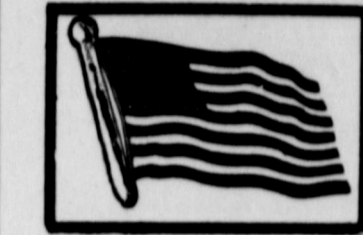
Attention Football Boys!

Earth Elevator Remodeling Complete, Ready For Season

Rebuilding and remodeling of the Earth Elevator has been completed and is ready to serve the customer with the most modern up to date equipment in the area, and residents in the community are invited to come by and tour the elevator which was contracted by Brown-McKee, Inc. of Lubbock, under the supervision of F. E. Kesler, foreman of the company.

The remodeling became necessary following damages received in a destructive fire that raged out of control for almost two hours on November 1, 1962, destroying the grain storage facilities, causing approximately \$150,000 damages. The smoldering grain kept Earth firemen alerted for several days.

The Earth Elevator was established in 1952 by Roy Byers Sr., owner of Byers Elevator in Littlefield, who is now retired.

Carroll Blackwell has been manager of the firm since its organization and an employee of Mr. Byers since 1955.

Mr. Byers moved his family to Littlefield from Caddo, Oklahoma in 1923, and farmed southeast of Littlefield. He entered the feed business in 1934, and before he retired, had branched out with three elevators in the area.

Since Mr. Byers' retirement, in 1955, his business interests have been divided between his children, ten in all, with each one having a part in handling their own business affairs.

Letter to the Editor

The following letter was received last weekend from the mother of one of the occupants of the car at the time of the terrible car wreck, following the published account of the wreck in August 8 issue of the News-Sun. We are sorry our source of information failed to report the serious condition of the Kesler lad...

Dear Sir,

Since I know how interested news people are in having correct information on the news, I thought possibly you would like to know about Jim Kesler, who was injured in the car wreck with Jerry Ammons and Sammie Smith.

Mr. Kesler had employed these boys on a construction job, and Jim was also working with his father, and his father was at Earth, when this accident occurred. Jim is 15 years old. He was thrown from the back seat through the windshield. He was very critically injured. Mr. Kesler had the doctor at Littlefield Hospital check him, to see if he could get him to Lubbock. The Dr. here worked on him from 1:00 until 5:00 Friday morning. Part of his skull was cut off, he had a brain concussion, his lungs hemorrhaged and his heart was damaged. He had over 100 stitches in his face. He was so serious that the Dr. had special nurses around the clock for four days and nights. The Dr. told us yesterday that the facial nerve has been destroyed to his eye, and that when he is able, he will have another head operation. He was also missing skin, and will have skin grafting and plastic surgery.

With all he is doing all right now, and will probably be all right some day, I'm sure the cause of the accident is very clear--that the car was being driven at almost unheard of speed. Our hearts are sad for the boy driving, and his parents. We know their grief from the pain of hurting the others is worse than the pain the other boys suffered, but their pain will pass in time, and Jerry's will be with him forever.

My husband and my son enjoyed working at Earth these past 21 months, very much. They made some very good friends. You certainly must have a town of fine, warm-hearted people.

Operate Cotton Picker Carefully

The difference between operating a mechanical cotton picker improperly and handling one skillfully may be as much as \$13.50 per bale or more, says B. G. Reeves, cotton ginning and mechanization specialist, Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Driving the picker off-center on a row often results in skinning off pieces of bark from the cotton plants, he says. Since bark is quite hard to remove at the gin, it may show up in the sample at the classing office. Cotton automatically loses one grade if it is classed "bark" and receives a one cent per pound penalty in the loan, says Reeves.

As an example of what this might mean to you, lets say that your cotton has been graded 5LM 1-1/16" but was down graded because of "bark" to LM 1-1/16". The difference

in price is \$1.70 per hundred pounds and the additional one cent penalty means a total loss of \$2.70 per hundred pounds or \$13.50 on a 500 lb. bale, Reeves explains.

A properly adjusted, carefully operated cotton picker can save hundreds of dollars a season and is reason enough for making sure the picker-operator keeps the machine centered on the row and does a good job of operating it in the field, says Reeves.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 9, 1963.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 26 proposing an amendment to Article XVI, Section 62 of the Constitution of Texas, by adding thereto a new subsection authorizing all political subdivisions of Jefferson County, Texas, to provide retirement, disability and death benefits for all appointive officers and employees of all political subdivisions within Jefferson County; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, explanation and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding thereto a new subsection (c), reading as follows:

"(c) Each political subdivision within Jefferson County, Texas, shall have the right to provide for and administer a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for all appointive officers and employees of all political subdivisions within Jefferson County, Texas; or said political subdivision may elect to join the County Retirement System of Jefferson County, provided that same is authorized by a majority vote of the qualified voters of such political subdivision and after such election has been submitted by being published in at least one (1) newspaper of general circulation in said county once each week for four (4) consecutive weeks; provided that the amount contributed by the said political subdivision to such Fund shall at least equal the amount paid for the same purposes from the income of such such person and shall not exceed at any time seven and one-half per centum (7 1/2%) of the compensation paid to such such person by the political subdivision.

