A check for \$3, 990, 64 was received by the U.S. Treasury which passed it along to the

Veterans Administration last week.

Administrator of Veterans Affairs Donald E. Johnson in Washington, D. C., said that Hughes' gift will be added to the VA Post Fund for the pirvate needs of hospitalized veterans not covered by Congressional appropriations, such as the purchase of television sets.
