## Band Boosters Meet

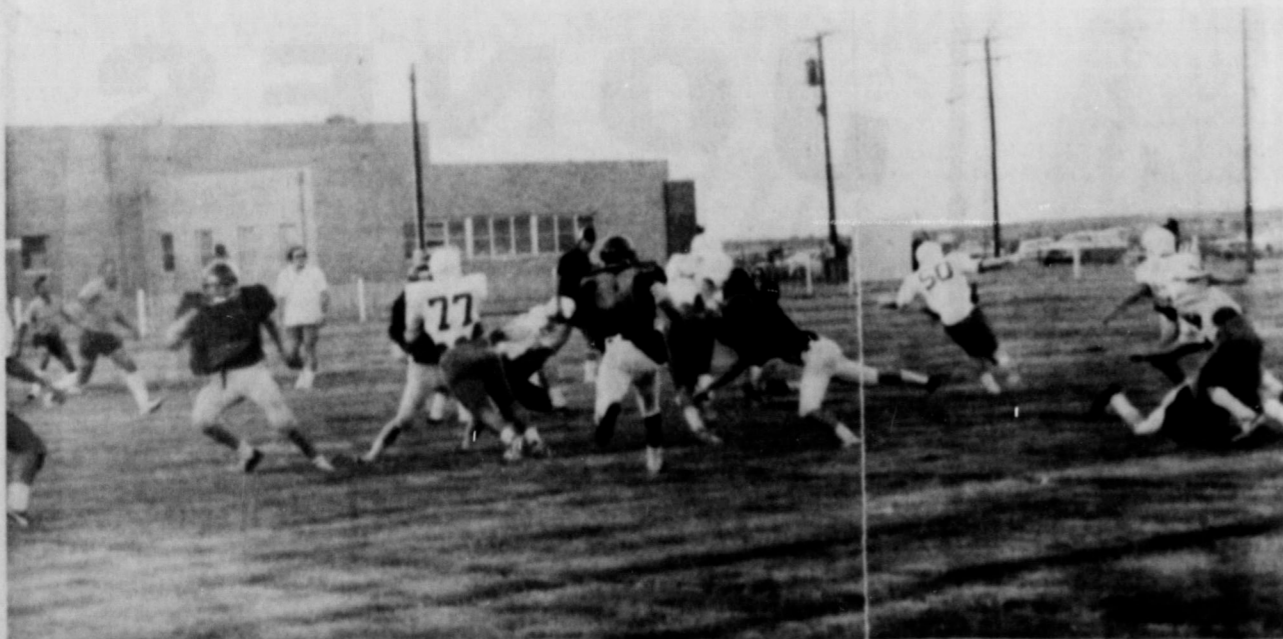

IN COMPLIANCE WITH STATE LAWS DISTRICT PROVIDES LUNCHROOM BENEFITS

The Springlake-Earth School District is providing free or reduced priced lunches to children from families whose income is at or below certain levels.

Furthermore, higher-income families which have unusually high medical bills, shelter costs in excess of 30 per cent of their income, special education expenses due to the mental or physical condition of a child, or disaster or casualty losses, may also be eligible for the lunchroom benefits.

With the free lunch, eligible students also will be entitled to an extra half-pint of milk.

At the beginning of the school year, eligibility forms for the federally subsidized lunch program will be sent home with school children. Parents who believe they qualify may complete the application and return it to the school.

In certain cases, foster children will be eligible for the lunch benefits. The reduced price lunches cost 20 cents.

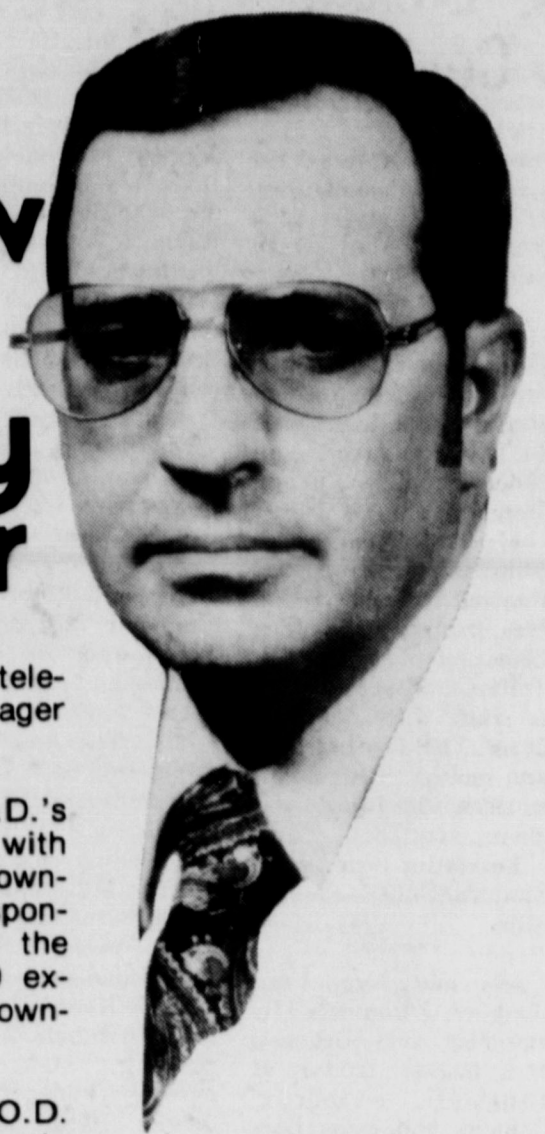

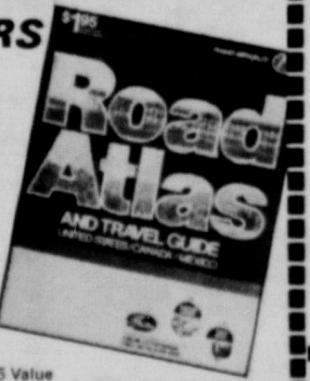

If you're a new mother, you may be a little nervous the first time you bathe your baby. After a few times, though, you'll relax and look forward to the bath as one of the most pleasant times of the day.

I do recommend that you assemble in advance the equipment you'll need and keep it together in a tray or basket: mild soap, cotton, Gerber baby powder, baby oil and lotion; safety pins (points stuck in a small cake of soap out of baby's reach), washcloths and towels.

See that the room is warm and draft-free, and fill the tub about a third full with warm water, at about 90° F. Hold your baby in a semi-sitting position in the water and work up a light lather with one hand. Go over baby's body quickly with your soapy hand, then rinse the soap off with a cloth. Dry with a soft towel and dust the upper body lightly with baby powder. I've always found that if you talk to your baby reassuringly during the bath, baby will soon be smiling back and splashing hands and feet with glee.