"All funds provided for the compensation of each such person, or by the political subdivision of Jefferson County, Texas, for such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund, as are received by the political

subdivision within said county, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or counties or cities of this state, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States Government, the payment of the principal of and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States; provided that a sufficient amount of said funds shall be kept on hand to be determined by the agency which may be provided by law to administer said Fund; and providing that the recipients of benefits for said Fund shall not be eligible for any other pension retirement fund or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless the Fund, the creation of which is provided for herein, contributed by the political subdivision is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at the General Election in November, 1964, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the following words:

"FOR the addition of subsection (c) to Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution, to authorize all political subdivisions within Jefferson County, Texas, to establish, after approval of its voters, a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund covering all appointive officers and employees of said political subdivisions.

"AGAINST the addition of subsection (c) to Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution, to authorize all political subdivisions within Jefferson County, Texas, to establish, after approval of its voters, a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund covering all appointive officers and employees of said political subdivisions."

Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election to be held on the first Saturday after the first Monday in the month of November, 1964, and have notice of said proposed amendment and of said election published as required by the Constitution of Texas and laws of this state.

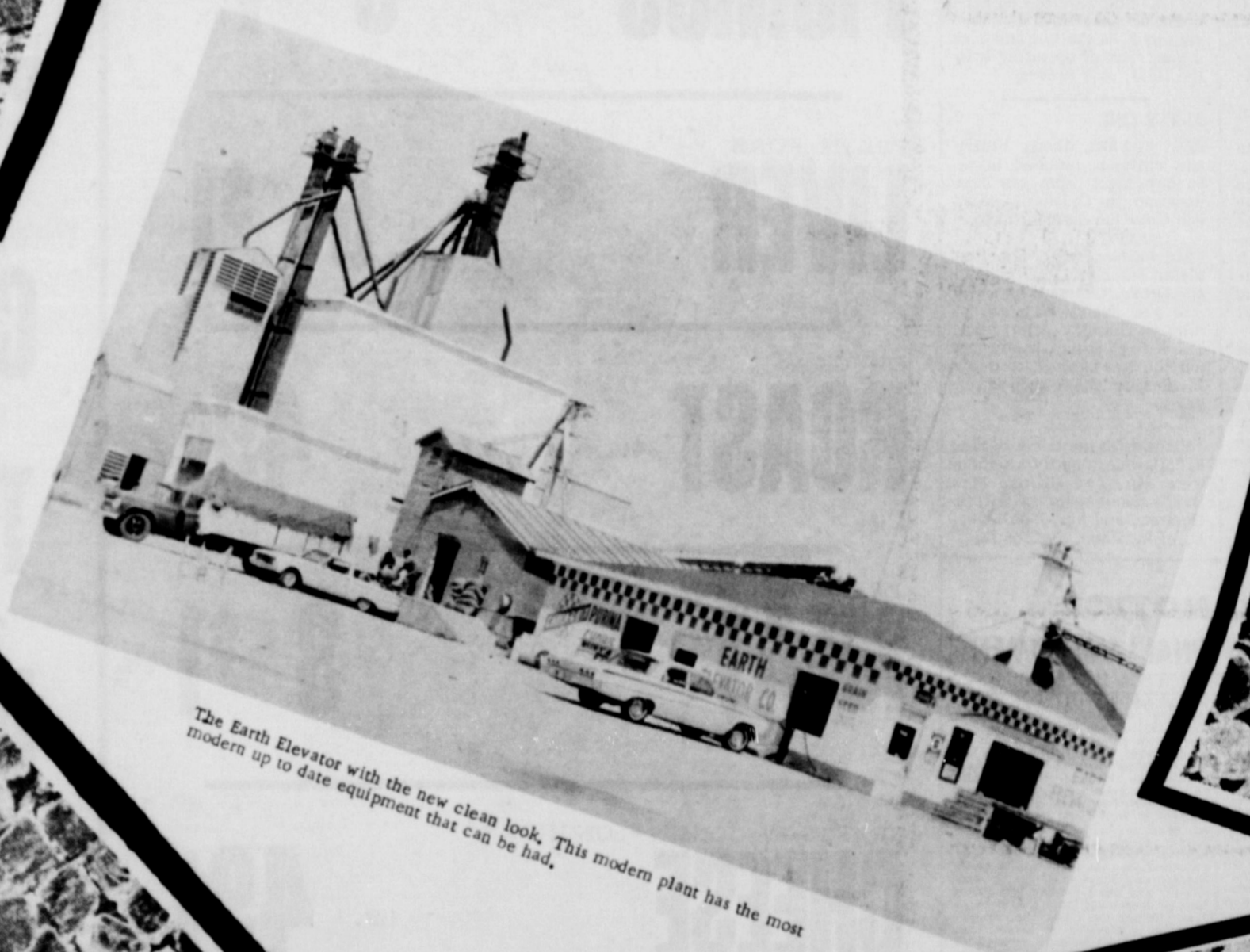

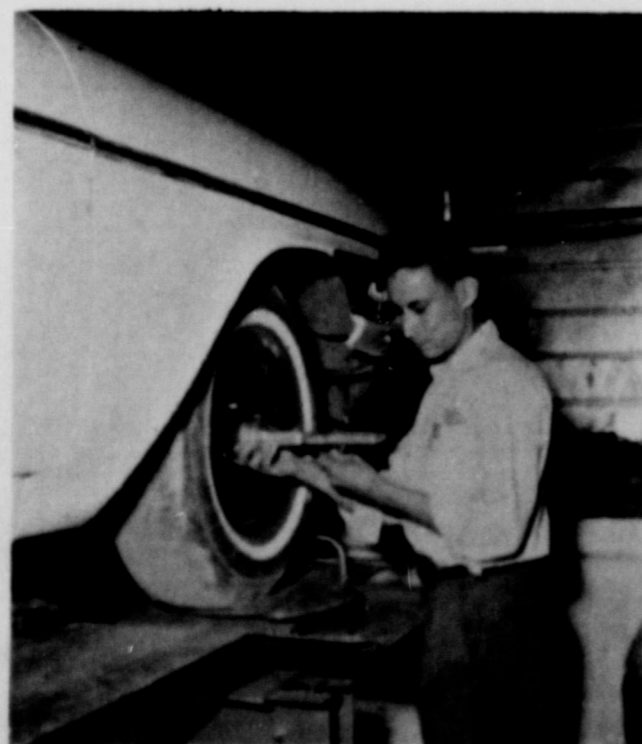

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Annual Boy's Rodeo Ranch Starts Sept. 1

