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## Craig Barton Named High Point Individual In Houston Competition

A South Plains College freshman, Craig Barton from Earth, was high point individual at

the Livestock Judging Team contest held in Houston March 5-6.

"I felt like the team was going to win, but I was surprised when I was high point man," said Barton.

The meet was held in the Astrodome with 21 colleges and universities and 63 individuals competing.

"I attribute my winning to my coach, Jim Jenkins, he is a great coach," said the Earth freshman.

Reared in an atmosphere of looking for good and bad points in horses and cattle, Barton is the son of a rancher-farmer, Mr. and Mrs. W. L. Barton. Young Barton's father has raised thoroughbred and quarter horses all of his son's life and long before. Some of Barton's horses have raced on major tracks in California, New Mexico and Texas and Craig has helped with every phase of the horses' development, acquiring a great amount of pride in his study of animals.

He is an agriculture major specializing in the field of animal husbandry. He plans to get a degree from South Plains College and then transfer to either Texas Tech University or Texas A&M where he will get a higher degree. He

hopes to follow the ranching and livestock industry after graduation.

The only boy in a family of three girls, Craig teamed up with his sister, Welda, now 17, and together they showed the champion barrow two years at the Fort Worth Fat Stock Show and last year in El Paso they showed the Reserve Grand

Barrow.

Barton was an ardent Lamb County 4-H Club worker six years and in FFA four years while in Springlake-Earth High School, holding an office. "I think everyone involved in 4-H Club work or the FFA receives many personal experiences and achievements he would not gain otherwise, but I guess the honor awarded me in Houston last week, had to be the biggest moment of my life so far. It is a thing every boy in Agriculture dreams of," said Barton.

Barton has four horses of his own and keeps two at the college most of the time. He participated in calf roping and attends Rodeo PE twice each week. He is a member of the Ag and Rodeo Clubs.

The winners in Houston were named and awards presented at a breakfast-banquet in the Restaurant of the Astrodome. Barton was also first high point individual in horse judging, and second high point individual in beef judging at the meet. The South Plains College Livestock judging team placed second in the contest.

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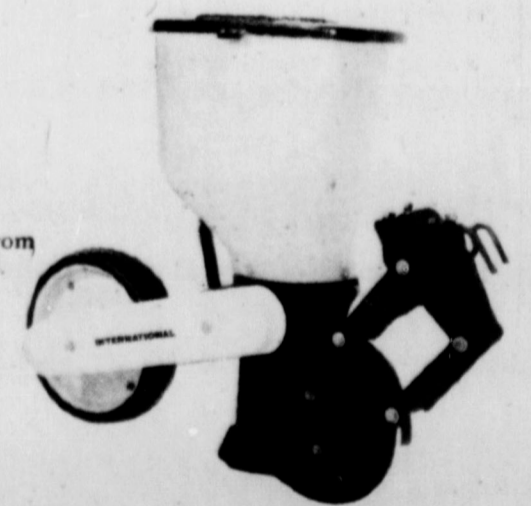
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## Troop 101 Completes Doll Furniture

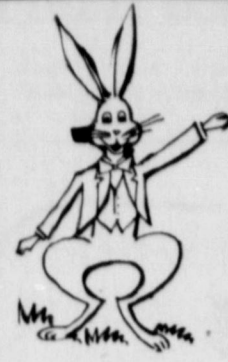



The Texas Lions League, which has operated a summer camp for handicapped children at Kerrville for the past 18 years, has added a new dimension of service this year with a special three-week camp for diabetic youngsters in cooperation with the diabetes associations of Texas.

League President Everett J. Grindstaff of Ballinger said the pilot program would be known as the Texas Lions Camp for Diabetic Children.

The special summer session--June 7 through June 25--will be held at the facilities of Camp Manion near Friendswood, between Houston and Galveston, where a diabetic camp has been operated for the past 14 years.

The League is the non-profit, charitable organization which represents all the Lions of Texas, Grindstaff said.

developing camp skills--is to help diabetic children learn they can lead happy, normal lives by following good health practices and to give them self-confidence when they have to leave home.

David Hughes of Charles Town, West Virginia, was so appreciative of his last 50 years of life that he has willed his entire fortune to the United States Government.

In his "last will and testament," Hughes directed his executor, after paying Hughes' debts, to give the balance of his estate "to the United States for the use and benefit so far as the law allows of the Veterans Administration."

Hughes received an honorable discharge as a seaman second class from the Navy in 1920, and spent the remainder of his life in VA hospitals.

In his will, dated May 22, 1958, Hughes accounted for his generosity to his country by saying he was "motivated by

gratitude to the United States and more particularly the Veterans Administration and the successive administrators and officers thereof, for the great consideration and kindness shown me and the care and assistance lent me by them ever since I was injured in the military service of this, my country, in World War I."

Hughes' last testament continued: "I make the said devise and bequest as a small acknowledgement, although the largest I can make, of my gratitude to my country and its Government and its public servants charged with the care so generously accorded me and other veterans of war."

