for social security in Lubbock Mr. Hutton said that you can reduce the processing time on your claim by bringing the folyour claim by bringing the fol-lowing things with you when you come to file your claim; (1) Proof of age, with your birth certificate, baptismal certi-ficate, or old life insurance policy; (2) A copy of your 1963 tax return if you are self-employed; (3) 963 W-2 form (the statement of your wages from your employer:)(4) a list from your employer;)(4) a list of your employers during the year, amounts each paid you and their addresses, if you had several employers during the

It will also help if you 'nave the following dates in mind or written down: Your date of birth, date of marriage, and dates of prior marriages and divorce (or date of death) of each. Bring birth certificate of any children you have.