The largest crowds in the history of the famed Boys Ranch Rodeo are expected at Cal Farley's Boys Ranch over the Labor Day weekend, September 1 and 2, when the 312 boys now being cared for hold their 19th annual event.

To accommodate the holiday crowds, the rodeo arena seating capacity has been expanded with the construction of 81 new concrete reserved boxes made possible by the Ranch's neighbor, the Texas Sand and Gravel Company, donating materials. The older boys of the Ranch worked on much of the construction as a part of their vocational training.

The new boxes will provide front row seats for more than 500 spectators with four, six and eight seats in a box. The Boys Ranch Rodeo is the only rodeo of its kind in the nation in which boys are the only contestants. Riding professional rodeo stock, they attract larger crowds each year with more than 7000 attending last year's two performances. It is fast-moving entertainment as older boys ride bucking broncs, Brahma bulls and steers, while the younger Ranchers take on the calves. All of the boys have some part in the rodeo.

A rapid sale of reserved box seat tickets is expected by Boys Ranch officials and advance orders are being taken at the Ranch's headquarters in Amarillo. The reserved box seats are \$2.50, which includes all admission charges. General admission will be \$1.50 for adults and 75¢ for children and servicemen in uniform. Proceeds from the rodeo will be used for the Ranch's expansion program.

Generally, though, look for an abundance of tomatoes, sweet corn, green beans, beets, cabbage, and lettuce. "Good buys" also will prevail on a number of in-season local vegetables.

Canned tuna joins the list because heavy inventories have caused concern among folks of the tuna industry. They're conducting a nationwide promotion program that means economical purchases for consumers. Tuna is an ideal hot weather meat, for sandwiches, salads, casseroles and other uses.

Watermelon supplies are expected to be at least as large as a year ago. Peanut foods, including peanut butter, are perfect summer snack items. Stocks of salad and cooking oils are about 700 million pounds larger than normal.

Wise shoppers can take advantage of the abundance of these plentiful foods by serving them often and generously. Lower prices and wider choice of quality usually accompany abundance.