A check for \$3,990,64 was received by the U.S. Treasury which passed it along to the

Veterans Administration last week.

Administrator of Veterans Affairs Donald E. Johnson in Washington, D. C., said that Hughes' gift will be added to the VA Post Fund for the private needs of hospitalized veterans not covered by Congressional appropriations, such as the purchase of television sets.

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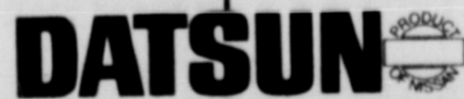

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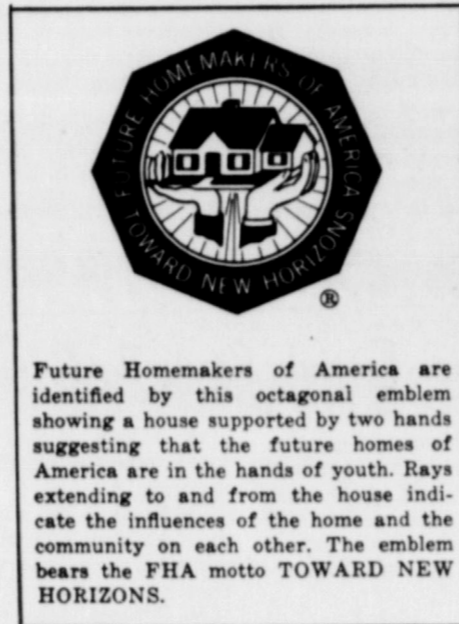

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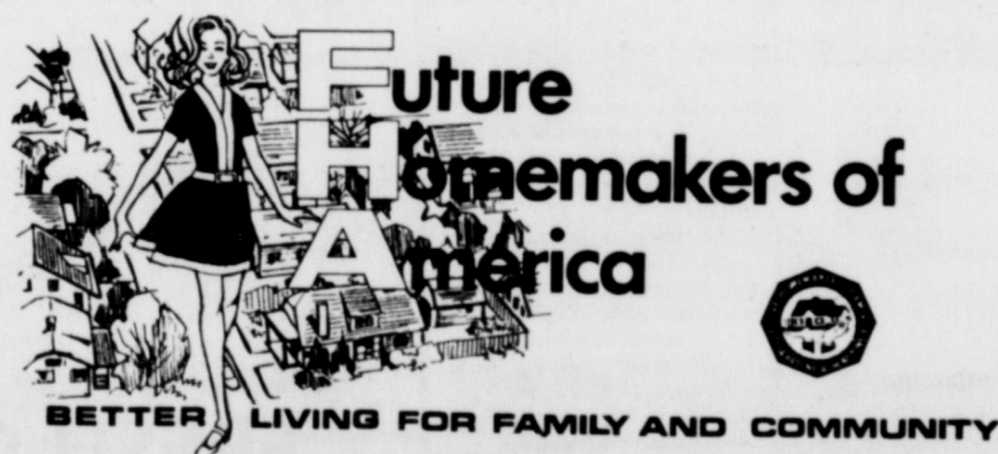

Representative Clayton serves as a member of the Intergovernmental Relations Committee of the National Legislative Conference. The Committee met March 19 and 20. A briefing on the President's

General and Special Revenue Sharing (grant consolidation) Programs was held for the attendees at the White House. Discussed were the implications for state and local governments contained in the President's six categorical special revenue sharing (grant consolidation) programs. To date, five of the six special messages (law enforcement, rural community development, urban community development, manpower training, and transportation) have been sent to Congress. The sixth--education--is expected to be sent next week.

Clark MacGregor, Counsel to the President for legislative and congressional affairs, addressed the legislators at a luncheon business session. He discussed the domestic initiatives of the President and their ramifications on state and local governments. The Intergovernmental Relations Committee was formed by the National Legislative Conference in 1957 in recognition of the increasing importance of the expanding role

of State Legislators in the federal-state partnership.

On a functional basis, the Intergovernmental Relations Committee has formed six task forces to consider problems and programs in the areas of: commerce and transportation, government operations, human resources, natural resources, urban affairs, and public safety. Representative Clayton serves as Chairman of the task force on natural resources.

Junior high teams were Vega, Farwell, Happy, Hart, Sudan, Kress and Springlake-Earth.

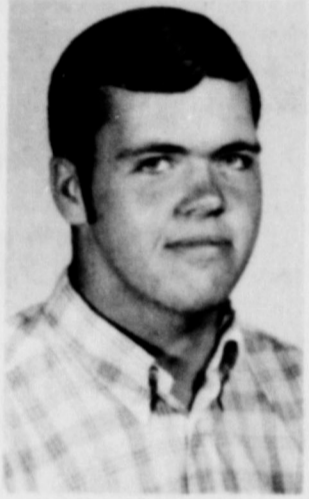
