."

Also participating in the turn-over ceremony was Mrs. R. F. Hallock of San Antonio, president of the DRT, Master of Ceremonies was San Antonio's Henry Guerra.

The Alamo lighting system was designed by C. M. Cutler, GE Lamb Division lighting engineer from Nela Park, Cleveland, Ohio. The new system will be lighted evenings from dusk to 11:00 p. m.

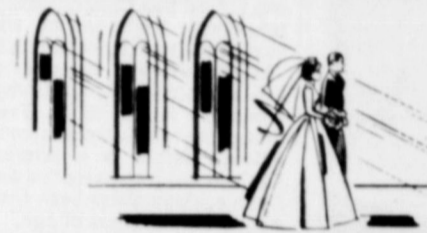

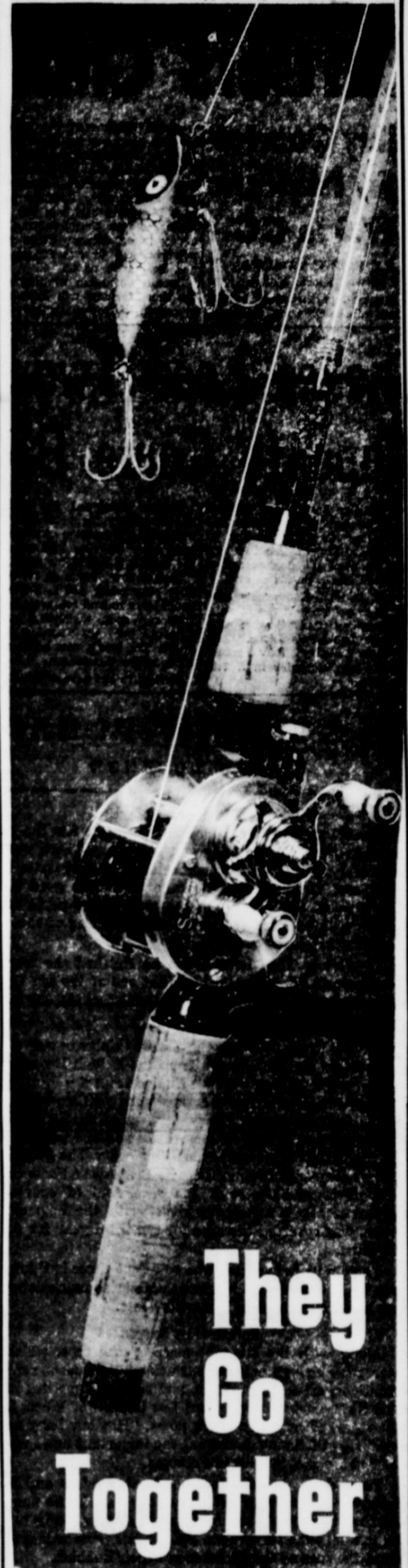
It was announced that City employees, not elected officials, will be given a flat rate on water.

