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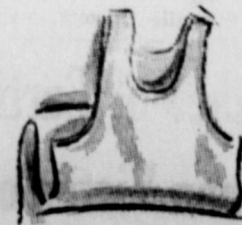

Farming activity at the High Plains Station of the Texas Research Foundation was stepped up January 25 with the delivery of a second tractor and equipment from the Minneapolis-Moline Company. 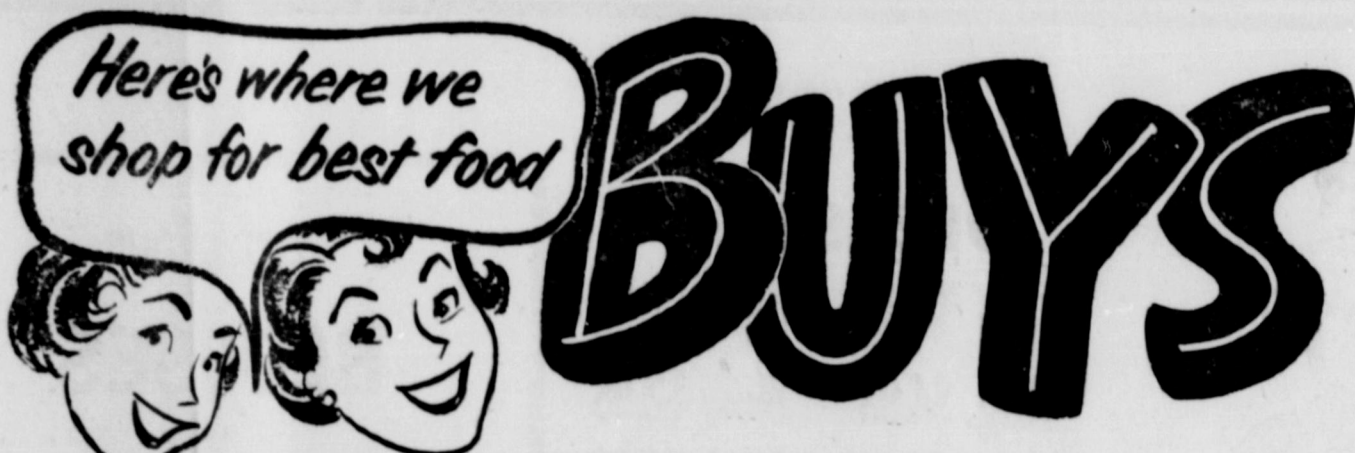

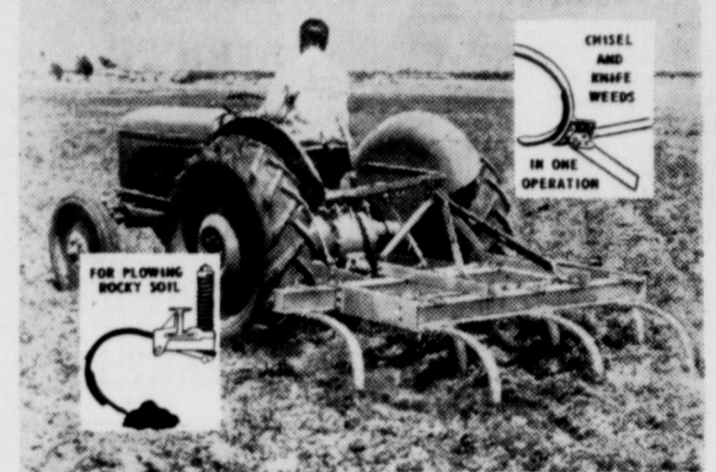

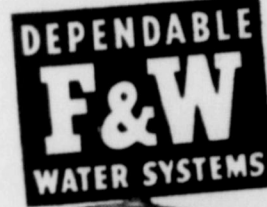

Railroads Extend Special Rates to Texas Farmers, Dairymen

AUSTIN, Texas — Drought ridden Texas farmers, dairymen and ranchers will reap additional large benefits as a result of the railroads' extending their 50 per cent freight reduction on shipments of hay.

Since October 13, when the rate slash went into effect through mid-January, Texas agriculturists were aided by the railroads to the extent of \$1,669,389. During that time the railroads shipped 134,993 tons of hay into Texas at the 50 per cent rate.

The rate cut tendered by the railroads covered eight states. The total saving to agriculturists in the 8 states has been \$2,371,882, of which \$1,669,389 has benefited Texans.

Action of the railroads, the dairymen, has been hailed by Texas agriculture leaders as the biggest contribution to the drought stricken area. The move was also

commended by President Eisenhower.

The rate reduction, originally scheduled to expire January 15, has been extended through March 31, the Texas Railroad Association announced.

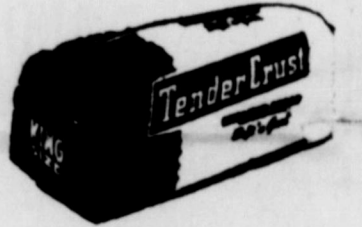

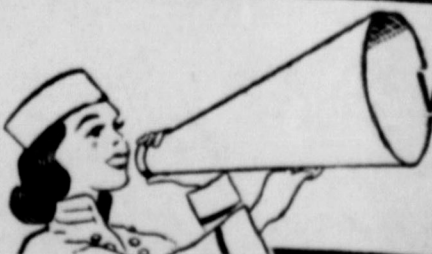
