## Amarillo Chamber Manager Says Unity Important

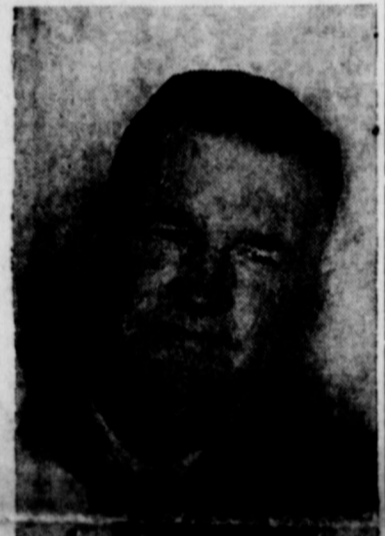
### Final Rights Conducted For Ben F. Orteg Wednesday Afternoon

Funeral services for Ben F. Orteg, 65 years of age were conducted at 2:30 p.m. Wednesday in the First Baptist Church at Earth, Rev. R. C. Gunstream of the Nazarene Church in Albuquerque, New Mexico officiated with Rev. C. T. Jordan of Earth assisting.

Mr. Orteg died at 10:00 a.m. Sunday in the Muleshoe Hospital following a heart attack suffered Saturday afternoon.

Mr. Orteg, a retired farmer, was born February 20, 1891 in Cook County, Texas to Mr. and Mrs. Edward Orteg. At the age of two his parents moved to Sulphur, Oklahoma, known then as the Indian Territory. The family moved to Western Oklahoma in 1905.

He was married to Lottie Harbarger November 12, 1919 at Ok-

lahoma City, Oklahoma. They moved to the Earth community in 1927.

He served two years in the 111th Division of Engineers during World War I. He was a charter member of the Muleshoe Nazarene Church and the American Legion at Olton.

He was preceded in death by a daughter, Mattie Marie in 1927.

Surviving are his wife, Lottie, a daughter, Mrs. Tex Haber of Earth; a foster daughter, Mrs. Mary Venoit of Wilmington, California; two grandsons, John Orteg & Donnie Haber, 4 sisters, Mrs. Cora Garrett, Mayfield, Okla.; Mrs. Jesse Kepper, Portland, Oregon; Mrs. Thelma Miller, Yuma, Arizona; Mrs. Ruby Spencer, Corona, California.

### Second Polio Shots To Be Given April 12 at Springlake School

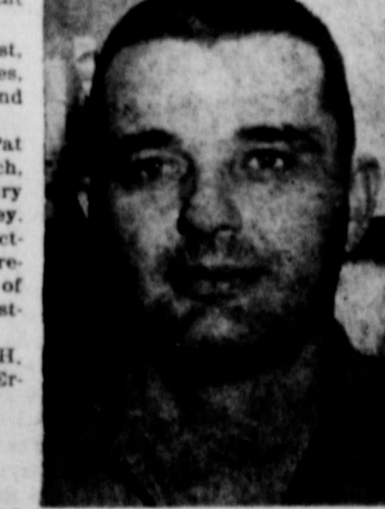
Second Polio shots of Salk vaccine will be given to the Springlake school students Friday, April 12 at the grade school building.

All children who received the first shot, March 22, will be given this second shot.

Dr. Carl Nowlin, County Health Doctor and Dr. F. B. Faust of Faust Clinic in Earth will give these inoculations.

Mass inoculations of Salk vaccine are being given free to school children as part of a nation wide program to protect them from the dreaded, crippling disease of Polio.

The third and final shot will be due in seven to 12 months following the second shot. It is the responsibility of the parents and will not be given at the school, however, Dr. Carl Nowlin, County Health Doctor, states that any child whose parents cannot afford the third shot will be given one free.

## Disabled Children Over 18 To Receive S. S. Benefits

The first benefits for disabled children over 18 will be paid under the social security system for January 1957. Mr. Hutton, manager of Lubock social security office, said yesterday. Applications are now being received.