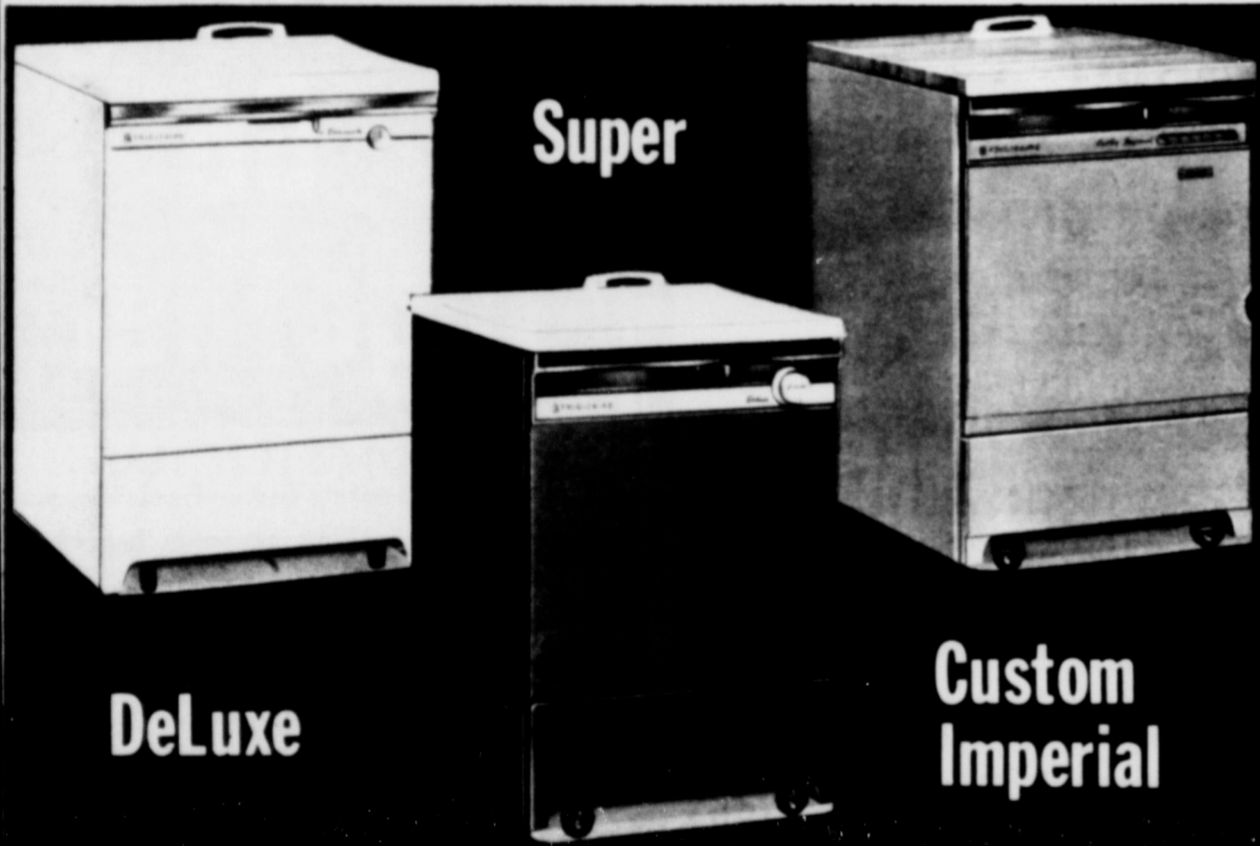

Welding Course For Farmers June 14 - 17

A farm welding short course for adult farmers will be held June 14-17 under the sponsorship of the Springlake-Earth High School Vocational Agriculture Department, according to Bill Mann, Superintendent and E. G. Gaston, teacher of Vocational Agriculture.

Joel R. Barton, welding specialist with the Vocational Agriculture Division of the Texas Education Agency and the department of Agricultural Engineering at Texas A&M College, will be the instructing in the course. He is headquartered at Texas A&M College.

Barton is a native of Glasscock County, Texas, and was reared on a west Texas ranch. He attended grade school in San Angelo and graduated from high school at Big Lake, Texas. He holds a BS degree in animal husbandry from Texas A&M. After five years as a pilot in the U. S. Air Force, Barton served as an agricultural specialist in Texas State Hospitals and special schools. In addition to regular classes, he set up farm shops and gave instruction in farm welding and general farm repair.

"Many welding short courses in various parts of the state have been taught by Barton and all have met with outstanding success," according to Walter Labay, area supervisor of vocational agriculture, Plainview, Texas. Arrangements for the adult education short course in welding and in other fields are made through Labay's office.

The short course at Springlake-Earth School is scheduled to begin June 14 at 8:00 p.m. in the Livestock Show Barn at Earth. Other meetings in the series of 4 will be held 15th, 16th, and 17th at 8:00 p.m. During the dates the short course is in progress, Barton will be available to assist farmers with individual problems and to provide on-the-farm instruction, according to E. G. Gaston.

Farmers interested in attending the short course should write or call the Superintendent of schools, Bill Mann, or the teacher of Vocational Agriculture, E. G. Gaston. An entry fee of \$5.00 will be charged. This must be sent to E. G. Gaston by June 9, so facilities can be arranged. Farm Welding Short Course Certificates will be presented to each enrollee who attends all the training sessions.

Barton states that the short course will be adjusted to wishes and interests of farmers enrolled but "that he expects to cover such items as safety in welding, factors controlled in the operation in running a bead and striking an arc, types of electrodes, preparation of joints, distortion, cutting, hardfacing, and pipe welding.

"Short courses in welding, as well as in other areas, are now available to farmers throughout the state under the new cooperative program between the Texas Education Agency and Texas A&M College," stated Bob Jaska, associate professor, Department of Agricultural Education at Texas A&M College, who coordinates the program for Texas A&M.

"This cooperative program," states Jaska, "is designed to make the services of specialists available to conduct short courses under the supervision of public schools. Such a program will enable teachers of vocational agriculture to provide improved educational services to farm people."

Specialists are available in the fields of beef cattle, insect control, farm management, farm electrification, farm welding, swine production, tractor maintenance, dairy cattle, oxy-acetylene welding, and pasture.

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Clayton's Report To The People Of The 91st District

As the regular session of the 59th Legislature comes to an end I would like to take this opportunity to give you a quick look at what has happened.

In the first place at the beginning of the session many said that it would be impossible to finish all of the business without additional sessions. The problems that faced this Legislature seemed insurmountable but within the constitutional 140 days time we have found answers to these many problems. A few of the things that were accomplished this session are as follows: (1) The creation of the Coordinating Board on Higher Education to help Texas obtain excellence in higher education; (2) The complete reorganization of the Hospitals and Special Schools to help facilitate better care and handling of indigent, mentally ill, blind and tubercular patients; (3) Reorganization of the Water Commission and Water Development Board that Texas may

make long range plans for development and use of the future need of water; (4) Congressional Redistricting to comply with the Supreme Court edict; (5) Legislative Redistricting also to comply with the Supreme Court rulings; (6) Pass the Appropriations Bill for the operation of the State for the next two years; (7) Pass a teacher pay raise for the betterment of the public schools of this state; (8) Pass an \$80,000,000 tax measure to pay the increased cost of the state Government operations.

We could go on and on with the list, but space will not permit. We have considered over 2,000 bills and about 1/3 of these reached final passage and are now laws. Committee work this session set a grinding pace and demanded a majority of our time. I spent an average of over twelve hours per day at the Capitol.

I have been pleased with my legislative endeavor this session

passing 11 out of 17 bills I introduced, which was far above the average. Over half of the bills recommended by the interim water committee, of which I was the Chairman, have been enacted into law.

If there are bills in which you are particularly interested, and which I have not discussed, please let me hear from you, and I will be glad to tell you what final action was taken on them. During the interim I can be reached in Springlake, and I hope that if I can be of help to you that you will let me know.