Under the new provision children who are disabled may receive social security benefits even after they reach age 18 if they were (disabled before age 18, are unmarried and are dependant on a live parent who is drawing social security benefits, or were dependant on a deceased insured step-parent or adopted parent.

It is not necessary that the child himself have any record of work under the social security law to be eligible for benefits as a disabled child. However, he must have a disability severe enough to prevent him from engaging in any substantial gainful activity. The disability must be medically determinable.

Mr. Hutton advised disabled

children over 18 who believe they qualify, or persons caring for them, to inquire regarding benefits at the social security office.

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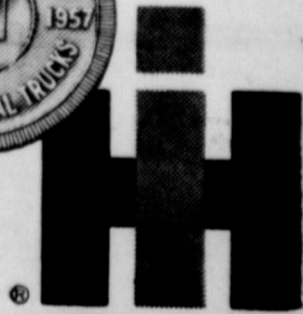

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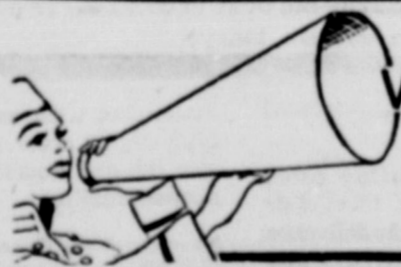

# Who Are The Best Drivers Men or Women?

Which is the better driver — a man or a woman?

Well, the Texas Department of Public Safety has just come up with the results of an exhaustive study which won't give the answer to that question, but which the State agency expects to utilize as a step in resolving the answers to a lot of other traffic problems involving drivers of motor vehicles.

The DPS Statistical Division, on the basis of records of the Department's Driver's License Division, has prepared a comprehensive analysis of the State's licensed drivers by age, race, sex and the type of license each holds.

These figures are expected to be applicable to population breakdowns and traffic accident experiences in similar categories and thus put the finger on accident-prone segments of society.

N. K. Woerner, DPS Statistical Chief, made the study and came up with multiple-dart code percentages which, when multiplied by the number of licensed drivers on file at any given time will give the total number of persons with concise accuracy by age, race and sex who hold operators, commercial or chauffeurs licenses.

Previous studies both in Texas and nation-wide have shown conclusively that there is a definite relationship between the number of persons holding valid driver's licenses and the number of traffic accidents which are recorded, but Woerner's new 25-page report and conversion chart compares what is believed to be the only survey of its kind ever made.

Using the Sep. 1, 1956, DPS Driver's License Division records as a basis for his study, Woerner shows that on that date there were 3,949,517 licensed drivers in Texas, of which 2,539,804 were men and 1,409,713 were women.

**Of the male drivers, 1,716,804**

held operators licenses; 684,952 possessed commercial licenses; and 138,047 were licensed as "chauffeurs."

As might be expected, a vast preponderance of the ladies were licensed only to drive passenger cars, with 1,388,295 in this category. Another 16,995 females held licenses indicating they qualified to drive commercial vehicles; and only 4,423 were in possession of chauffeurs licenses which allows them to drive passengers for hire.

Starting at age 14 (the youngest at which a person may qualify under certain conditions for any sort of driver's license in Texas, the number of individuals holding valid licenses increases from 4,937 (the number of 14-year-olds licensed) with each age group upwards to age 29 (104,982 licensed). There, the number declines for the 30 and 31 year old brackets, only to jump to 106,981 at age 32, the age group holding more licenses than any other.

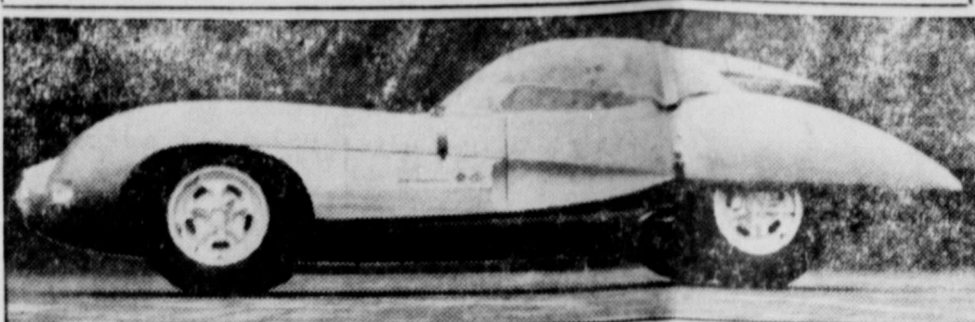
From age 32, the number of licensed drivers remains in excess of 90,000 for each group through the age of 39. Beginning with age 40, however, the number of licensed drivers declines steadily — with a few exceptions — for each year of additional age through 85, the point at which the survey ceases to classify by specific age. While only 1,291 persons (including 1,173 men and 118 women) aged 85 hold valid licenses, that is not to indicate that no one over that age is licensed to drive.

As a matter of fact, 3,029 individuals who are older than 85 did hold perfectly good driver's licenses on September 1. Of these, 2,777 were males and 249 were females. None of the ladies in this group held anything other than operators licenses but 167 of the men were qualified as commercial operators. The number of licensed male chauffeurs over 85 years of age was listed as "nil", which, according to Woerner's explanation indicates that there are a few but that the number is so small as to have no meaning in his conversion factors.

Percentage-wise, the study shows that 64.3 per cent of the State's licensed drivers are men and 35.7 per cent are women. These figures, however, are not indicative of the accident-proneness of male and female drivers, Woerner explains, since the latter must necessarily be based on the number of miles actually driven annually by each sex. This is known as accident exposure. Such information, he said, is not available and will not be until someone comes up with a practical method of surveying the State's nearly four million licensed drivers to find out just how many miles each drives.

"Anyway," Woerner adds, "we're not really concerned about which sex has the better drivers. There are good and bad in both — and the really important thing is for men and women alike to drive in such a manner as to merit individual commendation through law observance and motoring courtesy."

## Motorists Sometimes Do Strange Things Such As Driving Into The Side of Trains

"Motorists sometimes do strange things," J. O. Musick, General Manager of the Texas Safety Association, commented today, but the most unexplainable is the way they drive into trains.

Speaking in support of the "Signs of Life" program now being conducted in Texas by the Texas Safety Association and the National Safety Council, Musick said that in about one-third of the grade crossing accidents, the auto hits the locomotive or another part of the train.

Noting the number of deaths and injuries in railroad grade crossing accidents each year, despite the fact that more than 96 per cent of all highway rail crossings in the United States are marked by some warning signal, Musick urged motorists to use extra caution in approaching grade crossings.

He said railroads and traffic officials are jointly responsible for protecting grade crossings. Railroads require their trains to give audible warning of their approach. In addition to the round railroad approach signs and the white cross buck, heavily used grade crossings are protected by gates, flashing lights, bells, wig-wag signals or watchmen.

## Helpful Hints On Insect Control

College Station — Entomologists of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service have prepared information guides covering measures for the worst offenders in the insect world.

The recently released series includes L-217, Stored Grain Insect; L-218, 1957 Texas Guide for Controlling Cotton Insects; L-219, ways to fight the Pink Bollworm and L-245, Texas Guide for Controlling Insects and Diseases on Fruits and Nuts.

The publications are available through the offices of local county extension agents or from the Agricultural Information Office, College Station, Texas. All have been prepared to save time for those needing information on control programs or practices for combating the losses which insects cause each year. The control measures are listed in chart form with the recommended chemical for dusting and spraying.

The entomologists point out the great need for careful handling of insecticides as well as using control measures before insect infestations become so heavy that control is made difficult and expensive. Too, the entomologists point out that the recommendations given in the new publications are
